State Audit Assails Unit for Retarded

New York State auditors have charged that they found uncontrolled drug supplies, workers asleep on the job and a naked patient wandering unattended at a state center for the mentally retarded on Staten Island.

Administrators at the center, the Staten Island Developmental Center, concurred with most of the charges made in a report issued Sunday by State Comptroller Edward V. Regan and said they were changing procedures and disciplining employees.

During a review of the center — the former Willowbrook Developmental Center — members of Mr. Regan's staff found discrepancies in inventory records of controlled drugs, two therapy aides who were asleep when they were supposed to be watching 20 sleeping residents, and inadequate controls of supplies.
