## 250 retarded

Cardinal Cooke, the archbishop of New York. Onto each person the archbishop placed his hands and prayed, then anointed the forehead with a blessing.



The archbishop was resplendent in his white satin, gold-trimmed robe and carried the golden staff, the symbol of being the shepherd of the flock.

To the hymn, "Oh Holy God, we praise Thy name," pumped on an organ by a 32-year-old Willowbrook resident, the impressive nine-priest procession was led by another Willowbrook resident who carried the crucifix.

A 13-year-old girl, unable to speak, nodded her head that she liked being confirmed.
