## TUCCILLO FREED ON ASSAULT CHARGES

Boys' Stories of School Beatings Differ; Ex-Con Still Faces Perjury Trial

A felonious assault charge which led to a perjury indictment against a Tompkinsville ex-convict who obtained a job in Willowbrook State School was dismissed yesterday in Magistrate's Court.

The assault count accused Ralph Tuccillo, 47, of 298 Bay street, of beating two boy patients, aged 14 and 15, with a broom handle. His arrest Aug. 20 prompted an investigation by the district attorney's office which showed several dis-crepancies in Tuccillo's application for an attendant's job.

Upon being released in Magis-trate's Court, Tuccillo was brought before Judge Thomas J. Walsh in County Court by his attorney Louis Baron, to arrange bail on the perjury indictment.

## Bail Set at \$2,500

While under bail from Magistrate's Court, Judge Walsh had released Tuccillo without additional bail in his counsel's custody, but he placed yesterday as a time limit. It had been agreed between Baron and District Attorney Sidney O. Simonson that County Court bail would be \$2,500.

Judge Walsh formally placed bail in that sum and Baron produced a bond for his client. Tuccillo then was released under bail to await

Testimony given by the boys under direct examination by Assistant District Attorney Kermit J. Casscells and under cross-examination by Tuccillo's lawyer, differed in many respects, it was said. Dr. Glasser, who made the complaint against Tuccillo, described the bruises found on the younger boys.

With the dismissal of the assault charge, Tuccillo's next legal fight looms in County Court. He denied the perjury indictment when arraigned last Friday, but no trial date was set.

Some discussion as to a trial date took place yesterday in County Court, but this was not definitely set. It finally was agreed that the perjury charge would be placed tentatively on the Oct. 6 calendar for trial.

The indictment charges Tuccillo with making false statements while under oath when he applied for the attendant's job last Jan. 30 and that these statements violated the State Civil Service Law. He is accused of using a fictitious name, John J. Martini, on the application, of concealing a past criminal record of ten arrests and two convictions and of hiding the fact that he was an inmate of Matteawan State Hospital.
