CSI Remembers September 11th Ten Years Later

The tenth anniversary of the September 11th attacks has brought about conversations among students and faculty around CSI's campus.

In order to further reflect and remember the tragic events of that day, the college held a World Trade Center Memorial on September 9th on the lawn between 2N and 2A.

The memorial began with a welcome by President Morales who spoke about the tragedy and the many lives lost that day. He then continued by announcing that there would be a new building built in the space that they were standing in order to preserve that part of campus.

After his words and a positive reception by the guests, Stephanie Geraci gave a violin performance of "Meditation" from Jules Massenet's Thais, followed by poetry written by Professor Cate Marvin.

Student Joseph McDonough from the CSI Armed Force's Club then took the podium to address the audience, speaking about lost family and friends.

Before the closing thoughts, some of the CSI Alumni Board Members read out 27 names of CSI Alumni who lost their lives, many of whose families were there.

During the ceremony, emotions were high as those in attendance reflected on memories of their loved ones and how the attacks still affect their lives ten years later.

Like so many people do, CSI staff member, Michael DeAngelis, remembers where he was that day.

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President Morales revealed a new 9/11 memorial plaque at CSI's memorial service.

New Campaign Gets Mixed Reviews

A new student organization has been created at CSI with its first project aimed at fighting the new "Change is in the Air" tobacco-free policy on campus.

The Student Government established a chapter of Young Americans for Liberty, a nationwide group dedicated to promoting

democracy and freedom, on campus. The group officially endorsed removing the ban and said this will be on the main agenda for the Political Action committee of Student Government.

"We are not pro smoking, we are pro freedom," Anthony Librera, 22, Chairman of the Publications committee for Student Government said.

The reaction to this new policy has not fared well with some students, who believe it is a violation of their constitution rights as citizens.

"CUNY's responsibility is to education," Librera explained. "This is a joint effort to a violation of rights on a group of people and turning us into second class citizens."

The "Change is in the Air" campaign was placed into full effect this semester, with the plan to transition the campus into a non-smoking area by September 2012. The campaign worked in conjunction with CUNY's decision to forbid smoking on all 23 of its campuses.

The CUNY board of trustees presented President Morales with the policy, and he was

Disability Gives Stephon Melvin Reason to Try Harder

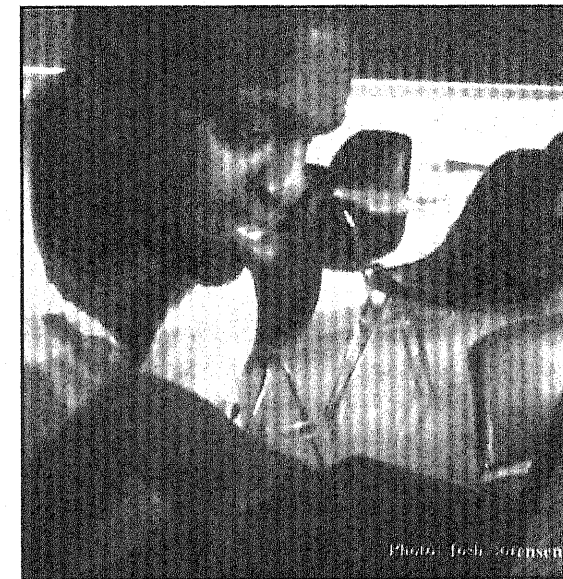
A lot of time and effort throughout CUNY has been directed at students with disabilities, and the story of Stephon Melvin at CSI shows the fruits of these efforts.

"Walking through the passageway, I was often stampeded by other students, with no regard to my disability," Said Stephon Melvin, as he reflected on his experience at Port

Richmond High School in Far Rockaway Queens in 2007.

Melvin has deformities from Amniotic Band Syndrome, a disease which developed while in his mother's womb. Melvin was born with one arm, in which he has two and a half fingers. He only has use of one eye and has noticeable scarring on his face.

Melvin's problems made him an easy target for high school bullies. When he graduated Port Richmond High school his family moved to Staten Island, and he had the opportunity to attend the College Of Staten Island. After Melvin became a college student, he found himself being viewed in a

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Tripoli Falls to Rebels, Future of Libya in Question

For Libya, the easy part of the revolution is over, now the truly hard part begins. With the collapse of the Gaddafi regime the question of the future now takes the forefront.

In order to prevent a power vacuum the National Transition Council has moved from the Benghazi, in the east, into Tripoli. The importance of this move being stressed by

hands, effectively signals the end of his regime. We must now wonder, what direction will the NTC take Libya into? Will the NTC step aside and actually aid in developing a new democratic government remembering that its place is to be transitional. What of the rebuilding efforts?

Will Libya fall into the old trap of Western neo-imperialism, with Western companies coming in, buying up the old

Joma Sayehi Eltayef, who is in charge of coordinating the securing of Tripoli, saying, "We can't leave any opportunities for remnants of the regime, or a vacuum. We need a strong grip so that we don't have chaos. As soon as the regime falls, we have an alternative ready to take over."

Gaddafi is still on the loose, with rebels fighting pro-Gaddafi resistance pockets in Tripoli and across Libya. All is not clear for the NTC, especially as they come under criticism by the people of Libya. With The Christian Science Monitor reporting "The leader of the NTC 'has lost his credibility by repeatedly lying to the press,' said a woman who asked to remain anonymous while criti-

State industries and extracting the wealth of the nation for their benefit instead of that of the people of Libya? With the NTC expressing idea's of limiting investment into Libya from countries that did not support the rebels, this is a distinct possibility, but it is too early to tell.

An official at the Libyan oil firm Agoço, as reported by Reuters has said "We don't have a problem with western countries like the Italians, French and UK companies. But we may have some political issues with Russia, China and Brazil." This stance has China scrambling to reaffirm its ties to Libya. China abstained from voting in the UN Security Council vote that authorized

cizing the rebel leader because she came from a prominent family in Benghazi. A spokesman for the council refused to talk when contacted by phone."

There has been controversy of the rebels claiming they had captured two of Gaddafi's son's Saif al-Islam and Mohammad. Saif who was reported by the rebels as being captured and readied to be handed over to the International Criminal Court, walked into the Rixos Hotel in Tripoli where the regime has been sequestering foreign journalists, denied being captured by the rebels. Meanwhile his other son Mohammad who was captured the night rebel forces entered the city, has managed to escape.

While these are worrying aspects about the NTC, their victory is assured. Though they caution victory will not be complete until Gaddafi is captured, with pro-Gaddafi forces falling back and strong holds falling, like Bab al-Azizya, which was Gaddafi's stronghold and compound, which has fallen into rebel

the NATO bombing campaign, expressing "deep concern" about them. In spite of that China has praised the rebels and the NTC. With China's State run news agency Xinhua reporting that the rebel leader had urged Chinese enterprises to return. With Abdel Hafiz Ghoga, the vice president of the NTC saying it would honor all of the contracts and deals agreed with the Gaddafi government.

The future of Libya hangs in the balance. Will we see actual change in Libya, or will the new leader be the same as the old one?

We must not fall into cynicism so soon, but we must remain optimistic with in realistic bounds. The writing on the wall is not yet clear on this issue. In the coming days, weeks and months it will be. By then, all we can do is hope. The people of Libya will now be the ones to hold control of their destiny.

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President Morales Has a "Masterplan" for CSI

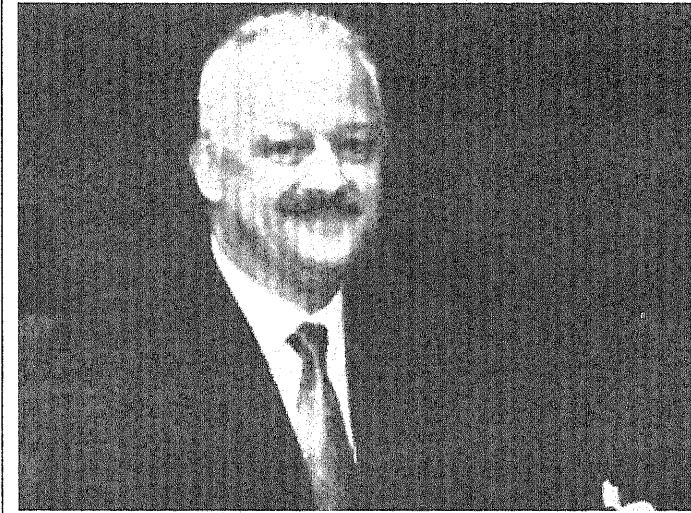

"I was in Tottenville High School and I was terrified. I didn't know what was going on. Seeing everyone starting to panic and leave the school didn't make me feel any better. It was not a great feeling," Michael explained. "Ten years later I still think about it every once in a while. Luckily I did not lose anyone, but what happened that day is and will always be a part of me."

Similarly, Student Ashley Asaro recalls, "I was in 6th grade when my principal made an announcement for us to all go into the auditorium to tell us what happened. I was scared because my uncle was working the World Trade Center and my dad was working a block away. I was concerned for my family and that was all I could think about."

"I am still affected today. My uncle was in the hospital for a month because of it. It was a scary time," Asaro remembers. "I go to the prayer session at Alice Austen Museum every year. My family and I light a candle and we remember all those who died that day."

asked to appoint a task force and start a campaign that was assigned to create an overall plan for the mission. They will have until next September to impose the rules, allowing them time to create educational campaigns, post no-smoking signs and provide counselors trained in helping smokers to quit.

Student government has been opposing this ban since its first announcement in January 2011. According to Librera, the group planned to set up a protest against the ban at CSI last year, but was arranged to stop by senior officials of CSI, whose names Librera prefers to be on the basis of anonymity.

Despite their past struggles, Student Government plans to hold events in the future to continue protesting the ban.

Ken Bach, CSI's Director of Communication believes that members of CSI's community should not place blame

solely on the College itself, as this is a CUNY based decision, though he applauds their desire to share their feelings.

"The great public debate is part of a great college experience," Bach said.

Morales' task force, which consists of a variety of members of the campus including Health counselors, Public Safety officials, a

professor of History, and two student representatives, believe the designated smoking areas, as well as displaying "Change is in the Air" posters on every building, car and pole around campus are all a component of starting the preparation into the 2012 policy.

"We were given the option to discuss several routs," Linda Conte, head of CSI's Health Center explains of their decision to create designated smoking areas around the campus,

rather than starting the semester off tobacco-free. "We thought this would be a smooth transition to the tobacco-free policy."

A series of comprehensive health workshops titled "We Get Fit" have been created by the Health Center to explain the reasons for the smoking ban, as well as a resource for information on how students and faculty

hibit it on college campus, we just happen to have a large campus with a large parking lot."

Until December 31st, Should a member of the college's staff, faculty or students be seen smoking in a non-designated area, they will be given a verbal warning from public safety. From January 1st 2012 to June 30th 2012, any violators will be issued notices of violations from public safety; if they are not complied with, violators will be subject to further enforcement actions.

CUNY's Decision stems from New York's City's new anti-smoking laws. Bloomberg administration and the City Council have banned smoking in almost all indoor spaces and have now expanded it to include beaches, parks and plazas.

"New York City is turning people into black sheep's," Librera explained. "As students, we need to learn how to say no more often."

"Everyone should be a part of this culture change," Conte explains.

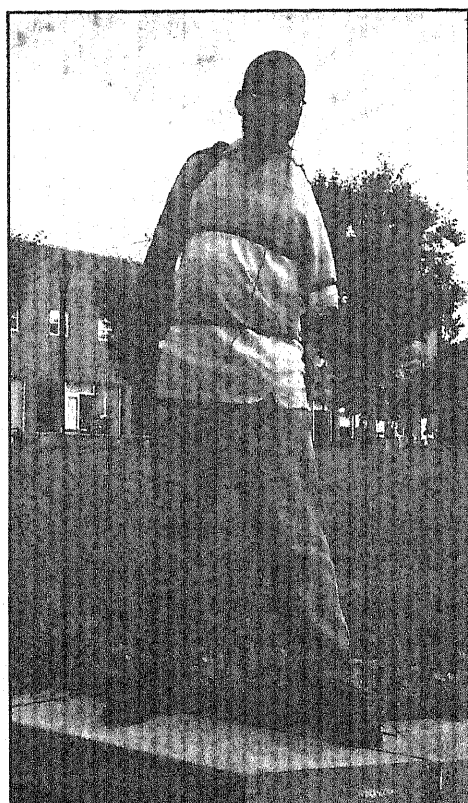
According to CSI's official Implementation Plan made available on their Tobacco Free website, smoking is banned on all locations of the Campus' property, including vehicles parked on campus parking lot.

Melvin still has a lot of adjusting to do when dealing with the people surrounding him, but to watch him carry out the smallest of tasks is inspiring.

The evolution of technology made it possible for Melvin to accomplish more in a class room setting. With A laptop, smart phone, and special pen to take notes with, Melvin found new ways to accomplish his goals without the need for a paralegal.

"It is an amazing feeling to be completely independent," Melvin said with a giant smile on his face. "I dreamed of it my whole life." Disability services still provides assistance when needed, but visits are becoming far and few between, as Melvin adjust and gets more comfortable taking his own notes and carrying his own bag.

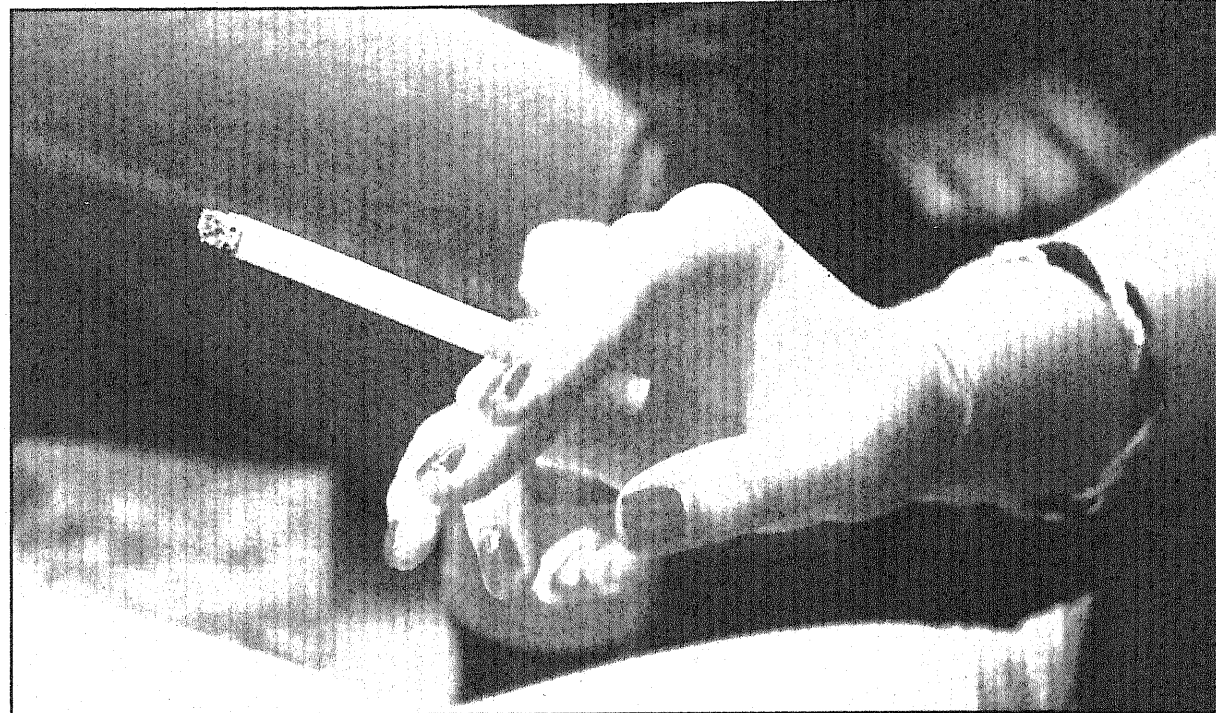
As time goes on they continue to work vigorously on upcoming projects. Matt, Dean, and Manny are always setting aside a day or two to develop new ideas for sketches.

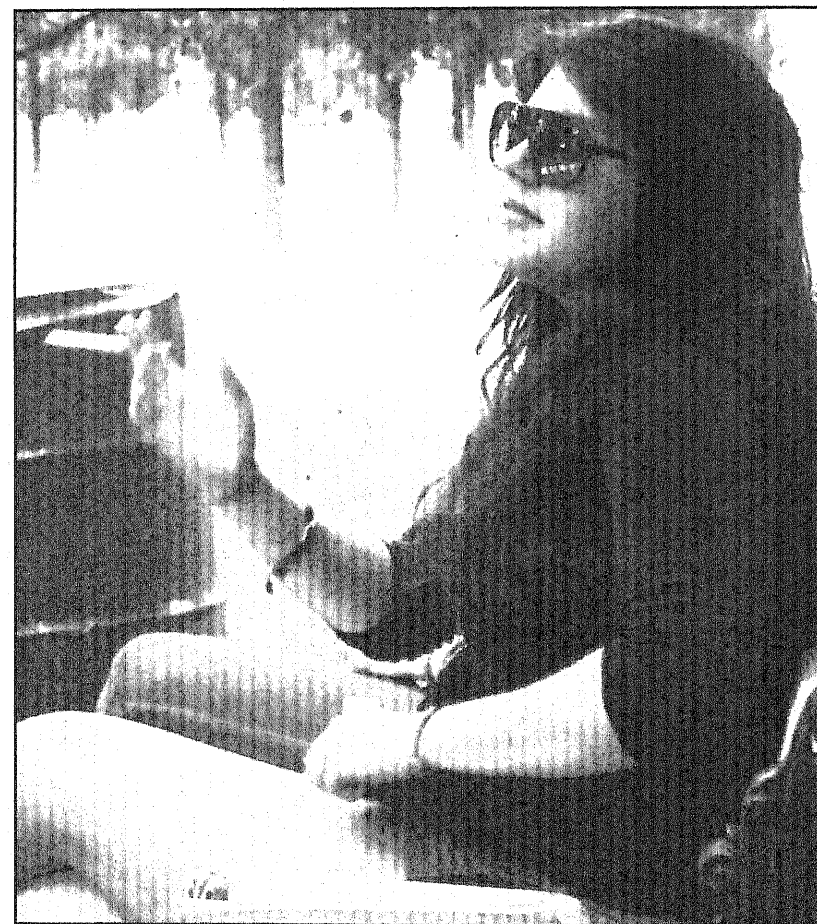

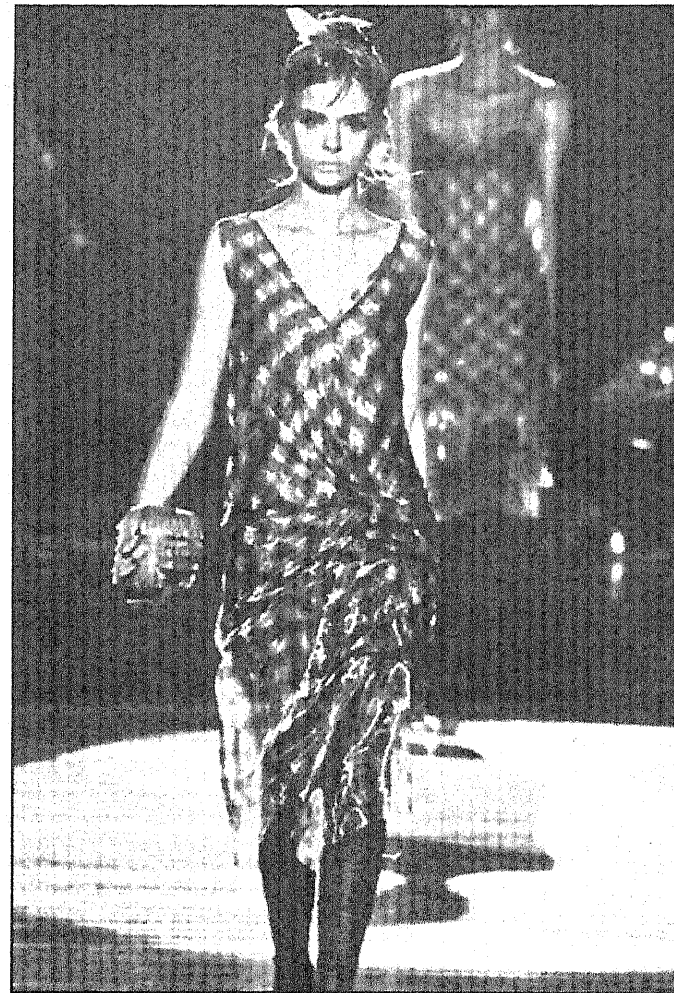

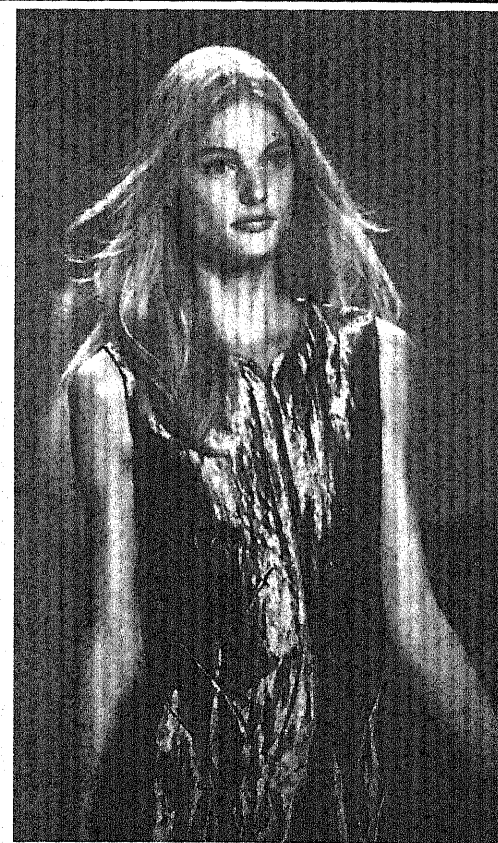

The softness and the femininity of the collection was a new direction in contrast to sculptural constructions that used to define his work.

Spaced Out is Mulligan's CD that will be reaching shelves on Halloween 2011.

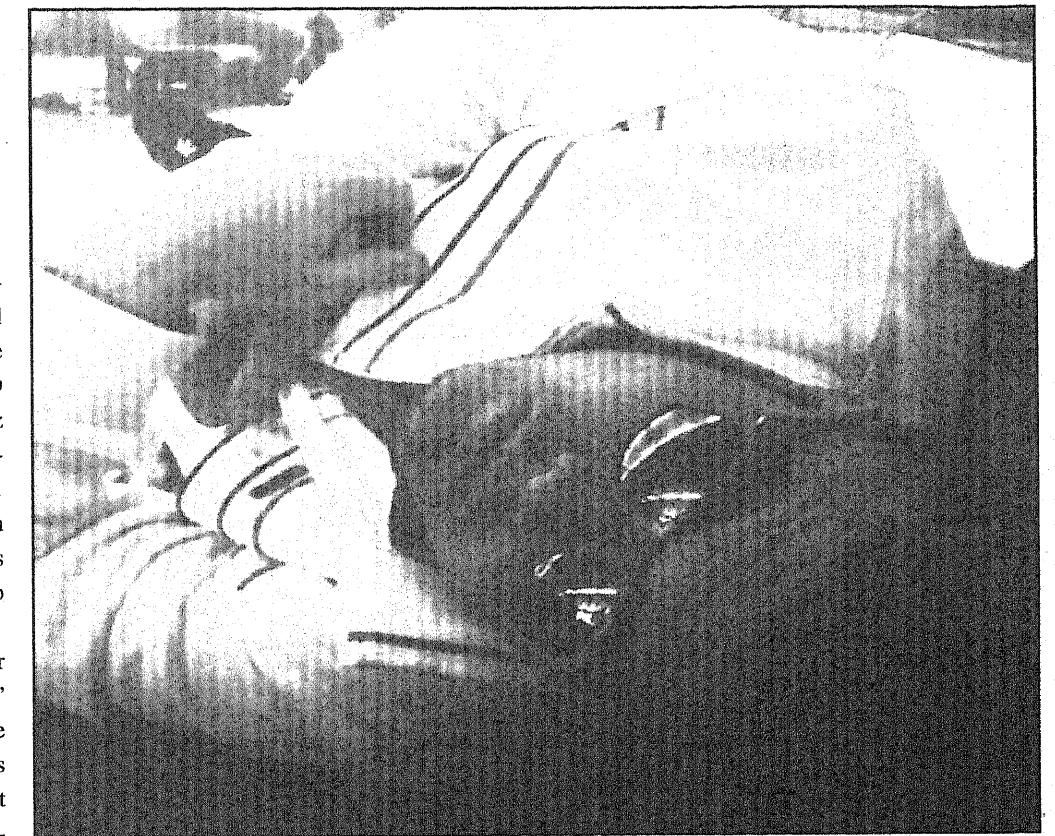

CSI Rocker Records with Sonic Youth Legend

Last year, Andrea Hansen received a grant from COAHSI that allowed her to record her new album in a studio. A producer was also in the budget, which allowed her music to get bigger and better.

"I was able to spend everyday for two weeks dedicated to the studio, not worrying about the sound," said Hansen. "Everything was enhanced."

COAHSI, the Council on the Arts and Humanities for Staten Island, gave Hansen the ability to achieve her goal with their grant.

Hansen had already been dedicated to music for almost a decade before she applied for the grant. She dropped out of college and moved to Manhattan all those years ago because the band she was with at the time, "AM Radio," was on a label and had a four-sided LP, which made it look as though they were going to make it.

Then tensions arose between some of Hansen's band members and another band came around that wanted to purchase their band name. Hansen and the other band members sold the name and eventually broke up, leaving her a solo act.

She made solo demos for years, while

holding odd jobs to support herself, but it was clear that something had to change. She joined together with Anthony Vitale, who made the cover art for her solo demos, and they made their duo, "Painting Soldiers."

It was then that Hansen applied for, and received, the grant that would allow them to make a studio album. They worked with producer, Lee Ranaldo, who was both a guitar player and a co-founder of popular 90s band "Sonic Youth." This resulted in the completion of "Wet Woods," "Painting Soldiers" debut album.

Their music is folk with a punk influence. Hansen sings and plays the acoustic guitar on "Wet Woods," while her band mate plays the keyboard. The album has a total of eleven songs on it right now.

Hansen is also thinking about trying to get a label involved with "Wet Woods," which, to her is very exciting. A label would provide her with a large amount of marketing and distribution, which are both important factors when releasing an album.

Now that Hansen recorded the album, she is anxiously awaiting its cover art and release. In the meantime, though, she moved back to Staten Island and decided to go back to school to complete the second half of her

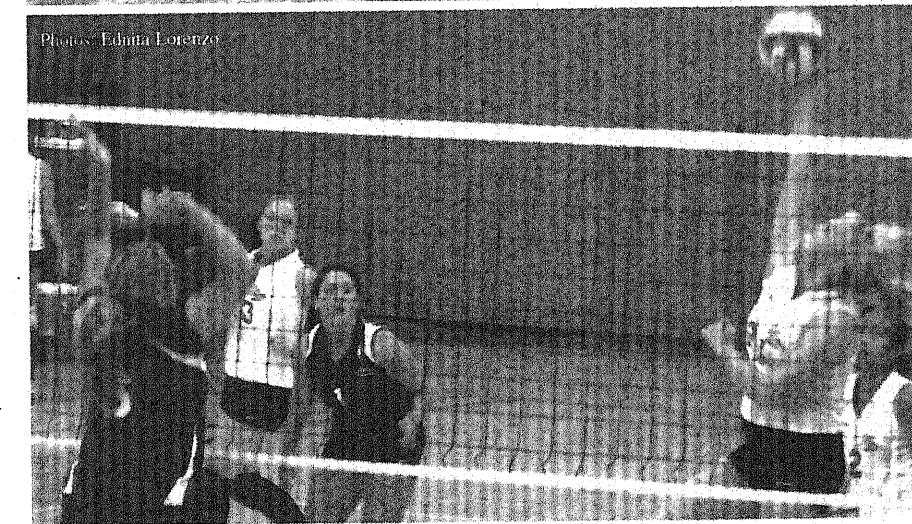
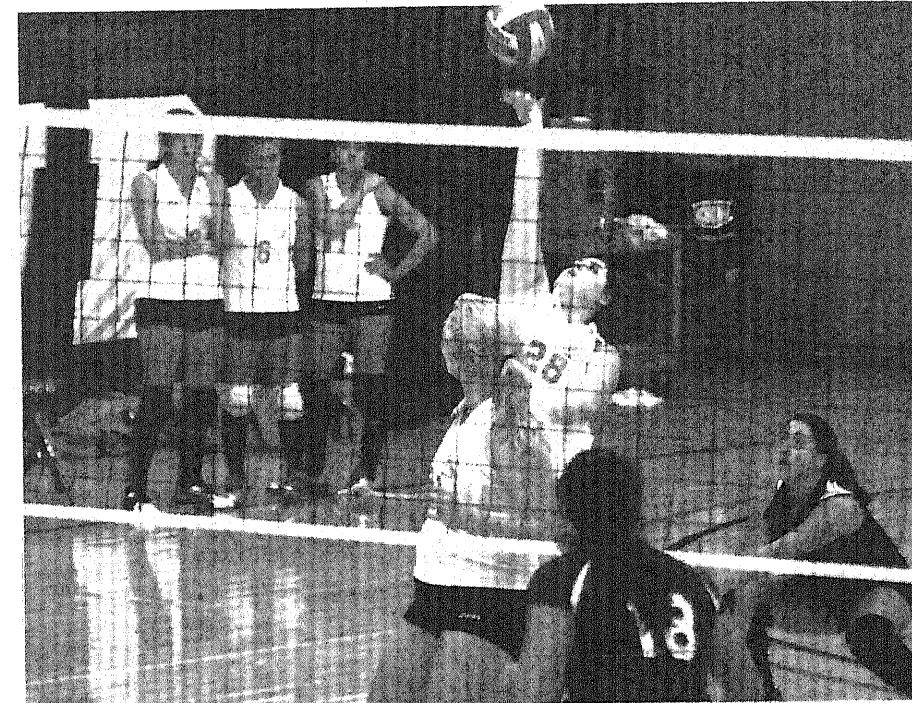

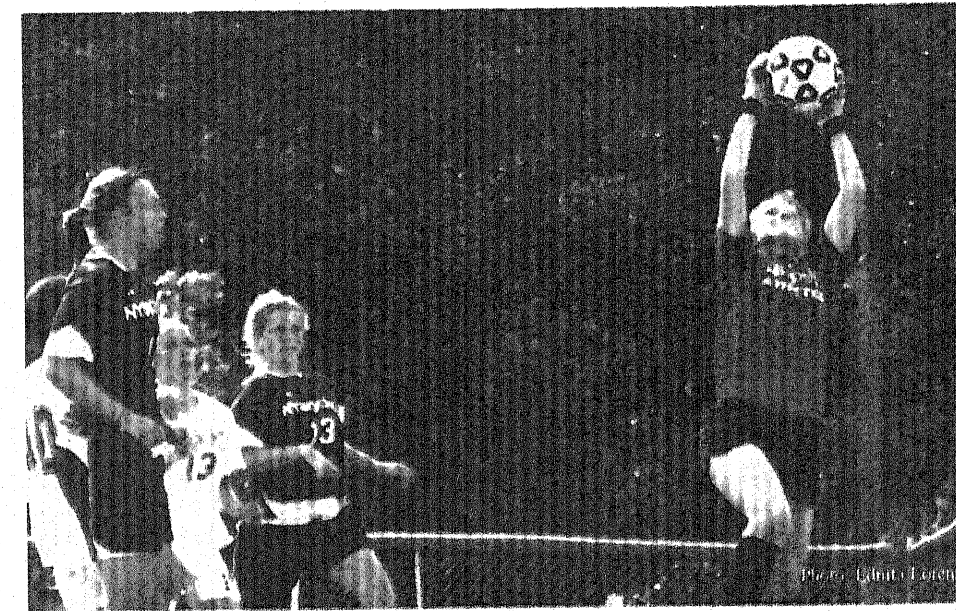
