## Union organizer accused once more

A union organizer for Council 50 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employes ran into trouble with the law again yesterday at Willowbrook State School.

Leamon Hood, 31, of the Bronx, was given a summons returnable Tuesday charging him with criminal trespass, obstructing government procedure and harrassment. The charges were lodged on the complaint of Jarvis Tabor, a school official.

Hood was charged May 2, 1968 with criminal trespass but the charges were later dropped by the Willowbrook administration.

On Nov. 27 at Willowbrook Hood was again arrested on charges of criminal trespass and obstructing a state administrator. After a two-day trial in December the union organ-izer was acquitted of all charges.
