


Due to the series of articles by

'the organizing of parents by homosok employees, Dr. Mike Wilkens and Mrs. Elizabeth Lee, the public became aware of what was going on at Willowbrook. In 1966 Robert Kennedy brought conditions at Willowbrook to light and after his election as Senator poured money into the institution. Money couldn't alleviate the problems there, however.

Last year money was cut back from the State schools (38 million) and this brought much protest from parents. After much public exposure to atrocious conditions at Willowbrook, Governor Rockefeller "found" more money to give to the state schools (25 million). It is agreed by all that money is certainly needed to hire more help, start meaningful programs for the inhabitants of Willowbrook, retrain the existing staff and train new ones, and rebuild much of the institution.

The conditions of, and what it's like being will own ook; we will not get into here (see "Advocate?" Magazine which will be out by March 1st). Every one gets the idea that more money should be poured into the school and other state schools. Some of the parent groups along with Drs. should not be placed under the State Department of a Hygiene! Furthermore, both Wilkensuma Bronston think that both the paents of the patients and the workers there should have final say in decisions regarding the children and not the administration which is responsible only to Rockefeller, not the patients, parents or workers. Dr. Bronston, on the Dick Cavette television questioned why Rockefeller could build a 1.5 billion dollar mall in Albany and the World Trade Center, "firetraps", and not help suffering human beings.
