## Willowbrook Must Educate Woman: Cour

A State Supreme Court justice ruled yesterday that state offi-cials had been "derelict" in their duty to train and care for a retarded woman at Willowbrook, and he ordered them to begin educating her to the limit of her

Justice Vito J. Titone said the State Department of Mental Hygiene had violated the state's mental law requiring that re-tarded persons be given treat-ment of "high quality and effec-tiveness." He gave state officials. 30 days to devise a program to teach the woman the "elementary functions that she is capable

Although the decision applied to only one Willowbrook resident, Adrienne Renelli, 22, legal experts said, it had implications for many other Willowbrook residents who are given essentially custodial care and little or no training.

The justice, sitting in Staten Island, where Willowbrook is situated, said placing Miss Renelli in Willowbrook without attempting treatment was unconstitu-tional, constituting "imprison-ment." She was "warehoused and ignored," he said, and tested only

once for educability.

That was when she entered Willowbrook in 1960.

Rep. Mario Biaggi (D-R-C-N.Y.), who brought the action N.Y.J. who brought the action nearly a year ago on behalf of Miss Renelli's parents, John and Amelia of 2553 Radeliff Ave., Bronx, said he would apply to Justice Titone to expand the ruling to include every Willowbrook resident.

Titone rejected charges by the Renellis that their daughter had been abused physically. He said there was insufficient evidence to support the contention. The State Department of Mental Hygience declined comment on the STATEN ISLAND ADVANCE, Tuesday, January 23, 1973

## **Court rules** Willowbrook must teach

Supreme Court Justice Vito J. Titone today ordered the state Mental Hygiene Department and Willowbrook State School to provide treatment and care for a 22-year-old profoundly retarded resident at Willowbrook in a decision on a suit brought by the girl's parents.

The girl, Adrienne Renelli, entered the school in 1960 and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Renelli of the Bronx, charged in their court action brought last August that the state was responsible for her regression during the last 13 years. They were represented by Congressman Mario Biaggi of the Bronx.

In his decision, Titone charged that Adrienne was "warehoused" at Willowbrook during her stay and ruled the state was "derelict" in its duties.
