The experiment of teaching children, many unable to read, to play musical instruments has proved revolutionary in the treatment of retarded children and has aroused widespread comment in medical circles.

## Society Pays Bill

The cost of supplying the instruments and uniforms, buying TV sets, radios and phonographs, and providing toys for the youngsters at Christmas, is underwritten by the society, which depends on contributions.

Last year they raised \$25,000 for the children. This year, because of the increase in children being admitted to Willowbrook, the society will need more funds.
