

## List of names of strikers is compiled

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — The names of state employes who struck state agencies over Easter weekend are being compiled by Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's administration in preparation for punishment.

If found guilty of engaging in the strike, the employe can receive a penalty ranging from a reprimand to dismissal.

In addition, the employe may lose two days pay for each day on strike and be placed on probation for a year. At the end of the probation, he could be dismissed without cause.

A spokesman for the Mental Hygiene Department, probably the most sorely affected by the 40-hour strike, said the department was ordered to submit the names to the Office of Employee

Relations by Monday. Other state departments received similar orders.

Involved are the names of those employes who struck while they were scheduled to work.

The state will not punish those workers who were not scheduled to work on the days of the strike — even though they may have walked the picket line, said a spokesman for the state Public Employment Relations Board, which governs state dealings with public employe unions and organizations.

Meanwhile, PERB was expected next week to bring charges against the Civil Service Employees Association (CSEA) for calling an illegal strike.

Jerome Lefkowitz, deputy chairman, said investigators now are assessing the impact and extent of the strike.

The CSEA could lose its dues-checkoff privilege, if the charge is upheld. Under this privilege, the state collects the dues through a paycheck deduction and sends the money to the organization.

Unions who have lost this privilege were forced to set up expensive machinery to collect the dues. Many times, the unions also lost members.
