The care and treatment of mentally retarded children in the infant stage is on an "experimental basis" at Willowbrook, which is a facility of the state Department of Mental Hygiene, Dr. Berman said.

istructiblions the Ma hattan State Hospital has been un d. consideration and number of years. When work is completed the bed capacity will be increased from 2,600 to 3,000. The budget makes \$12,000,000 available to start the reconstruction, an increase of \$8,000,000 over the previous appropriation.

The budget also disclosed that \$2,150,000 will be needed to reequip Willowbrook State Hospital on Staten Island, operated until recently by the Veterans Administration as Halloran Hospital.

In addition to a reappropriation of \$3,370,000, the budget makes \$3,830,000 in new money available for building a medical-surgical building at Rochester State Hospital. The unit will provide quarters for 1,030 patients. Another appropriation provides \$2,075,000 to supplement a previous \$925,000 appropriation for a building at the Hudson State Hospital in Poughkeepsie, to care for tubercularmental cases
