

Strikers face loss of pay, year's tenure

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — Notices have been mailed warning some 5,000 New York State employes that they face loss of pay and of one year's tenure because of their participation in the Civil Service Employees Association strike, according to Gov. Rockefeller's office.

Another 2,000 notices are expected to go by the end of the week, the spokesman said Tuesday.

The CSEA struck the state for 40 hours over Easter Weekend to press its demand for a pay raise for state workers. The Taylor Law prohibits strikes by public employes and imposes penalties on both the workers and their union for strike action.

The state Public Employment Relations Board is considering the Rockefeller administration's request that the CSEA's dues checkoff privileges be revoked.
