

Willowbrook outpatient found roaming with baby

A Staten Island Developmental Center outpatient now living in Brooklyn, who disappeared Tuesday with a neighbor's 6-week-old son, was discovered yesterday roaming the center's grounds with the infant.

Police said Patricia Murphy, 22, of 2858 Stillwell Ave., was spotted with the infant about 1:30 p.m. by Carolyn Saberg, a social worker at the Willowbrook center. She was arrested and accused of kidnapping, unlawful imprisonment and endangering the welfare of a child.

Ms. Saberg, who works in the center's outpatient division, recognized the woman, who has been an outpatient since November 1977, as she walked through the grounds near building 46, according to police. Ms. Saberg sum-

moned security officers who held the woman until police arrived.

The infant, Janmell Turner, was returned to his mother, Regina Turner, also of 2858 Stillwell Ave., last night, according to police. The baby was examined and given a clean bill of health by a physician at the center, police said. The pair reportedly disappeared Tuesday afternoon after Mrs. Turner gave Ms. Murphy permission to take the baby "for a walk."

While a resident of the developmental center, Ms. Murphy was often missing and center officials said she had been receiving special privileges enabling her to come and go more freely than other patients, but was reported missing when she failed to call in or return after several days.
