

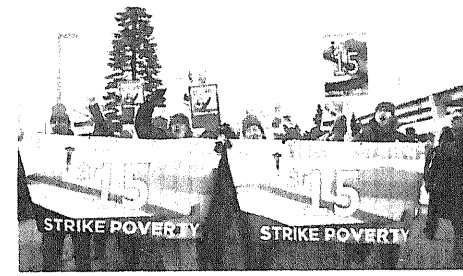

Head Swim Coach In Too Deep

Men's Swimming Program May Face Harsh Penalties

The men's swimming program will pay a price based on an NCAA Division III Committee on Infractions report released in late November. The report covers a period of allegedly unethical conduct by former coach, Oleg Soloviev, which included providing cost-free housing to one student, from 2006-2012.

"In July 2011, the College became aware of improprieties in its men's swimming program and self-reported the violations to the NCAA," said President Fritz. "A joint investigation by the NCAA Enforcement Division ensued, and on March 14, 2013 the NCAA issued a formal Notice of Allegations (NOA)."

Fritz participated in a hearing held by the infractions committee in August. The college submitted a formal response to the NOA in June 2013.

Penalties may include a four-year probationary period and a two-year ban on postseason competition; putting a halt on potential



NCAA title aspirations of the talented Dolphins.

Additionally, all individual records of six student-athletes from the time they became ineligible for competition through the time their eligibility was reinstated will be vacated.

Athletic Director Charles Gomes would not provide any names for the other affected athletes and declined to comment on the infractions and subsequent punishment. However, Gomes was able to offer insight on

one portion of the investigation.

"Nothing related to the NCAA investigation had anything to do with the budget," said Gomes.

The student activity fee provides funding to athletics. Supplemental funding can be provided to teams by the recreational center through membership fees and rentals. CSI Association Executive Director, Marianne McLaughlin, handles the development and review of activity fee budgets.

"To my knowledge, none of the money came from college related funds or budgets," said McLaughlin.

According to the NCAA report, "the administration never required Soloviev to give an accounting of his recruitment activities." The report also claimed, Soloviev was recruiting international athletes electronically and at times when he was vacationing overseas.

The committee found that Soloviev facili-

CSI Students Face Financial Aid Problems

Students at the College of Staten Island are not receiving their financial aid payments on time, and with the staff losing their handle on the CUNYfirst system, applying for funds and receiving them may only get worse.

In 2012 over 80% of students in public universities received some form of financial help, according to the U.S. Department of Education. CSI is no exception to the overwhelming amounts of students who need help to pay their way.

Since the current semester began, there has been over 10,000 students who have traveled to building 2A room 401 in order to acquire funds for their school bills. But many have encountered issues when it comes to finalizing payment. One issue occurred with Robert Gonzales, a student at CSI who has had a considerably hard time collecting his financial aid money since the begin-

Children Center Leaves Parents in the Dark

Student parents in the Evening and Weekend Program at the College of Staten Island are pushing for later hours at the Children's Center (2R) to accommodate those enrolled in night classes.

The Children's Center at CSI provides child care and educational programs for children of students at the college. The center is open weekdays from 7AM to 6:30PM and offers care for infants, toddlers, preschool, and school-age children. While the

program is greatly beneficial to student parents who attend day classes, those enrolled in The Evening and Weekend Program can't utilize the center's services.

"The Children's Center is open until 6:30PM, but that's when most of my classes start," said Precious Sherman a Sophomore Psychology Major and a single parent to eight year old Genesis. Sherman, who works and attends school full time, enrolled in the Evening and Weekend program and registered her daughter in the center's after school program.

Because the Children's Center closes early, Sherman has to pick up her daughter and often times bring her along to class.

"Most of my professors don't mind because she sits quietly with her iPad and headphones and keeps to herself," said Sherman. "But some professors don't allow any visitors to the class." In those cases, Sherman will either pay for a babysitter or just stay home from class that evening.

According to their website, the Children's Center is funded

tated the visa process for five international prospects; arranged for reduced-cost lifeguard certification classes for three-student athletes and signed leases for four student-athletes.

"The college lacked control of its athletic department when it failed to provide adequate NCAA rules education, failed to monitor the recruitment activities of the former coach and failed to monitor student-athlete housing arrangements," an NCAA official said at a press conference held on November 21.

The official also acknowledged that the college "indirectly provided financial assistance to prospects" by lowering swim lane rates for the private swim club and "permitted certain student-athletes to compete without executing student-statements."

Suspicion of any wrongdoing stemmed from a posting Soloviev made in July of 2011 on the website of a private swim club, an enterprise that he formed in 2003 and continued to run. An employee of CSI spotted the message, which requested that members of the swim club donate household items for two international prospects that were scheduled to arrive in the U.S. later that year. The message alerted the college to review files it maintained on international students.

"The institution discovered documentation in which the former coach, his wife or the

private swim club had agreed to sponsor and/or provide room and board to four incoming international student-athletes," noted the NCAA report.

According to a statement by President Fritz, "The NCAA imposed upon the former coach a show-cause order, the most severe penalty the NCAA can levy against a coach. This affects future employment for the next four years at an NCAA member institution."

"I believe that due to our proactive measures, including self-imposed remedial measures, the College was able to preserve the continuation of our swimming program and the integrity of our athletics program," said Fritz.

According to Fritz, "there was no allegation that the academic integrity of the College's students or faculty was ever compromised."

Soloviev, who had been the school's director of aquatics since late 1995, led the Dolphins to seven CUNY Conference titles and produced the school's first NCAA champion in any sport, Pavel Buyanov of Russia.

Major changes were made to the athletics program upon the appointment of Fritz as President and before the formal NOA by the NCAA was issued. Athletics was placed under direct supervision of the President's Office in April 2013 and Charles Gomes was named Interim Athletic Director; an emphasis was placed on professional development and rules

education concerning NCAA compliance for administration, coaches and staff; and lastly an internal review of facility usage and rentals and disassociation from the privately owned swim club referenced in the report.

The President also created a Compliance Team consisting of various members of his administration, faculty members, a student representative and the Athletic Director.

Additionally, CSI cannot recruit interna-

tional prospective men's swimming student-athletes for the remainder of this academic year. A new faculty athletics representative will be appointed for fall 2013.

Currently, the team is 4-2.

As the details of the NCAA investigation come to light, CSI prepares to monitor athletics operations more closely. It's believed that the investigation could be on going.

through CSI student activity fees, state and federal grant money, and a fee of \$2 per hour. Sherman feels that, because the students are paying for it, the center should be able to extend their hours.

"If CSI can't provide me with the child care I need, then why would I stay?" Sherman explained that out of the eleven CUNY senior colleges, nine of them offer child care. "I would probably spend the same amount of money commuting as I do on private childcare. If tuition is the same price and I get the same amount for financial aid, then I may have to transfer."

In an attempt to resolve this issue, Sherman contacted Cassandra Emery, the Evening and Weekend Commissioner for Student Government.

"Parents going to school usually have to work during the day to pay for their living expenses and then attend evening classes or weekend classes," said Emery. "Without reliable care for their children, this makes this stressful and sometimes impossible."

Emery, who is also a student parent, was unaware of the center's evening care and enrolled in day classes to avoid any scheduling conflicts. However, students like Sherman don't have that kind of flexibility and would need to utilize the center's nighttime hours.

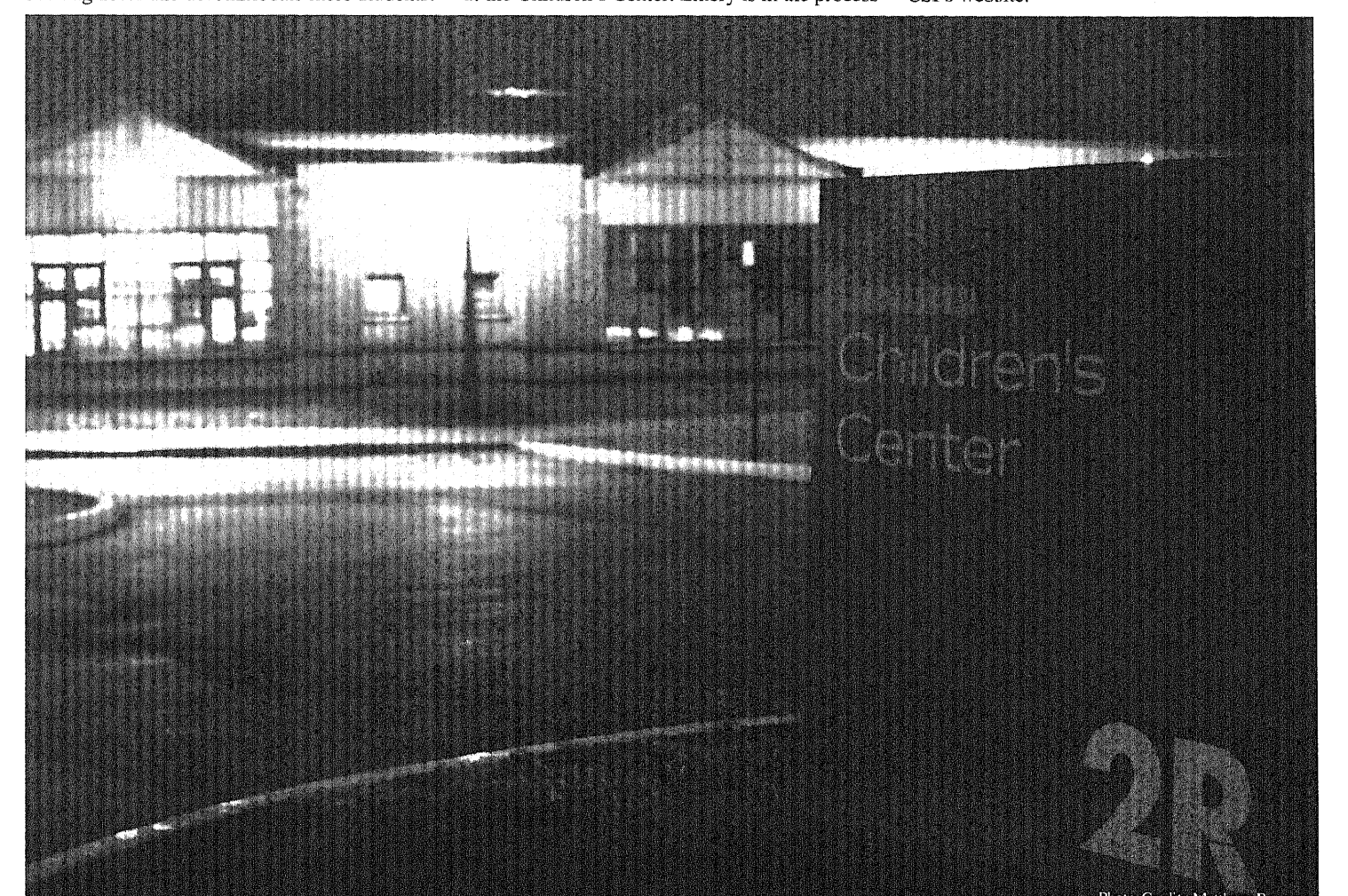
"The Children's Center offers evening care when the demand for child care is over five children per night," said Emery. "In the past, this demand has not been enough for them to continue evening services, so they haven't been promoting it and many people at the college didn't know they even offered it. The center is in part funded by student activity fees that evening and weekend students also pay. Therefore, they are paying for something that should be available to them."

Cynthia Murphy, the director of the Children's Center, confirmed this information and also discussed why it is difficult to provide

child care after hours.

"Within each program, there needs to be a minimum of two adults, one of which is a licensed teacher, to care for the children and conduct the classes," said Murphy. "Because of budgetary and licensing purposes, we need to have at least five children enrolled per night from each age group. Most of the time, we barely get five children in total for the week."

According to Murphy, there are roughly 130 students registered for the Children's Center per semester and are admitted through a lottery system. If more students register for child care, the Children's Center will be able to extend their evening hours and accommodate more students.

Gonzales applied for his financial aid a month before the fall 2013 semester, and he contacted the financial aid office and the bursar office on numerous occasions throughout the semester in order to check on the status of his funds. Gonzales discovered that he was supposed to receive a \$2,600 check in the mail but it was sent to an older address associated with him. Gonzales changed his address with the bursar office only to find that another error had occurred. "They told me that I had owed almost \$6,000 between this semester and the next one."

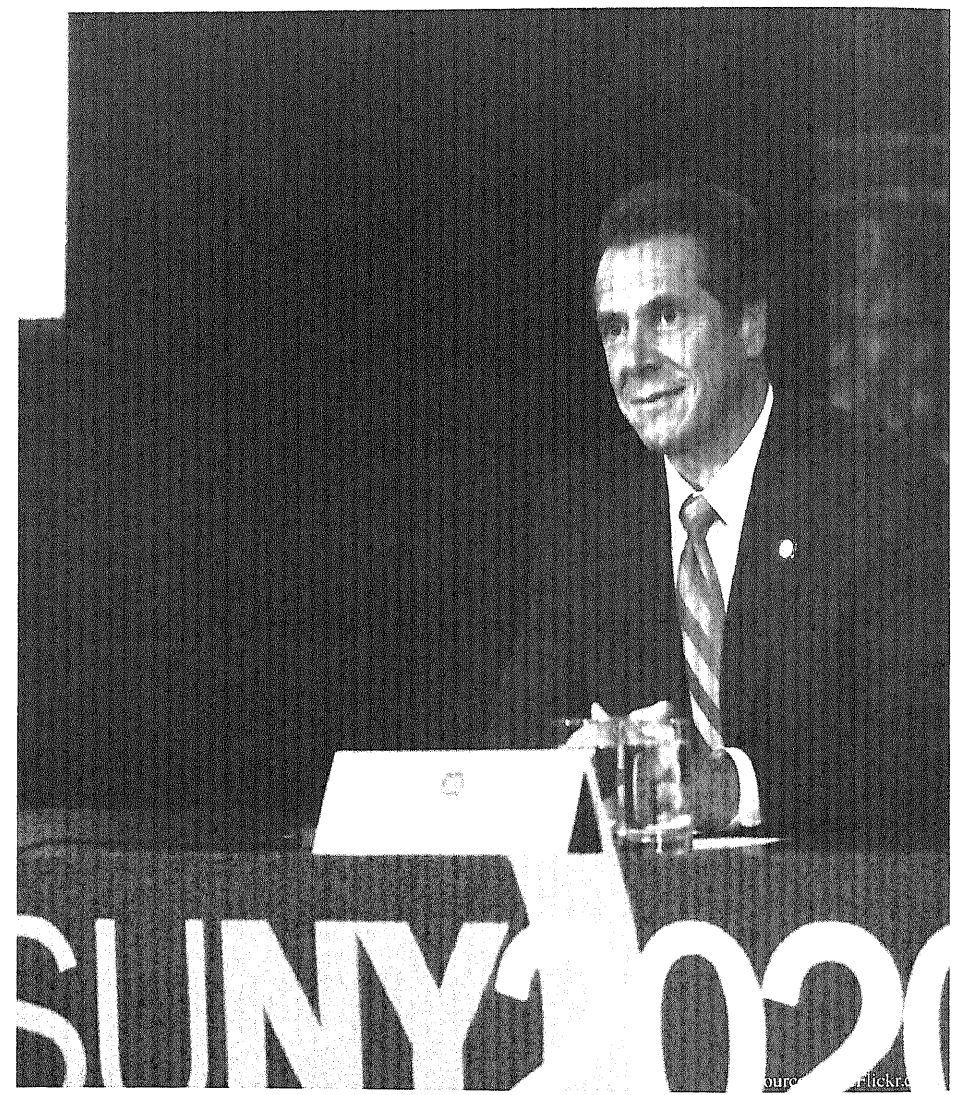
said Gonzales. Both he and the staff member knew this was an error and she proceeded to correct the matter immediately. Although the problem was resolved, the mailing of checks to the wrong address is not an isolated incident here or in the rest of the country when it comes to Financial Aid. Another student, Daniel Jalashgar, has had problems receiving his money when he applied for FAFSA over six months before the semester began. Jalashgar was accepted for the aid but he was told he would have to wait. He was given no definite time window for when he would receive his money. Now three months into the semester Jalashgar has still not received any money and

because he has not managed to pay his bill he cannot register for his next semester of classes. Between the Financial Aid room and the Bursar office there are many students having issues in what they describe as a lack of communication between the two offices. Students are told they can avoid problems with acquiring their aid by registering early. "Students are urged to apply for financial aid before March 30, when students applications are reviewed by the Federal Government and not by our office," said Director of the Office of Financial Aid Phillippe Marius, despite students like Jalashgar already doing so. "When the government gives us the approval we send the approval information to the Bursar office who finally issues the payments to a student's CUNYfirst account. Any other problems collecting funds may be due to problems with CUNYfirst or something that may need to be cleared up with the Bursar's Office." Mr. Marius added that since CUNYfirst has been implemented it has taken some time for all of the staff to get accustomed to the system and that there were a few bugs, but assured students that most problems were being corrected. Students who have applied for their Financial Aid but failed to acquire it are told that refunds are handled specifically by the Bursar Office and have nothing to do with Financial Aid at all, leaving the fate of their education and finance in the hands of the many administrative offices.

Governor Cuomo Approves SUNY 2020 Challenge Grant Program A 19.5 Million Dollar Grant for SUNY/CUNY may Result in Additions to CSI

BY CLIFFORD MICHEL College of Staten Island has unveiled its plan to leverage a capital investment of 19.5 million dollars over two years from Governor Andrew Cuomo's NY-CUNY 2020 Challenge Grant Program. CSI is working on this proposal with The Graduate Center, Borough of Manhattan Community College, The City College of New York, The New York City College of Technology, and the School of Professional Studies. If successful, the new School of Business will be leading the way to create several big data business analytic resource sites throughout New York City. The remaining revenue will be used to construct a center in building 2M for big data analytics. Big data analytics concerns processing extremely large amounts of data that are near impossible to capture through traditional methodology. Big data analytics allow hidden patterns, little known correlations and other useful information to be seen. Successful big

data analysis results in competitive advantages, more successful marketing and increased revenue. "If funded, CUNY 2020 will provide training for graduate students and business professionals to meet the current industry demand for big data analysts in the public and private sectors," wrote CSI Interim President, William J. Fritz. According to Fritz, the project would have an extraordinary economic impact. It would result in 26.3 million dollars in wages, 8.7 million dollars in tax revenue and create over 100 construction jobs in the City. CSI is choosing to construct an analytics center in 2M because the college recognizes it as the future home for the new School of Business. The college plans to implement ten classrooms and two offices later this year and is planning multiple phases of construction later in time. "I think it's important that the school looks for ways to help out the business school. It's a new program and could use all

the help we can get, plus business and STEM fields are on the up and up, it makes sense to invest in it," said Hannah Parkins, an accounting major. "Having hands on experience with big data would look help me out personally with my resume, so I can see why the school is interested." The CUNY 2020 Challenge Grant was created earlier in 2013 as a joint program between Governor Andrew Cuomo and CUNY. The goal of the program is to create long term economic development plans, designed by CUNY campuses in fields they excel in. The capital funds will support programs sustainable in the long term and provides economic development which will affect students as well as the surrounding community. Preference will be given to projects that are deemed transformational, leverage investment, support advance academic research and impact job creation. A total of 55 million dollars in capital funding will be provided for the first year of the NY-CUNY 2020 program. All Graduate and professional schools, senior CUNY colleges and community colleges are eligible to compete for the grant. All CUNY schools have the option of vying for funding independently or collaborating with other schools. The idea for the NY-CUNY 2020 challenge stems from the NY-SUNY 2020 challenge grant, established in 2011. The program set a fixed increase in tuition for all SUNY and CUNY campuses, it also provided 140 million dollars to the four SUNY University Centers (35 million dollars per campus). The second round of the grant was implemented this past June and 60 million dollars was awarded for four more projects. In Governor Cuomo's 2013 State of the State address, a third round for the NY-SUNY 2020 challenge grant, awarding 55 million dollars, was confirmed along with CUNY's first round. While new capital is expected to continue to be provided, the decision is made year by year and continued funding is dependent upon the success of the initial 2013-2014 funding.

15 Things You Probably Did Not Know About Minimum Wage in America A Tribute to the Seattle Suburb Where Voters Raised Base Pay to \$15 Per Hour

BY JOHN L. FALCONE III Yes, you read the headline correctly. There is a place in the United States where some workers will be earning a minimum of \$15 per hour. During this past election cycle, voters in the city of SeaTac, a suburb of Seattle, narrowly passed Proposition 1. In doing so, they voted to raise the city's minimum wage to more than double the federally mandated \$7.25 per hour. There is more to this law, however, than just raising the minimum wage. Proposition 1 guarantees that: the new \$15 per hour minimum wage must be adjusted annually for inflation, extra hours are to be offered to existing part-time employees before hiring additional personnel, tips will be allowed to be accepted by

employees, paid sick time can be accrued, and audits must be performed to ensure compliance with the new regulations. Not surprisingly, Proposition 1 was highly controversial. A recount was called for by Common Sense SeaTac, a group of businesses which united to spearhead opposition to the proposal. The ballots were recounted on December 9 and it was confirmed that Proposition 1 had passed by just 77 votes. But before you begin to get too excited, and start to think there may be an impending groundswell of minimum wage increase movements about to sweep the nation, you need to understand that this law is actually very limited in scope. This is because the city of SeaTac is essen-

tially an airport. Home to the Seattle-Tacoma International Airport, SeaTac was not even a city until its incorporation in 1990, and derives its name from the name of the airport: Seattle-Tacoma. SeaTac is only about ten square miles in size, three square miles of which is- you guessed it- the Seattle-Tacoma airport. The 2010 census reported that only 26,909 people resided within the city's limits. These numbers are important to understand because SeaTac's \$15 per hour minimum wage only applies to the airport and airport related businesses. NBC News estimates that this means the new law will only benefit about 6,500 employees. Assuming that most of these employees

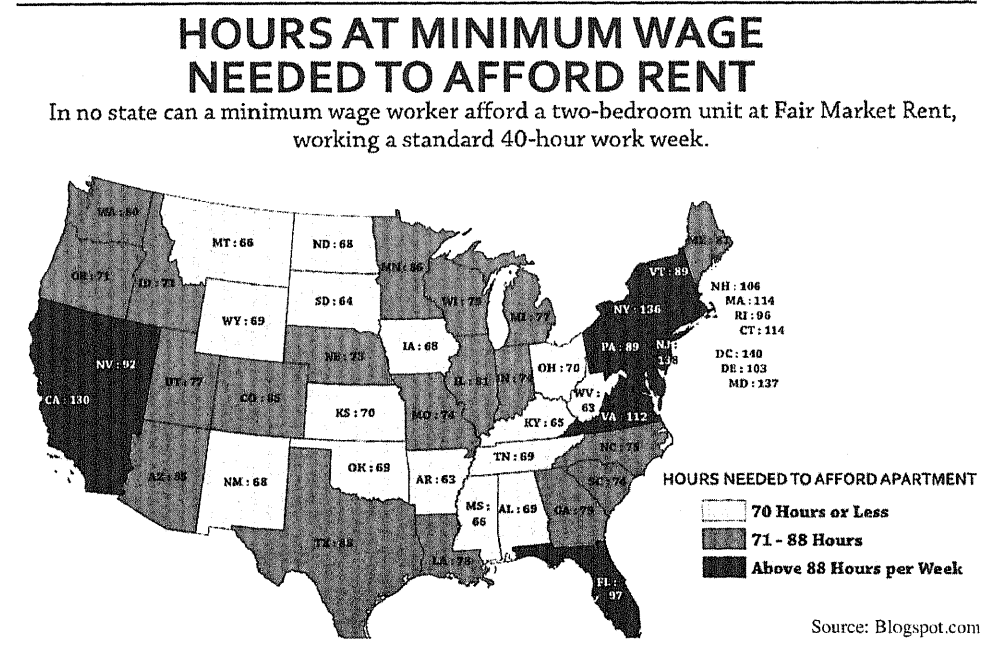
live in or around SeaTac, it quickly becomes clear that this law is far from a sweeping reform of minimum wage standards in America. Despite the limited demographic and geographic impact that will result from the passing of Proposition 1, and despite the fact that this small city's new law will not likely start a movement to double the federal minimum wage any time soon, it is refreshing to see a group of people take political action to tackle an important issue, rather than to simply complain about it. So in honor of their new \$15 per hour minimum wage, The Banner presents to you a list of 15 things you probably did not know about the minimum wage in America:

Alabama South Carolina Louisiana Tennessee Mississippi 5. Facts 3 & 4 are possible because states are not federally mandated to have a minimum wage. That is to say, that there is a federal law that mandates all employers in the US pay employees a minimum of \$7.25 per hour, but it does not require that each state have a minimum wage law of its own. So some states pass their own laws establishing a state-wide minimum and continue to raise it as the federal rate rises. A few states have never updated their laws as the federal rate has increased, hence why some states have a lower rate than the federal minimum. On the other hand, some states have established higher rates than the federal minimum. Localities within a state can raise their minimum wage, as was done in SeaTac.



Voters from the small city of SeaTac, Washington made their voices heard by approving a law to raise their city's minimum wage to \$15 per hour

- 6. Washington D.C. has a minimum wage of \$8.25. In D.C., the rate is automatically set to be \$1 above the federal minimum wage. 7. The federal minimum wage was first established in 1938. Establishing a federal minimum wage was an integral part of the Fair Labor Standards Act which was passed during the height of the Great Depression in hopes of stimulating the economy. 8. Franklin D. Roosevelt was President when the federal minimum wage was established. The rate was \$0.25 per hour. That would be equivalent to approximately \$4 per hour today. 9. Barack Obama was in office for the last increase of the federal minimum wage in July of 2009. It rose from \$6.55 to \$7.25 per hour. Congress has only raised the minimum wage three times in the last thirty years.



- 10. Working at \$7.25 per hour, a full time worker would earn \$15,080 in one year. That is only \$3090 more than the MSRP of the cheapest new car currently on sale in the US, and once you pay the taxes and insurance it is doubtful that you would even have enough left over to fill your tank. 11. In the US, for a single person considered to be in poverty they must earn less than \$12,000 a year. If you have two kids, the threshold rises to \$23,000. This would mean that if a couple with two children both worked full time at the minimum wage they would be a mere \$7,000 above the poverty line. 12. The Bureau of Labor Statistics reported that as of 2010 about 4.4million Americans worked at the minimum wage. Mississippi, Texas, Alabama, and West Virginia have the highest proportion of minimum wage workers in the nation. 13. The minimum wage would need to rise to \$10.74 per hour in order to compensate for inflation. In 1968 the minimum wage was \$1.60 an hour and at its peak buying power. Though the rate has increased, it has not accounted for inflation, thus the buying power of the minimum wage has gone down. Another way of saying this is that the buying power of \$1.60 in 1968 is the same as the buying power of \$10.74 in 2013. 14. \$2.13 is the federal minimum wage for tipped employees. This applies to restaurant employees, parking attendants, hotel staff, and other occupations in which gratuity is a part of an employee's income. 15. Pew research reports that as of February 2013, 71% of Americans will support a federal minimum wage increase to \$9.00 per hour. An increase would see support from 87% of Democrats, 68% of Independents, and 50% of Republicans. At the state level, New Yorkers have voted for three increases, which will be: \$8.00 on December 31, 2013 \$8.75 on December 31, 2014 \$9.00 on December 31, 2015

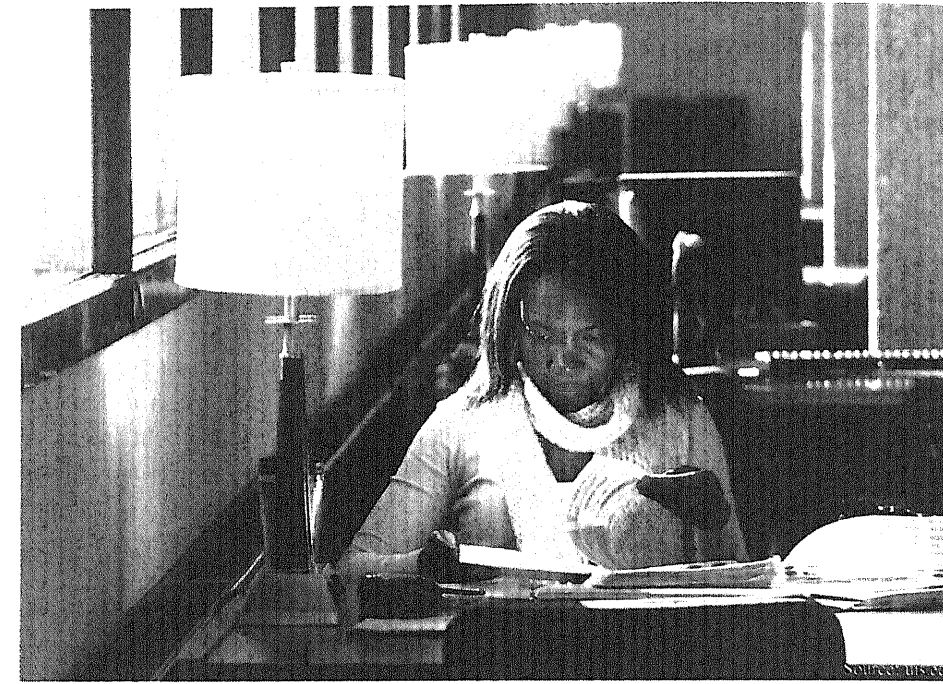

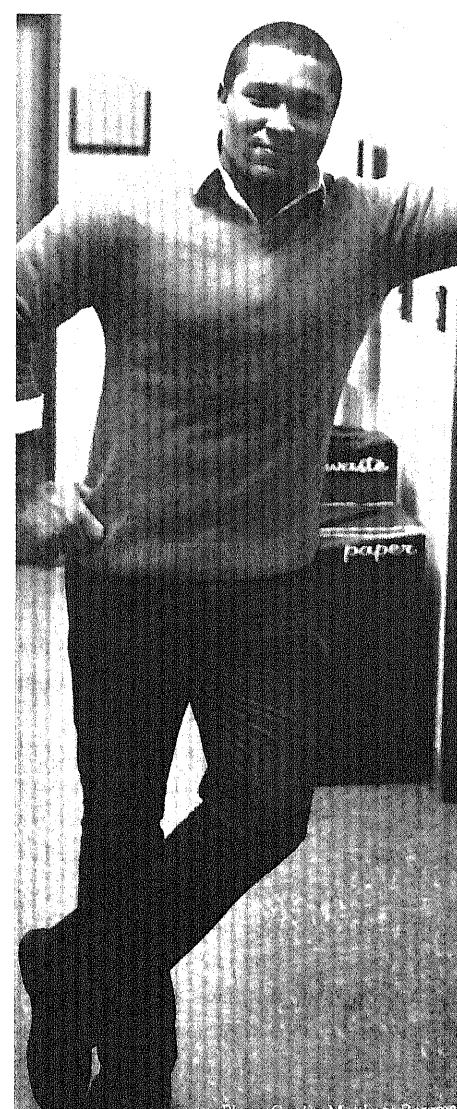

New York Crawl 'Til the Ball Falls New Year's Eve Bar Crawl (5PM to 4AM)

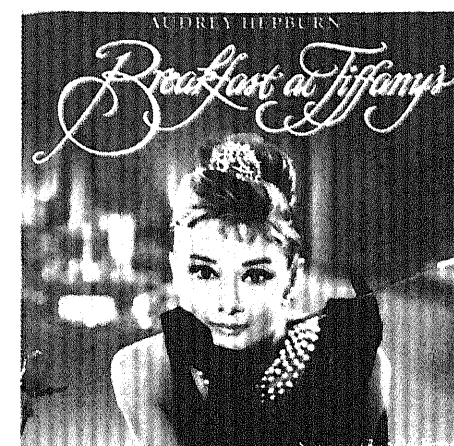

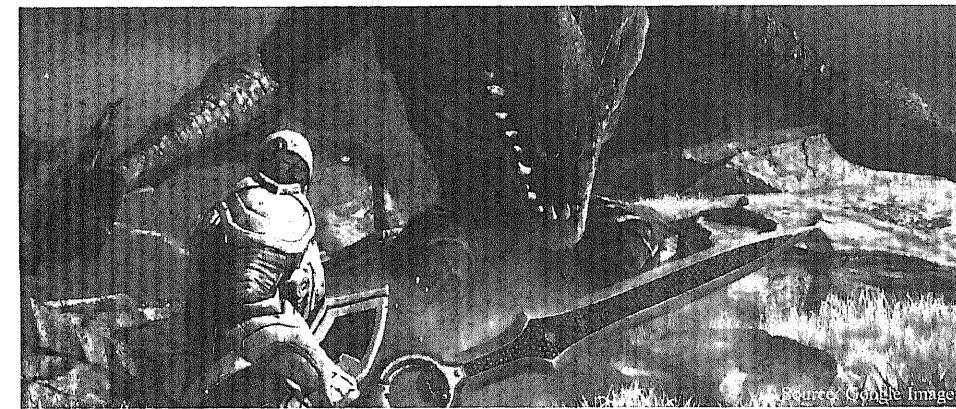

the list with its gross income of about \$306 million. Whether viewers loved the books or just the first *Hunger Games* film, everyone

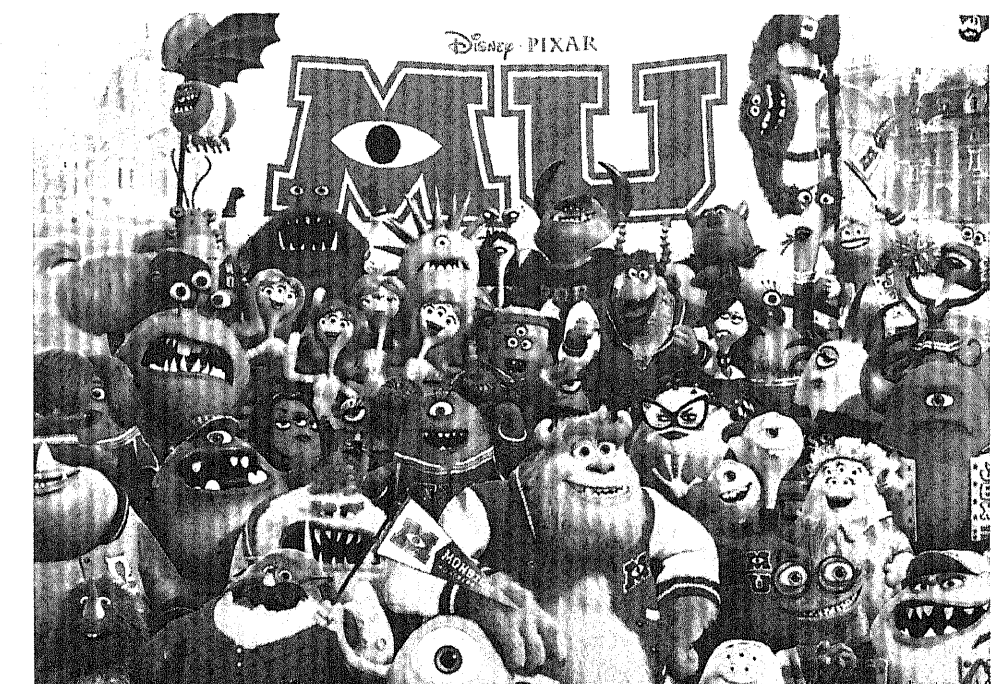

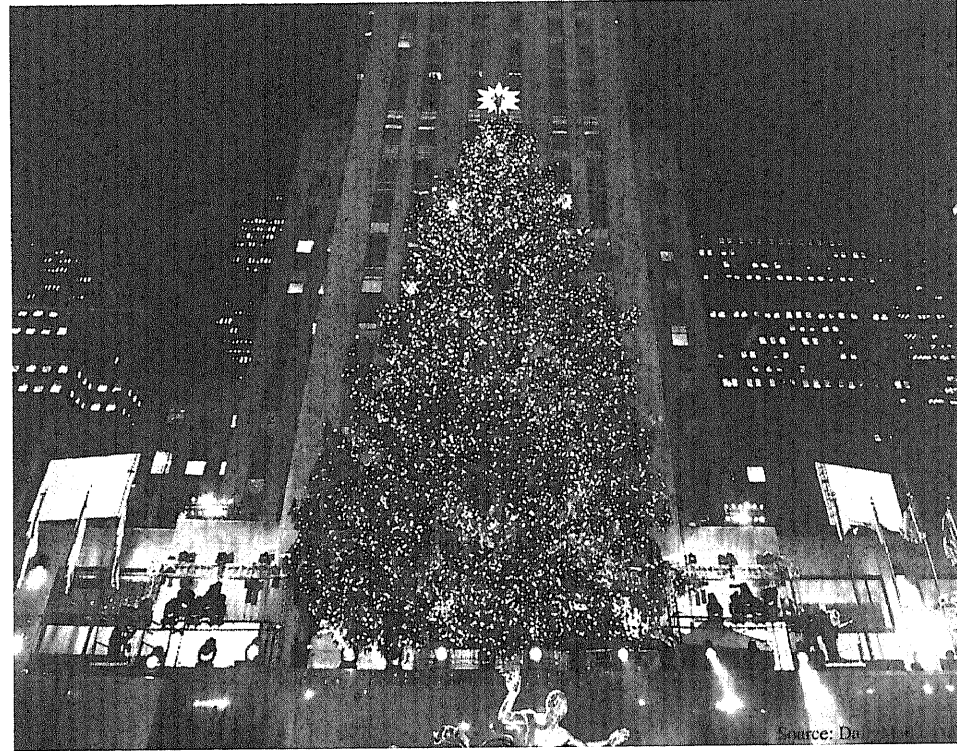

Backstage.com and craigslist are examples of where traffickers sold sex to potential clients.

allowed clients to buy sex from women and underage girls, the owners of the sites second-guessed the demand because of the enormous revenue selling sex was bringing them.

"Backstage.com makes \$33.7 million a year on sex ads alone," expressed Kim Sykes, a proponent for the fight against human trafficking. "Maybe that's why they don't want to stop and take it down because they're making a lot of money off of a human rights abuse and off the sale of women and children on the internet."

One might question why the victims don't speak out? The traffickers brainwash them into believing that if law enforcement found out, they would kill the victim and the victim's family.

Those who have the impression that slavery perished when Abraham Lincoln abolished it in the 1800s, are left delusional. Slavery still exists and will continue to unless the government and more people in our community join arms and fight against it.

And, even when masses have joined arms to fight against human trafficking, there will be people out there who are manipulative and will find illegal ways to make money. 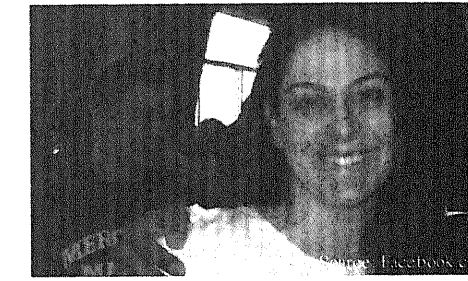
