Got Stress? Counseling Center Helps Students and LGBT

With finals coming up and the holidays just around the corner stress levels are high and even the best students can feel like they are on the verge of becoming unhinged.

Sometimes talking to family members and friends is not enough, but a session with a private therapist can cost upwards of \$100.00 per hour. Fortunately, at CSI's Counseling Center (1A-109) students can receive academic, personal, and LGBT (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender) counseling with an experienced mental health professional and it is free and confidential.

The qualified and caring staff of four full time counselors and five part time counselors all have a minimum of a master's degree in the areas of either psychology, social work or mental health counseling. They don't give advice, but rather provide direction to aid people in finding the answers within themselves. Students are encouraged to listen to their inner voice and obey their gut feelings. They can speak freely without fear of being judged. "I would certainly hope that students would feel comfortable coming here," said Counseling Center Director, Dr. Ann Booth. "We try to make it a relaxing place, free from the hustle and bustle of the campus."

On any given day 20-25 students visit the Counseling Center seeking help. They can either walk in or make an appointment. The center will never turn away someone who is in need. Session usually last one hour, but if someone needs additional time counselors will stay with him or her for up to two hours. The most common problems students have are: depression, anxiety, stress, and relationship or family difficulties. The Center adheres to New York State

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Quantum Inside CSI Brings the Future of Computers Closer to Reality

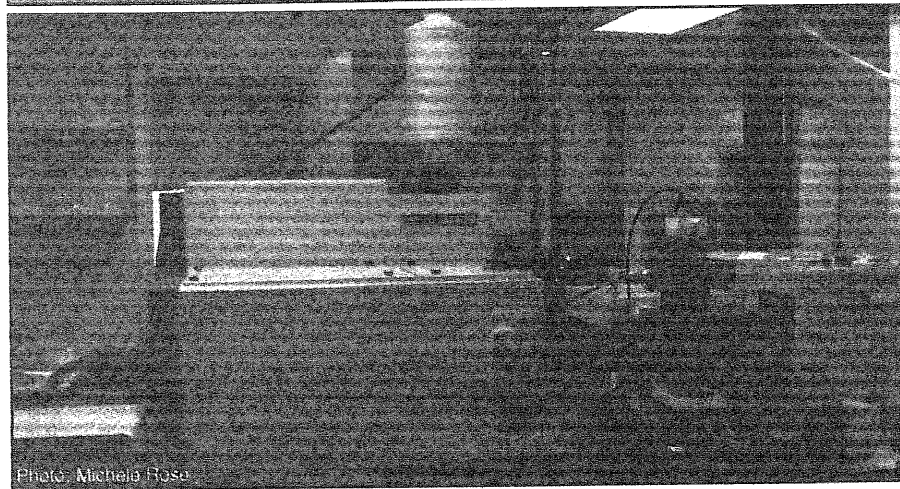

In a lab tucked away in 1N, CSI Physics Professor, Anshel Gorokhovskiy performs an experiment which he hopes will advance his research of photonics. He is assisted by Alexandra Bergman, a graduate student, who is working on her PhD. The task ahead of them is complex and tedious. Coordinated teamwork is essential to their success.

Bergman slips her hands into a pair of gloves, snaps protective goggles over her eyes, and pours a liquid with a cloudy white vapor into a device resembling a small pool filter.

Gorokhovskiy attaches electrodes to a grey sliver of a diamond the size of a nail head perched under a microscope. The current begins to flow. She walks over to the light switch, flicks it off and the lights go out. The diamond sample glows, an effect called electroluminescence; the reason the backlight goes on when an alarm clock goes off. The dynamic duo takes a small step toward harnessing a single photon.

The correction of eyesight, tattoo removal, barcode scanners at the supermarket, and light shows at

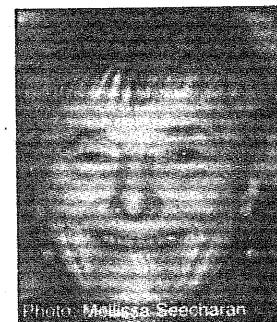

Prohibition is usually imposed because someone wants to make money from destroying others' business. But are there any pubs outside the campus profiting from the prohibition at CSI?

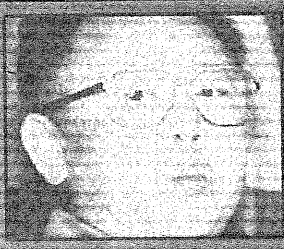

Allies Disregard U.N. Sanctions Against North Korea

As it plays the first card of a round trying to lambaste Pyongyang for its nuclear test, the U.S. encounters a growing opposition to the United Nations' resolution against North Korea while more countries adopt the resuscitated Cold War strategy of nuclear deterrence to shield themselves from nuclear bullies.

The U.S. has already been exerting sanctions on North Korea for half of the year as a punishment for Pyongyang's conventional rocket tests. The most recent one was carried out in June. North Korea has also been charged with trafficking nuclear weapon parts and counterfeit currency.

The U.N. resolution, ratified after North Korea's Oct 9th nuclear test, demand countries to prevent Pyongyang's trafficking in illicit materials. But North Korea's neighbors - South Korea, China and Japan - hesitate to enforce tougher measures or a naval blockade against Pyongyang.

"We have to really understand why some countries pursue military nuclear programs," Mohamed al Baradei told Die Zeit. "On the part of North Korea, developing nuclear weapons is a cry for help and a fight for survival."

The Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad addressed the 61st session of the U.N. General Assembly with an accusal of the U.S. for using its nuclear weapons to intimidate the world. In fact, the U.S. is the only country that has ever carried out a military attack using weapons of mass destruction. Ahmadinejad also highlighted that the U.N. Security Council is controlled by the United States, which constitutes a grave impediment to its objectivity.

The recent developments on the international political scene reveal a severe split between the group of countries and institutions backing the after-world-war-two order of the United Nations (e.g. the United States, Great Britain, Israel, the IMF, the World Bank, the EU etc.) and all the others including not only the countries of the former "Iron Curtain" but also the previously non-aligned ones, the countries of the South.

At the same time, the future relationship between the United States and

The club of nuclear-weapons countries keeps growing as more countries engage in a strategy of nuclear deterrence to protect themselves from imperial powers. Some governments of sovereign states deem it their duty to protect their country from foreign imperial domination.

President George Bush deserves blame for the present nuclear weapons' race because he violated the Non Proliferation Treaty (NPT). Signatories to NPT declared "their intention to achieve at the earliest possible date, the cessation of the nuclear arms race and to undertake effective measures in the directions of nuclear disarmament...The cessation of the manufacture of nuclear weapons for all time, the liquidation of all their existing stockpiles, and the elimination from national arsenals of nuclear weapons...and complete disarmament under strict and effective international control."

In his State of the Union address

on January 29, 2002, President Bush declared North Korea a perennial

enemy, along with former allies Iraq and Iran, as "the world's most dangerous regimes and the axis of evil." In fact, Pyongyang has never ceased to be considered an "enemy" since the U.S. remains officially at war with North Korea since 1950.

The U.S. war on North Korea stands out as one of the major war crimes of the Twentieth Century. During the military operations, the U.S. Army destroyed 78 North Korea's Cities, thousands of its villages, and exterminated approximately a third of the country's population.

In light of the above mentioned facts, President Bush not only branded North Korea a perennial enemy, but also submitted to Congress a "Nuclear Posture Review" on January 8, 2002, which ordered the Pentagon to prepare contingency plans for use

of nuclear weapons, which was in a sharp defiance of the NPT treaty.

President Bush carries the blame for the present reversal of the nonproliferation and disarmament strategy to nuclear arms races worldwide. Bush keeps the U.S. nuclear options open and approves of development of new types of nuclear weapons, such as "mini-nukes."

"The U.S. has also violated the Non Proliferation Treaty (NPT) when it signed, on March 2, 2006, a nuclear cooperation with India, which has obvious military application," Pravda stated. "By agreeing to supply nuclear reactors, fuel and expertise to help India produce larger quantities of plutonium, without insisting that India sign the NPT," the U.S. implemented a double-standard which promotes possession of nuclear weapons in countries like India, Israel, and Pakistan.

This trail of events led North Korea and other countries, such as Iran, possibly Brazil, Egypt, Saudi Arabia, Turkey and potentially many others to adopt the nuclear deterrence strategy and to disregard the NPT as a worthless piece of paper since it has been violated by the nuclear-weapons countries. The fragile balance has been broken and the world is bound to search for new solutions to defend itself against the imperial domination.

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confidentiality laws. 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about serious subjects," Professor Brian Cogan said. "Since the drinking age went up something has been lost. In the old days students would not dare to get drunk if their teachers were around, they acted sober by convention because they would have been seen as weak if they could not hold their alcohol. Now in America, that privilege is largely gone, as is much of the camaraderie we used to enjoy."

proval, disappointment, or even anger directed at them.

Homophobia is a societal problem and can have many roots. Sometimes an

drink and also the age limit should be revoked," Colomba Varriano, a freshman from Argentina, said. "This is not right. The law should change, the whole thing should change. If students misbehave when they get too drunk, they would get expelled, but it's up to them not to make a mess out of themselves."

The CSI administration looks up to the times when the prohibition laws plagued U.S. citizens countrywide and concocted the same humiliating and restrictive situation for the CSI students. Prohibition became enforced after enacting the Volstead National Prohibition Act and the Eighteenth Amendment that was grafted to the U.S. Constitution in 1920 forbidding the "manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors." Prohibition mentality has never entirely left the American bodily system..

"There is no place where the faculty could drink either," Carol Brower Director of Student Life said. "It's not students versus faculty issue. It's just about the age. There is also a certain level of maturity that is individual. We don't say 'never.' The first step is to provide students with an inviting environment. We want to convert the Green Lounge into a Coffee House with nice trendy furniture for students to chill with friends. So, this will be the first step and then will see."

"Prohibition represents both the increasing emphasis on liability by colleges, they essentially have become paranoid of lawsuits," Professor Cogan said. "In Europe most people emphasize personal responsibility, but we Americans are, sadly, a litigious people."

"I support not having alcohol," Vice President for Student Affairs Carol Jacobson said. "It's a commuter campus; students drive, but they are not held captive here. If they are legal age they can drink home with their families. Research suggests that liquor impairs good thinking."

individual fears that they themselves maybe homosexual, others learn the prejudice at home from family members and friends, while others are fearful of a behavior that they cannot understand. Many times people object for moral or religious reasons. Since there is no one origin, the task of eradicating homophobia can be quite challenging." Everyone is entitled to their opinion, but just because it's your opinion, doesn't make it so," said Booth. "In terms of: 'If you don't like it, leave,' well we can be wherever we want, whether it is a conservative environment or not. People have a right to protest."

We at CSI must do our part to be open and accepting of those who are different from ourselves. "You try to change the way people think, or at least impart the message that outward discrimination is unacceptable," said Booth. "My dream would be for everybody to be tolerant of everyone's differences. It's going take a gay and straight alliance, not just in the form of a club, but in general, because gay people can't do it alone and straight people can't do it alone."

Liquor still carries the hallmark of impropriety and sinful temptation. Not only that, but people also believe that some CSI students are not sophisticated enough to control themselves and have to be handled by authoritarian restrictions. "I don't think it's a good idea," Glenn Savino, a former CSI student, said. "We don't need some college kids to get drunk and kill somebody. It would be a problem for the college. Ed Fienkiewicz, a junior, expressed a similar opinion. "I can handle it. But our students are so stupid that they would have a lot of problems."

CSI administration not only prevents students from getting into a problem but also from exercising their own free will and rights. Wine, a demon when consumed more than one can master, contains healthy antioxidants - the enemies of loose radicals that can plague us with cancer, deafness and other afflictions. Already the ancient Greeks and Romans were well aware of medicinal effects of wine. Hippocrates, a famous ancient Greek doctor, was among the first to prescribe it. One has to; however, come to one's limit and recognize the right moment to stop.

Beer competes with wine for first place among health beneficial drinks. American scientists have come to a conclusion that beer is healthier than wine due to its higher content of vitamin B12, niacin, folic acid, anti-oxidants, polyphenols, or ferule acid.

"Wine and beer at CSI sounds good," Tatiana Ciccarelli, a freshman, said. "People have to learn responsibility one day. I don't want to be baby-sat. Don't baby-sit me!"

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Quantum Inside

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Webster Hall originated in photonics. Gorokhovskiy, a native of Tartu, Estonia, explains that the creation and manipulation of light particles, or photons, is the basis of this science. Early in the morning on every third day, Bergman pours liquid nitrogen into the Raman Spectrometer. This device is commonly used in combination with a laser. It produces red, blue, or green light in order to characterize the optical properties of diamonds.

When handling nitrogen, safety goggles and gloves are a must - imagine a substance so cold, it can burn through skin. On average, the temperature is 77 degrees Kelvin, or a numbing negative 321 degrees F. This liquid is similar to the gas in a car, except it's about fifty cents less per gallon than fuel on the island.

Unlike one in a ring setting, the diamond sample is laced with xenon, a gas that creates an eerie glow, producing an LED (light emitting diode). When the day's experiment is completed, the results are magnified onto a Sony Trinitron television screen and logged into a computer in graph form. The hulking Spectrometer, costs \$250,000, bringing the grand total of all the equipment to a cool one million.

The photonics team puts this pricey equipment to good use as they attempt to harness a single photon. In theory, it will allow for the secure transfer of information - the basic idea behind encryption.

"The idea is to get to the point where you can count photons. When a light is flipped on, a million photons are radiated out and it's impossible to control," said Bergman. "With the releasing of single photons that carry information, it is easier to manipulate, controlling the number of photons emitted."

It is understood that the receiver would be the only one able to interpret the message, securing it from anyone who would try to intercept it. This is the basis of quantum computers, encoding information. As far as what the device will look like; that's left to the engineers.

In any PC, the term bits refers to the combination of ones and zeros, which make up all operations from words in a document to modem status. The world of physics is always black and white - an electrical switch has the option of on or off and an object can't exist in two places at once.

Quantum computers break the rules of binary code; instead of bits, these quantum bits, or qubits, can represent a one or a zero, a combination of both, or something between zero and one. The possibilities are infinite. Quantum computers have the potential to out run even the fastest Intel Pentium chip, according to an article published in Scientific America.

In 1994, in New Jersey, Peter Shor, a research scientist at AT&T's Bell Laboratories, set out to discover

how to solve a number theory using quantum computers, calculating huge numbers extremely rapidly, much faster than the average desktop. Keep in mind that photons move at the speed of light, roughly over 9 million feet. Since then it has sparked national curiosity because of its potential use in military and commercial communication. Inevitably, the research conducted at CSI and elsewhere will develop the technology to produce smaller, more powerful computer chips and conserve energy.

Professor Syed Rizvi, the Chairman of the Physics Department, saw the change in global trends immediately after Sept. 11th, knowing full well that the need for homeland security would emerge quickly. Research ideas stem from current events or just a general need. Demand is the driving force.

When the Physics team comes up with a new research project idea, Prof. Rizvi draws up a proposal and mails it to a funding agency. For the past ten years, he has managed to charm the Department of Defense (DoD) into funding a large portion of their research. The United States Air Force has also been intrigued by the technology that CSI's facility can churn out. CSI's team is collaboratively working in this CUNY-wide effort to discover this encryption technology. Despite the larger size of the lab at The City College of New York, the Chairman is confident in CSI's facility. "It's a very competitive area," said Prof. Rizvi. "Given the size of CSI, what we have is significant and we're not in bad shape."

Of course there are always kinks to work out with new technology. Without regard for security, quantum computers could open the door to every encryption under the sun. It would allow the professional code breaker behind enemy lines in a matter of seconds, according to an article published by Military.com.

"You'd be surprised how many people have nothing to do but break into computers" said Prof. Rizvi. "We call them hackers." More research is needed - and fast. The institutions working on these quantum computer glitches include California Institute of Technology, Los Alamos, and the epitome of monopolies, Microsoft.

For years CSI has worked strictly with organic material, elements from living things such as carbon. Prof. Gorokhovskiy revolutionized photonics at CSI in his work with inorganic materials, metal substances. Ultimately both materials make up a quantum computer. "What he does is unique," said Gail Simmons, Dean of Science and Technology.

"We're trying to do something that no one has done before," said Bergman. As the applications of quantum computing develop, the more there will be a need for it. An article from the University of Oxford speculates that quantum computing will not become a reality until 2020.

Perhaps CSI's photonics team will take the world where no man has gone before.

According to Dr. Springer, CSI's Master Plan is currently in its first stage, as the site of the future dormitories has already been decided upon. "It will be back, near the Recreation Center," stated Springer. "There will be people who won't like the site, but there are people

who wouldn't like any site.

Springer admitted that CSI is preparing for residential like, but "doesn't know how it will all come out."

In addition to the Master Plan, Dr. Springer announced 29 new faculty searches, the expansion of Wi-Fi to parking lots, and the Verrazano School, an extension of the F.I.R.S.T. program, which Dr. Springer called, "a school within a school."

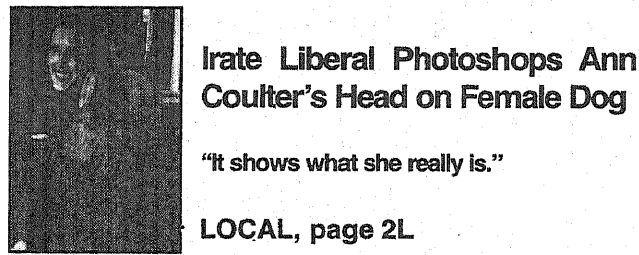

Keepin' Indie-Rock Steady

Last I heard from Tad Kubler he was bent sweet on codeine, typing from somewhere within the belly of Williamsburg, flung far from the banks of the Mississippi River. He and his band, The Hold Steady, were back at home-base Brooklyn to begin work on a new record, Boys and Girls in America, their third effort in as many years.

Since its debut LP, *Almost Killed Me* (2004, Frenchkiss), the band's rise to indie-rock stardom, from the ashes of Twin Cities art/punk outfit, Lifer Puller, has been at least nothing gradual, if not sensational. That year, the record spotted at number 31 on the Village Voice's yearly critics' poll, Pazz & Jop. And yet, prior to its second release, *Separation Sunday*, in May 2005, the band became the first rock group in recent memory to get the cover.

Separation, a loosely conceptual record, follows the lives of three characters: Holly, the Catholic-addict prostitute; Charlemagne, the pimp; and Gideon— as they tramp, drunk and high, from town to town searching for themselves or just another party. It's a narrative that drags through the debauched grottos of a drugged world and back— "Holly's been disappeared for years. Today she finally came back."

Sonically the record is slow and fast, layered in horns and keys and plugged-in riffs rooted in classic rock. Craig Finn, singer/songwriter, doesn't keep secret the impact of Springsteen, Billy Joel or even Meat Loaf composer Jim Steinman, but to dwell on that would be to cloud your better judgment. The record jumped to eight in last year's P&J poll and separated the band from the shadows of the bar tap.

Boys and Girls in America abandons the linear narrative, but with each track displays a concerted effort to get back to the same themes of love and guys and girls and relationships. The title itself comes from *On the Road* by Jack

Kerouac. "Boys and girls in America have such a sad time together," he wrote. "Most of the songs go back to that. [They] are a little more self-contained. They don't relate as much to each other but all go back to this one big thing," explained Finn. Still, he can't give up on the story and we can't ignore his scholarship.

Finn's vignettes tender a range of characters from the suicidal poet-drunk, John Berryman to a guy whose girlfriend doesn't have to work because she can always tell which horse will come in first (they spend the whole next week getting high). Even Holly, Charlemagne and Gideon show up on "First Night." As a whole, he takes a big step toward broadening the spread of his tales. Although his soul will never seem to stray far from Minneapolis, his umbrella reaches out.

Overall, Boys and Girls appears a bit underdeveloped as compared to its predecessor. It may be a product of intention or just an inability to replicate the depth and penetration of *Separation*, or maybe they just got lazy. I can't tell. Musically, the two are very alike. More keys and layers show up on Boys and Girls, but still something is missing.

While Boys and Girls in America is satisfying enough for any fan, critically it is a step off the pace they set. In short, we can't ever truly expect anything to be as good as it is at its best. We can only hope to get as close as possible. Grade: 7.5/10

Fergie Steps Out As The Dutchess



Fresh off a six year stint with The Black Eyed Peas and a notorious pants wetting incident, Fergie steps up and out with her solo debut album, "The Dutchess." The CD is filled with a combination of dance tracks, retro-style love songs, and sappy ballads. It's exactly the lighthearted romp we'd expect from Fergie and while the lyrics lack depth and the spelling out of words that plagues the choruses of both "Fergilicious," and "Glamorous" can get annoying, all in all the album is fun, catchy, and infectious. The album's first single "London Bridge," adds new meaning to the nursery rhyme we all loved as children. As Fergie asks the age old question: "How come every time you come around, my London, London Bridge want to go down?" Sexual innuendo, a

thumping baseline, handclaps, and a tag line from Full Metal Jacket all add flavor to this pop hit.

"Clumsy" is reminiscent of the Natalie Cole style love songs of the 1970s, and comes complete with spoken declaration: "Every time a boyfriend and I break up, my world is crushed and I'm all alone. The love bug comes right back and bites me...and I'm back."

"Mary Jane Shoes" is bursting with wonderful island rhythms that have been hijacked from Bob Marley's "No Woman, No Cry," and layers smooth harmonies over the reggae beat. Its slow build up to a *No Doubt*-like crescendo makes this tribute to the official footwear of Lolitas everywhere, quite memorable.

Some tracks like the silky smooth "Velvet," and the sugary sweet "Glamorous" are so soft and bland that listeners who aren't careful may soon find themselves asleep.

"Loosing My Ground," is an inspiring tale of self-discovery. Fergie emotionally inquires: "Where do I go? What do I do? Who do I turn to? I'm losing my ground. Who am I now? Where does it end? How did it all begin? I'm loosing my ground."

"Pedestal" is one the standout tracks on the album. Fergie sings in a childlike girlish voice to the tune of the London Bridge nursery rhyme: "Pedestal is falling down, falling down,

It appears that Nintendo is working hard to end its current console failures. The past decade hasn't been good for Nintendo as their last two home console systems: the Nintendo 64 (N64) and the Nintendo GameCube (GCN) were unsuccessful against their competitors.

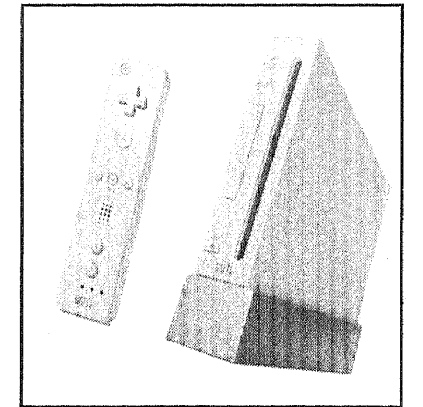
Nintendo is hoping that will all change now with their newest home console: the Nintendo Wii. According to Nintendo of America President Reggie Fils-Amis: "Our strategy is based on one core belief: That the next step in gaming is bringing gaming back to the masses." One thing that Nintendo is gambling heavily on is their new controller. Believing that large controllers with lots of buttons is ok for experience gamers, but turns off new ones. Nintendo decided to make a simpler controller that looks more like a remote control rather than a video game controller and is motion sensitive to create more innovative gameplay experiences.

Since the release of the Super NES, Nintendo has been infamous for only having a very small number of games available at launch. That all changes for the Nintendo Wii

as a total of 24 games will be ready on the November 19 launch. That's the most since the launch of Nintendo's original home console: the NES, which had 20 games at launch and all of them, were made by Nintendo.

While the Wii has 24 games at launch, only a mere 5 games are being release by Nintendo. This means that Nintendo is taking third-party support very seriously unlike the N64 and GCN which both had a lacking amount of it. Currently, 11 game developers have made commitments to make games for the Wii. Many of them are among some of the biggest names in video games. They are: Activision, Atari, Atlus, Electronic Arts, Konami, Majesco, Midway, Sega, THQ, Ubisoft, and VU Games.

Having strong games available at launch is always important and the Wii will have plenty. Nintendo is expecting *Zelda: Twilight Princess* to be its killer app for you to



want to buy the Wii. Other big titles include: Call of Duty 3 and Tony Hawk's Downhill Jam from Activision, Electronic Arts' Madden NFL 2007 and Need for Speed: Carbon, and Ubisoft's Rayman 4 and Red Steel. In the first six months, Nintendo will have three of its biggest franchise available for the new console with *Metroid Prime 3: Corruption*, *Super Mario Galaxy*, and *Pokemon: Battle Revolution*. Sega will have *Sonic* and the *Secret Rings* ready in that time as well.

Nintendo is working hard to make the Wii stand out and they are including many on-line features that give the system a very similar feel to the Xbox 360's Xbox Live. One feature of the Wii is the Mii Channel which is a feature made to be a "Profile". The user can select from several pre-made caricatures or create their own so that it can look like them or make themselves look like Hulk Hogan, Ash Ketchum from *Pokemon*, or someone else. Although the character will appear cartoonish so don't expect to make any ultra realistic look-

alikes. Still, the character you create can be used in several different Wii games and can also be downloaded to your Wii controller and play as the character you created on a friend's Wii. How cool is that?

There will also be a news channel to allow users to access the latest news headlines and current events as well as a Forecast Channel to receive the latest weather updates. You'll also have a photo channel to store your digital photos and have access to the internet too. There is also the Wii Play History which automatically records details of what game was played, when and for how long. This feature is also similar to what Xbox Live currently has. The Virtual Console still remains the best of these features letting you play classic Nintendo games from the past. You'll be able to buy these games based on a point system: NES games are 500 points (\$5), Super NES games 800 points (\$8), and N64 games 1000 points (\$10).

Yet some questions remain. The Wii is reliant on its unique control scheme, and it remains to be seen how well the bulk of the console's titles will effectively utilize it. Titles like *Wii Sports* may be fun for several minutes, but what about a game like *Zelda: Twilight Princess* or *Marvel: Ultimate Alliance* that takes over 30-plus hours to complete? These are serious issues that the Wii must be able to overcome.

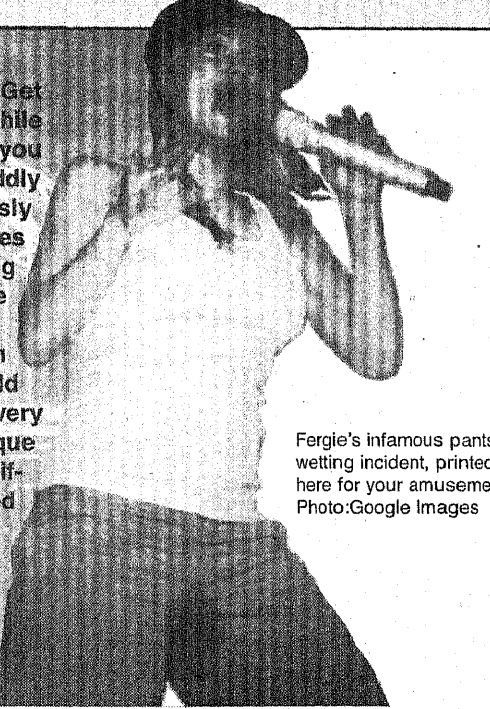

Dolphins Go Down Fighting

Queens, NY- The seventh-seeded CSI Men's Soccer team lost to the second-seeded Baruch College Bearcats 3-1 Wednesday night at the Metropolitan Oval. The CUNYAC Quarter-Final loss eliminates them for the playoffs.

Despite the loss, the Dolphins played hard for the entire game even with the referee's call always seeming to go against them. save. "It's a totally different game if they don't score that goal with twenty seconds left," defender Joseph Fassari said. "It took so much out of us. They were all excited and we had our heads down because we wanted to have the lead."

Btsh played a solid game and the game ended with him totaling thirteen saves.

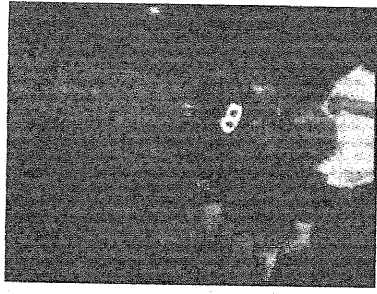

Baydal Breaks Through

As the two-time defending CUNY Conference women's soccer champion CSI Dolphins prepare for the final stretch run toward the playoffs, Captain Lauren Baydal guarantees, "We are definitely winning CUNY."

A statement like this is commonplace for Baydal. Always confident of her abilities both on and off the soccer field, this little blond-haired fire-cracker is never short on self-belief or words.

Baydal started playing organized soccer at the age of twelve, a relatively late age to begin. A natural at the sport, her inexperience gave way to her talent. As she gained more and more experience, she was soon on par with the other girls who had played since they were five.

A few years later in high school, Baydal had no trouble making the varsity team at Staten Island Tech. It was here where she first encountered injury. After attempting a header, a player from the opposing team came down low and knocked Baydal's legs out from underneath her. She landed hard and awkwardly on her right knee. "I either strained or tore every ligament in my knee," she said. "I gave it some time to heal but constant knee on knee collisions and just wear and tear kept it from healing fully. Last year I found out that I tore some stuff in my hip caused by my weak knee."

Injuries would follow Baydal throughout the rest of her athletic career. "Right now I'm playing with a strained MCL," said Baydal. "I ripped my knee apart in high school and have never really been healthy since."

Wrapped in her sub-five foot, ninety pound frame beats the heart of a stubborn warrior. Game after game, Baydal typically plays as the smallest player on the field. Bumping elbows and kicking shins with girls often twice her size, she has become accustomed to playing with pain.

Lauren Baydal lives life like she plays soccer, hard. Right now, she balances schoolwork, soccer, an internship at Lifetime Television, and working as a server at an Island restaurant. Still, her scholastic résumé is as impressive as her soccer record.

She has been a member of the Emerging Leaders Program, the Scholastic Athletic Committee, a regular on the Dean's List and the 4.0 List. All while winning MVP honors during last year's CUNYAC playoffs.

The road to CSI success was not an easy one for Baydal. She graduated from Staten Island Technical High School in 2001 and her hard work earned her a scholarship to Pace University.

Her first year at the university was a difficult one. A change in lifestyle, a serious illness and a series of unfortunate miscommunications caused her cumulative GPA to fall just barely below the level required by her scholarship. As a

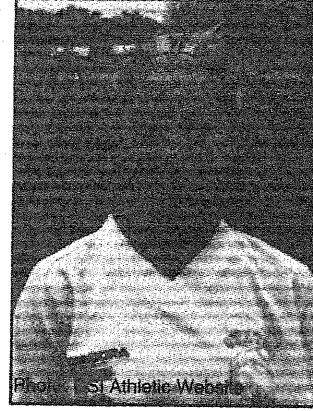
result, she lost her scholarship and left Pace University. "It was disappointing what happened at Pace," she said. "All these things kept happening that were out of my control. But life goes on and so did I."

"I didn't want to go to CSI," said Baydal. "I thought of it as a dead end." So she went to work for a Manhattan temp agency, but became

unhappy with her career prospects. She gritted her teeth and enrolled at CSI. "When I first got here, I hated it. I didn't think I belonged. I was doing well but I just wanted to go to my classes and go home."

A chance encounter with an old teammate changed the course for the rest of her time at CSI. She was persuaded to join the CSI soccer team. "I hadn't played for two years," she said. "Once I started playing again, I fell in love with it all over again. I knew almost everyone on the team. We had either played with or against each other throughout high school and now we were all on the same team."

November 5th is the Hudson Valley Championship game. For Baydal and the rest of the seniors on the Dolphins, this will be the last chance they will ever wear the CSI blue and white. "It's really sad," she said. "I hope we all get together to play in a winter league. We do this because we love it."
