In March, Community Board 3, which oversees the South Shore, voted unanimously to reject a home for six retarded adults in Greenridge. Since then, several homes in the Board 1 and Board 2 areas, which cover the North Shore and Mid-Island, respectively, were supported.

Community board approvals are not required for the establishment of such homes. Rejections result in administrative hearings, which usually result in a ruling in the sponsoring agency's favor.

Community homes typically house eight to 10 developmentally disabled persons whose disabilities include mental retardation, autism, and other impairments of the brain and central nervous system.

Staten Island can expect 35 to 40 similar residences to be established in the borough during the next four years, according to local social services providers.

The Staten Island Developmental Disabilities Council is a coalition of agencies and parents. The council offers information, referrals and advocacy. The Staten Island Council advises the city Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Alcoholism Services on needed services for the Island's developmentally disabled. Meetings are held the fourth Friday of each month at the Connelly Center. For more information call 983-5354.

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
