Two Staten Islanders have been awarded \$300 jointly for a moneysaving idea they put to practice at Willowbrook State School. Frank L. Tolman, chairman of the New York State Employes' Merit Award Board, announced in Albany today.

The award went to Frank Angillili, Willowbrook's head industrial shop worker, of 49 Roosevelt avenue, Meiers Corners, and Lucas Tessalone, tinsmith, of 245 Willard avenue, Westerleigh.

The cash award is accompanied by state Certificates of Meritorious Service.

At a cost of \$88, the two men adapted a hand-operated cushion filling machine for additional use in constructing crib mattresses. The idea cuts in half the cost of replacing crib mattresses at the state institution.

The average need for new mat-tresses at Willowbrook School is estimated at about 50 a month, according to the Department of Mental Hygiene. Utilization of the idea will eliminate the need of purchasing a power mattress-filling machine costing \$1,500.
