## Halfway house to open for retarded in spring

A halfway house for mildly retarded adults under state care will open in New Brighton late next spring, according to a Willowbrook Developmental Center psychologist who is coordinating the project.

One of four such proposals for Staten Island, the threestory house at 200 Tysen St. will accommodate 10 to 12 adults, all of whom will be employed, in workshops or training programs in the community.

Robert Gang said the occupants would be chosen from the Willowbrook center, who are currently residents or outpatients there, or from the community.

Minor renovations are to be completed by late spring, when residents will move in. Five permanent employes and volunteers will work with the residents around-the-clock in three shifts. There will be no live-in houseparents.

A second house will probably be opened within the next year, Gang said, although he would not say where.
