Marjorie Williams, 75, active in Island politics

Marjorie Williams, 75, of New Brighton, a Democratic district leader and a retired civilian employee of the Army, died of cancer yesterday in St. Vincent's Medical Center.

Mrs. Williams, a volunteer worker for the Democratic County Committee since the mid-1960s, also worked part-time for Assemblyman Paul Viggiano, staffing the lawmaker's Central Ave., St. George, office one day a week during the legislative session.

Gov. Carey appointed her to the board of visitors of the Staten Island Developmental Center, Willowbrook, in 1978 and reappointed her in March 1981.

She had been an administrative assistant for 20 years in a military intelligence unit of the Army at Fort Jay on Governors Island. Following her retirement from the federal position, she worked for six years as an occupational therapy instructor for the state Mental Hygiene Department, retiring in 1965.

In 1973, she managed the North Shore headquarters for successful mayoral candidate Abraham D. Beame, one of the services cited that December when she was honored by the Democratic Organization of Richmond County. She had been secretary of the club for six years.

Mrs. Williams, who was active in the Cassidy-Coles Senior Citizens Center, was a graduate of the former Maxwell School for Teacher Training.

She was born on Staten Island but her family moved to Brooklyn when she was a child. Mrs. Williams returned to the Island in 1955.

The funeral will be Friday with a service in the Scamardella Funeral Home, West Brighton, conducted by the Rev. William E. Epps, pastor of St. Philip's Baptist Church, Port Richmond. Burial will be in Rossville AME Zion Cemetery.
