Contracts will be signed immediately with the Maran Construction Company, Manhattan, for the building of an \$800,000 infirmary-dormitory.

CURRY said he expected bids to be let within two months for the remainder of the work at the school.

Included will be four other buildings and a main kitchen. The addition will enlarge patient capacity by 1,000.

The infirmary-dormitory will be patterned on present dormitories. The other five structures will be of a new design.

Curry stated he will continue to work for new construction on the Island in the interest of building trade unionists.
