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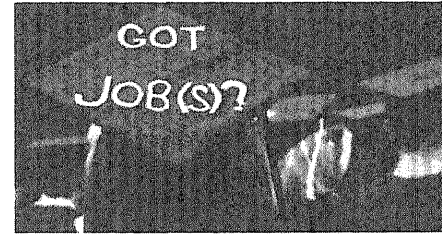

Many students are still interested in

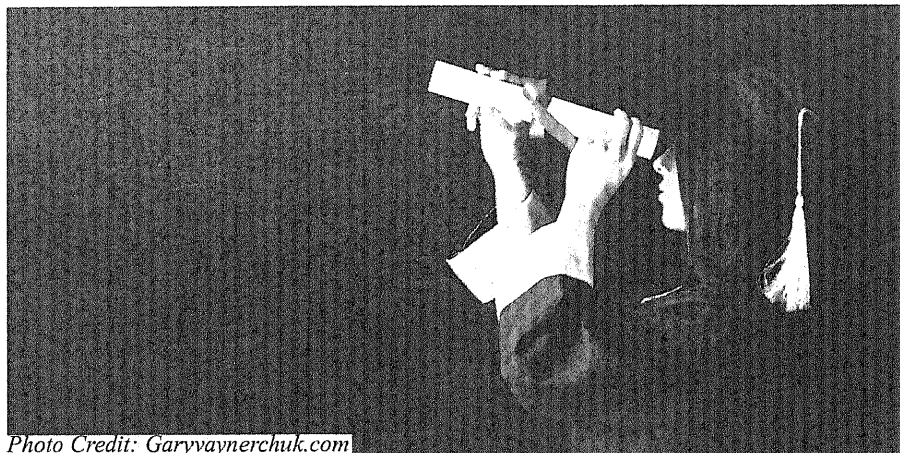

While a bachelor's degree indicates that you had received a good education, companies seem to prefer those who take the extra step and take the

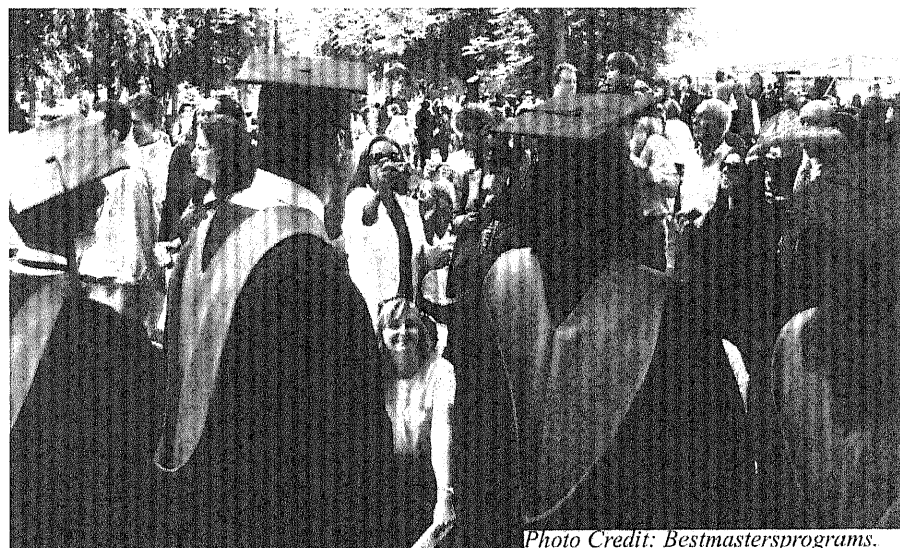

So fret no longer, because The College of Staten Island offers many post-grad education options for those striving to continue their education.

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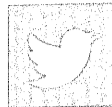

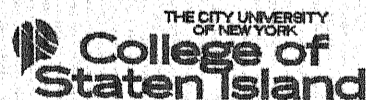

## We Could Be The Change

The Future of Our Country Belongs in College Graduate's Hands

With the political situation in the United States at a boiling point, it is hard to overlook and be indifferent towards politics, especially now that the real world is approaching.

Within the last ten years, many topics have become politicized. Things like Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP), to even broader topics like science, have since turned into political issues.

For instance, according to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), a solid 97% of scientists believe that climate change is man made and will have catastrophic effects on humans and the planet in the near future.

Yet our political leaders have not passed any substantial policy to combat climate change.

Especially due to our political leaders taking "campaign contributions" from political action committees (PACs) that represent the oil industry, the chances that there will be something done about climate change on a federal level is very unlikely.

Our political leaders are not just ignoring scientists, they are also ignoring the clamor of the people they hold a fiduciary responsible to.

In a Princeton University study on who really impacts public policy, scholars found that our political leaders barely pass laws that the vast majority of the people want. Instead, our political leaders follow their PACs and what other special interest groups want.

Furthermore, with the census, an extensive survey done by the population of the United States every 10 years, coming up soon, it is very crucial to be active and utilize your political voice in the upcoming election years.

When the census is taken, the district maps will be redrawn. This would allow our political leaders to gerrymander (a process of manipulating constituencies in favor of a political party or class) the district maps.

While gerrymandering a district based on the racial makeup of that district is illegal, partisan or political gerrymandering is completely legal.

Another political issue that our nation faces, is the tax system, which heavily favors corporations. Included in the recent tax cuts, which President Trump signed into law in December 2017, the corporate

tax rate went from thirty-five percent to twenty-one percent, and this is permanent.

Although there were tax cuts for middle and lower class people, those tax cuts have a "sunset" provision attached to them. After the tax cuts for the middle and lower class ends, their taxes increase.

With corporations getting tax cuts through President Trump's tax bill, corporations also get an additional tax cut through "tax repatriation."

According to Fortune Magazine, an estimated \$2.6 trillion dollars of corporate taxes lay idle in foreign banks. Corporations are demanding to pay less taxes on that \$2.6 trillion.

If an ordinary citizen was to try this, they would be in jail for tax evasion. However, large corporations can get away with it.

The military also has become a serious problem in the United States. According to National Priorities Project, the FY 2019 federal discretionary spending (\$1.19 trillion) had over fifty percent of the federal budget going to the military.

According to Forbes, the Pentagon and the Housing and Urban Development could not account for \$21 trillion that had been spent. Furthermore, the Pentagon also could not account for \$8.5 trillion that had been appropriated to the Pentagon since 1996, according to Yahoo Finance.

Time Magazine reports that the government spent up to \$1.45 trillion on the F-35 military jet. There was just one problem with the jet: it has problems flying.

Our government has plenty of money to spend on the military, however our political leaders usually tell us that we're not able to afford tuition-free colleges.

According to USA Today, Senator Bernie Sanders's tuition-free college program would cost up to \$70 billion, far less than what our government spends on the military.

Minimum wage increase is much needed in the United States. According to the Economic Policy Institute, productivity from American workers has skyrocketed since the 1970's. However, hourly compensation for Americans has stagnated.

According to a report written by the Economic Policy Institute about raising the federal minimum wage to \$10.10, there would be an estimated net gain of \$22.1 billion in the economy, if the federal minimum wage was increased to \$10.10. This, in part, would be due to consumers having more money in their pockets to spend.

Also according to this report, there would also be an estimated 85,000 net gain in job creation. This is would also be due, in part, by businesses who would need more workers to service the consumers who have more money to spend.

With all these political issues weighing down, it may seem overwhelming to fix them. However, with more involvement in our civic duty, such as voting and activism, we can fix the situation in the United States.

As former President Barack Obama famously said, "We are the change you seek."

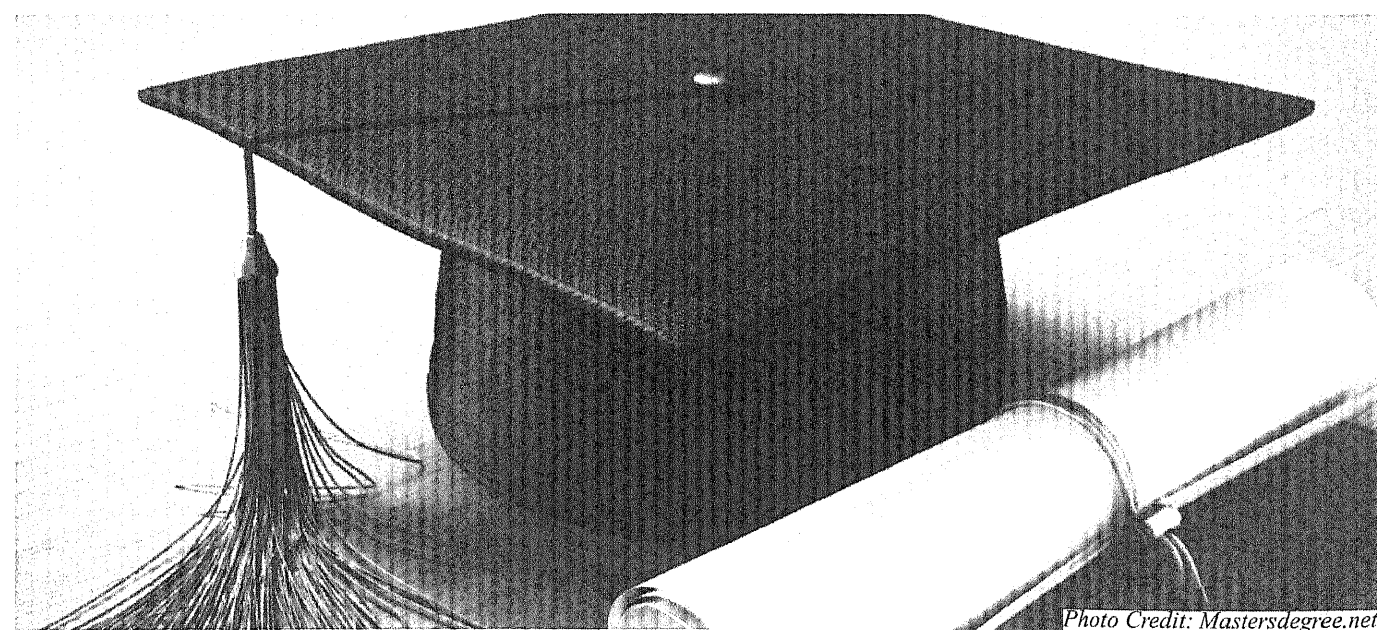
"A sample of median salaries for careers that require a master's degree, as provided by the BLS in May 2016, indicates that nurse practitioners made \$100,910 annually, education administrators made \$92,510, occupational therapists made \$81,910, physician assistants made \$101,480, and speech-language pathologists made \$74,680."

Study.com also referenced another study from The National Association of Colleges and Employers in which they recorded the salary for those who have a bachelor's degree in 2013.

They found that people who had a bachelor's degree in elementary education, history and nursing had an average starting salary of \$39,000, \$42,100 and \$52,000 respectively.

People who pursued a degree in engineering, such as chemical to mechanical engineering that only had a bachelor's degree had an average starting salary ranging from \$63,900 to \$96,200 according to The National Association of Colleges and Employers in 2013.

According to salary.com, public school teachers who had a bachelor's degree had salaries that ranged from \$52,520 to \$56,629. Public school teach-

ers who had a master's degree had salaries ranging from \$53,045 to \$57,267.

In order to achieve a master's degree, you need to attend around two more years of college than you would with a bachelor's degree. You might even need to attend graduate school depending on the degree you want to pursue.

In addition, people can attend college to work on their degree, or they can simply take online courses from online colleges.

-scriptions to work in your favor.

For instance, let's say you worked in the school's cafeteria but there's no glamour in describing that role of washing dishes and spooning mac n' cheese.

Use specifics about the job but make them work for you like instead of serving food to student body, try extensive customer service.

Instead of writing, "taking and placing customer orders," write about your experiences as a strength by saying instead, "effective at verbal communication."

Finally, instead of saying "washing dishes," use "organization and prep of services". You can do this with literally any job, no matter how unfulfilling it seemed to be.

By jazzing up how you describe your

duties in the workplace, it not only helps with resume building but can also help with interviews when asked about how such a job may have shaped you for this new one.

Be sure to keep your resume to one page. Many companies will not look at a resume that is convoluted and unnecessarily long. That's what your CV is for.

A CV is a whole other professional beast.

While most think its essentially the same as your resume, this is a misconception.

Also included in your CV is any pro-

fessional experience, certifications and skills.

While your resume limits you one page, a CV is your chance to elaborate on all of experience that makes you unique and qualified for a job or career.

Your CV should showcase anything you did in your college career that is relevant to your intended career such as term papers, final projects, experiments, publications, extracurricular activities and any courses you took that provide you with a specialized skill-set.

For example, if you want to be a journalist, you wouldn't include everything you've ever written, but instead would include papers that were highly investigative, persuasive and translatable as these show skills needed for a career in journalism.

Keep the others for your portfolio-not your CV.

If you spent a semester abroad, always put that in your CV under your educational experience.

Not only does it show an adaptive and well-rounded attitude about education, it can always serve as a conversation starter for professionals to review your CV during an interview.

If you can get someone who has also traveled to that country or city and strike up a conversation about the food or the culture, you may just have a personable edge on the other candidates.

Try to keep your CV to about 2-3 pages. Anything more might seem excessive.

Finally, when it comes to your cover letter, sell yourself.

Confidence is key for a cover letter as this is your chance to write about yourself without a rigid format or in bulleted form.

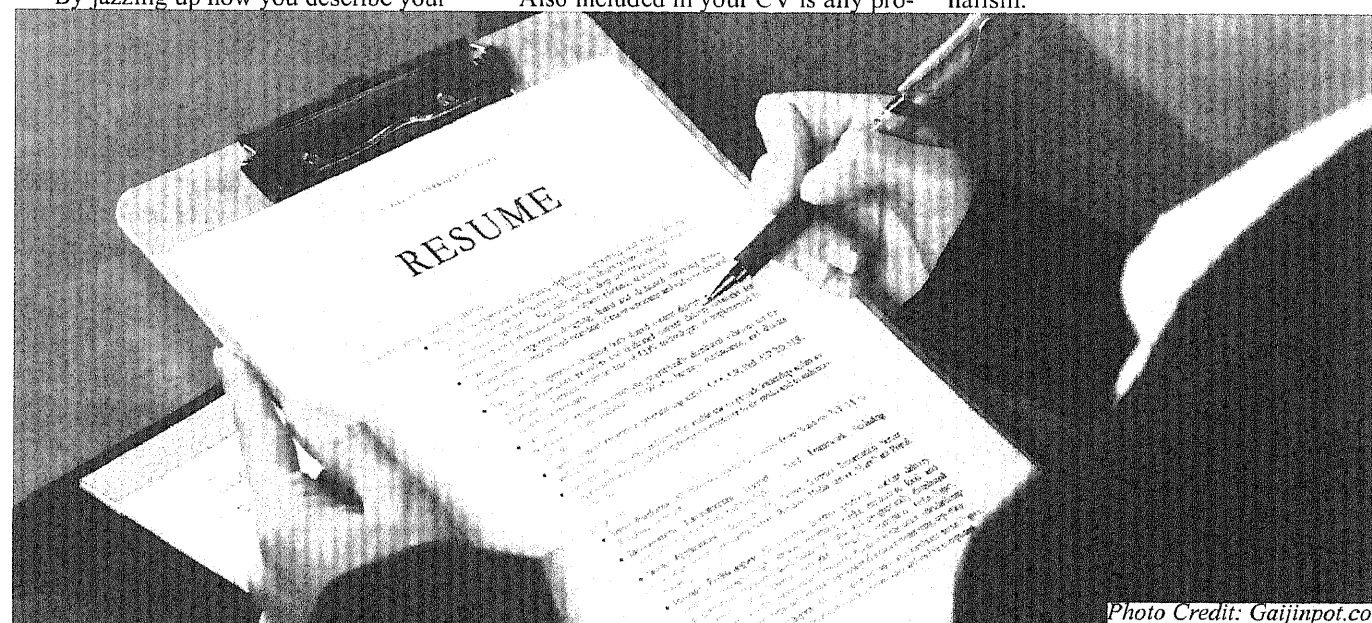
While you should always say that it would be a fantastic opportunity to work with the company, you should also tell them why you would be an asset to them.

Talk about your skills as a leader, a member of a team, with time management and adaptability.

No matter the job or company, those skills are required across the board.

Finally, make sure to thank them for their time and consideration and sign your cover letter at the bottom. "Regards" or "Best" is always classy, and is a perfect way to round up that winning cover letter.

CSI features 27 unique fields one can score a masters degree from. Some of the program concentrations include: accounting, biology, computer science, and a range of teaching degrees tailored to a specific grade of schooling.

Information about the various degrees can be found on the CSI website.

There, students will find a list of the graduate programs CSI has to offer as well as the coordinator/director and the application deadline for each particular program.

Prospective students are urged to apply online. The link to the application form as well as all other functions regarding the graduate admissions process can be found in the column menu on the left side of the page once you are on the graduate school webpage.

All applicants must pay a \$125.00 non-refundable fee to get their application processed.

Official transcripts from all post-secondary (education after high-school) institutions must be requested and sent CSI. CSI transcripts do not need to be requested as the Office of Recruitment and Admissions will obtain a copy.

Graduate Recommendation Forms

are not required for all programs; this will be evident once you read the specifics of your program of choice.

The format of the Recommendation Form for most programs involve the recommender to submit a written evaluation assessing the the applicant's potential for success both academically and professionally.

If an applicant has taken graduate courses within the last five years at an accredited college or university, these courses may be accepted at the discretion of the coordinator of the graduation program.

A maximum of 12 graduate credits in graduate courses, with a minimum grade of 3.0 (B) in each, may be applied toward a graduate degree from the College of Staten Island.

There are also other program-dependent forms one may have complete listed under the Application for Transfer Credit link.

All paper applications/forms must be submitted to the Office of Recruitment and Admissions; the address is provided at the bottom of the Graduate Forms page.

On campus events are also held to provide greater insight on a specific program.

During the months of February and March, potential applicants are welcomed to attend any of these events which are held in various classrooms throughout the school.

Under the "Pre-Admission Services & Events" tab, one will find the events listed, along with their date/time and specific location. The website asks you to RSVP to the events and provides a link to the online form where you may do so.

What to do post-bachelor's can prove rather frustrating. Many students often want to continue their education, but don't exactly know what type of program they'd like to pursue or their most recent school has few options.

Fortunately, CSI hosts many degree-bearing programs along with resources capable of removing any uncertainties a prospective graduate student may have.

Naturally, the answer to every question or concern one may have regarding a graduate program will not be found online.

Has anyone ever wondered why people take extreme measures to look fabulous on their graduating day as if it was their wedding?

According to collegescorecard.ed.gov, the graduation rate at CSI has been as low as 28.2% since 2014. With this in mind, students who graduate should especially be celebrated.

Even though the acceptance rate at CSI is 100%, not everyone can leave college with a degree. The college has over 13,000 enrolled on campus but only a few thousand get to throw the motorboards in the air at the end of the semester.

For many seniors, graduation is a time to dress up and spend massive amounts of money to look beautiful before walking down the aisle, looking good for the camera.

Both males and females will spend hundreds of dollars on an outfit and styling their hair.

"People from every race come over here and add little weave into their hair for a fuller

"I sometimes make a little over a \$800 a day sewing and styling my clients hair because I do charge \$150 just for sewing the hair."

Sometimes, she likes to give regular clients discounts for events such as weddings, birthdays and, of course, graduation.

She will give between 25-50 percent off for her client's hairstyles, and her reg-

For graduation, Ashlyn said she receives about 30 clients a year who ask her to make them look like Beyoncé, or as if they were going to be at the Grammys.

Many of her clients want a different look than on graduation than how they

makeup, such as powder, foundation, eyeliner, but nothing beats a fresh, full face of makeup done by a professional makeup artist.

Around graduation time, MAC and Sephora have special deals for students. At MAC, if a person spend around \$40-50, they can receive a free face beat, but this deal normally runs on weekends.

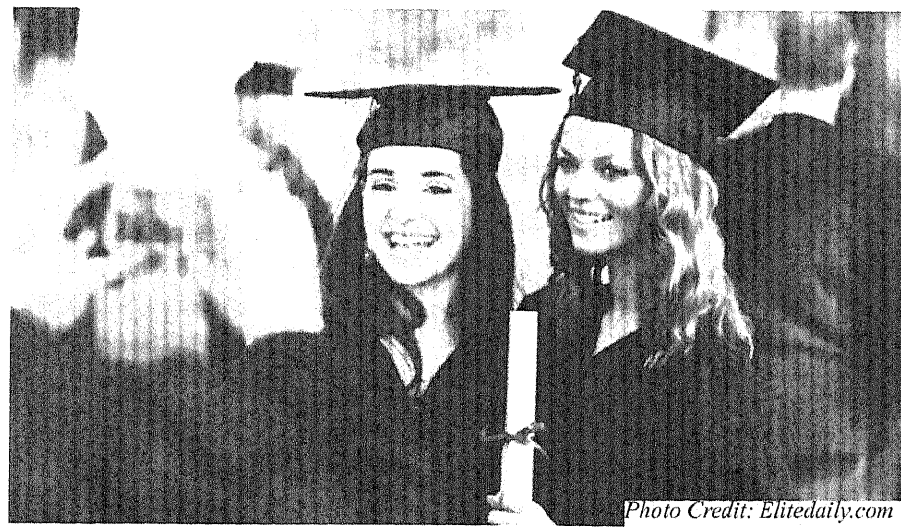
Future graduates pay between \$60-70 for a full-face beat, including lashes, for a flawless look, whereas at Sephora, a person pays between \$50-60 for a full flawless beat including lashes.

However, not all makeup artists work for MAC and Sephora; some own their own businesses.

Christina, a well-known makeup artist on Staten Island, charges \$70 for a full-face beat including glitter, cat eye, and lashes, but a regular face beat minus those features is \$50. Students must book her months in advance.

Even Christina acknowledges that this is the season for anyone in the beauty business. "Any makeup artist can agree with me, when I say they make the most money during May-August because of prom, graduation, and weddings."

On graduation day, every single person walking toward the podium has a fresh face and new hair-style. Many would say spending \$200-\$500 is a lot, but at the end of the day, splurging to look good and feel good on your special day is all worth it.

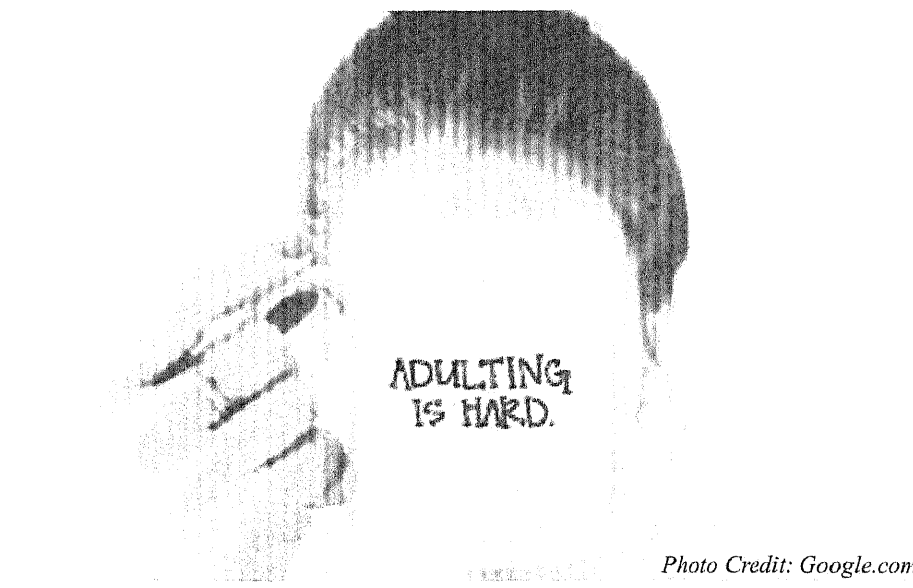

The only way around this is a

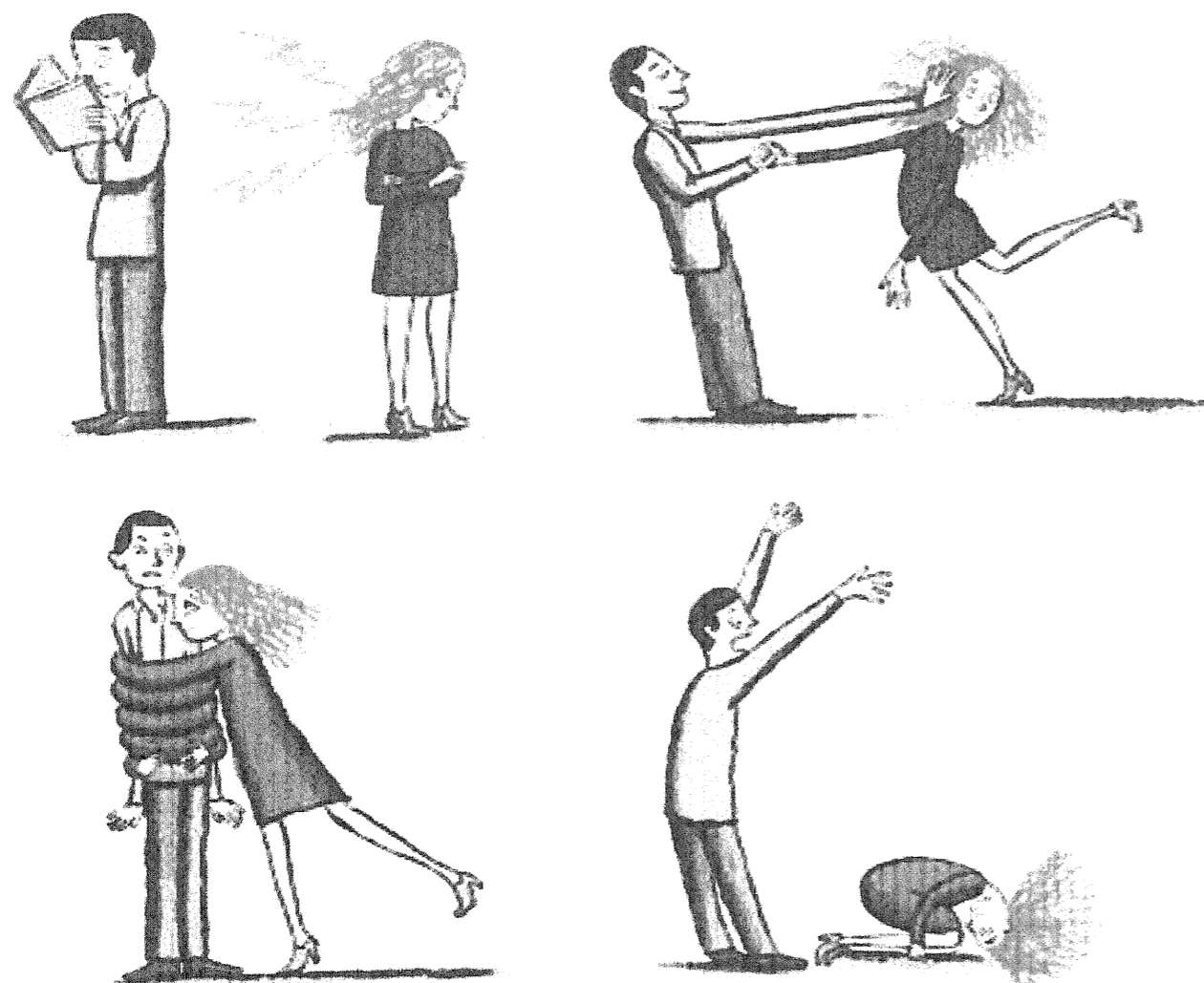

Don't take a year off just to sleep and eat chips on your couch while binge-watching Netflix, though that does seem incredibly tempting.

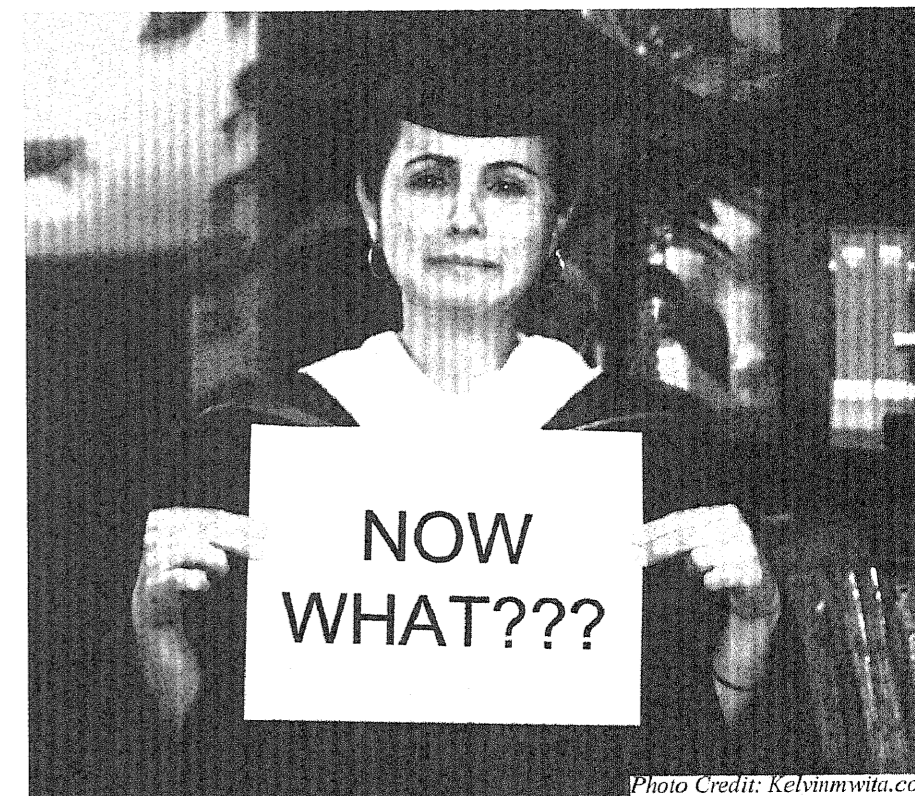

College is absolutely not the end of your life, it is just the beginning.

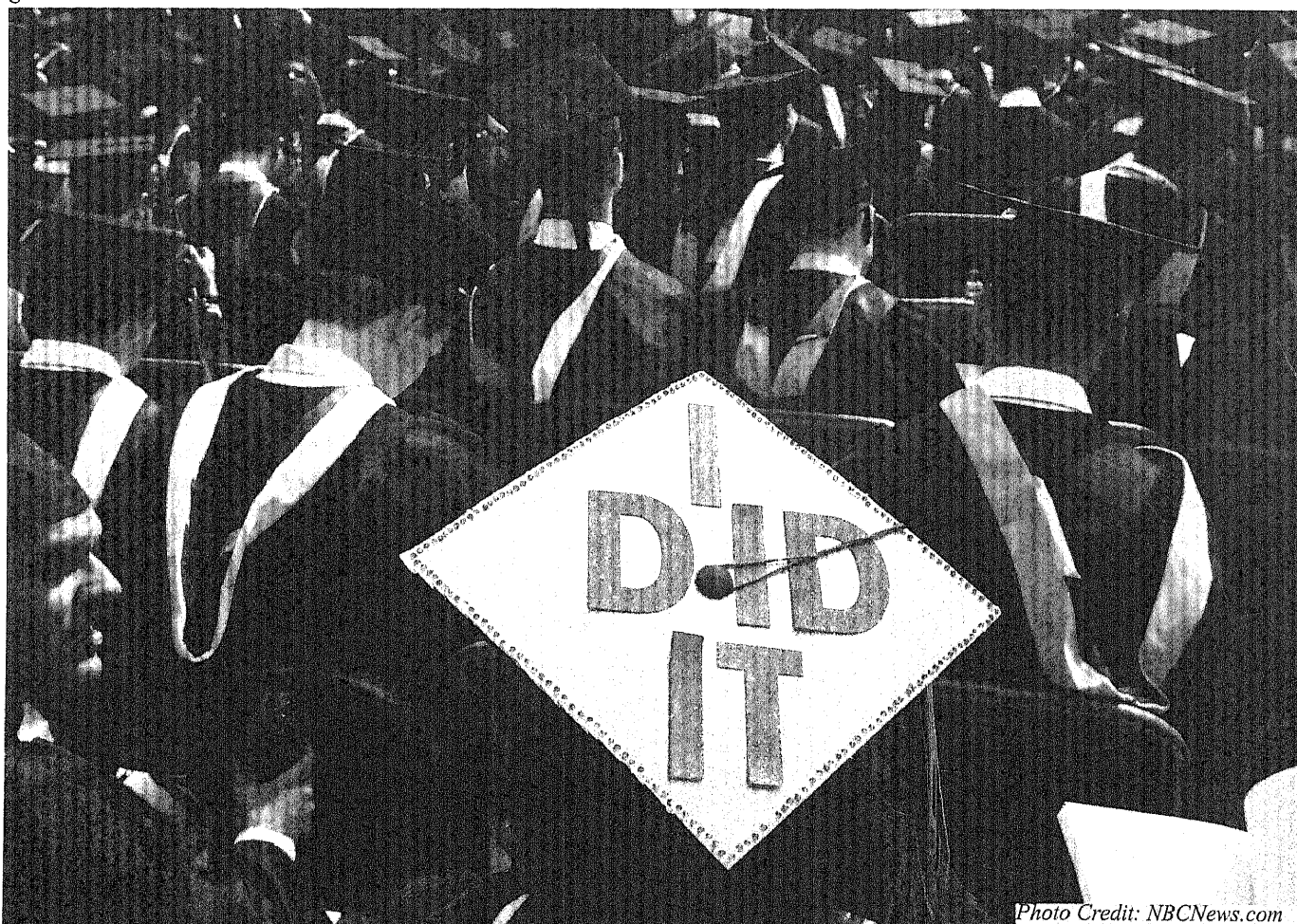

Though it is a painstaking to hear your name get called, then walk on stage to get a rolled up piece of paper, the smile on your family and friends' faces will be totally worth it.

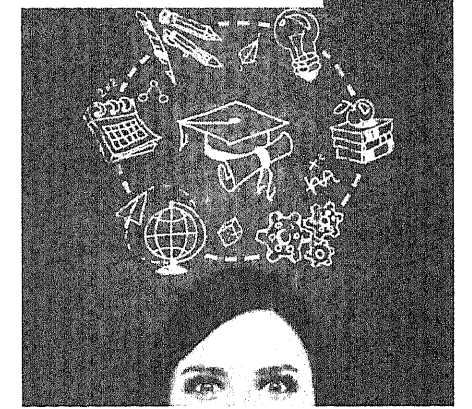
Importantly, be sure to take tons of pictures. Gather all your friends phone numbers and email addresses so you can keep in contact.

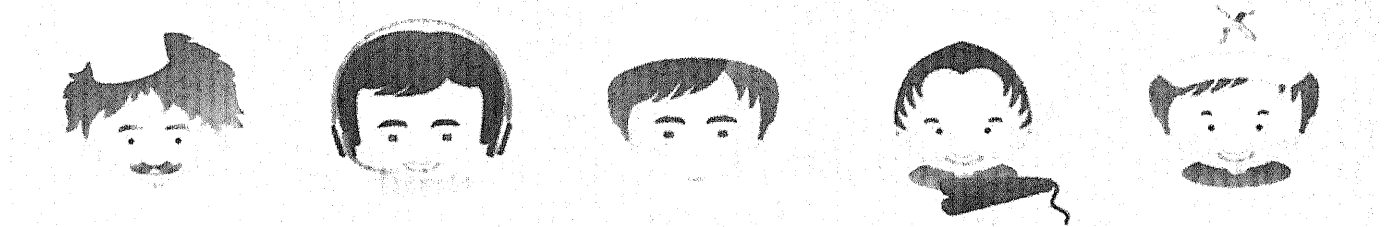

The job of a legal assistant seems pretty mundane, but because you'd serve as administrative support to a lawyer, there are still tons of tasks you'd be assigned on a day-to-day basis. Most paralegals work in law firms, but definitely not all, so you may or may not be in a standard office.

In an article on [onlinecollegeplan.com](http://onlinecollegeplan.com), it states that "As a legal assistant, you would be responsible for maintaining case files and putting that information into a case management system. Keep up

with important dates and deadlines, helping with scheduling, and preparing care materials are all things that you would need to do."
