New Emergency Boxes To Improve Campus Safety

CSI will be replacing the emergency boxes on campus with newer high-tech models. The upgraded system will have audio/visual capabilities and is designed to improve response time, decrease the number of false alarms, and improve the general safety of the campus.

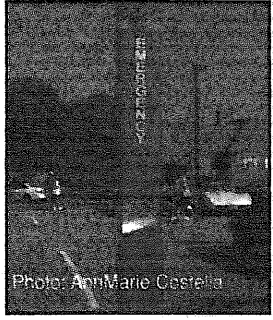

Emergency boxes, like this one near the Campus Center, will soon be placed throughout CSI. Johnson Controls, an independent contractor, will be installing the 370 new boxes this semester at a cost of 2.2 million dollars. The old boxes were removed in late Spring 2006.

"Overall, CSI is an exceptionally safe environment. There has not been an assault since 2004, but the need to create a secure environment can't be taken for granted," said Vice President for Finance and Administration, Angelo J.

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Springer to Step Down

Announces in college-wide e-mail her tenure will end in June.

In a decision that caught CSI by surprise, President Marlene Springer announced that she will end her 13 year career by stepping down on June 30, 2007.

Dr. Springer has felt the cheers and jeers of critics, recently, receiving bad press as a fiscal battle ensued

between Student Government, CSI Association, and the administration. President Springer told us she wished she had handled the fiscal issues differently, but the fiasco did not play a role in her decision to step down as President. "I thought about doing it [stepping down] last year very seriously," said Springer, "but the master plan was not yet in the works. The dormitories were still in an initial stage, and the 5 year plan for the next year, academically, was not well under way and now it's in way of completion. It just seemed like a good time."

Springer recently granted the Banner an exclusive interview. Here's the rest of the transcript:

Banner: I've spoken to some professors, and having been a student here the perception is that you've been out of touch.

Springer: No, that's not true. I meet with students probably more than any president in CUNY and there's 12,000 of you - and you're going to talk to the student who has basically said, 'no I haven't seen her.' That's going to be

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SG Opposes Chancellor's Compact Proposal

"They're not allocating enough time towards planning"

Student Government met with members of the administration to discuss concerns over the proposed allocation of funds in the Chancellor's compact.

"It's a draft," said David Podell, Vice President of Academic Affairs. "We're not opposed to refining it."

During the first meeting held on September 20, SG President Arishna (AJ) Ramphal and Senator Dennis Gaffigan questioned Podell and Carol Jackson, VP of Student Affairs, about the college's proposed spending of \$32,000 for two janitors, under the category, Student Services.

"How is this a student activity?" asked Ramphal.

"Somehow we ended up with two janitors," added Gaffigan, in support. "This is not acceptable from a student's perspective."

The discussion continued on September 26 when President Springer and her cabinet were present. The revised proposal included new sections in which suggestions made at a SG meeting were incorporated into the budget. However, many still believe the proposal is flawed.

"We had a problem with items not fitting the criteria," said Michele Payton, VP of the CSI Association and Head of the Budget Committee. "That's why we were up in arms."

The Chancellor's compact is designed to fund CUNY through philanthropy, savings efficiency, and an increase in student enrollment, all of which are considered unreliable according to SG Vice President, Ilya Geller. They're not allocating enough time towards planning," said Geller. "Some of the money came from John Marchi. He's retired so we can't count on receiving the same amount of money."

Technology Advances Cheating in the Classroom

are unable to cite information correctly. This leads to incorrect quotations and unsuccessful paraphrasing.

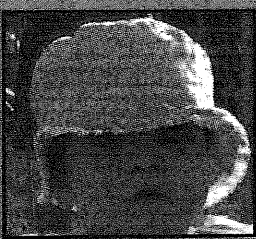
"The education system has failed to prepare students for college," Professor Sherwin said. "However, it is not an excuse."

High-tech & State-of-the-Art Cheating

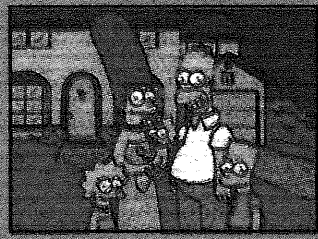
Students are finding new ways to cheat on multiple choice tests and short essays. Numerous websites have recently been designed to encourage and help people to cheat.

According to these sites, one of the newest technological methods is

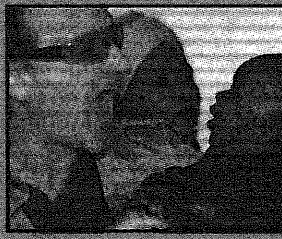

Judge Porzio's Run For Civil Court

Women love Judge Ralph Porzio. In the spring, at the Staten Island Film Festival, they hugged and kissed him in public. In front of the St. George Theatre, dozens of women surrounded the judge, embracing him and fighting among themselves to get closer to him. Female social workers who admire his work and grateful victims of domestic violence he ruled in favor of in Family Court love him.

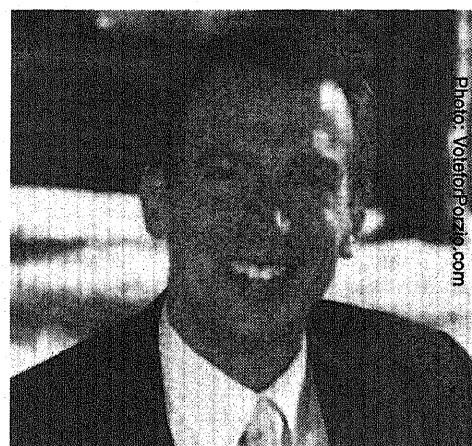

Porzio, a Republican, who was appointed to Richmond County Family Court in 1996 by the then mayor Rudolph Giuliani, was approached by the Republican Party in May during the Staten Island Republican Convention and invited to run in the November general election for the Richmond County Civil Court.

Even though Porzio belongs to the Republican Party, seventy percent of the people working on his election campaign are Democrats, mostly social workers, who know Porzio's work from the Family Court. They know that he would listen to both sides and then decide which one makes sense. They encouraged him to run in the election to make a difference. He knows there are always people trying to trick the court. Porzio works fast. He has one of the highest ratings of efficiency in the courts in Richmond County. Porzio also coaches other judges how to work faster and more efficiently.

"This is one of the very few judicial races only for Staten Islanders," Porzio said. "I'd be very pleased and much honored to be elected a judge to Civil Court." Porzio patted his grey short hair cat, named Gabriel, sitting on a cream-colored plush couch by the window of his living room in the Swiss style house near Silver Lake. Emily, his other cat, a calico, was climbing up a leafless artificial tree enclosed in a third-floor, outdoor playpen, which connects to the house. His wife Geraldine, a petite brunette, and two cute little daughters sat in wicker chairs on the patio. The girls were waiting for

their dad and, at the same time, their soccer coach to take them to practice. "Until the end of the last year I was a judge," said Porzio and took a gulp of Pilsner Urquell Czech beer. "I had an intention to reopen my private law practice, but a lot of people encouraged me to run for Civil Court."

Porzio believes that the position of a judge creates a tremendous challenge. One has to be ethically strong and has to have the utmost integrity because the responsibility is so great. A judge has to use all of his personal experience and apply it to the law. To be a judge constitutes a position of honor in contrast with a much more profitable private practice. Currently, Porzio works as a judicial hearing referee because his ten years' Family Court tenure passed in the end of the last year. He adjudicates high-conflict custody and visitation cases in Family Court.

Porzio, the only conservative Republican with ten years of experience as a judge, is running against two Democrats. In 2003, he ran for Supreme Court, which included the entirety of Brooklyn.

The judge, a native Staten Islander, was born to a modest middle-class second generation Italian American family. During his studies at St. John's University he worked as a basketball referee and, later, in law school, as a paralegal. As a student, he wanted to be a professional athlete, but became a judge instead. Porzio used to run long distance for St. John's University, and he also ran a few marathons. He graduated from St. John's Summa Cum Laude in 1980. Four years later, he obtained Juris Doctorate at the same university.

Years ago, Geraldine, an attractive sociology student, met a young attorney Ralph in a bar, where he was hanging out with an old guy. She thought that he had to be a good guy when he would go to the bar with old guys. But they didn't exchange phone numbers then. Some time later, Porzio's sister in law, who, by coinci-

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The Devil is at Home

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true. I meet with the students more than any president in all of CUNY. I've had very good support from the students over the years. Same with the faculty. They just passed a major resolution asking for my leadership. You're always going to get people who, maybe, I've turned them down for promotion, you know, they don't tell you that. Or maybe, I've turned them down for tenure, or maybe they're under some other problem. But you're going always going to get people like that. But by and large, I am very pleased by the cooperation I've gotten from the faculty and students.

B: I've actually attended a lot of the town hall meetings ...

S: all of them.

B: ...where you've spoken to the students and they never actually took advantage of coming to them and meeting you...

S: Well it's their option whether they want to come or not. I know that they have very busy lives - they have children. But I have a busy life too, so between us, we try and cross whenever we can. I walk the campus often, less so in the winter, and I told SG whenever they want to meet with me, I'll gladly set up a meeting so that's very good.

B: Right now the student body, I think, is very apathetic to CSI or anything related to CSI because it is a commuter school. A lot of the students come to class and leave - they don't really get involved. So with the addition of the dorms and other future programs, it will build spirit.

S: I hope so. Some of our students, true, are apathetic, but also our students have tremendous pressures on them. And uh, they're not apathetic about raising their children. They're not apathetic about, you know, other things. They have to

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inclined to cheat. Since there is no abrupt plan by the state, city, or college to decrease the size of classes, putting equations in a calculator, using cheat sheets filled with vocabulary and putting them in odd places, or paying for a paper to be written, remain traditional and effective ways to cheat.

However CSI is taking action to prevent cheating. "The campus bought a tool called turnitin.com a few years ago," said Chief Librarian, Wilma Jones. "It is used to prevent plagiarism." A professor can submit a document and search thousands of databases to see if any part of the document has been plagiarized. This tool is advertised to the faculty by the Center for Excellence in Learning Technologies, located in the Library.

"Even typing a phrase into Google can help detect plagiarism," says Prof Sherwin. "It is becoming harder and harder to tell if something is written by a friend, but I give enough writing assignments to know each student's

make choices as they go. And also they take, 12 hours of classes. By the time you have 12 hours of classes, possibly a job, and raising a family and a commute to school, you don't have a lot of time for other things and I understand that.

B: Do you have any regrets?

S: Oh yes. There are things I would've done differently at some time or another, but if you don't look back and say, "I would've done that different" you don't learn. But by and large, major, no.

B: With the recent fiscal fiasco that shed a negative light on the administration, would you have done anything differently?

S: Yes, I think I would've probably looked at the ear-markings differently. It was something we worked out amicably, and I'm delighted for that. I now have a very good working relationship with the Student Government. That's the positive thing that came out of it.

B: What prompted you to step down?

S: Basically I thought it was time. I've been here for 12 years, almost 13. I'm at that stage in my life where I've accomplished a great deal with the help of everybody else, and I just wanted a different challenge. This job is a 24/7 job, and I just wanted more time in my life to devote to other things.

B: How has the student body changed over the past 13 years?

S: There are more women in CUNY than men, and that's true in many, many institutions across the country. Our number of African-American students have increased, and I'm delighted with that. We also have a student body, I think, that is better prepared than it ever was.

B: How will your departure affect CSI? When you think of CSI, your name comes to mind.

S: The institution is a wonderful place, and my name is associated with it because I'm president. When I leave, the next president's name will be associated with it. I think that's a very good thing. You move on, and the institution will con-

tinue to grow. I want it to be in very good shape when I leave. I want the community to think well of it. My chief job while I've been here is to try and build and institution that the students will be proud of and will say, "I'm glad I went to CSI."

B: When June 30th comes around, what's the first thing you'll do without a title attached to your name?

S: I'll be fine. I'll get a lot of my life back, although I enjoy the life that I have. I will be a university professor. I was a professor when I started, and it seems to me that life goes full circle.

B: And you're still going to be affiliated with CUNY?

S: Yes.

B: What will the process be like when choosing your replacement?

S: I won't have anything to do with it. When they chose me they did a national search. I think there were over 60 people in the search. We had 3 days of interviews. I interviewed with the college, with the search committee, with the Board of Trustees, and with the union.

B: And what qualities would you like to see your replacement have?

S: I would certainly like to see someone who has integrity, who stands up for what he or she believes in, who is dedicated to CSI, and enjoys the job.

B: Do you have a message for the student body and the incoming classes?

S: What I would like to see them do is be very proud of their school, and to work very hard to make the citizens of Staten Island understand that. Our students can get as good of an education here as they can get anywhere. They get it for, what is difficult sometimes for them, but it's still \$4,000. That's a lot different than other schools that charge \$30,000. You've got labs here that certainly much more expensive schools don't have, you've got quality professors who have been educated in the best schools in the country. The school has a lot to offer, so I hope that all 12,000 people will turn into a cheerleader for the school.

On math and science tests, these methods don't help. "I am not personally diligent," said Professor Heiler. "I am usually doing something else while they take the test. The way I discover cheating is usually through students having the same bizarre wrong answers."

It has become increasingly easy for students to cheat and increasingly hard for professors to know how their students cheat, but the college has come up with an effective deterrent, the Academic Integrity Policy. It states that any student caught cheating can receive a lower grade, get suspended, or expelled. However, it is ultimately up to the professor what punishment a student will receive. "It is pretty much impossible to prevent students from cheating," states an anonymous student. "The only way to completely eliminate it is if we become a totalitarian society. And no, I don't want that."

Emergency Boxes

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Aponte. "This new system is not a response to a pattern of crime, as it is a system to help people on campus facing medical emergencies, unexpected transportation problems, etc."

Further, the visual capability of the system provides invaluable data. "It gives any responding officer more information about what's going on," said Director of Marketing, Robert Huber. "You can never have too much intelligence in public safety."

In the past when someone used the old model "squawk boxes" an alarm would sound in the public safety office and all available officers would respond to the scene. This system was inefficient because since there was no way to see or hear the person in trouble, the officers had no idea what level of emergency they were dealing with. Also, routine maintenance checks showed that many of the old boxes were not functioning.

The new system will aid public safety in saving time and man power, while ensuring that students receive the help they need. "The audio and video features of the new emergency boxes allow for a more customized response," explained Aponte. "Now, depending on the nature of the call, appropriate levels of public safety response can be anticipated. For example, a severe health emergency would still require significant response but would also allow for Public Safety to dispatch an officer who is also a licensed emergency medical technician, while a dead car battery might require one officer to respond."

In addition to the new boxes, public safety is increasing the number of officers on patrol during evening hours. The administration is also working on a plan to provide handicapped students with a handheld device that they can press in order to activate the nearest emergency box. As a supplementary safety measure, Vice President Aponte recommends that all students program the telephone number of public safety (718-982-2111) into the speed dial on their cell phones. Students should contact public safety whenever they need help or feel that their personal safety is being threatened.

Director of Public Safety Gene Martinez, declined to comment.

Soriano now works for Porzio in his election campaign as a campaign treasurer after she had completed the paralegal studies program a few years ago. "I'm trying to learn from him. He is like the samurai, and I'm his apprentice."

As Porzio's student, Soriano learned that the judge has integrity. "He is the person I'd like to be one day," Soriano said. "The more you know him, the more you have respect for him." In Soriano's class, there were many blue-collar single moms. They went to paralegal class to make something of themselves. The judge, never condescending, encouraged them to make themselves better. He has a lot of understanding for poor people.

Porzio believes that working as a paralegal before law school or during law studies contributes greatly to aspiring legal professionals' work experience and is a useful preparation for their future job as an attorney or as another legal professional. The judge considers his former paralegal job a wonderful education.

In the future, Judge Porzio intends to reopen his legal practice if the election doesn't work out, but he also has a message for CSI students. "All the students should come out and vote. Our country changed in the sixties and seventies because of the power of students. Every student should vote and have a voice in their government."

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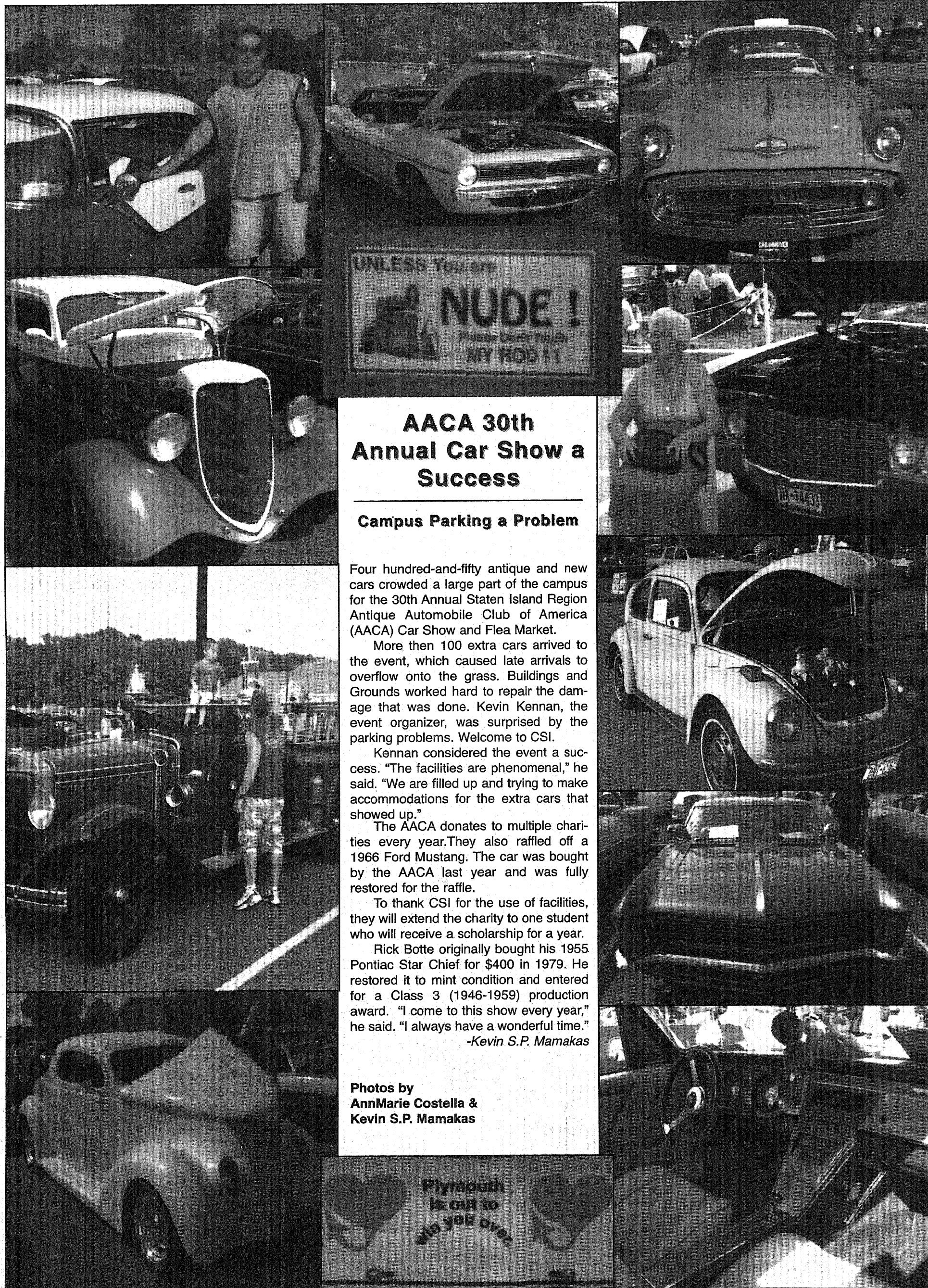
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AACA 30th Annual Car Show a Success

Hillel Joins Thousands in Central Park for "Global Save Darfur Day"

The Jewish community accounted for many at rally to speak out against genocide in Darfur, Africa.

Children held hand painted signs proclaiming: "Stop the Murder" and "Save Darfur". A mix of ethnicities and ages wore orange stickers to represent Darfurian victims individually. A New York resident attendee, Margret Batzcock's sticker read, "I'm standing for Darfur victim number 200, 852". The stickers were numbered 1 through 400,000.

Since the conflict began, an estimated 400,000 people have been murdered and 2.5 million displaced. It is 2006 and a holocaust rages on in the Darfur region of the Sudan. A police estimate of 20,000 people attended the East Meadow Central Park forum.

The peaceful yet emotionally charged gathering featured speakers and musical performances. Actress Mira Sorvino spoke comparing the Sudanese regime to a "sociopathic parent." She described children "being shot in their mother's arms and purposely poisoning wells with dead bodies in them."

Ethan Rafal, a student journalist/photographer who was detained in the Sudan told his story. All of his documents were confiscated leaving him only with the words of his personal account. "Close your eyes," he said, "Imagine children's sandals drenched in blood staring at you. The sun reflecting shards of glass and metal covering the streets."

A former slave in the Sudan, Simon Deng spoke asking the attendees, "Be the voice of the voiceless. I know what it is to be a victim. I saw kids dying in their mother's arms in

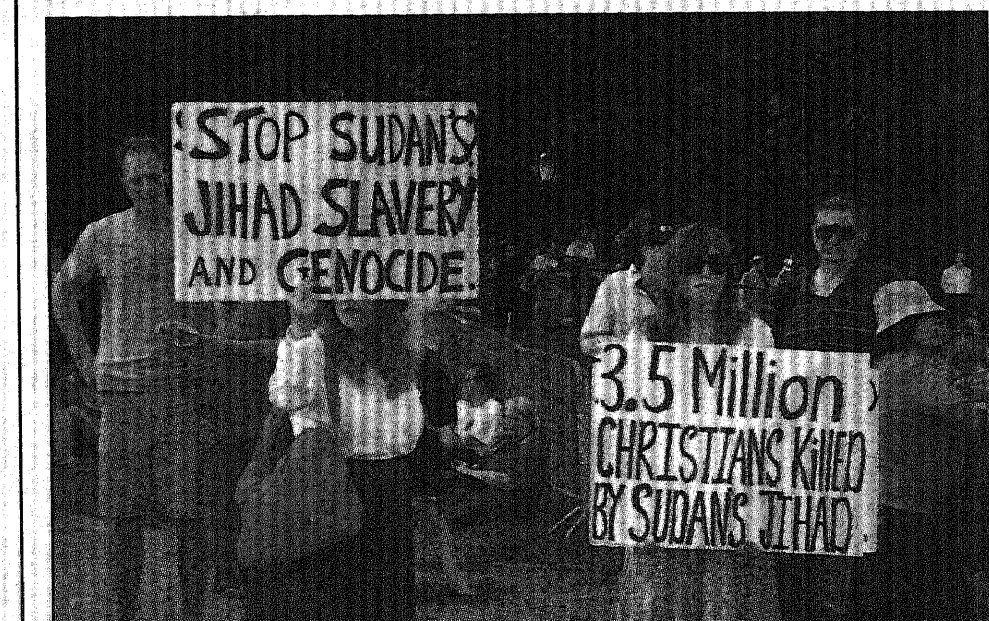
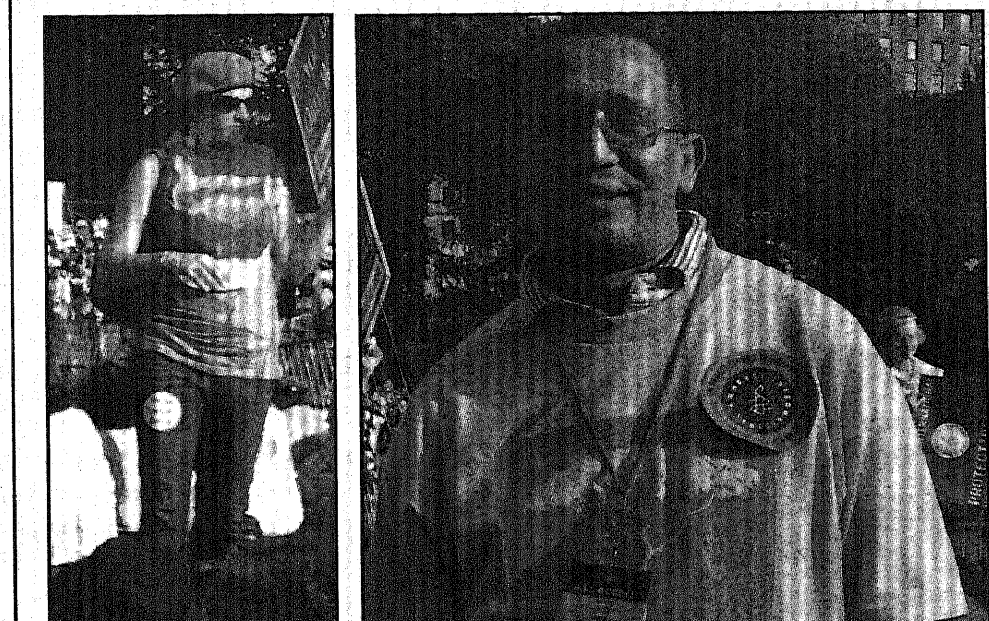
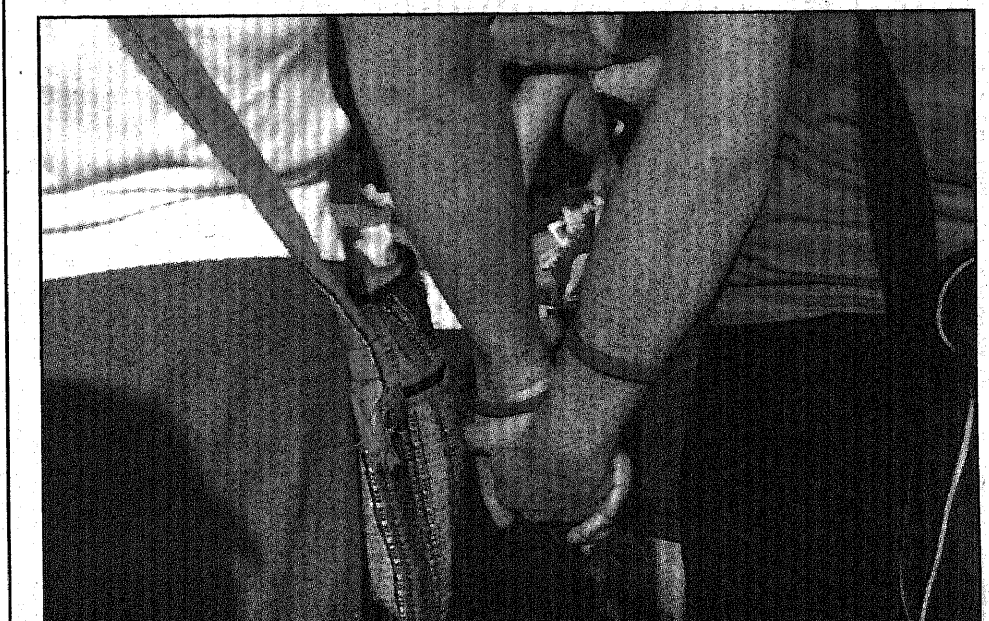
the refugee camps."

The band OAR performed and has allowed the Save Darfur campaign to come on tour with them. "I don't want to be another passerby," they sang. "Give me one shot in my life." They also sang a rendition of Bob Dylan's, "The Times They Are A Changing."

Many people from Sudan attended the rally. "We support our people," Sabri Taha who writes for an arabic online newspaper Sudaneseonline.com. "I walked from New York to Washington the first time. I have family in Sudan and I worry about them." The first rally/protest to save Darfur was held last year in Washington D.C.

Beginning in 2003, a government-backed militia known as Janjaweed has been systematically raping and murdering the Darfurian people. Despite a peace agreement made on May 5, 2006, nothing has changed. The African Union has no mandate to protect civilians and is inadequate to do so. The Save Darfur Coalition and many other supporting groups are asking the U.N. to take over and fulfill the peacekeeping mission. However, the Sudanese president, Omar al-Bashir, has continuously rejected any notion of a U.N. intervention. David Rubenstein, organizer of the rally and member of the Save Darfur Coalition, had the final words at Sunday's event. "Wake up world," he said. "Twice as many people as you see here today will die every month in Darfur."

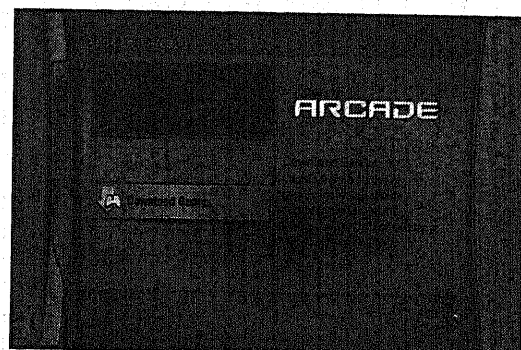

Weird Al Yankovic, the parody pioneer, who in the past has brought us such classics as: "Pretty Fly for a Rabbi," "Amish Paradise," and "Dare to Be Stupid," is back with his 14th studio album entitled: "Straight Outta Lynwood." It consists of both parodies and original tunes. Unfortunately, while it does have its strong points, many of the tracks leave much to be desired.

On the single, "White and Nerdy" a parody of Chamillionaire's "Ridin," Al doesn't miss a beat. He shows off his rapid rhyming skills and proves that he can adapt his voice to a myriad of singing styles. It is the best song on the album and is sure to become a Weird Al classic. The music video demonstrates the off-beat sense of humor we've come to expect from Weird Al. It features a wonderful cameo appearance by Donny Osmond, whose hysterical dance moves alone, are reason enough to check it out.

"Canadian Idiot," finds Al taking pot shots at our wacky neighbors to the north. He sings: "Don't Wanna be a Canadian Idiot. Won't figure out the temperature in Celsius. See, the map, they're hovering right over us. Tell you the truth, it makes

me kind of nervous."

Al uses his unique accordion laden brand of polka to concoct "Polkamania" a humorous medley of modern hits like: "Let's Get It Started," "Drop It Like It's Hot," "Candy Shop," "Take Me Out," and "Gold Digger."

"Don't Download This Song," an over the top "We Are the World," style anthem is by far the best original song on the album. It humorously preaches the evils of illegal file sharing, and lampoons self righteous rockers such as Metallica's Lars Ulrich. Al pleads: "Don't take away money from artists just like me. How else can I afford another solid gold Humvee? And diamond-studded swimming pools, these things don't grow on trees. So all I ask is, everybody, please...Don't download this song. Even Lars Ulrich knows it's wrong."

"Virus Alert" is a silly but catchy track about computer viruses. Al warns: "Look out! It's gonna melt your face right off your skull and make your iPod only play Jethro Tull."

"I Sue Ya," a tune about frivolous lawsuits done in the style of Rage Against the Machine, and "Close but No Cigar," which is reminiscent of "Short Skirt, Long Jacket," by Cake are mildly interesting, but mediocre at best.

The 11 minute homage to R. Kelly's

urban opera "Trapped in the Closet," called "Trapped at the Drive-Thru," was



especially disappointing and others like "Weasel Stomping Day," and "Pancreas," are so awful they need not be described.

Unfortunately, Al's satirized version of the nauseating James Blunt balled "You're Beautiful," aptly titled "You're Pitiful," did not make it onto the album. However, you can legally download it for free on Weird Al's official MySpace page: www.myspace.com/weirdal.

If imitation is truly the sincerest form of flattery, then Weird Al will be around for a long time. "Most artists seem genuinely flattered to get the 'Weird Al treatment,' he said. "Some groups, including Nirvana, have publicly stated that they didn't realize that they had really 'made it' until they heard my parody."

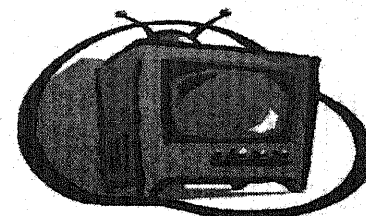

As the calendar turns from summer to fall, TV networks roll out the new crop of "must see" hits and their version of "TV's most anticipated new drama/comedy." Once these shows have been weeded through, only a few manage to become mainstays of television. Here's a review of some of the best shows still on television since their debut.

The Office- Many of America's white collar jobs are filled with mind numbing monotony and bosses who seem to cause



more problems than they solve. Very much in the same vein as 1999's film Office Space, it is

this familiar repetitiveness that draws more viewers to the show each week. Based on the Emmy Award winning British television series of the same name, The Office debuted in March 2005 on NBC with a short run of six episodes. The style of the show is something much different than of a typical American sitcom. The unusual mockumentary-style approach of the series made it a risk for airing in the US along with dialogue that is crammed with uncomfortable silences and blank stares. Plus there's no laugh track to tell the viewers when it's

Steve Carrell stars as Michel Scott. The comedian's dead pan technique fits perfectly with the oblivious and egocentric world's worst boss who makes you cringe with every thoughtless comment he blurts out. John Krasinski and Jenna Fischer co-star as the now proverbial "Ross and Rachel" couple Jim and Pam. Instead of a coffee house, this "will they or won't they" romance is set in the confines of workspaces and cubicles. If you like smart, subtle, uncomfortable and sweet humor, this show is for you.

Scrubs- For all intents and purposes, Scrubs is about all of us. Everyone has a dream. But what happens when it actually comes to fruition and you discover that your ideal job might not be exactly what you expected?

The first season of Scrubs centers on new medical school graduate JD, his best friend and roommate Dr. Chris Turk and love interest Dr. Elliot Reid all finding their way through their internships at Sacred Heart Hospital. Along the way, they meet Dr. Cox, a narcissistic long time resident who likes to make long and humiliating

speeches to all of his students, played wonderfully by John C. McGinley.

The heart of the show lies with the love-hate relationship between JD and Dr. Cox. JD wants nothing more than Dr. Cox to be his mentor and Dr. Cox wants nothing more than JD to leave him alone. The humor of the show comes from the awkward way which the characters interact with each other, whether it's JD sleeping with his mentor's ex-wife or Cox's never ending battle against evil Chief of Medicine Dr. Bob Kelso.

ER- Twelve years ago, NBC premiered this fast-paced ride into the emergency room of Chicago's County General Hospital and has been disappointing since. The first season introduced new talent to America such as Snakes on a Plane's Julia Ann Margulies and reinvented the

career of former Batman and Robin star George Clooney. The highlight of the initial year came in the episode titled Love's Labor Lost, perhaps one of the best hours of television ever produced. This single installment is a microcosm of the excellent first season of ER and sets the bar for the series at an incredibly high level which it still often reaches.

The Simpsons- Television networks have tried over and over again to duplicate what FOX started seventeen years ago. Still the smartest show on TV, The Simpsons

offers what no other sitcom can, animated or not, intelligent humor and characters that never change.

Based on animated shorts that ran in the late eighties on the sketch comedy program The Tracey Ulman Show, The Simpsons immediately became a national hit once they received their own show. Everyone wanted Simpson merchandise and t-shirts were banned from schools for endorsing underachievement. Compared to what the show has evolved into, The Simpsons came from humble beginnings. The drawings were crude and the characters undeveloped. Even though the series wouldn't really hit its stride until the third and fourth seasons, the first year still outshines any Simpson clone out there.

The hardest thing a show can do is either sustain the momentum it initially creates or generate an audience that isn't there from the very beginning. Obviously The Simpsons and ER have been able to continue having success for over a decade. It will be interesting to see if Scrubs, entering its 6th season this January, and The Office just beginning its 3rd season, can build a larger audience and become as successful as they deserve.

Challenges Await Reigning CUNYAC Champ Dolphins

From the first day of training camp to the last seconds of the season, every team has one goal. Win. But it's hard at the top. When everyone knows you're the team to beat, you carry a target on your back all year.

After winning the first-ever official CUNYAC title in 2005, the CSI Dolphins women's soccer team now has the difficult task of defending their crown. Having gone unbeaten in conference play, with a record of 4-0-1 last year, there's no doubt that division foes already have CSI circled on their schedules as the Dolphins look to continue their dominance over the league.

Since CUNY conference play began in 2004, the Dolphins have been undefeated. Their record in the league has been an outstanding 11-0-1, which includes last season's first-ever official CUNYAC playoff.

As soon as the Dolphins stepped on the field against CCNY, the confidence of the Dolphins was apparent. Without wasting time, the Dolphins took control of their foe and the game. From the outset, the strength, size and speed advantage of the Dolphins was obvious as CSI ran around, over and through the Beavers all afternoon long.

Danielle Narwick scored the game's first goal with an assist from Lauren Baydal at 3:39 into the first-half opening the floodgates. Narwick added her second goal of the game less than six minutes later. The onslaught continued as two goals by Shannon Connelly sandwiched a pair of goals by Daniella Otaiza. All four of these CSI goals came within a span of eleven minutes.

The first-half ended with CSI lead-

ing a blowout 6-0 over CCNY. The Dolphins outplayed their conference rival for the entire opening half, spending more than thirty minutes inside Beaver territory, firing twenty-two shots compared to their opponent's four.

With a big lead and the game pretty much in hand, the Dolphins dialed down the attack against their outclassed adversary. CSI tacked on a goal scored by Lauren Baydal in the 54th minute off a penalty kick. The day's scoring was capped off by freshman Melissa Cimilluca. Playing keep away, CSI managed to wear down the clock the rest of the way putting the final score at 8-0.

For the Beavers, the lone bright spot was freshman goalkeeper Yuri Giraldo, who saved twelve of the Dolphins twenty shots on goal. On the other side of the field, CSI netminders Tina Bellocchio and Jennifer Miller split the Dolphins' first shutout of the season. The win over the Beavers kept the Dolphins' career record in the CUNY conference at an unblemished 12-0-1.

The Dolphins will play the remaining ten games of the season over the next three weeks. They will face CCNY again and Medgar Evers College twice before post-season play begins on October 29.

The team has the tools to put the pieces together once the playoffs begin. The greatest advantage CSI has is that they feature the return of last season's top six scorers. Sophomore Fiosa Begai led the team with twenty-nine points as

a freshman. CSI's all-time leading goal scorer senior Shannon Connelly returns with fellow seniors Daniella Otaiza, Bukurije Begai, Danielle Narwick and last season's CUNYAC MVP Lauren Baydal.

The roster consists of twenty athletes, half of whom are underclassmen. The mix of older and younger students should provide CSI a healthy balance of experienced veteran leadership and youthful excitement. It has fallen on the shoulders of the seniors and juniors on the roster to make the necessary adjustments in order to lessen the burden for the novice freshmen and sophomores. Despite the rocky start, the CSI Dolphins will keep fighting and playing hard down to the last second that ticks off the clock.

Star Player Injured During Soccer Game

One of the Dolphin's star defenders will be sidelined four to eight weeks with a third degree sprained ankle sustained against FDU-Florham.

During the first half of the game in Newark, NJ, captain Joseph Fassari caught up to an opposing player on a breakaway. Fassari slid and knocked the ball away, saving a potentially dangerous scoring opportunity just inside the 18 yard box. "My left foot got caught in the turf," he said. "My whole body just fell over it and rolled out in a bad way."

Fassari lay on the field for five minutes before trainer John Nostro carried him off the field. During half-time, Fassari went to the emergency room. He spent five hours in the waiting room before getting x-rays, only to be told that because of the swelling, they could not give a clear diagnosis.

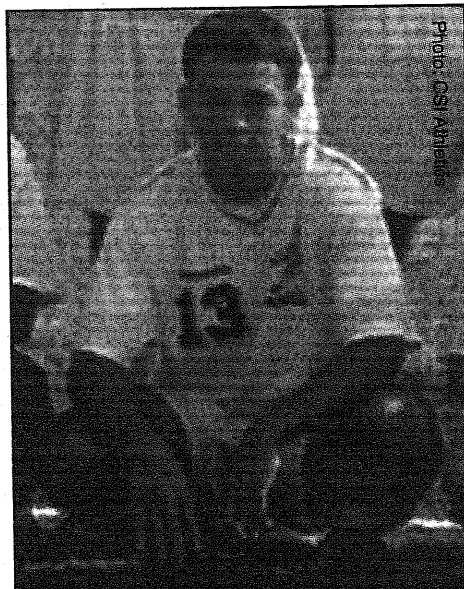
"I was depressed in the hospital," he said. "It was just a long time in the

waiting room and you don't know what's wrong with you." He left the

hospital on crutches, pain-killers, and scheduled an MRI appointment later in the week.

"I've never been injured in my life," he said. "This is the first thing and it's hard to take. I sacrificed a lot to be here this year. It's hard, two games into the season and it might be over."

Fassari earned the Coach's Award at last year's Athletic Awards Banquet. Coach Vito
