WSIA Says "Screw You" to Naysayers

After more than a year of waiting, WSIA won the battle to keep their license, but was severely warned for the accusation that they do not provide access to public files.

According to long time station member Brain Ahl, "The good guys won."

After being denied control of WSIA, The Voice of Staten Island, Inc. sent in a petition to deny the renewal of WSIA's license last year. The staff of the radio station believes it was a personal vendetta from a former member, Carl Sabatino, who is the Executive Director of the Voice of Staten Island.

"The petitioner has attempted to coerce the College, both prior and after filing its Petition to Deny, through its threats to file, and by filing the Petition to Deny, to obtain air time and other concessions, relative to access to WSIA," according to WSIA's counsel, Christopher D. Imlay.

Sabatino claims WSIA has failed to meet minimum standards for community affairs programming; failed to provide

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And the Search Goes On

Springer Announces Two More Months

By request of CUNY Chancellor Matthew Goldstein, CSI's President will be Marlene Springer until August 31, 2007. The delay in her departure is due to the Presidential Search Committee and the Chancellor finding it necessary to continue the search, but they did not specify why the search needs to continue.

Springer originally planned to leave office at the end of the academic year on June 30, but conflict postponed her departure from the college which educates about 12,500 students.

"The College of Staten Island is a very, very important institution," said Jay Hershenson, Vice Chancellor for University Relations. "We're not going to rush to judgment, and the committee will continue to do its work and consider candidates that have come forward, as well as new ones. The chancellor and board place a very high priority on finding the best candidate for the position."

One possibility could be in response to a letter that more than 200 faculty members signed requesting the search committee to consider that the next President have a scholarly academic background rather than proficiency in business and administration.

"My personal opinion is that I don't believe you can run an academic institution if you're not an academic," said Deborah De Simone, an associate professor of education, who helped write the letter. "It's integrity, vision, and ability

Eleven productions deep at CSI, Chris Russell played the protagonist, Tom Wingfield. Tom opened up as the narrator,

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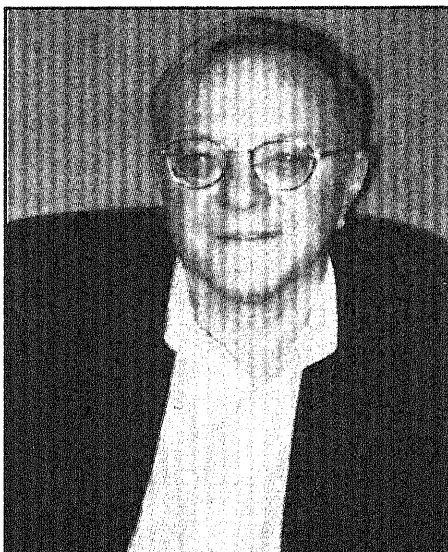
Bob Huber: The Answer Man

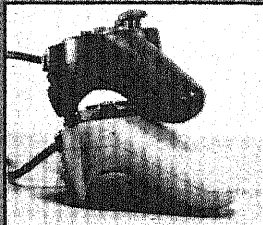

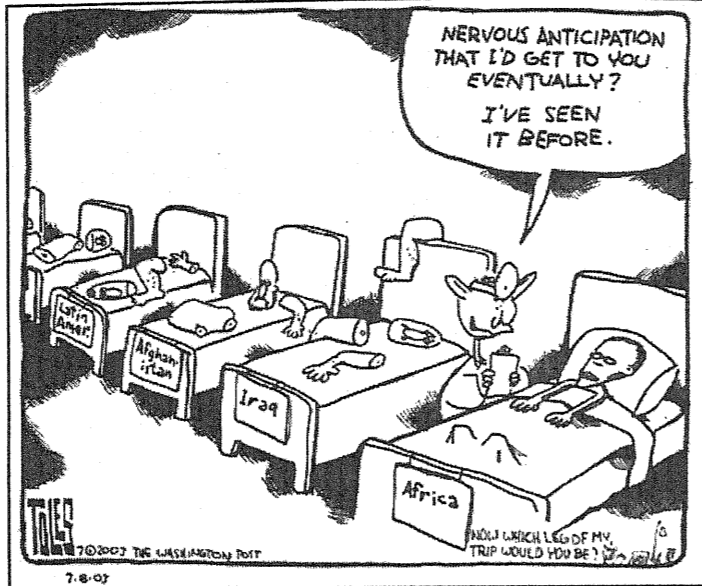

oil producing nations in the Middle East.

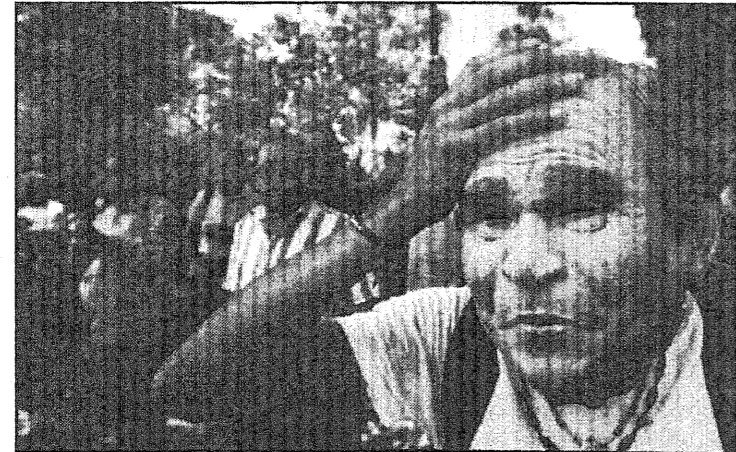

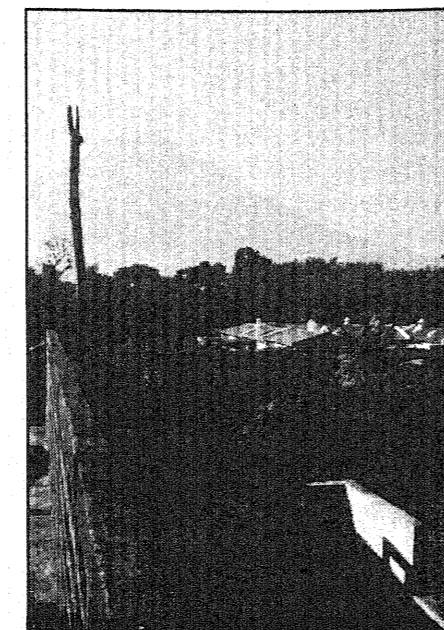
on illegal immigrants. Bush clarified that Guatemalans were not the only ones currently targeted, but all undocumented immigrants.

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to work with the faculty that matters most.

The letter is rumored to be in response of another rumor that the current Vice-President of Finance and Administration, Angelo Aponte, is one of the top candidates. His history in politics and business make some of the college community, who wish not to be named, worried he can take control of the college.

Aponte has a law degree and taught at Hostos Community College, but he is the city's former Consumer Affairs commissioner, State Housing Commissioner, and at one time ran a Rossville dirt-and-stone transfer station for Interstate Materials. Even though Aponte was never accused of wrongdoing after leaving years ago, the company had alleged mob ties.

De Simone continued to say, "This is a completely principled statement that is not in reaction to any individual candidacy." However, it is possibly just a statement made to protect the writers and signatories from any personal attacks.

The continuation of the search could also be due to high ranked friends of Aponte tampering with the procedure. According to a rumor, Aponte may have not gotten enough votes to be a top candidate, and certain community trustees and politicians are trying to place him as a top candidate for the Chancellor to pick from. Certain faculty members believe that Aponte's ties want him to be President in order to commercialize the college.

According to an unauthored piece in the March 21, 2007 Staten Island Advance, "Distasteful as purists might find it, a college president must also be proficient at fund-raising, budgeting, planning, management, alumni and public relations and keeping the institution current in terms of technological innovations, among other skills."

Aponte could not be contacted to comment on any allegation or respond to the rumors of his interest in becoming CSI President because of the death of father.

Another possible conclusion to the search being extended is that the Search Committee and the Chancellor are simply not satisfied with the pool of candidates that have submitted an application or nomination.

"There is no rush to judgment here," Hershenson said. "There's no artificial date. This is too important a college for the process not to be both deliberate and exhaustive."

Whether Springer staying another two months and the postponement of the forums are due to rumored reasons or not, the only thing that matters is that the college get the most qualified candidate.

According to Borough President James P. Molinaro, "What matters is what's in the best interests of the students in the school and the students who are coming into the school."

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broadcast services "in the public interest"; failed to provide backup or plan for a national emergency; failed to provide direct management to the station; and failed to provide access to public files. The only claim that the FCC admonished WSIA for was the denial to give access to public files.

The files were given to Samantha Zito, but when she tried making an excessive amount of copies, the students in WSIA did not know what to do. After some confusion, Carol Jackson told her the files would be mailed to her. John Ladley mailed the files to her, but Zito claims that she never received them.

Despite the setback, WSIA was pleased that their license was renewed. "We are thrilled that the license has been renewed," said WSIA Chief

Engineer John Ladley. "The collective station now has a sigh of relief. It will allow us to get on with important jobs of broadcasting."

WSIA members were also shocked by what they saw in the FCC's written decision that shocked them. Dr. David S. Shear, the former General Manager of WSIA, sent the FCC an Informal Objection to the renewal of the radio stations license. His accusations were unfounded and badly worded, but the sheer idea that he would not support the radio station that thought highly of him was completely unexpected.

Now that they have a new seven-year license, retroactive of last year, they have a simple message for all those who oppose them. "Screw you David Shear and Carl Sabatino."

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or manipulated. Good journalists continually dig and they don't take too much at face value. They probe to find the truth. So many journalists today are just not doing that."

Further, he says the field of public relations is a far more profitable and rewarding than journalism. "With everyone blogging and having a different position, people are always looking for advocates to present their side of the story. From a financial standpoint, unless you're one of the superstars of print journalism, you'll make a lot more money in public relations." Huber does, however, offer this advice to those considering a career in public relations. "Good PR people believe in what they are doing and that's very important," he said. "If you are working as a spokesman for a company and you are obliged to spin something in a way that you think is absolutely dishonest, you just shouldn't do it."

In his free time, Huber enjoys reading history books, playing golf, and traveling to France with his wife. He likes working at CSI and believes that the college offers students a unique learning opportunity.

"CSI is based on a very exciting and almost revolutionary premise: 'If you want to go to college, you can.' You won't be stopped because you don't have a lot of money, or because you didn't do so well in high school," he said. "If you have a heart and a mind that wants to move ahead, CSI can help you. That can't be said of a lot of places."

Huber plans to stay at CSI and is excited about the future. He is looking forward to the addition of residence halls, which he feels will give the college a cozy quality, while attracting new students. Huber remains modest and feels more comfortable answering questions about CSI than about himself. "It doesn't seem like there is a whole lot of sex appeal, in doing a story on me," he said with a laugh. "But if you're really interested go ahead."



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Author Talks Highlight Professors' Accomplishments in Research and Literature

A new edition has been added to CSI's already extensive literary events. "Author Talks," a forum where the college introduces the idea that our esteemed professors can do much more than just teach, gave students and faculty a chance to be introduced to their recently released books.

On March 22, three of CSI's faculty members presented their books at the first ever "Author Talks" series in the Archives, the library's newest unit. David Gerstner, Catherine Lavender, and Timothy Gray all spoke about their works.

Professor Gerstner, who had received his PhD in Film and Television at UCLA, is Acting Chair and Associate Professor of the Cinema Studies Department. Gerstner gave insight into his book *Manly Arts: Masculinity and Nation in Early American Cinema*. His research began in New Zealand, where he taught for two years.

Gerstner's focus was on cultural identity and questions dealing with masculinity and nationhood, leading him to ask the questions: "What does it mean to be a man in a country? What does it mean to be a man in America?" The professor tackles the diversity of cinematic issues by dedicating an entire chapter to Theodore Roosevelt's concerns of war in movies to today's African-American and Queer culture, and how they are perceived through film.

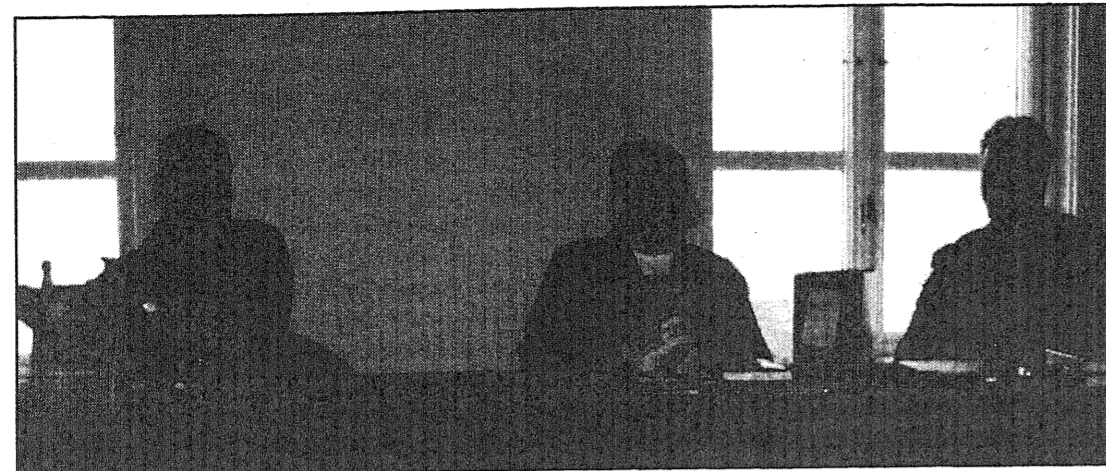
Gerstner was the first of the authors

to highlight the importance of past research in the process of writing, saying that there are, "weird games with archives, legalities you have to dance with." While authors may become engrossed in this process of investigation, the author notes that eventually one "has to stop reading and then write," and that the "lives [you are researching] write out at you...you become this book."

Professor Lavender, a member of the History Department, presented *Scientists and Storytellers*, a research piece based on Native American women. It was her goal in writing the book to spread the message that women are neither insignificant, nor unimportant. Rather, "they are the authors," said Lavender.

She noted that she, "live[d] to find documents," because it was widely believed that no research had been conducted in her field before the 1930s. However, when she finally found notes made by anthropologists, she compared it to finding a Shakespeare folio. Now, she hopes that her book will "salvage and preserve" the matriarchal Native American culture.

Lavender explores issues of early feminism by tracing the history back to Native American women and the roles they had in society. From referencing the power that Native American women held

when it came to the ownership of property, right down to exploring their methods of birth control and abortions, Lavender compares the feminist back then to the feminist today.

The English Department's Professor Gray faced a unique challenge when writing his book, *Gary Snyder and the Pacific Rim: Creating Countercultural Community* - his subject was still alive, which produced, in his words, a "great and complicating" situation. "Working with a living artist is tough [because] you have to want to use accumulated correspondences yet still respect the wishes of the writer."

Gray first met Snyder while studying at the University of California - Santa Barbara, where he had obtained a PhD. After "drop[ping] Snyder a line", Gray began writing about him and following in his footsteps. He traveled to Asia three

times, showing him that there was "flexible citizenship" for both East and West.

The three authors stated that although the subject matters of their books deal with difficult and highly educational issues, the writing style would appeal to the average reader. "I don't come from an academic family," says Lavender, "My father was a lumberjack. Although I wrote about a complicated matter, my goal was to write a book that my father could read - a book that anyone can just pick up."

All three professors were schooled out West, and they noted that CSI reaches out geographically and that "enriches [the] teaching".

Spreading the Word, Not the Disease

Three out of four people are infected in their lifetime with the Human Papilloma Virus. Most do not even know it. You are at risk, but there is a chance for help now.

The CSI Wellness Center provides information concerning HPV and its effects. It is a sexually transmitted disease with more than 100 strains. More than 99% of cervical cancer cases are caused by the virus, which usually has no symptoms. Approximately 288,000 women will die of cervical cancer this year. Could the new vaccine have prevented these deaths?

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has licensed the new vaccine, known as Gardasil, which requires three shots done over six months, according to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention. Women from age 9 to 26 are encouraged to obtain the vaccine.

This vaccine has received much opposition in Texas, where Governor Rick Perry has ordered girls entering the sixth grade to receive the vaccine. Thousands of letters and e-mails have been sent to the governor by angry parents and concerned Texans rejecting his mandate, stating that the vaccine is too new to know its long-term effects.

Michigan and Maryland both rejected similar bills about the vaccine. Virginia has passed a bill, but the state's governor, Timothy M. Kaine, has not signed it yet.

Besides health concerns, the vaccine also hits a chord financially. Health insurance plans usually only cover recommended vaccines, and Gardasil has not reached this status as of yet. In addition, Gardasil is the most expensive vaccine to date at a cost of \$120 per shot.

On Monday, March 26 at 6:00p.m., there will be a CLUE event in the Green Dolphin Lounge concerning this topic of interest. It is sponsored by Colleges Against Cancer and the Wellness Program. Carliann Costanzo, President of Colleges Against Cancer, says that Dr. Alecia Giovinazzo will be speaking about, "gynecological health, STDs, and particularly HPV and its relation to cervical cancer." Go to learn the facts that could help save your life or the lives of those you know.

n-word.
"I enjoy the opportunity to connect with my community and research, shoot, interview, and spit out a product in less than a week," she said in a recent interview. "I'm confident that years of developing various skills will be very worthwhile in the end."

Cecchine grew up outside of Philadelphia, in a suburb called Bala Cynwyd. She is the daughter of public school teachers, her father a Biology teacher and her mother an Art teacher. Cecchine attended public school her entire scholastic career leading up to college.

She studied film, video and photography at Hampshire College. Hampshire has a student-initiated curriculum, which allows for "active participation in original research; and the diverse communities, on campus and off, in which learning takes place." The school is actually quite different than traditional universities. The university's students create their own coursework and are aided and guided by faculty mentors.

Teaching has been extremely rewarding for Cecchine. "Teaching our very diverse students, and learning from their experiences has shown me how important it is to leave my own politics outside of the classroom."

"I teach students to pay attention to the media around them," she said. "Most important to me is that I ask students to recognize media's impact on them in both a personal and socio-political way."

Students appreciate Cecchine's honest, but caring, style of teaching. "She always had a way of making everything interesting," Chris Olivieri, a former student of Cecchine said. "Her teaching style is so unique."

"I don't think they need to be told what to think," Cecchine said. "They need to learn the confidence to analyze and digest all of the influences around them." This approach has worked well.

Danielle Palladino credits Cecchine with helping her find her voice. "She gave me helpful feedback on my projects that helped me hone my creative style," she said. "I feel like I really found my voice."

"I'm glad to contribute my little bit to help our students," said Cecchine. "I love watching students gain confidence while connecting to their creativity."

She is currently teaching a video production class and an introduction to media class.

Although Cecchine does her best to guide students to their maximum creative potential, she is met with some hardships. "I've seen time and time again how much our students need to write to develop their voice, to know they have a voice," she said. "I think our students have been neglected by primary and secondary education. I've worked in public schools. I don't blame teachers. It is part of a systemic neglect of education in the U.S."

Cecchine offered a possible solution. "What gives me hope is how quickly students can improve when they are engaged in the content."

She also notes that students tend to respond better when they are being creative. "I am surprised by how many of them barely made anything," she said. "They really get excited about their work."

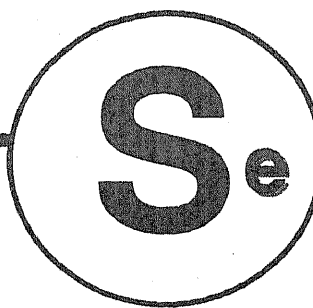
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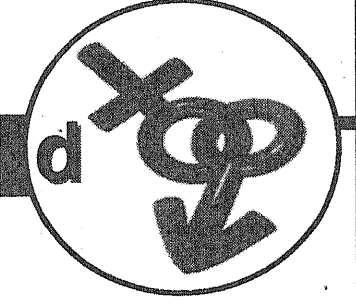

addressing the crowd. He spoke directly to the audience and explained the background of the play and each character. Tom established himself as a narrator/character and explained the non-existent character, his father, "a telephone man who fell in love with long distance."

The father abandoned the family, leaving Tom to take care of his mother, Amanda and sister, Laura. A gray picture of the father hangs above the fireplace. The characters often refer to him but he is never seen on stage.

The action opens with Tom, Amanda and Laura eating dinner. Amanda, played by Beth McNeil, immediately shows her comically antagonistic character by annoying her son Tom. She antagonized him about the smallest details of his eating, which infuriated Tom and amused the audience. At this moment Amanda chuckled with the crowd. Her only slip of the night though. She was like a boxer off balance in the first round, took an 8 count and kicked ass for the next eleven rounds. McNeil delivered a strong performance of Amanda Wingfield, a part that Jessica Lang was consistently bashed for.

Amanda is the paranoid and obsessively worried mother who basks in the memory of her better days. An old Southern belle with plenty of "gentleman callers," she counts on Laura to save the family from poverty by way of business college or marrying a wealthy gentleman caller.

Laura, played by Jill Ward, is socially and physically crippled and unable to

live up to her mother's standards. Though enrolled in college, Laura deceitfully stopped attending and spent her days roaming the streets of St. Louis. At home she does little more than tend to her collection of glass figurines, which the play is named after.

The tension between Amanda and Tom intensified in scene three. Amanda refused to grant Tom any privacy while writing. Writing, along with movies and liquor served as Tom's escape from monotonous misery. An argument erupted, and Tom, frustrated with his clumsy

favorable to the idea, still submitted to his mother's request. "Yes!", he yelled back at his mothers pleas. Almost every one of Tom's lines reeks of repressed rage, often with a dark sarcastic tone.

Tom invited his semi-friend Jim O'Connor over for dinner but never shared his original intentions. O'Connor, played by Gregory Mueller, is the most realistic character in the play. Outspoken, confident and career minded, where the Wingfields have dreams, he has goals.

After the meal Amanda asks Jim to entertain Laura. They shared an awkward

attempt put on his coat, tosses it across the room, knocking over Laura's glass collection.

Scene three established the mental prison that trapped the three main characters. Amanda's paranoid delusions, Tom's disgust with life and yearn for "change and adventure," and Laura's complete inability to function are all rooted in the fathers abandonment.

Amanda grew frantically obsessed with finding Laura a gentleman caller and asked Tom to find a suitable prospect at his job in a shoe warehouse. Tom, not

silence at first but then engaged in conversation. Laura admitted that she had a crush on Jim in high school and reminded him of the nickname he'd given her, "Blue Roses." Jim's misinterpretation of Laura's illness, pleurosis.

In this scene Laura's limp became noticeably inconsistent. Though physically unconvincing, Ward superbly captured the fragility and timidity often embodied in Tennessee Williams' lead female characters.

The moment went from awkward to intimate. After Laura showed Jim her

favorite figurine, a unicorn, they set the glass piece on a table and danced. They bumped the table and broke off the unicorn's horn. Caught up in the moment, Jim kissed Laura but quickly jumped away and admitted, "I shouldn't have done that." Jim then tells Laura about his steady girlfriend and explained to Amanda why he had to leave.

Another argument erupted between Amanda and Tom. Tom exited and made his final narrative speech.

It's said that The Glass Menagerie is Williams' autobiographical work. Williams himself worked in a shoe store and his mentally ill sister Rose inspired the character of Laura.

Papa and crew didn't just dust off a 65 year old play. They entertained the audience and caused brief chuckling outbursts. But most impressive was how four students put on a professional level performance, in parts that Hollywood actors even suffered harsh criticism.

27 Wagons Full of Cotton

Prior to The Glass Menagerie, student director Jessica Yalango presented 27 Wagons Full of Cotton. Another brain-child of Tennessee Williams, the one act play also captured the misery of Southern poverty. John Gibson played Jake Meighan, an out of work laborer and wife beater. Jake set arson to Silva Vicarro's cotton gin with hope to create work for himself. Silva, played by Daniel Coady, approaches Jake with 27 wagons full of cotton to gin. While ginning the cotton, Jake's wife Flora, played by Nicole Catalano, is then raped by Silva. Flora's character was just as emotionally fragile as Laura in Glass Menagerie, but without the physical ailment.

Remembering Richard Jeni

Actor and comedian, Richard Jeni, 49, best known for his role as Jim Carrey's best friend in *The Mask*, died on March 10th from a self inflicted gun shot wound to the face. The media speculated that he had been distraught over the poor state of his career, but Jeni's family claims he had been struggling with depression and bouts of psychotic paranoia. Jeni was discovered at his home in West Hollywood, California, by his girlfriend who called police. He was rushed to Cedar Sinai Medical Center where he was pronounced dead an hour later.

Richard was not down or blue, he was ill. If you knew him, you could understand this was as much

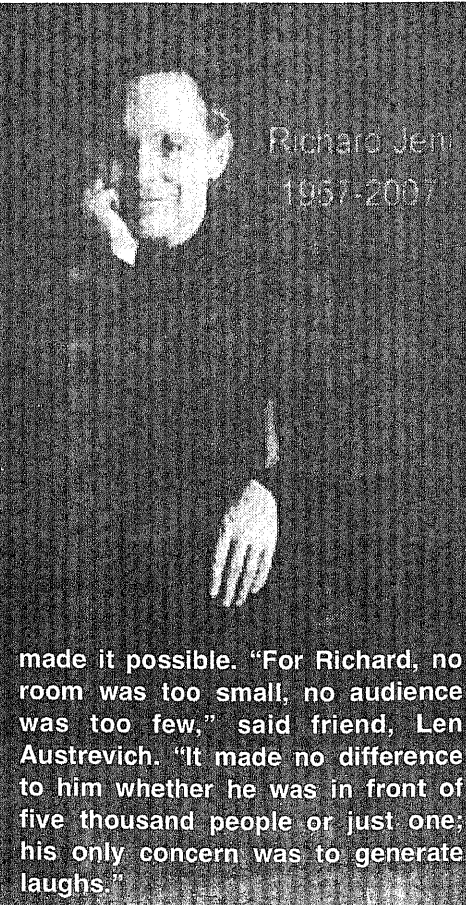
a shock to those close to him, as it was to his fans and colleagues," according to the official statement posted on his website, richardjeni.com. "Perhaps his passing will encourage people to have sympathy, compassion, and understanding for those afflicted with mental illness. As we are all trying to make sense of this, take time to remember the joy and laughter Richard brought to the countless people he touched during his much too short life."

Jeni burst onto the comedy scene in 1990 with his first Showtime special "The Boy from New York City." Over the course of the next 20 years, he built up a cult following of loyal fans. "He really had the audience in his hand the whole time," said Frank Kelly, the

manager of the Iprov in Irvine, California. "I could just tell from listening to the laughter when Jeni was up onstage."

Richard Jeni, born Richard John Colangelo, came from a traditional Italian-American family, and was born and raised in the Bensonhurst section of Brooklyn. His long and illustrious career included regular appearances on the Tonight Show, several critically acclaimed HBO and Showtime Specials, roles in television and film, and appearances in commercials. In 2004, Comedy Central named Jeni, one of the 100 greatest stand-ups of all time. "He had tons and tons of material," said Frazer Smith a comedian who often worked with Jeni. "He was looked up to by all the young comedians, a total pro."

Even though he had achieved much success throughout his life time, Jeni remained modest, always remembering the fans who had



made it possible. "For Richard, no room was too small, no audience was too few," said friend, Len Austrevich. "It made no difference to him whether he was in front of five thousand people or just one: his only concern was to generate laughs."



Wario Has All the Right Moves

Wario (Mario's rival) is starring in a new game: WarioWare: Smooth Moves for the Nintendo Wii. The WarioWare series features mini-games, called microgames, in this series. Before the debut of the WarioWare games, Wario starred in a number of different handheld platformers known as Wario Land. The Wario Land series were some of the best games that Nintendo had to offer on the various Game Boy handhelds. The games focus on Wario doing things that Mario would never do, like exploring different levels to take treasure for the sole reason of feeding his greedy ego and featuring a number of different wacky power-ups that Mario would never use. When it was announced that Wario would star in a new platformer, Wario: Master of Disguise for the Nintendo DS, I was excited. After all, the last Wario handheld platformer was Wario Land 4 for the Game Boy Advance way back in 2001. With such a long hiatus, a return to Wario's roots was overdue.

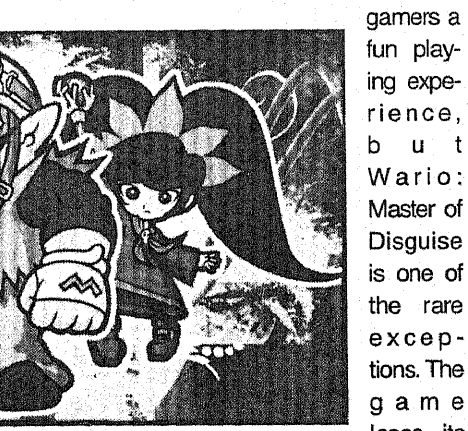
Sadly, this game wasn't the triumphant return that many Wario fans were expecting. The bad starts early on with the game's lame

story Wario's newest plan to gain quick easy money is to create a device called Telmet, which has the power to bend time, space, and reality. Why? So he can enter the fictional world of his favorite TV show.

The show centers around a thief named Silver Zephyr who uses a magic wand to disguise himself and to endow himself with powers. Wario steals the wand and becomes the Purple Wind (a.k.a Thief Wario). Soon after stealing the wand, Wario discovers the existence of another more powerful object called the wishstone, which has been broken into various pieces and scattered to different tombs throughout the TV show.

Thanks to his greedy ego, Wario sets out on his adventure to find the wishstone and put it back together. That's when the real problems of this game occur. This game isn't a traditional

platformer as you're lead to believe, but instead a puzzler similar to the Super NES cult-classic, The Lost Vikings from Blizzard Entertainment.



Nintendo has almost always known how to give gamers a fun playing experience, but Wario: Master of Disguise is one of the rare exceptions. The game loses its appeal within the first hour of playing it for the simple reason that it gets boring fast. The reason is that solving many of the game's puzzles and minigames can become tedious; it takes too long to complete certain levels (or episodes as the game calls them). Also, the touch-screen controls for this game are annoying. Many DS games have shown that the touch-screen controls can be fun, but Wario: Master of Disguise

use of the touch-screen echoes back to the early days of the DS where touch-screen controls felt both forced and gimmicky. Having to use the touch-screen to switch between different costumes is one such example. Also, the game has trouble interpreting symbols if you do it too fast and when you're in the middle of boss battles (which require you to switch between different costumes quickly), it can be very frustrating.

As for what is good about the game: the graphics are bright and colorful including the well-animated backgrounds. Also, Wario: Master of Disguise does continue the Wario Land tradition of featuring wacky power-ups like, Genius Wario or Dragon Wario, but since the use of different power-ups is restricted to only a few situations, it takes away the fun of using them whenever you choose. The music in the game is also catchy and fits the theme of each environment.

Overall, Wario: Master of Disguise is nothing special and is a mediocre platform puzzler at best. If you truly want to play great DS platformers you'll be much better off playing New Super Mario Bros., Kirby: Canvas Curse, or Sonic Rush.
