Dr. Hammond was also eulogized as a "compassionate and dedicated man" by Dr. Miodrag Ristic, his successor as director of Willowbrook, the state's largest institution for the mentally retarded.

"When he left Willowbrook, he was missed by the people here very deeply," Dr. Ristic said. "I am also shaken because I know Dr. Hammond died for a cause."

Attributing Dr. Hammond's death "to the kind of life he led" - one of "long hours, with never a moment of rest" -Dr. Ristic noted that, "This is what the life of a director of a place like this is like,"

> Dr. Hammond entered state service in 1952 at Willard State Hospital and became assistant director at Rome in 1959. After serving five years in that position, he left in 1964 to take control of Willowbrook, where he remained until assuming a similar position at Rome less than six months ago.
