38 apartments planned for senior housing

Thirty-eight apartments for low-income senior citizens are expected to be in construction this spring on a site adjacent to the Port Richmond High School athletic fields.

It marks the first new infusion of such housing since a similar project opened in Mariners Harbor in mid-1989.

For the latest project, plans filed in December with the Buildings Department reveal two clusters of two-story townhouse-style homes on part of a city-owned site adjacent to the athletic fields on Nicholas Street, near the corner of Castleton Avenue.

One cluster containing 20 apartments is to be built at 1731 Castleton Ave. and another with 18 apartments has its address listed as 1721 Castleton Ave.

The homes are being built by a three-way partnership of the City of New York, which is donating the land, developer-attorney R. Randy Lee and the Community Agency for Senior Citizens (CASC), which will manage the project.

More than a year ago, the application filed by Lee's Leewood-Bridgeview Construction Corp. and CASC Housing was picked for a \$3.7 million state

The Port Richmond apartments are to rent for about \$400 a month, depending on the tenant's income and size of the unit.

"We're in the home stretch now. We should expect to see some construction starting there within the next couple of months," said Wallace Kubec of the Port Richmond architectural firm of Diffendale and Kubec.

Another Port Richmond senior citizens housing project, also designed by Diffendale and Kubec, was picked to receive a \$4.2 million grant from the same 1989 state trust fund competition. Cost

estimates on that project, which would convert the former PS 20 school building into about 40 apartments came in higher than expected, Kubec said.

Its future now rests with the city, which reportedly has been weighing the merits of supplying the sponsor, the Northfield Local Development Corp., with additional funding.

Elsewhere on the December new buildings list, the number of new homes filed in December is once again short. Aside from the 36 units in the Port Richmond project, permits for just 26 other new homes were requested.
