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Two Propositions Before the Voters

Voters accustomed to studying a m titude of amendments and proposition when they go to the polls will get off ea on Tuesday.

There will be only two propositions the voting machines. No amendments.

Both propositions, moreover, presen clear-cut choices for the electorate.

Proposition No. 1, if approved, wi authorize a state bond issue of \$350,000 000 to provide institutions for the care mental illness, mental defects, epilepsy and other emotional disorders.

This proposal has been emphasized b Governor Dewey as a must because th state's present mental hospitals are over crowded and the case load is growing. We now have about 112,000 patients squeezed into facilities that can properly handle maximum of 86,000.

HOSPITALS now under construction will provide 16,000 more beds, but even this number will fall 10,000 short of meeting current needs. Statistics show that annually there are about 3,000 new patients in excess of the number discharged as cured.

The passage of this proposition would open the way for construction of a new \$1,275,000 building for mentally-retarded tabercular patients at Willowbrook State School, which handles all such patients from downstate areas and now has 112 under treatment. This would be in addition to a \$6,000,000 building program for Willowbrook long in the blueprint stage: Authorities say the proposed structure at the Island institution is desperately needed.
