A 33-year-old former resident said he had deliberately committed a crime so that he could be transferred to Beacon State Hospital, where he had known his happiest moments, was sentenced yesterday to a state prison term of up to three vears.

Bierman has an IQ of 39, far below normal, and has been institutionalized since he was 6 years of age.

After residing at various institutions, including Willowbrook, Bierman was sent to Beacon in 1969, where he worked as a porter. Last February he was transferred back to Willowbrook.
