Willowbrook Probe: When?

Although there have been some steps made toward the materialization of the immediate investigation. (launched, theoretically, more than 10 days ago), those agencies and officials directly involved with it are vague about what has been accomplished to date.

Amann, who initiated the investigation with a telephone call to Dr. Frederic Grunberg, deputy commissioner of the Department of Mental Hygiene, has not yet followed up on its progress.

Commenting that "they (the Department of Mental Hygiene) have to be given a chance to get the investigation rolling," Amann assured that he "will absolutely, definitely follow up" on Willowbrook when the results of the re-evaluation of the institution are made known to him. "We have reviewed areas of critical need with the director of Willowbrook and with members of the staff and are trying to get an exception to the freeze in certain areas of that operation," Dr. Grunberg said, referring to Gov. Rockefeller's freeze on state jobs.

"Even with the possible exception," Dr. Grunberg continued, "the situation there will remain tenuous, But we agree that there are some areas which require additional aid."

Precisely when patients and employes at Willowbrook State School might expect the financial fruits of the reevaluation is still unresolved.

"We're living in a world of uncertainty," Dr. Grunberg

Dr. Jack Hammond, director of Willowbrook, indicated that the kind of investigation ordered by Albany would not require his direct participation.

director indicated that there has not been a change in the routine, weekly vevaluations which take place at the institution.

"We are in constant communication with the state Department of Mental Hygiene," Dr. Hammond said, "and have made them completely aware of our most critical areas of need.

"There are program analysis here very often," Dr. Hammond continued, "and their research does not require my presence."
