198 Children Evacuated in S. I. Bomb Scare

One-hundred-ninety-eight youngsters in cribs were carried from a building at the Willewbrook State School and Hospital on Staten Island this afternoon as a result of a bomb scare. A man phoned the hospital, where mentally retarded children are treated, to say he had planted a bomb there. No bomb was found.

Bomb Scare And Address School

Attendants at Willowbrook State School evacuated 198 children, ranging in age from 1 to 5, from a building yesterday after the telephone operator received an anonymous call that a bomb was planted in the building.

Mrs. Margaret Rogers, the operator, told police that about 12:40 p.m. a man called the school and repeated three times, "There is a bomb planted in Building 12."

After a three-hour search by police and school security guards the children were returned to the building. They had been kept in other buildings during the search.
