Last Second Heartbreaker

The second-seeded Dolphins men's basketball team, competing for their 12th CUNY title, lost a last-second heartbreaker to the first-seeded York College 56-54 on Friday, February 23. The title, which would have been CSI's first since 2001-02, earned the winning team a guaranteed spot in the NCAA Division III tournament. CSI and York split the regular-season series, with each team winning at home by double digits.

The Dolphins took a 27-24 lead into halftime but as the second half began they fell behind to the Cardinals. CSI began to close the eight point gap with ten minutes remaining and with one minute to play the score was tied at 49. CSI recaptured the lead with twenty seconds to go and five seconds later York's Jeffrey Boone scored one of two free-throws. CSI's Sean Weismuller was fouled next and hit both giving CSI a 54-

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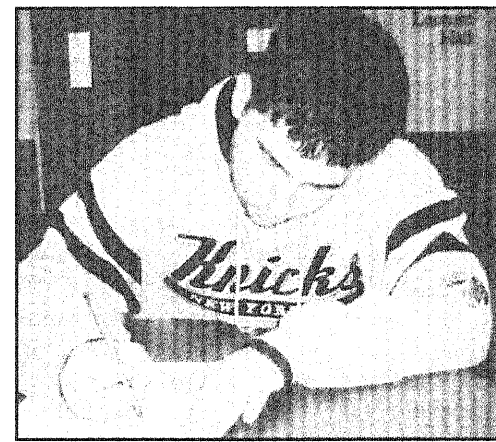

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Can't Drive 25

Speed Not Enforced By Radar

Since the beginning of the fall semester, there have been 15 car accidents on Loop Road. In response to this recent problem, Public Safety has posted two electronic signs alongside Loop Road to show drivers how fast they are going. They hope this measure will get motorists to slow down.

"It's a precaution, but it's not connected with giving out tickets," said Director of Marketing and Public Relations, Robert Huber. "In order to give a ticket for speeding, you need a radar gun that is calibrated so that you can take it to court and it can be entered as evidence."

The newly posted electronic signs, which cost \$2,500 each, have not been calibrated correctly and often give incorrect readings that can reach as high as 68 miles per hour. "I would be shocked if anyone was driving 68 miles per hour, even though that's what the sign read. That's really fast," said Huber. "I've mentioned to Public Safety several times this past week that they need to recalibrate those signs."

The speed limit signs as well as the Parking Information Handbook say, "Speed Enforced by Radar," but that is false. Public Safety does not have any

Thousands Want U.S. Out of Italy

Vicenza, Italy, Feb. 17 - An angry crowd of Italian citizens flooded the streets of Vicenza, a picturesque, northeastern Italian city, to protest a governmental plan of expansion of the United States Army post Caserma Ederle.

Tens of thousands of concerned residents and anti-globalization activists, carrying "Yankee Go Home" banners, marched through the historical city center to protest the planned construction of Caserma Ederle II. Construction is expected to begin in September at the Dal Molin airport.

The former right-wing government of Silvio Berlusconi together with President Bush, contemptuously giving no heed to the will of the Italian people, decided on the expansion of Caserma Ederle by thousands of new American soldiers.

A part of the new centrist government of the centre-leftist Prime Minister Romano Prodi has been further continuing to ignore the public opinion in a supercilious manner.

The street crowd won't change our decisions," Corriere della Sera quoted Prodi's reaction to the demonstration. He couldn't have expressed his deeply rooted contempt for democracy and for the Italian citizens more clearly.

Alternatively, Fausto Bertinotti, President of the Chamber of Deputies, said on the



pages of Corriere della Sera that if it weren't for political ethics of his governmental office, he would have taken part in the demonstration against the expansion of the U.S. military base himself. According to Bertinotti, there are no governmental commitments that could not be revoked.

Another governmental dissident, Paolo Ferrero, Minister of Social Solidarity, told Corriere della Sera that "terrorism can be defeated not only by the police and magistrature but also by the active democratic participation. Those who march in the streets fight

not only against the government but also against terrorism."

The reputation of the U.S. Army has lived down a gradual fall from the position of a "liberator," after the WWII, to a "terrorist" at present. In the last sixty years, the U.S. has played an unexpectedly aggressive role in fomenting wars ranging from the WWII (Prescott Bush financed Hitler) to the wars in Korea, Vietnam, Panama, Afghanistan, Jugoslavia, and Iraq.

Italians can hardly be blamed for not embracing more and more U.S. troops in their country. The status of a smiling "Dollar Yankee" from Caserma Ederle has changed over time to that of an economically inferior and culturally incompatible "alien soldier."

Northeastern Italy has undergone a vast transformation from a poor rural area after the end of the WWII to a rich, pulsating economy. Nowadays it is the Yankee soldier who often enlists in the U.S. military to escape extreme poverty at home. The Italian girls, who used to be so willing to marry handsome "all-American boys" in the past, now stay away from the poor, badly-behaved troops who wear oversized "urban-style" baggy sweat suits and unlaced Nike



sneakers, Corriere della Sera observed.

One of those badly-behaved boys, Sergeant Joseph, told a Corriere della Sera reporter: "Fuck you," lifted his middle finger and added, "We are used to raiding Baghdad. Four hundred anti-globalist tramps ain't gonna scare us away."

A few days after the demonstration, Prime Minister Prodi resigned, and the citizens are planning to block the treacherous bulldozers with their own bodies to defend their country against the occupiers and terrorism.

The greatest peaceful use of atomic

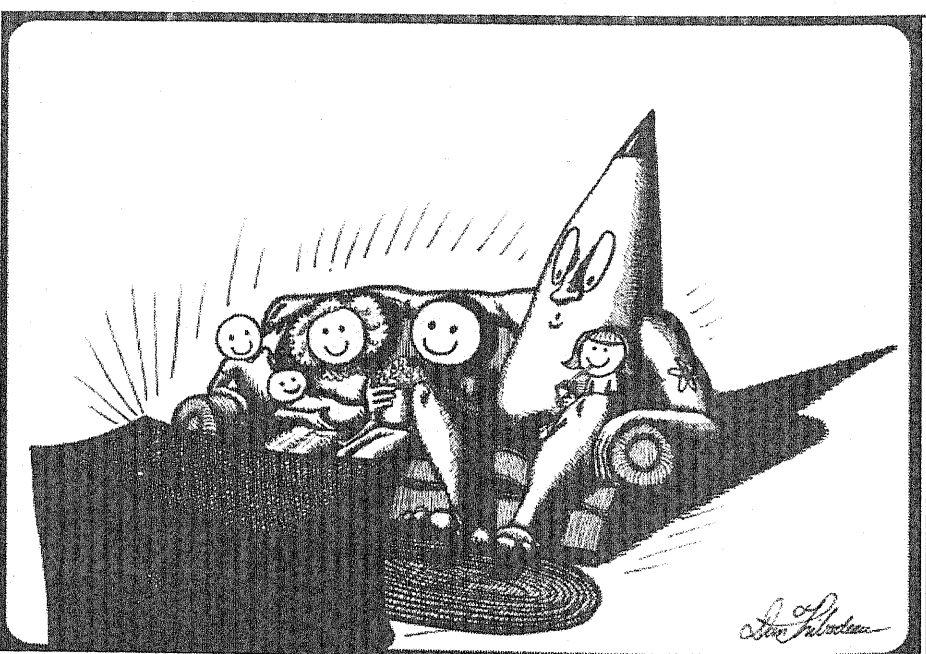

Her unapologetic anecdotes about sexual experiences give hope to all women who feel as though in a bias society such as ours a girl mustn't be sexually open and keep the lock tightened on the chastity belt.

Having battled bulimia while in college, Giulia Rozzi makes it a point to tell her story to all who would listen.

"When I was in college all I really heard about were the extreme and dramatic cases of eating disorders and I couldn't relate because I didn't feel like my issue was as severe," she says of her experiences with struggling through a deathly eating disorder. "I felt like a lot of what I read and heard was so technical, lots of psycho babble and statistics were thrown at me; So when I was going through the initial recovery process I knew that once I was ready I wanted to use my ability and passion for performance and humor to talk to other people about my experience in a more laid back, humorous and hopefully relatable way."

Whether through her various articles, her monthly show Stripped at Mo Pitkins, or Mortified, a show where Rozzi hosts adults who read about their embarrassing young adult diary entries, essays, poems and letters; anyone can see that this girl is here to stay.

Aside from speaking about the everlasting struggles of body image and her sexual escapades, Rozzi is known for her uplifting stories of growing up with Italian Immigrant par-

ents.

Staten Island can relate, being that whether it is our parents or grandparents, we all have someone who is old school in our family, someone who thinks that food can cure from a fight with a boyfriend right down to receiving an undeserved bad grade. "My mom taught me food is love." The young comedian says.

"I love storytelling and while I love telling stories on stage I also love the idea of just writing a story," said Rozzi, "Giving it to someone and walking away so they can experience it without me watching for their reaction, as opposed to standing up where you are trying to get an instant reaction. My advice for anyone wanting to pursue writing depends on what type of writing they plan to pursue. The best advice honestly is just to write as much as you can, practice everyday and hone your craft."

The Women's Center has really outdone itself this time; Rozzi's show, Filling Up on Life and Laughter, is scheduled to take place on March 1, 2007. At 11:15 am Giulia Rozzi will be speaking at the Green Dolphin Lounge in 1C about her struggle with Bulimia and at 1:30 she will be performing her stand-up comedy routine in the same room. The Women's Center will also be announcing the winners of the raffle promptly after Giulia's show at 2:30 PM.

"Regardless of if you are a person with an extreme case of anorexia or a person who struggles with a small obsession to loose those last 5 pounds," said Rozzi, "I think people want to know that they are not alone in their struggles with body and food issues. I think my style of speaking encourages them to think and talk. On a personal note, sharing my story has been equally therapeutic for me."

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rupted from February 8 to February 13, 2007 due to a sewage problem nearby," said Chief Librarian.

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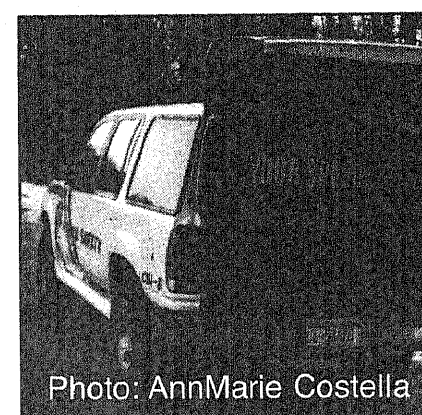

radar guns in order to properly gauge the actual speed a person is going.

While it is true that Public Safety can't give you a speeding ticket, they can give you a \$40.00 summons for driving in an unsafe manner. The Parking Information Handbook classifies unsafe driving as: "Endangering pedestrians, property, other vehicles or drivers. Failing to obey posted traffic signs or the directions of college personnel responsible for traffic control."

Since September, Public Safety has given out 23 such summonses. However, you may appeal the summons and with no radar gun reading as proof, it's your word against the officer's word. "I think almost anyone can tell the difference between someone whose going 25 miles an hour and someone who is going 50 miles an hour, especially when they start passing other people on the road," said Director of Public Safety, Gene Martinez.

Huber feels that one's regard for one's own personal safety and the safety of others is enough to get people to drive at a reasonable speed, but without radar guns or speed traps, many students feel that the electronic signs are pointless.

Journalism major, Karen Herrera, 22, says she sees motorists exceeding the speed limit on campus all the time. "Everyone cuts each other off. It's very dangerous here," she said. "I saw electronic speeding sign yesterday and I realized that I was going a little fast so I slowed down." However Herrera feels that since no one actually occupies the vehicle where the electronic sign is posted students will not be inclined to slow down. "If there is no one to pull people over then what's the point," she said. "People are going to speed anyway."

As a pedestrian, Crystal Waistell feels the threat of unsafe motorists as she walks around the campus. "Word gets around," she said. "If people don't get caught then they are just going to continue to disobey the rules."

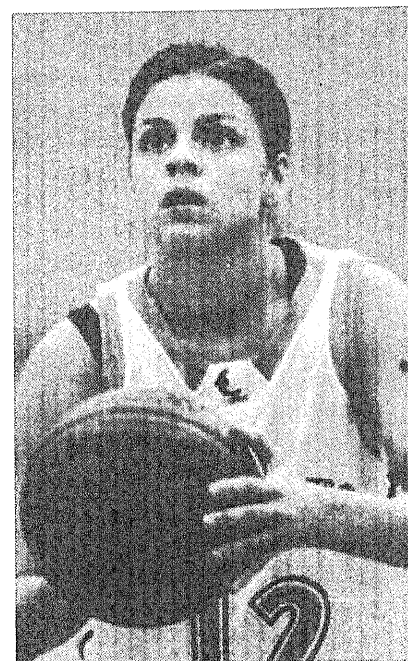
All of the problems and difficult decisions seem to fade away on the basketball court. "All that matters is the moment you are in."

CSI senior Eros Qama, who earned the CUNYAC's Performer of the Year, had a time of 4:54.59, beating his own personal record in the 500-yard freestyle. He later helped CSI

earn their best time ever (3:45.73) in the 400-yard medley finals along with teammates Nick Levintov, Vladomir Fedosseev, and Vadzim Zhgun.

The next day the teammates raced in the 200-yard medley finals, coming in tenth place and breaking the record set in 2005. They weren't finished yet. When the four raced in the 800-yard freestyle relay they set another CSI record by posting a time of 7:48.10.

Qama then swam in the 200-yard in

1:51.00, breaking his own record of 1:51.51 that he set earlier this year.

CSI freshman Tara Meiners broke a CSI record of 2:36.40 held by current Dolphins swimmer Cen Wang in the 200-yard backstroke. Wang also beat her previous record by finishing at 2:30.16 while Meiners' time of 2:24.77 replaced the old record.

Nick Levintov set the new CSI 200-yard backstroke record with a time of 2:10.50 while Qama finished sixth overall in the 200-yard butterfly event setting another CSI record at 1:58.24.

In the diving competition Margaret Borzymowski became CSI's first-ever diver to make the three-meter swim competition, where she finished eighth overall in the finals.

On the basketball court, both the men and women made it into the CUNYAC playoffs. The women's team made it to the semi-finals, while they men made it to the championship game before losing to York College.

CUNY also selected two men and two CSI women from the teams as CUNY All-Stars. Nicole Estrada, Melanie D'Ambrosi, Sean Weismuller and Gari Blackett received plaques and were invited to the luncheon held at the Water Club in Manhattan.

Estrada had a career-high 38 points in a game on December 7 against Brooklyn College while D'Ambrosi recorded 42 points, the most in a CUNYAC game this season, against Medgar Evers College.

For the men, Weismuller, who was named CUNYAC Player of the Week on December 4, was second in the league in scoring, averaging 18.4 points per game. Blackett, is the league's leading rebounder and currently ranked fourth nationally.

Crippled People Aren't Special

Handicap Bureau

According to a recent study conducted by Harvard, it has been learned that physically handicap people are not as special as society likes them to believe. Their findings suggest that individuals with handicaps are not any smarter than the average person, do not have special powers that compensate for their disability, and, contrary to popular belief, God did not make them that way for a reason.

The Coalition for the Advancement of Healthy People (CAHP) is using this recent study to promote their agenda of bringing to an end what they call Crippled Affirmative Action. "We've got to stop humoring these people," says Ari Borealis, CAHP Vice-Chairman. "Why should those with handicaps have their own parking spots, their own toilets, their own entrances into buildings? 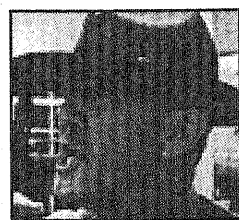

Borealis continued his diatribe by adding that the handicap contribute nothing to society and should be dealt with in a pitiless manner. "They are a burden and should be shipped to an island of their own where everything is wheelchair accessible."

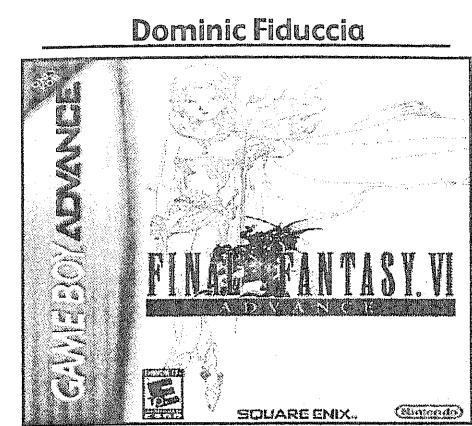

FINAL FANTASY VI A Fantasy Worth Revisiting

Since its debut in 2001, Nintendo's handheld system, the Game Boy Advance, has been a mixed bag of great games from original 2-D titles (Pokemon Emerald, Sonic Advance series, and Drill Dozer), to the enhanced re-makes (Metroid: Zero Mission or Pokemon FireRed/LeafGreen) or straight ports (such as Super Mario World and Zelda: A Link to the Past).

Final Fantasy VI Advance from Square Enix falls somewhere in-between the enhanced re-makes and straight ports. It's not a direct port of the classic Super NES game, but there weren't enough changes to consider it an enhanced re-make, either. The storyline of Final Fantasy VI isn't especially original. It's actually a very typical plot

for a Role-Playing Game (RPG). The presentation is so well-done, you'll enjoy every moment of it. The story begins over 1000 years ago when a war involving the use of magic nearly destroyed the world. In the aftermath of the war, the power of magic was lost. As a result, people started to develop technology to replace magic as the primary way of life. Meanwhile, there is a powerful empire that is gaining strength and expanding its reach in an attempt to rule the world. The empire realizes that it will need more than technology to assert its dominance, so Emperor Gestahl decides to revive magic and use it as a source for his ultimate power.

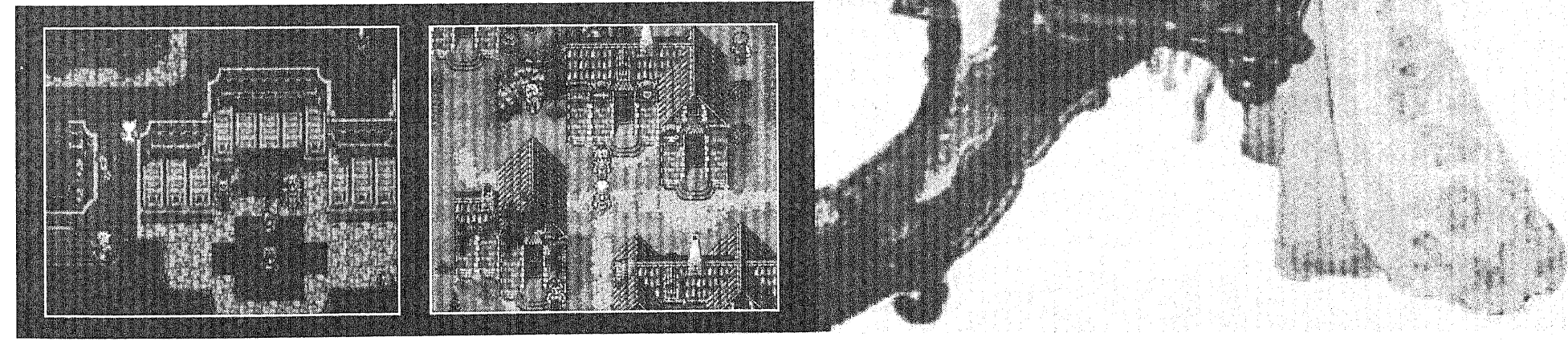
The main story is interesting, but what makes the game so memorable are all the details that go into the game. Even 13 years after its debut, this game featured the most playable selection of characters for a Final Fantasy game. You'll have fourteen different characters to choose from to form your party of four. The diversity allows you to have different playing experiences depending on which characters you choose. Each character has its own personality, background story, strength/weakness, and even theme song. You'll have to keep in mind that Final Fantasy VI is a very traditional RPG, so be ready to take part in

many tedious tasks, such as endlessly leveling up your characters and taking part in a lot, and I do mean A LOT, of random battles.

Still, Final Fantasy VI is one of the greatest games ever made. One reason is the game's final boss, Kefka. He's one of the Emperor Gestahl's top generals, and his ambition is matched only by his own madness. Kefka was one of the toughest final boss battles ever, and it's every bit as difficult to defeat him now as it was back in 1994. As for what is new in the game, the changes are actually very minor. The biggest difference from the original is dialogue. Much of the original text has been updated; the changes are mainly done so the dialogue makes more sense in translation from Japanese to English. Some of the spell, item, and skill names have also

been changed in order to clarify them. The biggest difference though, is the addition of a new optional side-quest dungeon called Dragon's Den; this is for gamers who want to add a level of extra challenge to their gaming experience.

Overall, Final Fantasy VI Advance is one of the best gaming experiences you'll have on the Game Boy Advance.

Dolphins Lose in Playoffs

51 lead with fourteen seconds to go. York rebounded with a missed three-point attempt but regained the ball and sank a two-pointer. Robert Mesjasz was fouled next and with four seconds to play his two attempts missed. York's Teron Simpson picked up the ball and made a desperate attempt from half-court and sank the shot, earning the Cardinals three-points and the victory.

"He makes a crazy shot like that and we lose," CSI head coach Tony Petosa said to the SI Advance. "You see it on TV all the time and you say 'That can never happen to me.' But it did happen to us tonight."

Throughout the CUNY playoffs the Dolphins had solid team performances. In their quarterfinal victory over Lehman College, 62 - 55, Sean Weismuller, an All-CUNY sophomore center, led the team with 27 points, followed by Robert Mesjaz with 13. CSI also won the battle of the boards by 10, behind Gari Blackett's 16 rebounds.

What did not show up on the stat sheet, but was just as important, were the key plays made by freshman point guard Kyle Yocum. In a tight game, late in the fourth quarter, Yocum blocked what Lehman thought would be an easy layup and then took a charging foul. He iced the game with a steal with less

than 30 seconds remaining and hit two free throws after he was fouled. "Kyle took over the game down the stretch," Petosa said about Yocum's important play. "He made plays that changed the game."

The quarterfinal victory over Lehman advanced the Dolphins to the semi-finals on February 21 at City College. CSI defeated third-seeded Baruch by a final of 68 - 59.

The Dolphins had a balanced scoring attack led by Mike Jones, Mesjaz, and Weismuller, whom had 18, 17, and 14 respectively. Although they jumped out to an 18 point lead and led throughout the game, it was a much more hard fought game than the final indicates.

Jones, who led the team in scoring, was suffering from flu-like symptoms. Blackett had 12 rebounds as the Dolphins held the edge on the boards again, 38 - 27. However he left the game in the second quarter for a short time after he was cut on the chin. Ryan Hennessey, twice had to take a breather after running into screens from Baruch's 6-foot-9, 265-pound center.

"They came at us hard" and played "a physical game," as described by Coach Petosa. "I'm really proud the way we stood up and finished the job."

"They played a great game," said a Dolphins fan, "but it just wasn't their night."

It was a roller coaster season for the fifth-seeded Dolphins who ended 8-5 in the CUNY Division and 12-15 overall.

Only five players, Erin Alesi, Melanie D'Ambrosi, Nicole Estrada, Amanda Sanguinedo and Nicole Stefanski, returned from the 2005-06 team, leaving the team with nine freshmen. The team started off with back-to-back losses at the Blue Jay Invitational in Maryland.

- Senior Margaret Borzymowski won the one-meter (205.75) and the three-meter (218.90) diving events.

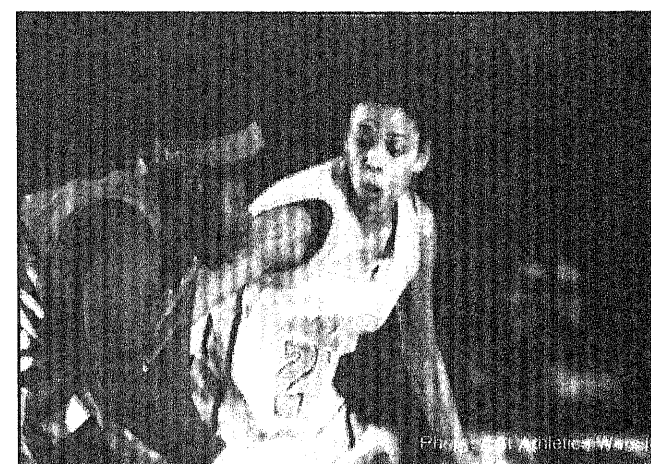
