CONY PROYS REJECT PAYLESS PAYDAYS!

The 6500 career faculty of City University rejected outright Mayor Lindsey's recent proposal to impose "payless paydays" on City employees.

In a letter transmitted today (Friday, October 9) to the Mayor, Chairman Belle Zeller of the Legislative Conference, collective bargaining representative of CUNY's professors, asked, "It's 'payless paydays' are permissible, why not 'workless workdays'?"

Prof. Zeller voiced strong objection to a public statement by Assistant Budget Director James A. Gavanagh indicating that the City may be obliged to violate collective bargaining agreements with its employees.

"As long as his statement stands as an expression of City policy," she took, "it grievously damages the faith of City employees in the City."

The Legislative Conference is currently operating under a threeyear contract negotiated with the Board of Higher Education in September 1969 on behalf of CUNY's full-time instructional staff.

CUMY PROYS REJECT PAYLESS PAYDAYS

The 6500 career faculty of City University rejected outright Mayor Lindsay's recent proposal to impose "payless paydays" on City employees.

In a letter transmitted today (Friday, October 9) to the Mayor, Chairman Belle Zeller of the Legislative Conference, collective bargaining representative of CUNY's professors, asked, "If 'payless paydays' are permissible, why not 'workless workdays'?"

Prof. Zeller voiced strong objection to a public statement by Assistant Budget Director James A. Cavanagh indicating that the City may be obliged to violate collective bargaining agreements with its employees.

"As long as his statement stands as an expression of City policy," she said, "it grievously damages the faith of City employees in the City."

The Legislative Conference is currently operating under a threeyear contract negotiated with the Board of Higher Education in September 1969 on behalf of CUNY's full-time instructional staff.
