## Scrabbling For Survival

*As international aid reaches a devastated people, their leaders wonder how to rebuild a country in ruins*

In the days after a magnitude 7.0 earthquake struck Haiti on January 12th, the country's shock and grief were tempered by the urgent need to save lives. Now that search-and-rescue operations are officially over—with just 132 people plucked from the rubble alive, and estimates of the dead ranging as high as 300,000—Haitians are confronting the devastation wrought on their perennially troubled land.

The past week has seen remarkable progress. Because Haiti's roads and ports were badly damaged by the quake, little aid arrived in the disaster's immediate aftermath. Moreover, since the government was almost wiped out—the presidential palace and most main ministries collapsed—there was no one to co-ordinate those relief workers that did arrive.

Now, such systems are returning, and outside help is beginning to make a difference. Port-au-Prince's single-runway airport is receiving three times as

many flights as it did before the quake, and aid supplies are also pouring into the part-repaired main port. The United Nations has begun hiring up to 220,000 Haitians to work on clearing-up and reconstruction. Electricity, fuel and telecommunications services are back. Locals are queuing for hours at reopened money-transfer kiosks to receive much-needed remittances from abroad.

The streets seem calm, and are now largely free of corpses and their stench. Teams of doctors from elite foreign medical schools are tending to the injured,

ensuring their wounds do not get infected. A 1,000-bed American hospital ship is floating in the harbour. The care that the poorest Haitians are now receiving is of a higher standard than anything normally available before the disaster. Small pouches of clean drinking water are being widely distributed.

The saddest sight is of the many badly wounded, particularly the thousands of amputees, who limp and hop along the capital's streets. People paralysed from their injuries are still being brought to hospitals. Providing long-term

## The Awkward Question

It normally starts with a form of recognition and most likely occurs in some public place where people spot you in your uniform. You can see it in their faces as they summon up their courage and tentatively approach you. It is always followed by a hearty handshake and the congratulatory praises of a "job well done" or "thank you for your service" and just when you think these social formalities have come to a humble conclusion—it is always invariably followed up with a sly nod and the question: "What's it really like over there?" The "over there" is coded speak for "combat" in Iraq or Afghanistan, and for the longest time I used to dread being asked what I would forever call: "The Awkward Question."

When I first came back home from Iraq, I often tried to oblige people with an answer about how things were over there. I did this with a sincere desire to impart a nugget of truth to share with people my combat experiences in an attempt to bridge the divide between soldier and civilian. I would soon discover this was an impossible task and I would often come to a pause in my story telling when I noticed the look of revulsion or horror in the eyes of the listener. I could feel a quiet tension stirring the air as the listener became visibly uncomfortable by what they were hearing, often followed by an awkward silence. In my exuberance to tell the story I sometimes failed to see the look of regret in their eyes. They would often apologize for fear of having placed me in an awkward position. As if my repeating of some unpleasant fact or detail will somehow lend itself to my emotional damage. More often than not, I've come to learn the apology isn't for me...the apology is for them. The "sorry" is for having asked the question in the first place and the truth has somehow made them uncomfortable. I learned a long time ago that when people ask you "what's it like over there", it isn't because they really want to know. Maybe some do, but more often than not, most people don't really want to know. I've come to learn that asking the question in the first place is a form of shallow patriotism. As if asking the question proves that people care and are somehow patriotic. I used to find something sad and horribly wrong with all of that and for a short period of time, I became angry with these "stay home"

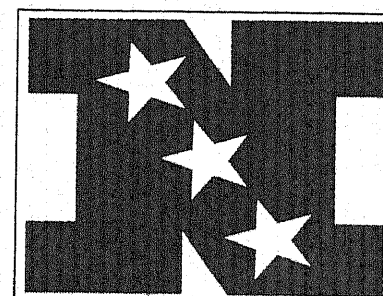

Other students mentioned that this is not always the case. Tanya Smith, a junior in CSI laughingly said "Ha! I get discriminated every week; it's nothing but a joke now." Tanya pointed out that some people discriminate without knowing it and they don't mean to offend others, but they do. She said, "Society has put discrimination in our minds. For example, people

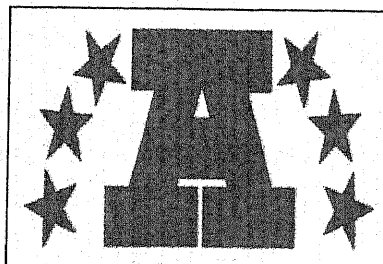

## Christmas Bomber Reveals Systemic Failures

Obama calls to investigate poor security, intelligence holes after the attempted terror plot.

Umar Farouk Abdulmutallab boarded a flight in Amsterdam en route to Detroit on Christmas Day, with the intent to set a bomb off midflight. The Nigerian man concealed an explosive made of PETN, a plastic material unnoticed by metal detectors, in his underwear, thus dubbing him "the underwear bomber". As he attempted to ignite the device on the plane, passengers and crewmembers noted his suspicious behavior, and sought to avert the terror plot. Abdulmutallab suffered third degree burns from the foiled plot. Upon closer analysis of the incident, authorities discovered that the bomber belongs on the no-fly list; according to The Washington Post, Amsterdam security cleared Abdulmutallab for travel. Furthermore,

Abdulmutallab may have gone undetected due to an error by the intelligence operative software - his name was misspelled.

President Obama acknowledged the efforts of the members of the targeted flight, as well as those in the "intelligence, counterterrorism and law enforcement and homeland security communities". Regardless, he also stated "there was a mix of human and systemic failures that contributed to this potential catastrophic breach of security. We need to learn from this episode and act quickly to fix the flaws in our system, because our security is at stake and lives are at stake".

Nevertheless, some Republicans are speaking out against recent security breaches like the Christmas bombing and Fort Hood shootings. Senator Susan Collins said, "Unfortunately, the terrorist attack on Fort Hood and the failed Christmas Day plot are stark reminders of what can happen when those authorities are not used effectively". Thomas Hamilton, former Chair of the National

Commission on Terrorist Attacks Upon the United States also asserted, "I do not think [Obama] has a firm grasp of the intelligence community." Statements by the State Department noting intent to question Abdulmutallab if his visa was renewed "defied logic and common sense", Collins explained. Due to such recent developments involving the Yemeni government in the issue, Obama has prevented sending a Guantanamo Bay detainee to Yemen.

Security concerns have left many questioning the security of airports. Reports circulating on full body scans at security checkpoints have caused much controversy and fear. "We don't need to look at naked 8-year-olds and grandmothers to secure airplanes," Rep. Jason Chaffet stated, as reported by The Los Angeles Times. "I think it's a false argument to say we have to give up all of our personal privacy in order to have security." Others agree, and wish to discourage the

Transportation Security Administration from purchasing at least 300 body scanners to install in busy city airports. The European Union remains skeptical on the issue as well. Stefan Paris, a German Interior Ministry spokesman announced, "Germany's

position is that the scanners cannot be deployed until it has been shown that they will improve security, that they are not a health hazard and that they will not be so invasive that they harm individuals' rights", as reported by The New York Times.

Overall, such acts of terrorism hold good reason for concern; however, how much needs to be done to achieve a proper level security? What sacrifices must be made? Further developments, perhaps, will lead to such answers.

care for these victims will further drain Haiti's scarce medical resources. Its human-development indicators were among the world's worst even before the earthquake struck (see chart).

The most common problem is homelessness. The International Organisation for Migration estimates that 1m people have been displaced, and that 200,000 tents will be needed to house them. Just 10,000 are in the aid pipeline. Even those who get tents will find them inadequate when the hurricane season starts in June. In the tent cities now occupying most of Port-au-Prince's parks and squares—mostly consisting of tarps hung from washing-lines—thongs wander in search of shelter. More than 200,000 people have simply abandoned the city. Many of those whose homes survived have nevertheless lost their livelihoods. Ageni Pierre-Louis, who used to sell clothes, says her entire \$1,000 stock was buried, and she is now making a living by peddling potatoes.

The inadequate distribution of food aid is also causing tension. Walls across the city feature English-language messages like "We need food and water." President René Prével complained that a few aid NGOs were putting more effort into creating photo-opportunities than co-ordinating their efforts with the government. The UN World Food Programme has so far been able to reach only 450,000 of the 2m people it hopes to feed. Some distributions have been cancelled due to rowdy crowds—Brazilian peacekeepers resorted to using tear-gas to control one mob this week. Relief workers fret about earthquake profiteering, with good reason: in one large tent city, sacks of grains marked "US rice" were on sale. Some

locals feel insulted by those trying to help them. Marie Sam Bastien, a mother of five, complains that relief workers throw food at Haitians as if they were dogs.

Efforts to clean up the destruction from the quake have barely begun. Mr Prével says 25,000 commercial buildings are destroyed and 60m cubic metres of rubble needs to be cleared. Only a few wrecked buildings are being excavated—some of them belonging to shop-owners seeking to recover their stock. At the remains of the five-storey Caribbean Market, mechanical diggers tear through shattered concrete and tangled wire, while workers load everything from tins of beans to printers into shopping trolleys, under protection from Filipino soldiers. In the rest of the city, such work proceeds with simple hand tools. At the collapsed La Union Protestant church ten parishioners with crowbars pulled out five bodies on January 25th.

Haiti was already a failed state before the disaster. Now its government has to start from scratch. It has taken refuge in a police station. Responding to widespread criticism of his near invisibility since the disaster struck, Mr Prével says: "170,000 bodies were removed from the streets in 8 days. That means somebody is in charge. Working in an office is less glamorous than going to hospitals, but I prefer to work at alleviating the suffering of my people."

The state has lost millions of records kept only on paper, like tax receipts and court filings, which now litter streets in the city centre. At the building that housed the foreign-ministry archives, workers are trying to salvage decades of folders and filing cabinets from the wreckage. A top pile on January 26th

## Students Mobilize to Help the Homeless

Braving the cold January weather, 41 CSI students joined a total of 91 volunteers from around the Borough early last Tuesday morning to bring aid to homeless and unsheltered individuals on the Island, while also taking a census to give the New York City Department of Homeless Services an idea of the extent of homelessness in the borough. The Staten Island volunteers teamed with Project Hospitality on the Island, although the initiative, Project Hope, was a City-wide effort.

CSI student Rose Ellicott, who took part in the event, commented that the "Project Hope Homeless Outreach was a experience that I will never forget. Being homeless a couple times myself in the past, I really appreciate [the effort] and want to help the homeless community to get back on their feet."

John Ryan, another student participant and a CSI Emerging Leader said, "I feel as though this was a valuable task in volunteering for the community in which I live and all five boroughs. My particular group unfortunately did not find any homeless people in need of help. However, this may be a good thing

because it may mean the number of homeless individuals is dwindling, which is the overall goal of the survey. If we get an accurate count of the homeless in the city, we will be able to better assist them. It made me feel great to know I was helping the cause."

"The volunteers were acting as facilitators to see if there's a way that we can meet the needs [of the homeless] and offer them shelter for the evening or longer term if they needed it," said Robert King Kee, Coordinator for Student Leadership Development in the CSI Office of Student Life. "Then, ideally, [volunteers worked] to count the number of homeless folks on Staten Island, and subsequently, City-wide..."

Kee noted that the volunteers reported for orientation at 10:30pm on Monday and took to the streets in teams of four or five between the hours of midnight and 4:00am. Each team was instructed to interview everyone they encountered on the street, no matter who they were or what they were doing. Once the team met a person, they would identify themselves as canvassers from the Department of Homeless Services, and with the person's approval, they would ask about five confidential questions,

such as whether they had a place to reside that they considered home. After the assessment, if the team concluded that the person was not homeless, they would thank them for their time. If they believed that the person was homeless, they would ask them if they needed assistance and/or shelter for the evening. The volunteers would then contact a representative from Homeless Services, who would dispatch a van to provide assistance to the person. Kee added that volunteers had food and water on hand to provide immediate aid, and in the case of an emergency situation, they would call 911 before calling Homeless Services.

Beyond the immediate and long-term aid that the volunteers provided, Kee explained that the census data will be used by Homeless Services to provide information to the federal government on the extent homelessness in NYC. "If the homeless and unsheltered population goes up, the City gets additional funds from the Feds for shelters, programs, city services, etc. Ideally, you want to see [the number] go down because then it shows that we do have initiatives that are working."

Regarding the volunteer recruitment effort on campus, Kee said that the Office of Student Life used a number of methods to get the word out, from ads in the CLUE News newsletter and student-run radio station W5IA to sending fliers to all campus clubs and organizations, as well as the Student Government and the Emerging Leaders Program.

## CUNY Helps Students Cope with High Cost of Textbooks

A year's worth of textbooks typically costs \$700 to \$1,000 – about 22 percent of tuition at senior colleges at The City University of New York and about 32 percent of tuition at CUNY's community colleges, according to University Librarian Curtis L. Kendrick. He notes that the price of books is particularly burdensome to CUNY students, 38 percent of whom come from families with household incomes of less than \$20,000.

Goal: To offset the rise in tuition  
As part of CUNY's \$10 million Student Financial Aid Initiative prepared by Chancellor Matthew Goldstein and approved by the CUNY Board of Trustees, the University targeted \$2 million for campuses to buy textbooks. Much of the coordination was initiated by the late Vice Chancellor for Budget and Finance Ernesto Malave.

The goal was to help offset the modest rise in tuition voted by the Legislature. By the end of November 2009, the almost 5,300 books that were purchased under this initiative had cir-

culated 87,741 times. The funds came with guidelines, encouraging college libraries to:

Put titles on reserves or make them available as "reference materials."

Purchase multiple copies as warranted.

Consider "rental" options.  
Consider "e-textbooks."

Select books appropriate for undergraduates at the campus.

Choose books that support current students and the current curriculum.

Work collaboratively to investigate systemwide licensing opportunities.

Campuses use funds to order books to place on reserve

Campuses generally used the funds to order books to place on reserve, Kendrick said. These represent high-use items that are most in demand and that most directly support the curricula. Campuses also bought reference materials to support students writing papers and conducting research. He said the books span the full range of disciplines and tend to be multiple copies of high-demand textbooks, copies of all readings required for general education classes and

readings required for selected upper-division courses.

The future

Looking to the future, Kendrick said that in addition to purchasing print textbooks, CUNY is exploring electronic book options. That could make tens of thousands of electronic books available to students and faculty on campus, as well as from their homes and office. He added that CUNY had established a committee to evaluate e-book proposals and had invited in a group of vendors for detailed discussions.

He noted that the New York State Textbook Access Act, which took effect on July 1, 2009, requires colleges to adopt policies that encourage faculty members to place their book orders early enough to enable bookstores to obtain the requested materials in used or digital formats, if available. At the federal level, a provision of the Higher Education Opportunity Act taking effect on July 1, 2010, requires that colleges disclose online ISBN and retail price information; CUNY is moving toward compliance.

Americans. I would often find myself toying with these people when the "awkward question" came about by blurring out something quaint or patriotic. I would say, "Thanks, we can't do our job without the support of good Americans like you!" I would watch their faces light up like a thousand watt bulb. As if someone pushed a magic button inside them and I would watch as they walked away feeling smug and content. As if they were somehow a part of my fraternity or bled alongside me in the back alleys of Baghdad. How shallow I thought these people were and I soon realized that I wasn't angry with them because they stayed home while I went fight. I was angry because they didn't have to sacrifice anything for the privilege of me performing that service.

In WWII, America as a society sacrificed and took part in the general war effort. From the rationing of food and gasoline- to the symbolic act of buying war bonds- every stratum of American society was affected by the war. Today we have the longest war going on in the history of the United States and the average American is oblivious to this fact. Unless you had a family member or a friend serving in the current war, you would never know there was a war going on in this country at all! I find that public disconnect very disturbing and my anger comes from a sense that society is not sharing in the burden with its soldiers.

I also find that my anger is two-part, and the second half of that equation comes from being disappointed with my family and friends. After coming home from Iraq I felt my family and friends people didn't quite appreciate the fragility of life. They all seemed engrossed in life's petty distractions. Who's getting married, who's getting divorced? Did you know that what's her

name's son just graduated from Harvard law school- are you sure you want to go to that CSI school? Of course I can't forget my favorite...Lady GaGa is so talented and intelligent! It's at that point I have a fantasy that involves a suicide bomber jumping out of my mother's closet- yelling "Allah Akbar" and putting myself and my family out of our collective misery. Now of course I don't mean that, but my frustration at times is that colorful!

How many times have we heard the expression: "Here today...gone tomorrow?" It becomes a cliché and people forget the relevance of such a statement. There is a reason why soldiers are so different after they come back home from a war. In combat the distractions of life are ruthlessly stripped away to a Zen like place. Soldiers don't think about tomorrow, next week or next month. We learn to just simply live in the moment and with a little luck - hopefully make it to the end of the day. It's during this stripping down process that soldiers cultivate a true love for life and most important of all, a love for their fellow soldier. In war, the social constructs of race, religion and politics all seem to melt away.

Since my return from Iraq, I have put a lot of thought into this and if that last statement above sounds a bit "corny" to you- then it means you don't get it, and in order to get it, you have to live it. I think that is the major reason why soldiers are coming home from this war so psychologically screwed up. The Post Traumatic Stress Disorders, the depressions, the suicides, the alcoholism and the drug use- all stem from not being able to transition back to a life they once knew. It's a transition that society expects or almost demands of its soldiers- "thank you for your sacrifice", but we need you to seamlessly become productive members of society again. The key is they often can't and it isn't because the

world changed on them-it's because they changed drastically within themselves. Many of the problems that soldiers suffer from (male or female) comes from an inability to articulate what cannot be articulated to their civilian counterparts. The Vietnam generation said it best when their tours of duty were up. They called going back home as "getting back to the world" and that's exactly what it feels like when you go back home... it's like stepping from one world into another. Except nobody tells you that the world you left behind won't be the same when you return.

Now when people ask me the awkward question nowadays- I am not so quick to let them off the hook anymore. I warn them that some aspects in the telling will be graphic and at times a bit gruesome. If they are still standing in front of me after that disclaimer- then I know they are sincere and it's at that point that I happily share my experiences with them. Five years after my return from Iraq I've discovered I am not so angry anymore. I've come to learn that anger is a normal phase that all soldiers have to endure in varying degrees as a part of the healing process. Keep that in mind the next time you see a soldier and ask him (or her) what it's really like over there? Be prepared to hear the truth, or a version of the truth that you may find really uncomfortable. Most important of all- don't be apologetic when you hear something graphic. If that soldier is comfortable enough to tell you- then there is nothing to be sorry about.

Lastly, listen to what that soldier has to say if they are willing to share it, because there may be something in the telling that is valuable to the both of you. That something may help us to connect to what is important in life and in the process it may have the power to make us all a little more human again.

Can anyone find a Public Safety Officer when you need one? It may sound like a joke but it is not. Public Safety is a main concern as the well being of Students is important. A recent email was sent out for a public safety advisory which stated, "The College of Staten Island Public Safety Department has increased patrol inspections on the campus. The Officers have been alerted to be extra vigilant and observant". From sexual assault to theft and vandalism, in the mist of any of these issues where is a Public Safety Officer to be found?

I had my own personal experience in November of 2008. I was being harassed by a fellow student off of the campus and I had already filled out the proper Police reports and had exhausted all my options. As I was walking alone from my night class I found my car was vandalized. I was parked in front of building 2A, where ironically, the Office of Public Safety can be found. Annoyed and aggravated I began my search for a Public Safety Officer. I walked into 2A and I could not find anyone in or around the vicinity of the office. About 10 minutes later I flagged down an officer outside who was completing a "patrol inspection".

After explaining my prior events with this particular student and another incident where my car was vandalized in the same way, it was safe to say we knew exactly who had done it. The routine procedure was to fill out a report of what happened but the officer could not do anything further than that. He informed me that there were cameras outside of the building and that if I spoke to the head of Security they would be able to watch the tape.

The next day after the incident I thought I would have enough evidence for the justice I needed in putting an end to the harassment. I was informed that the cameras were not working and they had no recorded tape for that day. How convenient not only was the crime committed under their noses but there was no proof it had ever happened. The report I filled out like the countless other ones at the Percent were all useless. Without that tape the detective dealing with my case said there was no way to prove that I didn't vandalize my own car in order to frame the other student.

What good is it having cameras that don't work or officers patrolling who miss obvious acts of vandalism? We may not pay Ivy League tuition but we could at least have grade "A" security. Now I know everything that goes on can not be monitored, this is not a perfect world but it would be more reassuring if help came speedily. Maybe more officers should be hired so that during night classes we could have one sit in each parking lot to watch over the students and their vehicles.

## DNA tests reveal origins of Charles Darwin

Two hundred years after the birth of Charles Darwin, the "Father of Evolution," DNA technology has helped determine who his ancient ancestors were.

Darwin's great-great-grandson, Chris Darwin, 48, who lives in the Blue Mountains near Sydney, Australia, took a Genographic Project public participation cheek swab test analysing his "Y" chromosome.

According to Spencer Wells, project director of the Genographic Project, a research partnership between National Geographic and IBM with field support from the Waitt Family Foundation, Darwin's deep ancestry shows his ancestors left Africa around 45,000 years ago.

"I couldn't wait to find out my family's deep ancestry. I suspect that most people would be fascinated to know their family history over the past 60,000 years. After all, how can you understand who you really are, if you don't know where you have come from," Chris Darwin said in a news statement released by the Genographic Project today.

### Haplogroup R1b

The test revealed that Chris Darwin, and therefore his paternal great-great-grandfather, Charles Darwin, are from Haplogroup R1b, one of the most common European male lineages, the release explained. "Approximately 70 percent of men in southern England belong to Haplogroup R1b, and in parts of Ireland and Spain that number exceeds 90 percent," Wells said.

The Genographic Project's test results show that Darwin's paternal ancestors would have migrated out of northeast Africa to the Middle East or North Africa around 45,000 years ago, Genographic said. "Diverging from this Middle Eastern clan, a new lineage emerged in a man around 40,000 years ago in Iran or southern Central Asia. Before heading west towards Europe, the next mutation, which defined a new lineage, appeared in a man around 35,000 years ago.

Men belonging to Haplogroup R1b are direct descendants of the Cro-Magnon people who, beginning 30,000 years ago, dominated the human expansion into Europe and heralded the demise of the

Neanderthal species."

Chris Darwin, son of George (known as Erasmus), grandson of William (Billy) and great-grandson of the astronomer George, who was one of Charles Darwin's 10 children with Emma Wedgwood, migrated to Australia from England in 1886.

A Blue Mountains guide and adventurer, (Chris often takes tourists on the Charles Darwin walk through the mountains to Wentworth Falls), Chris said that he was excited to find out his family's history.

### Chris Darwin's mother's ancestry

The Genographic team also tested Darwin's mitochondrial DNA to provide an insight into his mother's genetic heritage. The result shows Darwin is part of Haplogroup K -- and likely directly descended from the women who crossed the rugged Caucasus mountains in southern Russia to reach the steppes of the Black Sea.

"What National Geographic and IBM are doing with the Genographic Project is incredibly important. The project is one way to show us the true story of humanity, of how we migrated across the world and that we are all related, tracing back to a small group of men and women who lived in Africa," Darwin said. "There are over 100 direct descendants of Charles Darwin who attended a family reunion in London last March," he continued. "I can't wait to share this with them."

The Genographic Project seeks to chart new knowledge about the migratory history of the human species and

answer age-old questions surrounding the genetic diversity of humanity. At the core of the project is a global consortium of 11 regional scientific teams following an ethical and scientific framework and who are responsible for sample collection and analysis in their respective regions.

Members of the public can participate in the project by purchasing a public participation kit (US \$100) from the Genographic Web site, where they can also choose to donate their genetic results to the expanding database.

Sales of the kits help fund research and support a Legacy Fund for indigenous and traditional peoples' community-led language revitalization and cultural projects.

There are currently 265,000 public participants who have actively consented to be included in the scientific database, according to the Genographic Project. "With the quantity of data and new methods of analysis that the Genographic Project team at IBM are pioneering, we are able to deliver insights into our past that were simply not possible before," said Ajay Royyuru, the leader of IBM's computational biology team.

The Genographic Project's consortium including the principal investigators from around the world are in Sydney this week for their annual scientific conference. Among the population geneticists are Australian principal investigator, John Mitchell from La Trobe University in Melbourne, and Alan Cooper, who heads up the Ancient DNA Centre at Adelaide University, as well as Sydney-based ethicist, Simon Longstaff, who chairs the global advisory board for the project.

## Twitter resets passwords after phishing attack

Twitter reset passwords for an unknown number of users... whose accounts appeared to have been compromised via phishing.

"As part of Twitter's ongoing security efforts, we reset passwords for a small number of accounts that we believe may have been compromised offline," the company said in a statement.

Some Twitter users apparently "used their Twitter username and password to sign up for an untrusted third-party application which then posted Tweets to their account," a spokes-

woman said.

"While we're still investigating and ensuring that the appropriate parties are notified, we do believe that the steps we've taken should ensure user safety," the statement said. "We'll continue to provide updates as warranted at @safety and @spam."

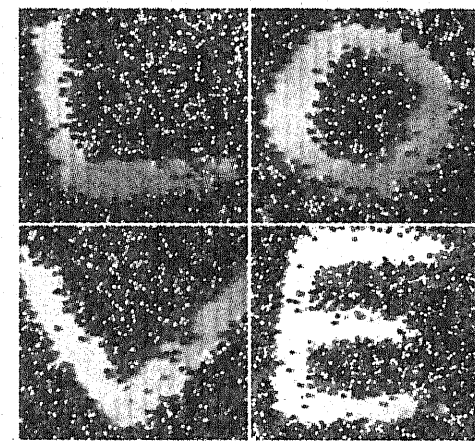

## E.U. Official Backs Greece's Deficit-Cutting Plan

Greece's deficit-cutting plan is ambitious but achievable, a top European Union official said Monday, while warning that Athens might have to take additional measures to shore up its finances.

The European Commission is due to publish recommendations Wednesday on Greece's austerity plan to reduce a double-digit budget deficit, which is a main reason Greek financial assets have suffered in the markets for weeks.

Greece's financial problems have also provoked talk about a possible bailout by the European Union and fears of a spill-over effect on other weak, heavily indebted countries in the euro zone. "What we are saying to the Greek authorities is, your stability program has established ambitious targets and objectives and we fully endorse these ambitious objectives," said Joaquin

Almunia, the E.U. commissioner for economic and monetary affairs. "The achievement of these objectives in the coming three years, before the end of 2012, is absolutely necessary. These objectives are achievable, but they are surrounded by risks." Greece, which faces its biggest fiscal crisis in decades, pledged last month to reduce its budget shortfall to below 3 percent of gross domestic product in 2012 from 12.7 percent in 2009. The gap in its public finances has prompted a series of downgrades by rating agencies and unnerved financial markets worried that Athens may not be able to pay its debt obligations. Its debt is expected to reach 120 percent of G.D.P. this year.

The Socialists, who came to power in October, have presented measures including higher taxes; a freeze on public-sector monthly wages of over 72,000, or about \$2,800; and slower hiring. But

the government is wary of cutting deeper, fearing public unrest. Unions have already called strikes for this month.

A purchasing managers' index of the manufacturing sector, released Monday, fell to an eight-month low in January, signaling no quick end to Greece's first recession in 16 years. Greek G.D.P. is forecast to shrink 0.3 percent this year after a 1.2 percent contraction, government forecasts say. "The economic cycle in Greece lags that of the euro zone by at least six months," said Nikos Magginas, an economist at the National Bank of Greece. "At the same time, the poor fiscal situation and the general sense of uncertainty created by market pressures on the servicing of Greece's debt are weighing on business confidence and delaying investment decisions."

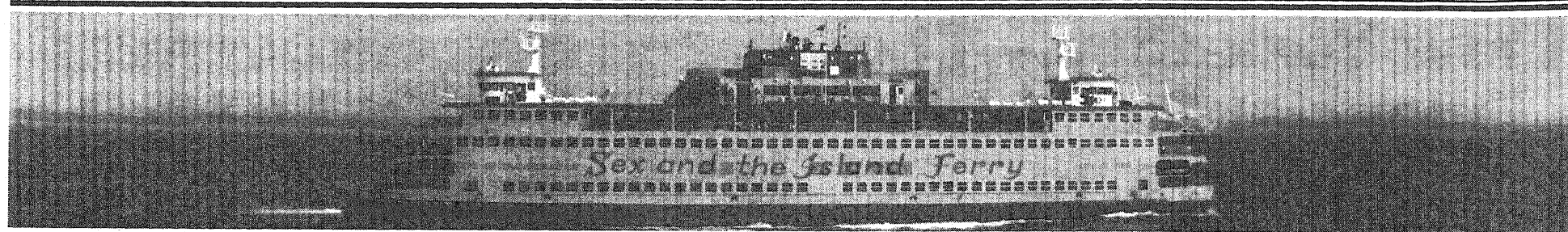
was a 1934 document restoring control of the Bank of Haiti to the government from the American bank that held it during a military occupation. More worrying still, more than 5,000 prisoners fled the country's jails in the earthquake, and most remain at large.

Until now, international aid agencies have filled the void while the government has focused on disposing of the dead. Over \$2 billion of relief funding has already been pledged. But officials estimate recovery could take a decade. And when the foreigners' attention inevitably drifts to the next crisis, Haiti may be left trying to reconstruct unaided what it could never build properly in the first place.

Nevertheless, Marie Laurence Jocelyn Lassègue, the culture minister, is optimistic about Haiti's chances of dragging itself back to its feet. "This time is different," she says. "The national palace, the cathedrals and the ministries have been destroyed, and everyone has lost someone. In their name, we are obliged to rebuild. Otherwise, we're not a real people."

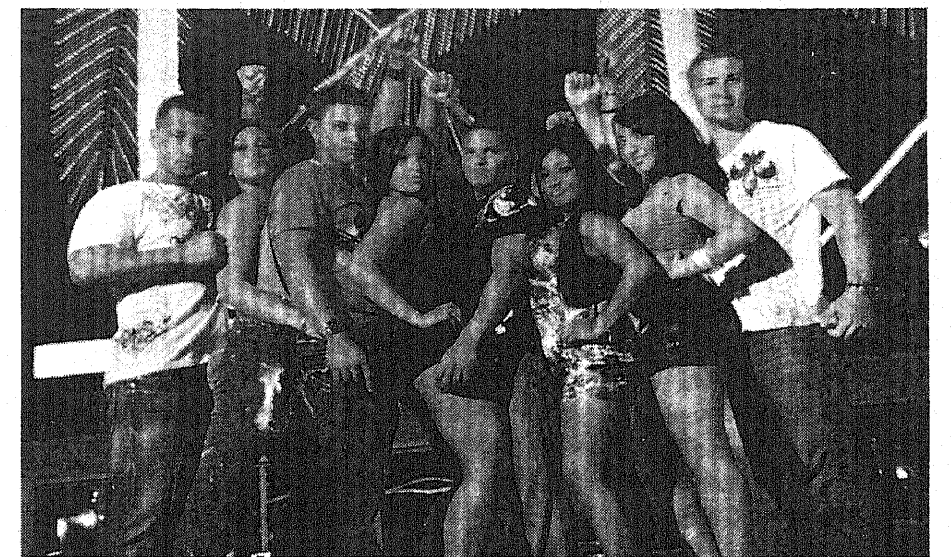

According to multiple sources (such as uscollegesearch.com and eam my degree.com), as of 2007, the student body at CSI was 62-70% white while the second highest being blacks or Hispanics at 10-13%. A white freshman in her second semester, who would like to remain anonymous, told me that she felt that the whites to blacks ratio was quite even in class room, while in reality it is usually 20 to 5. Another student, a sophomore who would also like to remain anonymous, was not surprised when I told him that the student body at CSI was 60-70% white. "Yeah. I can picture that," he told me. But at the same token, there isn't much a warm environment with coloreds at the College of Staten. That may have something to do with it being on Staten Island.

As a sophomore in my fourth semester as The College of Staten Island, and a Hispanic, I very rarely found myself in a classroom where I could find more than 5 Hispanics. While I don't feel there is any prejudice or discrimination being taken place on campus, but I do feel that the number or minority students is dreadful. As a CUNY school, there should more diversity. There is no other CUNY school with a more than a 20% separation between the top two ethnic groups.

I can't say for sure why exactly it is that the school is so unbalanced, ethnically. I am hoping that by the time I graduate in 2012, the numbers won't be so drastic and the campus will have a little more to offer to those of us who don't reside on the Island. Until then, minorities like me and the other 30-40% of the student body will have to make due in this uneven environment. Unfortunately, I was not able to find a black or Latino available for an interview.
