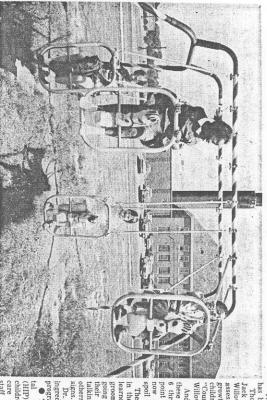


these youngsters, mostly aged 6 through 10, have reached a point where the attendants now say, "We have time to spoil them a little." And the self-care abilities
