





In 2003, CSI signed a contract to lease the 12 tennis courts on campus to The Staten Island Community Tennis Center, at a cost of \$100,000 per year for ten years. The company covered half of the courts with a bubble and left the other half outdoors. The goal was to use the income to aid the college through "difficult fiscal times," while providing community residents with additional tennis courts that could be used year round.

Now, the co-founders of tennis center, Max Buxbaum and Jim Barton, are interested in covering the remaining outdoor courts. They are engaging in preliminary discussions with the administration



but no contract has been signed yet.

"We have put together an extensive package which gives blocks of free time to students," said Barton. "The tennis teams could play all of their matches indoors. They wouldn't have to worry



Vending **Machine Bandit** Attacks, Injures Safety Officer

A safety officer arrested non-student, Frank Tormenia of Castleton Corners, for breaking into one of the CSI vending machines next to the closed-off Green Dolphin Lounge on the North Side of the Campus Center on the afternoon of February 25.

To fuel his crack addiction, Tormenia broke into nine CSI vending machines in the month of February and was arrested while breaking into the ninth vending machine.

"I broke into the machine to support my problem," Tormenia told inves-

One of the safety officers recognized Tormenia from a description of a possible suspect and called for back

"When Tormenia was addressed by the officer, he became belligerent," according to Director of Public Relations, Bob Huber. "The officer noticed a bulge under his sweater and assumed it was a weapon. He asked the man to take off his sweater and remove whatever he had under it."

When he refused to do so, the officer tried to forcibly remove the items from under his shirt. At that point, the incident became physical. A small crowbar, a knife, and a dollar stacker from the vending machine fell out of Tormenia's shirt. Tormenia then struck

CIA TO WHACK CHAVEZ?

While President Bush is touring South America, the CIA is allegedly attempting to assassinate the Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez

according Venezuela's military intelligence services. Chavez suspects that the CIA has already formed a special hit squad that is currently establishing connections Venezuela.

The wellknown critic of President Bush revealed this information during a televised

interview last Sunday. The CIA supposedly created a special assassin unit that operates in South and Central America.

The units ostensibly involve associates of Luis Posada Carriles, a former CIA operative and a Cuban anti-communist militant, who faces immigration charges in El Paso, Texas, and is in the custody of the U.S. Marshal's Service, Herald Tribune on a diplomatic five-country tour to promote stated.

Chavez's suspicion grew serious after the nomination of John Negroponte as the United States Deputy Secretary of State. Chavez declared Negroponte a "professional killer," The Associated Press informed. In the past, Negroponte served as the first United States Director of National Intelligence.

"They are going around searching for explosives in large quantities," Chavez said, "and thinking about a sort of car bombsearching for ground-to-air missiles, thinking

military attack on Iran would aggravate the nuclear threat instead of foiling it. According to a new expert report, a power solution supported by the Bush administration would fast-track Iranian nuclear weapons development, which would take mere months instead of years.

The report, written by a renowned nuclear physicist and military technology expert Frank Barnaby, shows up at the moment when the IAEA (International Atomic Energy Agency) is expected to punish Iran for its alleged clandestine nuclear weapons development, for the existence of which there is no solid evidence.


Despite President Mahmoud Ahmadi-Nejad's repeated denials of the alleged program's existence, Nicholas Burns, U.S. Under Secretary for Political Affairs, informed the House International Relations Committee that he has not "encountered a single person who has found the ritualistic public denials of the Iranian leadership convincing."

According to the recently issued scientific report by The Oxford

Research Group, bombing Iran would only speed up Iranian nuclear program. "Armed attacks on Iran would



very likely lead to the result they were meant to avoid - the building of nuclear weapon with a few years," Barnaby's report claims. It also argues that the CIA lacks information on the extent and location of the Iranian nuclear facilities. Bombing Iran will simply not work.

Loop Bus," she said while chuckling at her own despairs. Her commute home is another three hour trip.

A load of laundry and a hungry husband await her at home. "I'm married, I got things to do at home," she said. Tate claimed that school work is her main priority, but, by default, her job is her main priority. If she doesn't make it to that Yard by 5 am. every day, then her tuition will not be paid. As well as utilities, rent and shit like that. But she sits humbly in class amongst the spoiled whiners that make up most of CSI.

Balancing work, school and housework are not Tate's only struggles. She needs to find time for her husband. Trying to better her life has entirely consumed her. She and her husband hardly have the quality couple time enjoyed by clichéd college students. At 29 years old her biological clock is ticking. They want to start a family and move to Pennsylvania. But with no time for herself or her husband, children are out of the question.

She also desires to get back the time she once had. Tate's only days offfrom work, Tuesday and Friday, she has a full day of class and 4-6 hours of commuting. "You know if you miss the ferry by 2 minutes then you gotta wait a whole half hour," Tate complained. When she gets home she is trying to get in bed by 7:00 pm. Instead of getting stoned and watching Seinfeld she makes an effort to get in a full night of sleep. At 3:30 am that alarm clock goes off no matter how tired she may be. Except on weekends, she gets an extra hour of sleep.

Tate is sick of Brooklyn. "The city's only good for people that's rich," she said, "I can't see myself struggling everyday." With her hopes to escape to the suburbs of Pennsylvania or Virginia, Tate battles another frigid Brooklyn morning walking to the Navy Yard.

Her harsh reality would discourage most "bitch-made" CSI students, but there is no quit in Sunny Tate. "I've shed a lot of tears," she said, "but I'm not a guitter. I fight for what I want. The harder you fight for it, the more it's worth."

about getting rained out. Students are going to benefit from this plan."

Currently, students can use the outdoor courts for free or play inside the bubble at a discounted rate (\$25 per hour). If the new proposal is signed students could use the entire facility for free and in exchange the administration would have to extend SICTC's lease.

"We would love to have them agree to the proposal tomorrow, so we could start building," said Buxbaum. The administration, however, will not be signing a contract anytime soon.

Over the course of the next year, an independent contractor will be surveying the campus. They will take into consideration the needs of students, funds, and available space, and construct a master plan for how college development should proceed. "It is extremely unlikely that anything will be done with the tennis center, until such time as the master plan is completed," said Director of Marketing and Public Relations, Robert Huber.

Buxbaum and Barton fear that if a contract isn't agreed upon soon, it may be too late. "If it doesn't happen in a relatively short period of time, it will probably become impossible to do because it will be too expensive," explained Barton. "The college has to allow us time to recoup our investment."

Newly appointed Athletics Director, Jason Fein speculated about the possible benefits of a second bubble. "I'm sure that there would be financial gain and it would be nice to never have to reschedule a tennis match because of bad weather," said Athletic Director Jason Fein. "From our standpoint that is something that is very attractive."

tic investigation and the process to fix the ongoing sewage from leaking into the Library and the Park Café will more then likely cost the college a great deal of money since they are going to an outside source.

"They had to go outside of CSI," said Jones, "However, I am pleased for the students and staff. It is now a safe work environment." A petition in which more than 300 students signed requested the improvements.

In addition to these improvements brought about by the sewage leakage, the library will also see improvements in the rotun-

The Banner reported in the February 26 issue that CSI received \$325,000 in capital funding from Borough President James P. Molinaro. A total of \$100,000 will go towards the improvement of the library rotunda.

The Banner has now learned that the improvements to the library rotunda will include the construction of a new entrance consisting of two pairs of doors and a temperature-conditioned vestibule between them to help limit the inflow of hot and cold air.

According to Jones, the funding will also help create exhibits about the history of CSI. "The rotunda will have three new dis-

plays," said Jones. A middle display would showcase the

history of CSI. Either the left or right display would be for the history of Richmond County College. The unused display would be for the history Staten Island Community College. "The construction of the displays will

honor alumni from all institutions and create a more welcoming atmosphere," said Jones. "Some of the alumni currently feel alienated because they are under the impression that they are not accepted by the CSI community. The new exhibits will hopefully get them to feel welcomed."




before he started school. The radio show, NEW York Views, airs every







One Marine's Personal Battle

Sergeant Gordon, Police Officer

Gordon, or just Gregory: No matter what uniform he wears, or what name he is called, he continues to live by the oath he took when he was just 18 in the United States Marine Corps, "Semper Fidelis," or simply, always faithful. Swearing by this oath; to himself, to his country, and to others, Gordon completed two tours in Iraq, by the age of 23.

"As a Marine, I carhonor," he said. " I knew that the other young Marines in my command looked to me

as an example." Gregory Joseph Gordon always knew he was going to join the service. "My whole family was in the service, my grandfather was in World War II, my uncle was in Panama, my brother was in the first Desert Storm, and my cousin was in Kosovo," he said. "I knew it was

in my blood to join the service, I just never knew which branch." Gordon made that decision in high school at the age of 14, and enrolled in the Tottenville

"Being able to wake up in my own bed and not have to worry about being attacked was the most important thing to me," he said.

> Gordon says that joining the Marines was a positive experience. He learned dependability, unselfishness, loyalty, pride, courage and honor. His desire to protect and serve led him to join the New York Police Department, where he now works as a rookie officer.

Gordon doesn't know where he would be today if he hadn't joined the Marines.

"Someone needs to risk their life to defend our freedoms," he said. "If our grandfathers didn't do it for us, where would we be now."

Draft Dodging Dennis Finally Goes to College

Dennis Gaffigan started college during the Vietnam War. After 35 years of working in sales, investing in stocks, and raising a family, he now tries to finish his college career during the Iraq War.

Like many students in the Sixties, Gaffigan enrolled in college to dodge the Vietnam draft. "I never learned anything," Gaffigan said remembering his brief stint at Long Island University. On the verge of failing out of school, just before the draft lottery came

Gaffigan out, went to McGuire Air Force Base to join the Air Force Reserves He knew that if he did sent to Vietnam with the Reserves. would be stationed in a base surrounded by Marines. when the lottery came Gaffigan won.

348. "Number Gaffigan said. "They would have took my mother before they took me.'

After winning the lottery, Gaffigan decided not to follow through with his Air Force Reserve plan and went back to work. He had worked since 16 years old. His father gambled a lot and didn't provide much, so while in high school Gaffigan started working at a grocery store. Working to survive since a teenager, he never had much of an opportunity to receive higher education. It wasn't just socioeconomic deficiencies and generic restraint that kept it from him, but campus life was different in the Sixties. "The campus would be shut down for two weeks at a times," said Gaffigan referring to the SDS and Black Panther protests. "If the Iraq War had a draft right now, this campus would be jumping.

From the age of political activism to the age of political apathy, Gaffigan refrains from criticizing today's young students. "When I sit in the classroom, I look around and I accept myself as being the dumbest one in the class," said Gaffigan. A humble exaggeration, but this attitude helped him provide more opportunities for his two children than he ever

Gaffigan learned from his father's mistakes and made sure his kids didn't miss out on an education and the beauty of pursuing their passions as careers. His son, James, played the bassoon, an instrument that cost Gaffigan \$5,000. Bassoon playing earned James a full scholarship to Yale, which he turned down for an offer from Rice University. James, now 27 years old, travels the world working as an orchestra conductor.

attend a Jesuit school, University of Scranton. Gaffigan never imposed on his children. He always let them make their own decisions, but he created a world of prosperous opportunity for them. Though he valued education, Gaffigan accepted his responsibility to his family and waited until his kids finished school before returning himself. He

Gaffigan's daughter Christine also turned

down a scholarship from Wagner to





years of age returned to college. Immediately after retiring, Gaffigan first attended acting school but realized that he had absolutely no talent. But Gaffigan gives a lot more than he takes. Older than most student's parents, he lends plenty of wisdom to the younger SG senators and wouldn't hesitate to lend money. As the Student Center Commissioner, Gaffigan planned to decorate the Center with 160 different national flags, to represent all the nations of CSI's students. build in their chest and then-BAM! Everyone runs face first into a stone wall and we all have to start from scratch



magine a world in the not too distant future where you are among a group of supercops that must rid Pacific City of the numerous gangs that plague this city. You have various weapons at your disposal and can leap great distances and pick up and throw cars, too. This is the world that exists in the video game, Crackdown from Microsoft for the Xbox

Crackdown has a series of character

based skills that can be upgraded to increase specific traits that can be used. The skills are increased by gaining orbs. The experience orb can be released from defeated enemies, with the type and number appearing being primarily based on how you defeated the foe and how difficult it was to defeat him. You can also find orbs that are scattered around the rooftops of Pacific City. There are also hidden orbs that can be acquired for all 5 statistics to be found. Each skill has five levels and with a numeric gauge on the display to indicate how close you are to reaching the next level. Each skill will also increase your trait or gains a new ability or weapon within that trait. If you end up dying or even injuring local civilians then you loss the orbs that you obtained in your progression of leveling up. In Crackdown, there are five different skills. They are: agility, driving, explosives, strength, and firearms.

Much like in another popular Xbox 360 game that was also published by Microsoft, Gears of War, Crackdown also features online co-op play. But unlike Gears of War, you or any of your friends can't simply jump in while someone is playing. In order to play together you both have to go to the main menu first and then chose to play in co-op mode. While in coop mode, both players can gain advantage of beating a mob boss in the game, but are required to obtain supply points and gain experience on their own. This actually creates problems while Crackdown tries to create the co-op gameplay to be a seamless experience it doesn't really workout that way. One of the biggest problems is when you accept someone's invite to join in their game. If you decide to accept you'll find out that you won't be joining alongside the other player, but instead you'll find yourself kicked out of your game and have to

reload to play again. Also, if your partner decides to stop playing then your game ends as well. While, Microsoft has been known for giving gamers the best on-line gaming experience. This isn't the case with Crackdown especially for those that have played Gears of War which gave gamers a great jump-in anywhere co-op gameplay. When it comes to on-line play it is definitely Crackdown's biggest weakness. You're much better off playing this game solo. Still, the good does outweigh

the bad in Crackdown.

The best has to be the open-ended world that Crackdown has to offer you. The point of an open-ended world is to be able to have the freedom to have control over the direction of the game and do whatever you want and Crackdown is one of the few games that truly does give you that sense of freedom. This is best illustrated with the main mission of taking out the nearly two dozen gang bosses. There is no set order in battling them so you can fight each boss in whatever order that you

Overall. Crackdown is a great game that offers great gameplay and lets you explore an open-ended world with superpowers. The opening song, Northbound Breakdown, is so accurately titled and kicks the album off with classic Lifetime



Magical Thinking



Hiring a dwarf housekeeper who only cleans as in exactly the right spot." high as she can reach, getting a blow job from a priest, dating a super conceited model with a small penis, and finding a mouse in your bathtub that just won't die, are just some of the bizarre real life situations experienced by author Augusten Burroughs in Magical Thinking.

The book is a collection of 27 true, short, stories that are all connected by a single thread, the idea that a person can control what happens to them if they just concentrate hard enough. Magical Thinking is filled with the wonderful and special brand of humor that we have come to expect from Augusten Burroughs.

Here are some chapter highlights:

I Dated an Undertaker

As the title suggests, this story is about Burroughs' romantic relationship with an undertaker. He engages in sexual escapades with his new boyfriend at the funeral home where he Beating Raoul works, sometimes within inches of dead bodies. Burroughs is both fascinated and afraid of this morbid profession.

"I couldn't help but dwell on the fact that I was dating somebody who had held somebody else's decapitated head in their hands. Who regularly tied string tight around the end of a dead man's penis so that fluids didn't leak out and stain the tuxedo pants. I was dating some body who had stitched a suicide's wrists shut after the fact. All with the same two hands that rubbed my back between my shoulder blades.

Debbie's Requirements

This is by far the best and funniest chapter in the entire book. Burroughs hires Debbie, a dwarf housekeeper, who only cleans as high as she can reach. Worse still, she is altergic to strong cleaning products so she makes Burroughs buy her special ingredients (baking soda, vinegar, and olive oil) so that she can mix her own cleaning agents. After Debbie's first day, the author arrives home to find his apartment more smelly than clean.

"Six hours later, when I returned, I was greeted at the door – and this before it was even opened - by the overpowering smell of vinegar. What were my neighbors thinking? That a douche-obsessed woman with a gigantic, three-foot vagina lived next door?"

Burroughs is excited to be dating Raoul, a young, handsome, millionaire and former model until he becomes aware of his narcissistic, judgmental nature. Burroughs is even more surprised to discover that the man who seemingly had so physical faults is less than perfect in one very important area.

"I turns out that Raoul has a condition known as micro-penis. This means his penis is less than three-inches long, fully erect. It looks like a citioris, sticking out above two balls. 'Suck my big fat, cock,' he tells me. 'You like that big dick?' I am dizzy. I am literally dizzy. Even though it may drag in spots, this book is well worth reading. You will find yourself laughing out loud more than once.

"I am so pleased that Jason Fein has accepted our offer for him to become the CSI Athletic Director and Director of the Sports and Recreation Center," Vice President for Student Affairs Carol Jackson said. "Jason has shown himself to have the enthusiasm, skills and motivation to do the job; after a nationwide search he emerged as the best candidate. I look forward to working with Jason as he moves our program to the next level."

Fein plans on continuing to improve the academic progress student-athletes have made, helping

them even further with the recently opened student lounge in the Athletic Center.

With CSI's addition of dorms in the coming years, Fein wishes to add to the sports programs on campus by adding more intramurals.

"We are going to move from a commuter campus to a residential campus," he said, "which means were going to move from an operation that shuts down to an all day all night all week all year operation. We want to try and start thinking about that"

One addition, however, will be a live stats update over the Internet for fans to keep up with games as they happen. The spring baseball and softball teams will be the first at CSI to have this feature. In the fall, plans are to stream live audio on the website for the games.

"We want to get as many stu-

dents involved as in as many ways as possible," he said, "whether it just be a recreation or intramural type of thing or coming down and cheering on the teams."

Fein watched as the men's basketball team competed for their 12th CUNY title in February. "That was probably the most crushing defeat I can remember in my eight years here- and we've had some bad ones," he said. "Every time that happens you're just not prepared. But that's why you play the games."

Fein first came to CSI in 1999 as the school's Sports Information Director and Assistant Director of Athletics. Three years later he was promoted to Associate Director of Athletics.

Since coming to CSI, the Dolphins teams have won 23 CUNY-AC Championships and its first and only CUNYAC Commissioner's Cup

in 2001, which is awarded to the school with best overall athletic excellence

Fein also jumped into whatever role the athletic department needed. He acted as Head Volleyball Coach for the women for two seasons starting in 2003 and as women's assistant basketball coach from 2003-2005.

Fein was chosen as the recipient of the Inaugural Rising Star Award in July 2006. The award is given to a trailblazer among sports information professionals by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

"I couldn't be happier working with and alongside Jason," Associate Athletic Director David Pizzuto said. "He's shown a lot of dedication and promise to out student-athletes here. It's a pleasure to be working with someone with the vision and motivation that he presents."


