> In addition to presenting the case to the grand jury, Braisted said that he has asked for a complete police report and will conduct his own investigation into the circumstances.

Braisted said that the timetable for the grand jury inquiry calls for completing the probe of the first two deaths before the jury, which has been held over to Dec. 13, considers the latest incident.
