point of employment, the gradual change over from Halloran VA Hospital to Willowbrook State School is not encouraging.

The current patient census at the state school is now slightly over 1,000 and the medical and work force is 331, a new peak. From that one can see that the ratio between patients and staff members may be, roughly, in the neighborhood of three to

As a veterans facility, Halloran employed about one person for every patient.

The difference in the size of the staffs can be found, principally, in the nature of the cases. The variety and the type cases at Halloran necessitated a much larger

Now with the VA hospital cutting back to a much smaller institution, the community will feel the blow. The shock won't be nearly as great as if Halloran had closed down but evidences will be found in various aspects of community life.

Many of the employes who are being forced to leave will find jobs in Peekskill and Brooklyn veterans facilities; others will have to enter new fields.

This means that scores of families will have to pull up their roots on the Island and move on. While there will be incomes waiting for them where they go, the individual employe and his family will rarely consider the change a happy one.

"The first thing I noticed was the complete absence of custodial atmosphere. Secondly the strong personal interest of Dr. Harold H. Berman, director, and his staff in each child in the school, and third, the general feeling of hope and optimism they have in regards to continued progress of the children.

This was the May visit of the group. Members are appointed by Governor Dewey. Their duties consist of regular visits to state schools and inspection of the facilities and management.
