Two of the Twenty Representative Positions are Left Vacant Until March

BY WILLIAM KLINE ADP EDITOR Student Government will accept nomi-

nations for an in-house election this March in order to fill two empty seats along with nominations for April's general election.Nominees will include one candidate of freshman or sophomore standing, and one of a junior or senior rank.

Since the prospective senators' election comes at the mid-way point of the academic year, their term will expire on May 31. The general election will decide all of the twenty representatives who will take office for the next academic year that begins on June 1. Thus far, between five and seven students have undertaken the self-nomination process. "It's a pleasure [for students] to have the ability to have an impact on campus," said elections commissioner, Peter Decrescenzo. A CSI sophomore had a car accident on her way home from classes on February 08, 2008, at 7:50 pm when her car spun out of control and crashed into a utility pole on a dark and slippery South Gannon Avenue, close to the CSI campus.

Ms. Jacqueline Donadio was rushed, with a police escort, to Richmond University Medical Center, on a cold, winter, Wednesday night. The 20-year-old student was pronounced dead at approximately 8:30 pm at the hospital.

CSI's Top Administrators Retire

Spring Brings Whirlwind of Changes – Angelo J. Aponte and David Podell Step Down.

Vice President for Finance and Administration Angelo J. Aponte and David Podell, Senior Vice President of Academic Affairs and Provost, are stepping down only a few months after the new president came to power.

Last semester, The Banner interviewed the CSI President Tomas Morales and questioned whether or not he intended to change staff. President Morales said that he wanted to "examine the organizational structure, to assess the administrative leadership whether the individuals who are responsible for the various functions are appropriate to do their job."

While the spring semester has only started, two of the top administrators suddenly step down - Angelo J. Aponte and David Podell. Is Vice-President for Student Affairs Carol Jacson next?"Vice President for Finance and Administration Angelo J. Aponte has announced his intention to retire in order to spend more time with his family," President Tomas Morales stated in his message on the CSI Web site. The 61-year-old one-time high school basketball coach, who graduated law school, and, who also served as the NYC Commissioner of Consumer Affairs and NYC Housing Commissioner, also worked in the waste management industry. He has been involved with a number of controversial matters over the past few years.

Aponte's more recent projects include the mysterious master plan to build dormitories either on the CSI campus or on the State land, inhabited by the developmentally disabled, in the immediate neighborhood of CSI. Continued on page 3

When the dust cleared, two stood poised and ready continue the fight. Except, the problem was that one of them was supposed to have fallen on the historic night, which came with so much build-up.

Super Tuesday came with historic implications embedded in its build-up. On one day, twenty-four states would ultimately decide the two Democratic and Republican nominees.

It even came paired with a historic Super Bowl match up two days prior. Some even called it Super-duper Tuesday, in order to really add the zest. But, what happened on the most delegate rich primary election day in US history would only equate to a tie in the Giants-Patriots game.

Professors Call for Optical Scan Systems to Replace Lever Voting Machines

BEWARE OF COMPUTERIZED TOUCH SCREEN VOTING MACHINES SAY COMPUTER AND SOCIAL SCIENCE FACULTY

Beware of computerized voting machines. Paper-based optical scan systems are a better alternative. That's the message from more than 100 computer and social science faculty from across New York who signed on to a public letter to policy makers across the state including several from, CSI. The letter was released today by the New York Public Interest Research Group, as the state nears making a decision on how to replace its 20,000 mechanical lever machines.

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"Optical Scan systems are inherently more secure, reliable and auditable than their ATM style touch screen counterparts," said Professor Ronald Hayduk of Borough of Manhattan Community College, a noted author on election issues. "As educators in the social and computer sciences familiar with these new technologies, we thought it vital to speak out now before a decision is made," he added.

Under federal and state law mandates, New York is expected to replace its lever machines by 2009, though a federal court is currently reviewing the pace of the state's efforts. Currently, each County Board of Elections will be making that decision, choosing between optical scan and computerized touch screen systems. The letter urged that optical scan systems where voters fill out their ballot by hand or with the assistance of an accessibility device be adopted statewide.

"Computerized touch screen voting machines have been nothing but trouble," said Ben DeAngelis, a Project Coordinator with the New York Public Interest Research Group, (NYPIRG) the organization that organized the letter. "New Yorkers deserve the best voting system available, not the one with the best lobbyist. It's clear, optical scan systems are the way to go," he added.

The effort to recruit university faculty and staff to weigh in on the voting system selection process began last month according to NYPIRG, which expects additional support as counties move closer to making a decision. The list includes professors from more than 20 universities across the state including

Nothing short of a bar room melee or a spectacle that involves jumping busses with a motorcycle will draw audiences away from the conflict potential of the Hillary-Obama showdown that will dominate the political atmosphere for the next several months. Or else, the old red state-blue state divide might only apply to the democrats, leaving the Republicans on the outskirts of the election looking inward.



Recently, Aponte, who had earned one of his post-graduate degrees at CSI, ran for CSI president, but was forced to drop his candidacy in May 2007, after more than 200 CSI professors and staffers petitioned that a proven scholar and academic be appointed president.

He also attempted to increase the business functions of the college in order to increase income. Some people felt this direction was contrary to the goals of an educational institu-

Aponte "played a key part in the branding of CSI and creation of a marketing function at the college." President Morales said in his message. "Angelo initiated a master plan for the campus that includes major capital projects, such as future classroom and residential housing scheduled to open in May 2010."

The Banner has repeatedly inquired about the above-mentioned master plan, either with George Targownik or Lillian McGinn from Campus Planning but to no avail. Both of them say that they don't know anything about the master plan.

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CSI Student Dies in Tragic Car Accident continued from front



Although Ms. Donadio didn't believe in coincidences, she had a brother, Cory, who had been involved in a fatal car accident, killing a pedestrian on Hylan Blvd, only a few months ago. He was never prosecuted because he had a green light

and remained at the scene.

Ms. Donadio left behind her father. Daniel Donadio, a retired NYPD lieutenant, her mother Diana, two brothers and many close friends.

"I just want her to come home...She is not dying," Ms. Donadio's mother told the Advance. "She is not dying. They wouldn't let me take her home to take care of her. I begged them."

Ms.Donadio posted on MySpace -"live fast, die pretty" - but she never took that phrase seriously according to her friends. The last thing on her mind was death.

"I was shocked when I heard about what happened," her friend Catherine Messina told The Banner. "Jacquie was always smiling; one of the few people that would always listen to me and give me good advice and talk to me even if I didn't see her for a while. She was really very nice."

The victim was big on old cars, SS, Camaro, Roadrunners, and Stingrays. She also loved "to laugh and smile, the smell of a cold winter day and her Mom's chicken cutlets."

MySpace: "If it weren't for bad luck, I'd know all the words. have no luck at all."

"We'd hang out in my neighborhood (New Dorp), driving cars," Ms. Messina told the Banner. "Jacquie would always sit in her car. When we really got bored, we'd drive around the neighborhood. She was one of the nicest people I've ever met.'

Ms. Donadio, who studied business law at CSI, went to school four days a week until that fateful evening, when she lost control of her 1999 Ford Mustang, after having attempted to overtake two cars at a dangerous curve on South Gannon Avenue in Willowbrook.

For whom am I here? This is a question I ask myself every day. My name is Cynthia Soto-Santiago; I am a fellow student at CSI. You may know me as a face in a class you once had. Some of you may have bumped me in line either at the cafeteria or the college entrance, and yet most know not who I am

Oddly enough it's hard to say, for wear many hats throughout the course of the day. At home I am known as the lady from 102, who should have a yellow school bus instead of a mini van.

In the morning I am my children's personal chauffer, in the evening their teacher, cook and maid. Our days are long, for we travel at least twenty-five hours a week to and from their four different schools.

This all comes before and after I either attend class or work in the Modern Languages Media Center. Throughout this ongoing endless cycle, I find moments of peace where I can sit, even if only for a moment, to ask for who am I here. I find that it can never be a simple response anymore and that being here means much more than it did to me before.

When I returned to school, I had spent so many years away that it was difficult to come back. I knew that things had changed and so had I. I was afraid of being here, but I knew I had to be. | had to do something with my life so that my children would be proud of me and follow in these positive footsteps, not those that I had taken before.

As hectic as my life may seem, it's peaceful now, almost normal.

I, like many, married young and against my parents' wishes. I didn't listen to my parents'-concerns and, like many, lived to regret not listening. My marriage was not the best, but I was blessed with my six children. They are something that I will never lament over.

I had always worked and did the average American check to check struggle, never thinking that one day we would be homeless. It was our sad misfortune that placed us in the shelter system for two long years.

During this time I was diagnosed with agoraphobia which is depression, panic and anxiety rolled up in one little word. Anyone who has had her life ripped out from under her would understand why I fell into this classification. The medication that the doctors placed me on did not help me; it locked up my emotions and released them in fury every time they changed my dosage. found my health and salvation when I returned to school.

When I came back, I thought it was for my children. I wanted them to see that it was important to study and do well in their school work. We all had been through so much. When we were finally placed in a home it was time for us to heal and grow.

Here we are, two years later, pushing forward and succeeding. They are all doing well in school, where they are active in art and music programs. In seeing them no one would ever believe that they were ever diagnosed with ADHD, HDD, depression or with separation anxiety, but it has taken a lot of strength and work for us to arrive at this point in our lives.

In these two years I have come across teachers who have enlightened had always worked and did the average American check to check struggle..."

me. This handful of old souls was willing to give a piece of themselves in every lesson that they have taught and my heart, empty, was willing to receive all it could absorb. They all have left an impression on me. Their actions and words are what made me decide that I want to teach. They have shown me that the person I was still exists and that I have so much inside of me to give to others.

I hear my mother's words from years ago, telling me how smart I was and not to waste my life inside four walls. I know my life is not wasted; it has only yet to begin.

I dream of seeing Italy and I am there through Mara, Buranello and Milligan's words. I wonder about the great pyramids; and need not wonder anymore through the great mathematicians Yazdini and Talafha. The universe is no longer dark and gloomy, the past no longer dead and buried. and rocks no longer look all the same to me because of Ohan and Okulewicz. 



Students to Albany Lawmakers: Show New York's Environment Some Love this Valentine's Day

College students from the New York Public Interest Research Group (NYPIRG) chapter at the College of Staten Island released the results of a statewide litter survey today and made a heartfelt Valentine's Day plea to lawmakers to update New York's Bottle Bill. The Bottle Bill requires a 5-cent refundable deposit on beer, soda, and other carbonated beverage containers. NYPIRG and other advocates want the law updated to include non-carbonated beverages, such as bottled water and

Students and community volunteers conducted 20 litter cleanups across the state last fall, including a mid-November cleanup of Crescent Beach and Children's Park in Great Kills and collected data on the bottles and cans they found. Among the key findings of the report, "Buried in Bottles: a Survey of Beverage Containers in New York's Litter," are the following:

1. Beverage containers made up 35% (by volume) of litter collected

2. Non-deposit containers outnumbered deposit containers by a margin of almost two to one

3. 21% of the litter, by volume, was composed of non-deposit containers that would be captured if the Bigger Better Bottle Bill were passed.

The Bigger Better Bottle Bill would improve recycling and prevent litter by updating New York's law to include noncarbonated beverages such as bottled water and iced tea. It also would require beverage companies to transfer unclaimed consumer deposits back to the state for use in the Environmental

Governor Eliot Spitzer has once again proposed including the Bigger Better Bottle Bill in the state budget. The State Assembly has supported this measure for the past three years, but each year it has been blocked in the State Senate, under the leadership of Senator Joseph Bruno.

Students, together with a broad coalition of other advocates, are calling on state lawmakers to pass the Bigger Better Bottle Bill in the 2008-2009 state budget. According to the Container Recycling Institute (CRI), more than 3 billion containers of non-carbonated beverages are sold in New York each year. CRI estimates that capturing the unclaimed deposits from an expanded Bottle Bill could generate more than \$200 million a year in new revenue for the environment.

"We're calling on Senator Lanza to have a heart for New York's environment by including the Bigger Better Bottle Bill in this year's state budget" said NYPIRG Project Coordinator Ben DeAngelis

"Participating in a local cleanup was a terrific experience," said CSI student Michael Gualtieri. "But it broke our hearts to see how much of the litter we picked up could have been prevented in the first place if the politicians in Albany updated the Bottle Bill."

"We're buried in bottles, and lawmakers have a responsibility to deal with this problem," said Joshua Center. "We know from our litter survey that the deposit works to reduce the amount of bottles and cans littering our communities.


A 2004 public opinion poll showed that there is strong public support for updating the bottle bill. 70% of New Yorkers surveyed supported expanding the program to include non-carbonated beverages, and 86% supported transferring unclaimed deposits to the state to fund environmental programs.


"New Yorkers love the Bottle Bill because it works." said DeAngelis. "If the Senate cared about cleaner communities, they would pass the Bigger Better Bottle Bill right now."


"This is a piece of legislation whose time has come," said Joseph Stelling, NYPIRG's Campaign Organizer for the Bigger Better Bottle Bill and author of the report. "The Assembly and the Governor have supported this measure for years; Joe Bruno and the Senate need to get on board and do the right thing for New York's environment."

More than 600 community groups, organizations, businesses, and local governments have endorsed passage of the Bigger Better Bottle Bill. But for years it has been "bottled up" in Albany by the powerful beverage and supermarket lobbies.

Sheek Louch, the Barack Obama of Rap

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The shiny suit from the LOX's Diddy days must be in the cleaners, as Sheek Louch lounges in a weed scented studio wearing a sloppily fastened doo-rag and a white thermal shirt wrapping his bulging triceps, which he owes to his recent health kick that helped him shed twenty pounds. In the unadorned studio with blood red walls and stacks of warped records in the corner, Sheek's only noticeable ice cools his cup of Courvoisier. "This is the only shit keeping me bloated hommie," he says in defense of his healthy diet.

"Chances are, the nigga that's working your album at the major [label] don't even listen to your music."

After a fairly consistent stretch of hitting the treadmill, hitting the weights and ditching the fried foods, Sheek, a former varsity football player, claims to be in the best physical shape of his life. And now with the lyrical shape of hip-hop declining faster than the value of the U.S. dollar, the self proclaimed "Barack O of rap," plans to deliver a lyrical stimulus package with his third solo album Silverback Gorilla

"It's a metaphor," Sheek says referring to the album title. "They say it's a jungle out there and I feel I'm one of the fiercest muthafuckas in this jungle of hip-hop."

His tone has a hint of arrogance, deservedly so however, after approaching his last two solo albums with humble confidence. But Sheek boasting about his lyrical ferocity is analogous to the Celtics boasting about a victory over the Knicks. Hence, hip-hop as a whole is as dismal as the NBA's eastern conference.

Sheek never planed on pursuing a solo career. But after Walk Wit Me went cold in 2003 another solo album seemed imminent. Between albums he linked up with Big Mike and Supa Mario. dropping two mixtapes, Year Of The Wolf and Still A Wolf. His second album, however, After Taxes, really established his individual identity and forced listeners to stop looking at him as just the other guy in The LOX. The single, Kiss Your Ass Goodbye, caught frequent commercial radio spins and underground fans respected his ballsy artistry

Once more he teams up with Big Mike to salivate the streets before Koch releases Silverback Gorilla. This time it's The Howling, a wolfing warning of the gritty gorilla soon to smash the shelves. "Yo, I don't get no money from mix-

tapes," Sheek yells, leaning unnecessarily close to the tape recorder. "The mixtape shit is just to feed the street."

Rolling his chair back across the room he starts to recollect on the glory days of mixtapes. "There was a time when it was a privilege to get on a [DJ] Clue tape... It still is," he says retracting whatever ill emphasis the statement had towards Clue. "But back then your shit had to be hot to get on Clue or Ron G or Doo Wop. Mixtapes used to be like street albums. Now I turn on a mixtape and I'm like 'who the fuck is this rapper?... And why is he dissin me?"

Sheek might often seem to lurk in the shadow of his rhyme partners and best friends Jadakiss and Styles P. but it's difficult to imagine any self-respecting hip-hop fan turning on The Howling and asking himself "who the fuck is this rapper?"

Though he never sought an individual spotlight his sharp voice has been penetrating radio and underground speakers for just over a decade. Even people who hate hip-hop have heard All About The Benjamins. Sheek's, Styles' and Jada's pens are responsible for some of Diddy's most familiar verses. "Me, Kiss and Styles wrote Victory," Sheek boasts. "Not Big's part, but we wrote so many of Puff's verses."

He goes on to tell about how Puff would often have a melody in mind but couldn't come up with the lyrics. Him, Styles and Kiss would chip in whatever lines and bars they had and Puff would crank out a commercial classic. At the time they didn't realize that they were supposed to be paid for their work.

"A lot of the money we supposed to have today we aint got," he says. "I learned a whole lot dealing with Puff though. We used to get to the studio: light up, do a lil verse and leave, He would be like 'how the fuck vall going home so early? I got millions and I'm not going home."

Sheek compares starting his career with Bad Boy to getting drafted by the Jordan era Chicago Bulls. He was surrounded by stars on the most winning team in hip-hop. "At 17 or 18 it was crazy seeing Big, Craig Mack and Total,"



he says. "So I don't regret nothing. I don't rearet the shiny suit, the glittery shit we had, nothing." He pauses and adds "I do regret signing the publishing deal without knowing what I was doing."

It's clear that without the Bad Boy days Sheek and The LOX wouldn't have the acclaim they have now. But unlike his partners, Sheek dropped all three of his solo albums on Koch. After releasing two solo albums on Interscope records, Jadakiss plans to drop his third album on Def Jam. Styles, also fed up with Interscope after two albums, now enjoys the artistic independence that Koch grants.

"I don't think I'd be able to have such success with Koch without ever having that major exposure," Sheek explains. "Any young boys trying to come up in the game can't just go straight to an independent label."

Sheek's eclectic approach to releasing music can serve as a neo blueprint for these "young boys" in this age of cyber theft. He constantly dabbles in three different outlets, major labels, independents and mixtapes, each with its own effectiveness. Silverback Gorilla drops on Koch, the next LOX album, Live, Suffer, Celebrate will be on Interscope while The Howling unprofitably rattles speakers.
