## Virginia Tech Shootings Leave CSI Campus on Edge

**O**n April 26, CSI's community paid their respects to the 33 lives cut too short during what is now known as the Virginia Tech massacre.

The hour-long memorial allowed students to reflect both on the tragic event, and their lives. With speeches from Dr. Marlene Springer, Carol Jackson, Vice President of Student Affairs, students, and professors, joined in sorrowful solidarity as the names of those killed were read.

CSI students, faculty, and staff were left with an uneasy feeling in their stomachs after April 16.

According to officials, the gunman chained the doors shut during the second rampage, making it nearly impossible for students to get out - or for police to get in.

Since this horrific event, complaints have been made about the way the situation was handled. Why

weren't any actions taken immediately after the first shootings in the dorms? What if the campus

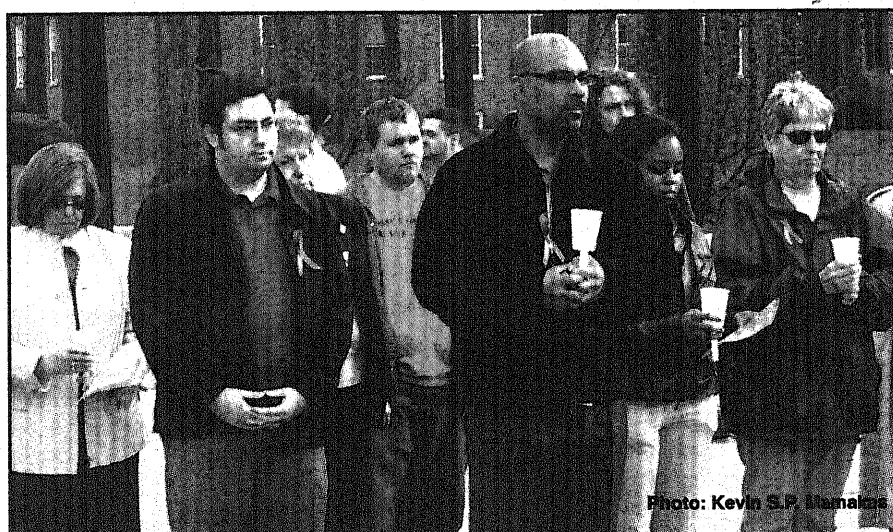

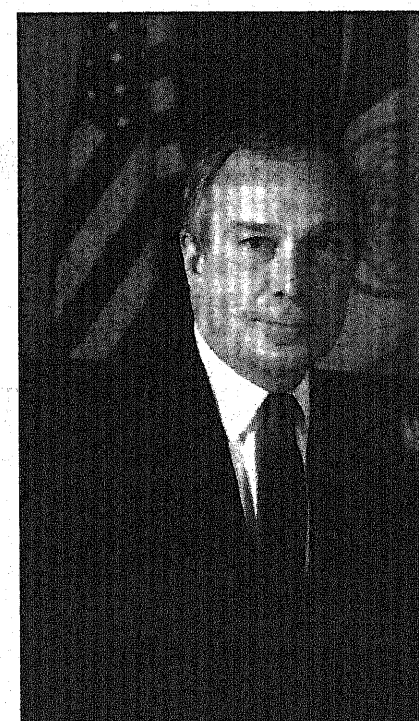

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## Bloomeberg Officially Confirmed As This Year's Commencement Speaker



Mayor Michael Bloomberg will be the Speaker for the May 31 Commencement Ceremony. Vice President for Student Affairs Carol Jackson made an official announcement at the April 25 Association Meeting.

Bloomberg was elected the 108th Mayor as a Republican in 2001, and was reelected to a second term in 2005. Forbes Magazine currently ranks him as the 44th richest person in the United States and the 142nd richest billionaire in the world, which explains why he only accepts the minimum mayoral salary, \$0.01 a year.

Bloomberg is well know by New Yorkers for donating his own money, more then \$125 million, towards an anti-tobacco initiative. Supporters of Bloomberg have started a campaign called Draft Bloomberg to encourage him to run for President as an Independent. Even though he has denied any interest in running, he has not officially ruled out the possibility.

## Deep Depp, Shallow at Best

"Depp" translated from German, means "idiot." To listen to "Deep Depp" is not enough to understand anything about Johnny Depp, but it is an effective sales pitch for Pomerance's book, as well as a great source for irrelevant trivia.

Johnny Depp was once told by Marlon Brando to not act for too long. "We only have so many faces in our pocket," Brando said to the young actor. This factoid, and countless others came from the lecture "Deep Depp: Travails of Celebrity in the Global Era." Unfortunately not much else came from it.

The lecture, "Deep Depp: Travails of Celebrity in the Global Era," was given in March by Murray Pomerance. The presentation explored Depp's film career "through a historical, cultural, and sociological focus." Pomerance wrote "Johnny Depp Starts here" in

2005, which is regarded as the most in depth look at the actor in print, albeit wordy and overly analytical.

Although the lecture had a similar subject matter, Pomerance was certain to note that it would not come near the depth that his book does. He was correct. "Deep Depp" was not an in depth talk about Johnny Depp, it merely brushed over his career, pointed out some memorable roles, and offered a number of questions with out sufficient answers.

Aside from being vague, non-informational, and lacking any reasonable conclusions, the lecture ran like an infomercial. Including plugs of other books he's written.

Professor Pomerance teaches Sociology at Ryerson University in Toronto. He is also the author of a number of books including, "Cinema and Modernity," "City That Never Sleeps: New York and the Filmic Imagination," and "An Eye for Hitchcock."

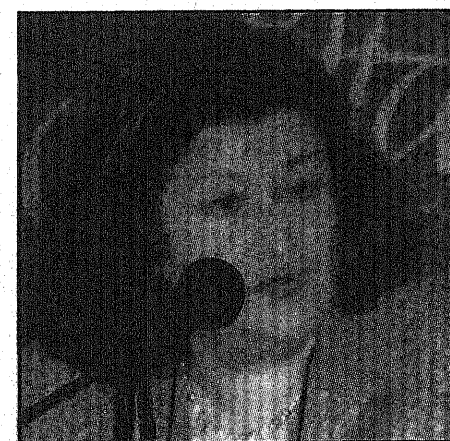

# The New York Times The American Democracy Project The Corporatization of Drugs

On April 19, the Staten Island Advance highlighted three separate events that focused on prescription drug abuse among local teens. The article introduced an unnamed Tottenville teen found with a stash of painkillers in his bedroom after threatening to shoot his step-father; on the same day, a 19-year old Annadale resident was reported to have impersonated a doctor in a vain effort to acquire prescription drugs from a pharmacy. These incidents are not isolated. Recently, the Advance published a story concerning the death of 17-year old Nicholas Caputo, who allegedly died in his sleep due to a powerful morphine lollipop prescribed to certain cancer patients in an effort to alleviate pain.

In total, the teens' failed collective efforts towards inebriation are not without reason. Staten Island teens are more likely to abuse drugs and alcohol than their peers in other boroughs. Likewise, the recent media attention brought to prescription pills only highlights the public's attention towards the negative consequences involved.

Mass produced and cheaply acquired prescription drugs are available and easily intensified, which

secures an addicted mass for pharmaceutical companies to legally exploit.

Despite the public's awareness of a sudden drug's popularity, the media neglect the entire scenario. Although natural drugs such as marijuana are either smuggled into or grown illegally in our country, prescription drugs corporations are able to freely distribute, market to, and create addicts; guaranteeing millions of dollars in the process.

To truly understand the impact of a given mind and/or body altering substance in society one must trace the product's lifespan to its origins. One of the more choice pills on Staten Island is "Vicodin." Affectionately named "vikes" or "hydros" by street pharmacists, the pills are sold by dealers who acquire the product in bulk from a prescription holder who legally acquires the pills from a pharmacy with physician's approval. The prescription holders in question work as a profitable middleman between the street dealers and the giant corporations who legally produce the drug. Though in retrospect, neither the CSI dropout dealer nor the physicians and pharmacists turn a profit even remotely close to that produced by major drug corporations.

According to Abbott Laboratory, the makers of Vicodin, the corporation recently reported in their latest quarter-

ly corporate statement: "worldwide sales increased 15.5 percent to \$5.3 billion." Likewise Pfizer, the makers of the popular anti-anxiety drug Xanax; reported similar earnings: "First-Quarter 2007 Revenues Grew 6 Percent to \$12.5 Billion, Driven by Growth of New and In-Line Products, Foreign Exchange, and Other Factors."

Loosely attributed to the "Other Factors" category is a profit resulting from the widespread abuse of prescription drugs by easily enhancing pills. Methods such as crushing the pills to increase reaction time and taking with alcohol create faster and more euphoric feelings but also establish a strengthened physical and mental dependence.

Today, in America, the imagery of a drug lord can no longer be represented by the cliché Scarface character. Instead, the changing face of drug pushing has transformed into a mysterious corporation ruled by a seemingly unknown board of directors. A top Pfizer director, named William R. Howell holds influential seats in several other profitable corporations but also in politically tied ones like Halliburton, which was under the control of Dick Cheney until he became Vice President in 2000. Owing to the existence of crucial investors with priority and influence, a shift in the democratic system occurs

and suggests that stock options override democracy.

Like many typical American communities, Staten Island is establishing a stance of negativity towards the abuse of prescription pills because of its addictive nature. But should the guilt rest completely on the individual abuser? Or should the Food and Drug Administration restrict the sale of potentially addictive drugs?

One recurring argument is that it is the individual's choice to abuse the pills in ways not suggested by the original makers. The argument is relatively solid but conveniently places blame solely on the addicted individual. Ironically, this logic also frees the corporation's hands and allows them to continue producing and profiting off the sale of their drug to existing users and those that will eventually begin.

The gigantic tobacco companies have remained in business by pushing the same agenda for years. Similarly, tobacco and pharmaceutical companies foreshadow a pill-popping society that frees the blame of their addiction off the hands of big business pushers and places it wrongfully on their own desire.

## IRAQ, A NATION STATE?

Iraq is not a state that evolved in the due course of time. It was a result of ethnal and religious intermingling and the British rule. After being granted independence from the British, Iraq was ruled by the Hashemite monarchy, which was overthrown by a military coup. members, who used to rule under Saddam. They want their power back along with Iraqi nationalists who are also fighting the U.S. military presence.

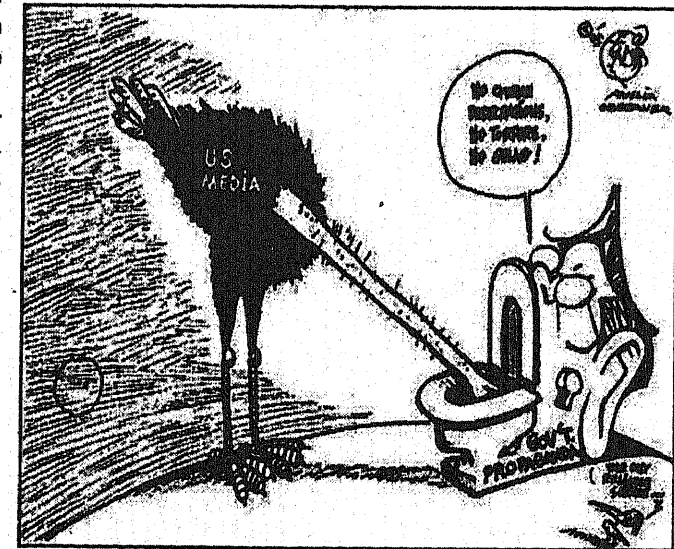
The Shites are the majority in Iraq. Sunnis and Kurds form the other major communities. Apart from these, there are also other minorities such as Assyrians and Shabaks. The Kurds have established their own autonomous region, which blocks the creation of a nation state.

It is a difficult situation for the U.S. to solve. Recently, there has also been a tremendous increase in the violence happening widely across the nation. Under the terms of the constitution, the country conducted nationwide parliamentary elections on December 15, 2005 to elect a new government. The overwhelming majority of all the major ethnic groups in Iraq voted along ethnic lines, turning their



vote into more of an ethnic census than a competitive election, and setting the stage for the division of the country along ethnic lines.

The need of the hour is to focus on a religious and civil understanding between all the communities, especially the Shites and Sunnis. With a civil disorder prevailing, there is no point in sending in more troops to a war-torn nation. The future of Iraq also depends on the changing political situation in the United States. With a possible change of power in the 2008 election, the political world has already started calculating the effect it may have on Iraq.

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dures in light of all of this," Jackson said. "We reviewed [the crisis plans] and I think they for the most part are in very good order, and we are trying to be on top of it as far as we can be. It's a crazy situation, and anything is possible." Jackson continued, "Anything is possible, and we would like to be able to say that we can protect everybody from everything, but we live in a real world."

At 7:15 a.m. on April 16, while most of Virginia Tech's 2,600 acre campus was still asleep, Cho Seung Hui, a senior and English major proceeded with his first rampage.

Armed with a 9mm pistol, a .22 caliber handgun, and over two dozen rounds of ammunition, he took two lives in West Ambler Johnson dormitory, which house 895 people. Two hours later, as police investigate the first shooting; a second shooting was reported at Norris Hall, an engi-

this hard to believe. A student who wished to stay anonymous said, "I have never seen public safety do anything but deny people I.D. card stickers. Being that they do not make their presence made, I don't think they're much of a deterrent."

Adam Lazarus, a junior at CSI agreed, "The shootings at Virginia Tech only underscored how vulnerable most college campuses are. Lazarus went on to state, I'm not blaming Public Safety. They probably do whatever they can, but then again they're minimally staffed, probably very underpaid, and have no real defense if something like that or worse would happen."

Almost two decades ago, at CSI's Sunny Side Campus, Spanish professor, Ruth Calderon-Gutierrez was attacked by a student in a crowded classroom as students and two other professors looked on. While holding her in a chokehold, the student screamed, "I'll kill you." Another student came to her rescue, pulling the deranged student off of Calderon, leaving scratch marks on her chest area. Later that day, Calderon found out that the secretary and director of the language lab, were also attacked by the same

woman. The traumatic event was then reported to Ed Paradise, the Director of Public Safety at the time. According to Calderon, Paradise remarks were less than professional. "What did you expect me to do?" Paradise asked. "I wouldn't send my guys up there with the possibility to get hurt."

neering building on the opposite side of campus.

"Keep in mind too, public safety officers here are extremely well trained," Bob Huber stated. "Gene Martinez and George Mallon have spent years and years in very responsible positions in the New York City Police Department. In fact, Martinez was a detective in Manhattan South Homicide, which is very high up on the food chain police work. George Mallon headed up the intelligence division of the N.Y.P.D."

Huber went on to state that both Martinez and Mallon are "public safety personals who bring a wealth of experience in dealing with public safety issues. George Mallon and Rob Yurman have close working relationships with the Borough Command on Staten

Island, they could have a patrol car here in three to 5 minutes. In a much larger response, this place would be crawling with police within a few minutes."

However, many CSI students find

Cho, who had been institutionalized for a brief time for suicidal behavior in 2005, had a history of disturbing behavior and writing. In between the shootings, Cho made a video message raging about women and "rich kids." News reports said that Cho may have been taking medication for depression and his behavior was becoming extremely erratic. But not every student that seems "a little different" to the norms of society will end up going on a shooting spree. Psychology Professor Katie Cumniskey hopefully can put this myth to rest. "There is no mold for someone who would do something like this."

Professors might want to label the quiet student in the back of the class with his hood up, but those students usually turn out to be extremely brilliant.

"There may be the impression out there that one has to be absolutely crazy to come to counseling states," said Mary Murphy, MSc. Associate

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Director of the CSI Counseling Center. "I just want to put that to sleep because that isn't true. It's for people who endure all kinds of issues, ranging from depression or anxiety, and people who are perhaps suicidal at times."

For students who are feeling distressed or not feeling mentally stable, Murphy has a few words of advice. "They should think about coming to the counseling center. We are trained counselors. When they come to the counseling center everything is kept private."

In certain circumstances we are bound by law to do otherwise. When they are a danger to themselves, others, and if someone is a minor and there is an abuse situation of an elderly person."

Pomerance continued to give some historical insight into the "Studio" era of Hollywood, and it's evolution into present day. Pomerance claims that despite the public's attempts to "grasp" Depp, he is "conceivably the first movie star we will never quite know." "We want to have Johnny," said Pomerance.

The lecture gave some insight to those who are ignorant as to how Hollywood works, but for the Media and Communications students that it was most likely geared towards, it was essentially a refresher course. Offering no real information that couldn't be found within a Google search, Pomerance continued speaking about the enigma of Johnny Depp without giving any kind of answers.

The questions and answers portion, which was cut short, did little to answer the questions of the audience. One viewer drew a conclusion between Johnny Depp and Andy Warhol stating that Johnny is playing with public perception of celebrity as Warhol did. Pomerance responded "I think I'm being complimented." Another member of the audience asked for clarification of that idea and was given a reading from earlier in the lecture. At this moment the lecture was ended abruptly.

A great deal of the talk focused on Depp's roles in the Pirates of the

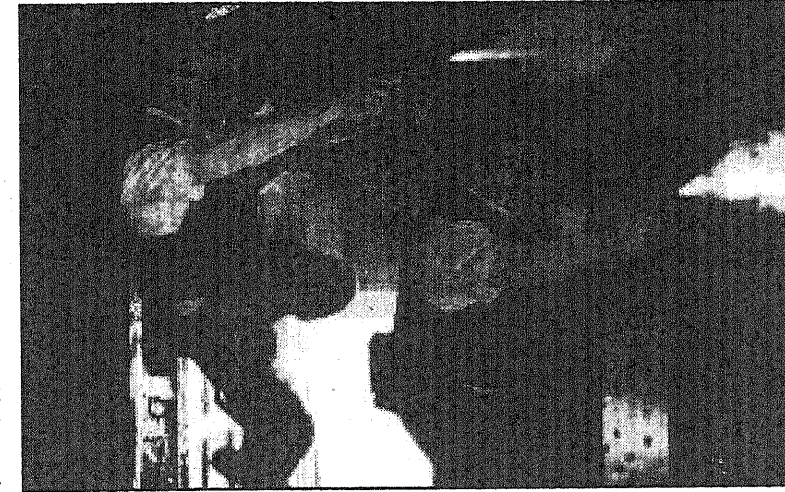
# See What the Fuzz is About

In 2004, Simon Pegg and Edgar Wright made their first strides in American film when they co-wrote and played in *Shaun of the Dead*, the critically successful zombie spoof. The British comedy duo teamed up again, along with *Shaun*'s director Edgar Wright to present the action-comedy *Hot Fuzz*, a parody of American action and crime films.

Sergeant Nicholas Angel, played by Pegg, is a highly trained London police officer. Angel is so adept at his job that his arrest record is 400 percent higher than the rest of the department's. His fellow officers and superiors, in order to preserve their own reputation, arrange for him to be transferred to Sanford, a pleasant suburban town with a crime rate of almost zero percent. Angel busts underage drinkers, traffic violators, and tracks missing geese while patrolling the quiet streets. But, when a string of unexpected deaths hit the town, Angel suspects that there is a pattern developing. To uncover the conspiracy, Angel teams with the incompetent but persistent PC Danny Butterman

Most of the success of the movie came from the natural chemistry of Pegg and Frost. Their teamwork proved that they have the potential to develop a small cult following and was both evident on camera and off of it. As writers, they managed to make the humor comfortable and not too farce, spoofing on well-known action films. The plot was simple but well written and entertaining. Some of the humor dragged in the beginning, only

ences for later laughs. Wright's Butterman character provided most of the reliable humor early on, making heavy references to *Bad Boys 2* and *Point Break*. In one scene, Angel pays homage to Clint Eastwood's signature toothpick in cheek while riding through the town on a horse. Pegg and Wright's brand of humor delicately balanced dry British humor with American context. Even the impressive action sequences managed to fit in rags on

the suspended disbelief of typical slow motion Hollywood shootouts with a slapstick quality.

*Hot Fuzz* was supported by the strong directing of Edgar Wright, who managed to capture the monotony of the setting and still made it visually entertaining. He loaded it with plenty of chaotic jump cuts, reminiscent of his work in *Shaun of the Dead* and his action montages were carefully arranged and somewhat engaging for a comedy. Wright sets up a few moments of shock in some of the gory death scenes, particularly when the journalist's head is crushed with a church steeple.

Pegg and Frost might have restored some credibility to spoof comedy flicks with *Hot Fuzz*. It gets by with cheap laughs and delayed responses and is great for the avid non-thinker. Overall, the movie is good in terms of style and story, but might be better rented than theater viewed.

Poor PlayStation Portable (PSP). Despite being the most powerful handheld ever it hasn't translate well with the public. Nintendo continues to be the king of the handhelds with the Nintendo DS. Soon, every night is, WE should

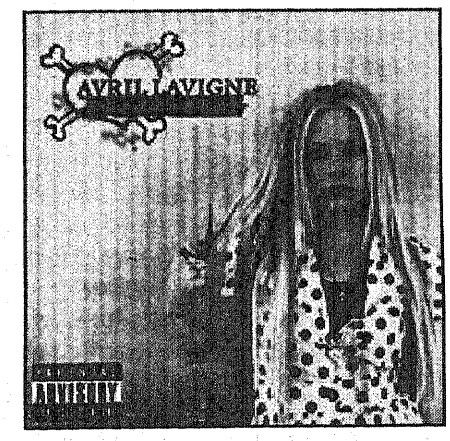

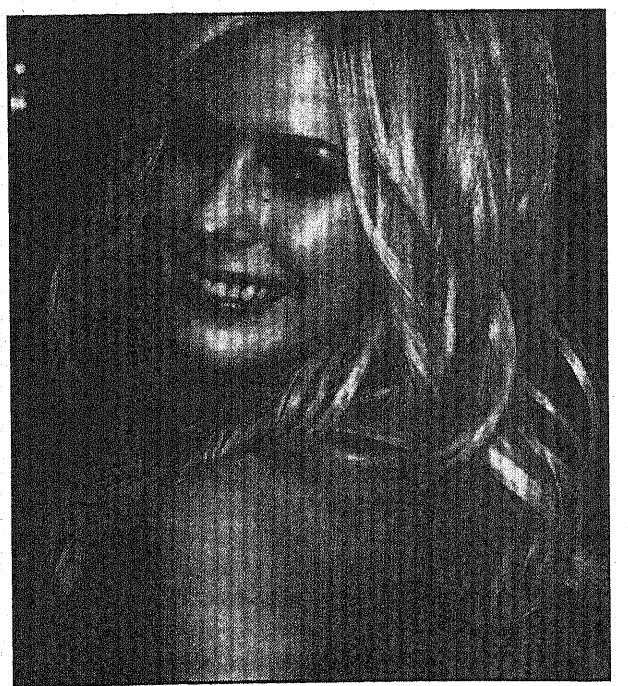

# Taijiquan Through the Western Gate

Rick Barrett's book offers nontraditional ways to improve one's health, mental focus, athletic performance, or self-defense skills through the thousands of year's old Chinese art of Tai-chi ch'uan. The book weaves together the pearls of the ancient martial art philosophy and modern scientific concepts.

The author, Sifu Barrett, who is a senior student of Grandmaster William C.C. Chen and a world-famous push hands player, has pursued the secrets of taijiquan and energy healing for more than twenty-five years. In 1997, Barrett won 4 Gold Medals in National Push Hands competitions in the Super heavyweight Division and 2 Gold Medals in the Middleweight Division. He teaches taijiquan workshops all over the U.S. and also on Staten

Island at the Snug Harbor Cultural Center.

Barrett's book opens the western gate of ancient oriental secrets in twenty chapters, in the last of which he reveals the "secret of the golden flower" - Barrett's metaphor for the relationship between the original mind and the conscious mind.

The author illustrates the well-guarded treasures of the Orient's inner practices to average westerners in a charmingly readable way while he also applies modern scientific explanations. For athletes, the book reveals how to get into the "Zone." For stressed-out students, it offers a supreme mental focus, and for those who suffer from health problems, the book brings about a tool of self-healing. At the same time, Barrett's book can serve as an invaluable resource for experienced martial arts practition-

ers.

In the introductory chapters, Sifu Barrett demystifies the ancient philosophy and techniques of the art of taiji. Barrett delves into the integration of the different levels of being - spirit, mind, and body. "Each has its role and performs better when acting in resonance with other levels. It is then that we are rewarded with health, wisdom, and power."

The author shares his knowledge about "entering the zone" where "brute force is discouraged in favor of the highly efficient use of a relaxed body and keen sense of internal energy." And if he stays in the "zone," Barrett, a fifty-year-old man, wins easily a tennis or basketball match against players a third his age and three inches taller.

Not only athletes, but also ordinary folks can appreciate when oppor-

tunities present themselves, gift wrapped, Barret writes.

Body/mind wisdom and art of taijiquan are performed in a highly conscious way, for the students to experience the mental, spiritual, physical, and energetic levels of their being in a perfect harmony.

The study of taijiquan reprograms the reader's consciousness and bodily functions. Taijiquan students acquire a higher order of relaxed efficiency, which improves their wellness and health, and gradually allows their bodies and minds to change in ways that resonate with the pulse of life, Barrett claims.

Barrett, borrowing from medieval scholastic St. Bonaventure, explains that humans perceive with three eyes: eye of flesh, eye of mind, and eye of contemplation and recommends to all to keep their three eyes wide open.

April 25 - On a grisly, overcast Wednesday afternoon in the Bronx the CSI baseball team lost a tough 8 - 6 conference game to Lehman College.

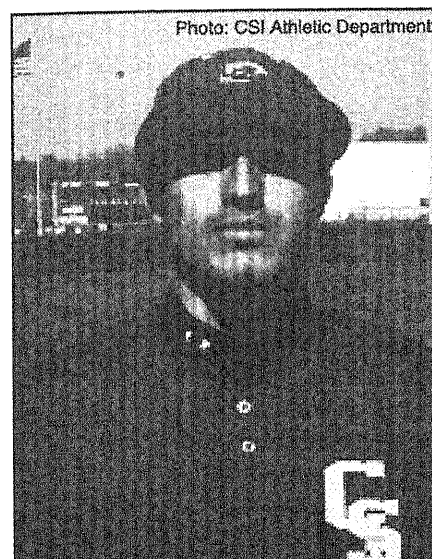

"There is no quit in this team and we are confident that once we are back to 100 percent we will rebound and contend for the title," outfielder Anthony Piccirillo said. "A-Pic", last year's tournament MVP, refers to injuries that have sidelined himself and fellow starter Mohammad Hamad. Both have recently returned to the Dolphins' lineup.

Hitting has not been the problem recently for CSI. "In our two losses (to City College), we had 16 hits and 13 hits," Head Coach Bill Cali said. "We scored 15 runs and 9 runs. That should be enough to win ballgames."

But inconsistent pitching and fielding has hurt the team, and continued to do so in their ensuing losses, a 17 - 7 beating by New Jersey College and the Lehman loss.

The Dolphins' Baio then scored on a hit by DiCasoli, who reached

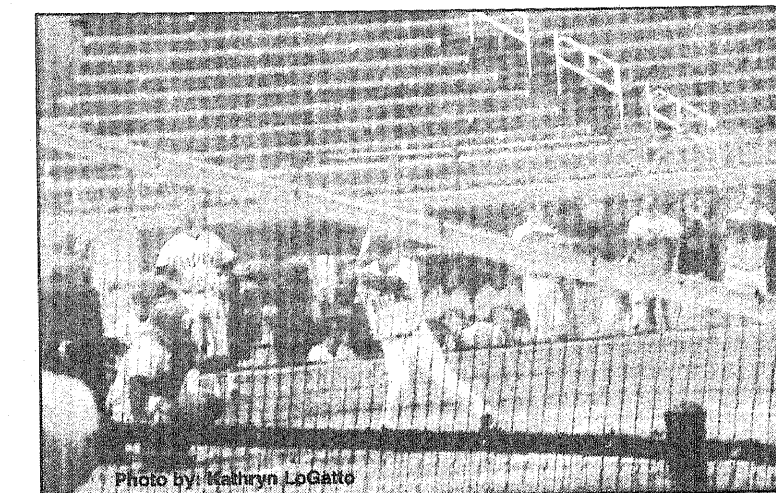

Nobody knew the severity of Hamad's injury, but the feeling was that he could miss some serious time during the season.

The Dolphins scrambled to try to replace the leadership and production of the two players who were both integral parts of the team. A platoon of different players attempted to fill Piccirillo's hole, while freshmen Brian Phillips and Rudy Piccirillo held down the fort at second base for CSI.

Over the next few games, in pursuit of their fifth straight CUNY Conference title, the Dolphins 1-8 record put a damper on their hopes and faced a much more difficult road, and must bear down both on the mound and defensively if they plan to make the playoffs and be a contender for the CUNYAC title.

"We were horrible, plain and simple," said Rudy Piccirillo. "Losing Ant and Moe really hurt our team but that is no excuse for some

CSI seemed to click on all cylinders heading into the key part of their season and in the middle of making a playoff push. In the April 14th double-header against Lehman, the duo returned to action and the Dolphins swept the visitors in Willowbrook. Hamad platooned second in the first game of the doubleheader and was steady as a rock in his return.

"It felt great to get back out there and contribute to the team," Hamad said. "Especially after getting hurt last year and missing our championship run through the playoffs. I wanted to be part of this run."

Piccirillo contributed three hits, two runs scored and an RBI in the games, all while looking like he never missed a beat in the field.

"Having Ant and me back is nice," Hamad said. "But the team as a whole must get better and step our game up to make some noise in the playoffs."

The Dolphins softball team won three games in a triple-header at the CSI Softball Complex. Their first opponent, conference rival the Brooklyn College Bridges, dropped the first game to CSI by a score of 13-1. Next came a double-header sweep against non-conference opponent the Drew University Rangers that they won by scores of 10-1 and 4-3.

In the Brooklyn College game at noon, the Dolphins' Kari Drew Varriale pitched a complete game for the victory. She threw a great game tossing five innings and allowing one earned run on six hits while walking three and striking out six.

"I went out there and just tried throwing strikes," Varriale said. "I just knew I had my defense behind me to back me up."

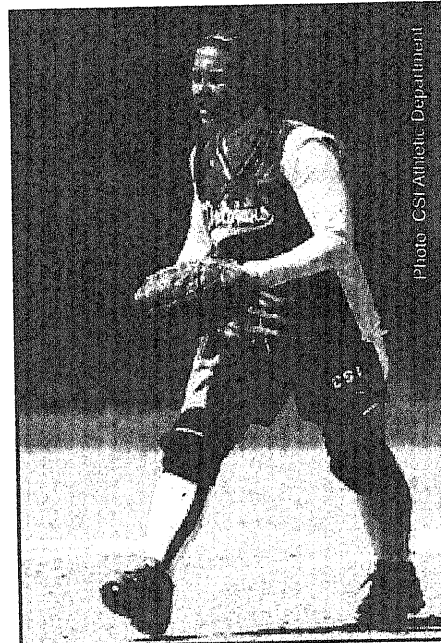
On the offensive side for the Dolphins they received tremendous results from sophomore catcher Nicole Estrada, who finished the game 2-for-4 with two RBIs. Freshman first base player Stefanie Allen finished the game 4-for-4 with two runs scored and two RBIs.

The Bridges received their only offensive output from sophomore third base player Lindsey St. Jour, who provided the only run for the Bridges going 1-for-2 for the day.

After defeating Brooklyn, the Dolphins took on Drew University at 3:30 p.m. Top pitcher for the Dolphins, senior Christina D'Arpa, took the mound and tossed a complete game. She gave up one run, which came unearned, three hits and did not walk any. She had four strike outs.

"Once I get in a rhythm I feel good," said D'Arpa. "As long as the team and myself go out there and give one hundred percent, we usually come out with a positive outcome."

The Dolphins spread out a highly offensive output against the Rangers and received big games from several players. Senior infielder Brianna Russ finished 3-for-3 with one run scored and five RBIs. Junior

outfielder Michele Mazza finished the game 2-for-2 with a homerun, two runs scored and two RBIs while Estrada put forth a perfect 3-for-3 contest with a run scored and an RBI.

For the Rangers, April Jacob recorded her team's only RBI in the fourth inning with a single.

The Dolphins saved the best for last and defeated the Rangers in the last inning of the game. CSI pitcher Katie Rossetti also pitched a complete game and had a great performance, allowing no earned runs in her outing. Her biggest obstacle came in the sixth inning when she pitched herself out of a bases loaded jam with a strike out and two groundouts.

"I focused on one batter at a time," Rossetti said. "I knew I needed at least one strikeout and I got it. My defense did the rest."

The game was tied at three going into the final frame of the sixth. The Dolphins had junior outfielder Megan Donohue on third base when senior D'Arpa scorched a grounder to second base. The Rangers' Cailin McGrorry threw the ball home but Donohue slid around the floating tag of the catcher to score the winning run.

"I just tried to put the ball in play and it worked," D'Arpa said.

On the day, the Dolphins pounded 33 hits at the opponents in the three games. Estrada and Allen provided six hits each.

"It was a fun day," Estrada said. "The games go quick when you're on the winning side of things."

The team hopes to make it back into the CUNYAC championship game after being upset last year by rivals Hunter College.

## Injury Bug Slows Dolphins

Piccirillo, the stud center fielder and lead off catalyst for the Dolphins lineup, found himself on the wrong end of a freak accident in mid-March. One of heavy, metal doors in CSI's Sports and Recreation Center came crashing down on his ring finger while he was working out for the baseball team. The reigning CUNY Conference Rookie of the Year and CUNY Conference Tournament

MVP's fingertip was torn off and required surgery immediately.

"I plan to be back in two weeks no matter what," Piccirillo, lounging around with a cast from his fingers to his elbow, said after his surgery. "I don't think I'll miss more than that."



Anthony Piccirillo, Dolphins center fielder warms up by shagging some flies before a game. Photo: Matt Maseo

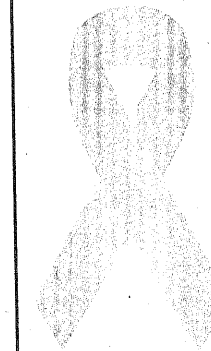
The Dolphins' second baseman, Hamad, whose steady bat and glove anchored the right side of the infield for the past two and a half seasons, pulled up lame while trying to beat
