CSI Marks Ninth Anniversary of the Tragedy of 9/11

White clouds and blue skies were the backdrop for the College of Staten Island's September 11th remembrance and reflection program at the World Trade Center Memorial.

The audience, comprised of students, faculty, staff, and alumni, gathered at the Memorial Garden, whose focal point is two steel girders from the towers for the brief and poignant program.

Dr. William Fritz, Provost and Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs opened the ceremony with greetings from CSI President Tomás Morales, adding "This is a campus where students come to fulfill their dreams and to gain skills to complete their career goals; the irony is that we are here to remember and honor those whose careers and dreams were cut short." Fritz noted that Staten Island and the CSI campus were particularly impacted, adding that "CSI

The Emerging World's Economic Rise

Since the global financial crisis began in late 2007, the only bastions of steady economic growth have been emerging market nations. In the past, the developed economies of the United States, the European Union, and Japan have been the forces behind the direction of the global economy. However, the global economic scene is changing profoundly. We are currently in the early stages of a significant shift occurring in the balance of economic power.

If current trends in the global economy continue, there is little doubt that the 21st century will not be an Asian Century, as cited by numerous policy makers and academics. With rapidly growing middle classes, vast populations relative to the developed world, and budding domestic industries, some emerging countries are poised to overtake the developed nations in terms of overall gross domestic product within the next few decades.

A good example of the emerging world's rising status is China's recent dethroning of Japan as the world's second largest economy. Only a decade earlier, China's economy was roughly half the size of Japan's, but huge economic gains over the past few years have helped China solidify its title as a chief player in the global economy. China's rapid industrialization has made it a leader in many sectors of the global economy and as a result, has drastically changed how the world does business, especially in the manufacturing sector.

Today, China is not only the world's second largest economy, but also one of the world's largest creditor nations and holds hundreds of billions of dollars in United States debt. In effect, China has been a lifeline for the United States through its purchase of our debt, financing myriad government expenditures from the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan to entitlement payments to seniors.

However, if the current fiscal situation in the States is not remedied by lowering our dependence on foreign creditors to finance our ballooning expenses, China's economic influence will most likely increase with its holdings of our debt. This is just one of many examples which point to the emerging world's growing economic and political strength.

As a result of China's staggering economic gains over the past three decades, there has been much speculation about how long it will take China to eclipse the United States to become the world's largest economy. Estimates from various companies and think tanks vary when it comes to specifics but each points to a world in which China will be the largest economy within the next few decades.

PricewaterhouseCoopers, one of the world's largest professional services firms says China will take the United States' spot as top economic power in as soon as 2020. On the other hand, Jim O'Neil, who is the Chief Economist of Goldman Sachs, recently said China will overtake the United States by 2027.

These estimates point to a strong likelihood of a radically different world in a relatively short time frame. In addition to China, countries like India, Brazil, Indonesia, and South Africa are growing

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Alif: The First Letter in Arabic

Now among the modern languages, CUNY College of Staten Island is offering Arabic classes.

Baruch College, Brooklyn College, City College, Hunter College, Medgar Evers College, Queens College, have been offering varying courses in Arabic including Arabic literature, Arabic script, Arabic cinema, Muslim culture and dialects of a few Muslim countries. ARB 214 Advanced Communication Skills in Arabic, will comprise of a deep exploration of written and oral expression through composition, translation, oral reports, and critical study of Arabic grammar based on the analysis of selected literary and cultural materials, as stated in course description.

Born and raised in Egypt and educated in Egypt as well as abroad, Professor Mohamed Badr was leading the Arabic Program at Berlitz Wall Street for three years. First professor to teach Arabic at CSI, he has taught Arabic at Columbia University. Additionally, with a Bachelor's in English Literature, Professor Badr has spent seven years teaching English in Egypt at private US-funded schools and has received numerous Teacher Achievement Awards.

"It is the main language in the Middle East which has substantial political and economical weight worldwide," said Professor Badr, "most importantly, it will build bridges of communication between Staten Islanders and the Arab world."

"I feel that Arabic is a language that is still overlooked by many people. I'm interested in learning Arabic because besides learning another language I want to be able to learn about the Middle East and North Africa. As an English major I'm interested in literature from different cultures including Arabic literature," said a CSI student.

CSI offers American Sign Language, Chinese, French, Italian and Spanish, and from now on Arabic. Students who wish to learn Arabic will not need an e-permit to take this language at other CUNY colleges. However, "this is the pilot project to see how much demand there is for the language," said Professor Badr, when asked why is it starting from an advanced level and not introductory.

Manufactured Mosques

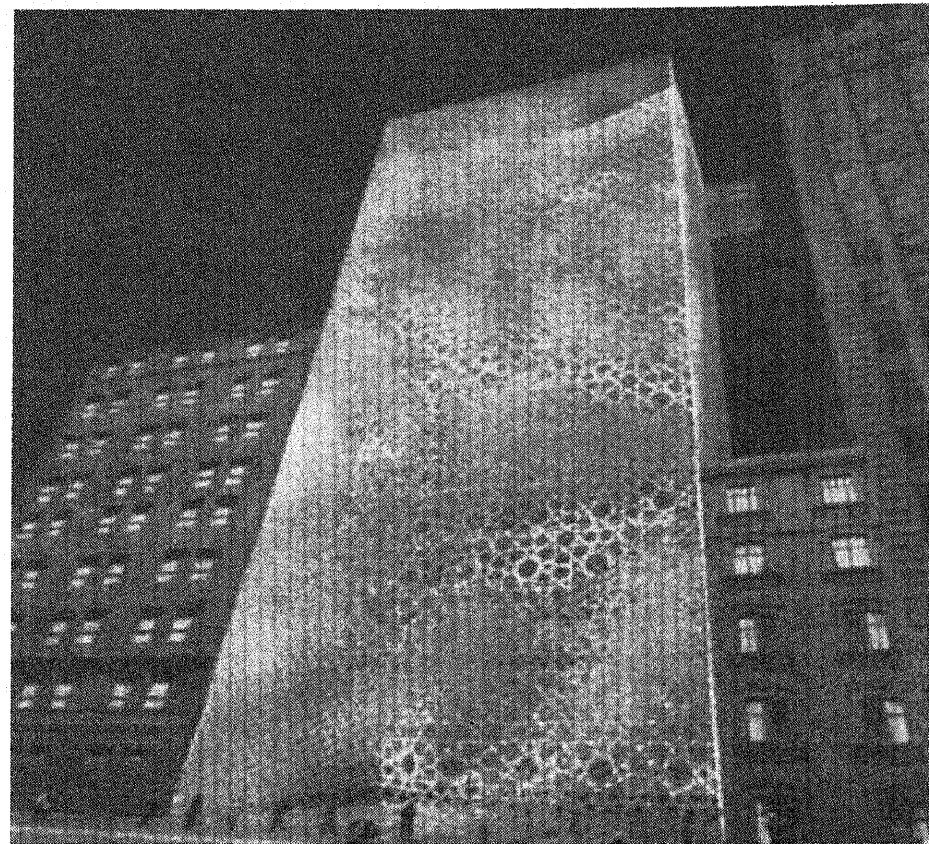

at brisk paces. These nations will change the economic landscape of the world as they and their citizens build not only wealth, but also political power.

Brazil, like China, is a quintessential example of an emerging economy growing at a staggering pace. According to the article "Brazil's booming economy - Flying too high for safety" from The Economist, "New skyscrapers are going up along Avenida Faria Lima in the business district of São Paulo. Sales of computers and cars are booming, while a glut of passengers has clogged the main airports. Brazil created 962,000 new formal-sector jobs between January and April—the highest figure for these months since records began in 1992. Everything indicates that over the past six months the economy has grown at an annualised pace of over 10%. Even allowing for an expected slackening, many analysts forecast that growth in 2010 will be 7%—the highest rate since 1986." The economic expansion that Brazil is currently undergoing is quite profound, even with deflationary pressures afflicting the major economies; Brazil keeps expanding its industries at a swift pace.

Emerging nations are rapidly growing even as the developed world painful-

ly struggles to get their economies back on track. However, even though these industrializing nations are growing, that doesn't mean that their economies are not filled with economic uncertainty.

There are multiple factors in each economy that could easily halt economic growth. Potential political instability, poor demand from the export sector, or weak growth in domestic consumption could all derail economic growth in any emerging economy. Additionally, such a stall could bring about a serious downturn as the emerging economies are not as structurally sound as developed countries like the United States or Germany, even though they seem to be the drivers of the global economy at this juncture.

Consequently, the major emerging economies have been centers of growth, but are still subject to all the potential risks of any nation still in the early stages of development. That being said, these countries still have huge growth potential and many decades of economic growth until they reach that potential. As a result, these countries will most likely continue to grow in both economic and diplomatic influence over the next few years.

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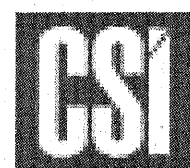

Program Gives Hong Kong Visitors a Chance to Intern in the U.S.

The CSI Center for International Service's Summer Professional Internship has recently given six students from the City University of Hong Kong the opportunity to intern for approximately six weeks in a local businesses or not-for-profit organizations.

Yi Ming Lam, a Junior studying Communications who interned at the Staten Island Museum, said, "This experience is beyond my imagination...I never thought that I'd get [an internship] as good as this one. The [museum] was fabulous. They were willing to teach and guide me...This experience helps me to develop my future career in my field of study, communications, and I think it's important to me to know what's going on on the other side of the world."

Hoi Ling Lee, a senior majoring in English for Professional Communications who interned at Staten Island Community Television, enjoyed learning something new. "I knew nothing about [television] before starting my internship, so whatever I do at the TV station is something new to me. I learned a lot of things about TV production. This is a new field for me, a new industry that I've never gained any exposure to. Now I'm thinking maybe I can enter this industry later on."

Junman Huang, a senior Political Science major who interned at Mary's Pence, a Catholic organization that works toward empowering women through economic

independence, added "I learned a lot of things in New York like the culture and the working attitude that the people here have."

Other participants in the program were Man Lai Lam, a sophomore Communications major who interned at CSI's Staten Island Small Business Association; Qing Shi, a senior Media and Communications major who interned at DesignAmerica; and Po Kwan Ho, a sophomore in Policy Studies and Administration who interned at College Bound.

The goal of this pilot program is to enhance the students' English language skills, while giving them the chance to experience what it is like to work in the U.S. The students, who arrived last June, received two days of training regarding working in the U.S. Most of them worked an almost full-time schedule and stayed in private homes.

The Center's Victoria Cox, who spent a lot of time with the students, commented, "My experience with these six tremendously gifted City University of Hong Kong students has been wonderfully enriching for me personally, from my perspective as their educator in the EPP [English Proficiency Program] class and later serving as their internship business mentor. It has been a joy for me to watch these students successfully navigate the somewhat tricky terrain of the world of work, and cheer them on through victories and occasional setbacks. Transitioning from student to professional can be difficult for any university student, but to overcome the added complexity of working in a foreign American land with different customs, mores, and language, not to mention working through the difficulties with the MTA/Staten Island public transportation system, is a tremendous achievement for all six of them."

Summing up the program, Barbara Clark, Assistant Director of the Center for International Service, noted, "We have been very pleased with the 2010 Professional Internship program for The City University of Hong Kong students. Not only has the experience strengthened the interns' understanding of the world of work here in the United States, but it also has helped us build new relationships with the Staten Island community, as well as strengthened our ties with the City University of Hong Kong. Judging from the final presentations given by the interns, their experiences here in Staten Island and at CSI have been life-changing. We certainly hope to continue the program next year."

CSI President Honored with Lifetime Achievement Award

President Morales received the NYLPRW's Lifetime Achievement Award in Education for his longstanding efforts in supporting traditionally underserved and underrepresented groups, including notably Puerto Rican women, gain access to higher education. The City University of New York's (CUNY) Senior Vice Chancellor Jay Hershenson presented the award to President Morales.

The NYLPRW is a non-profit organization dedicated to assisting Puerto Rican women in their pursuit of higher

education by providing them with the financial support necessary to obtain a college degree. The proceeds of the 2010 College Awards Gala Dinner Dance went toward the funding of their College Awards Program. The League's College Awards offer a \$1,000 scholarship toward each Puerto Rican undergraduate woman selected for her academic excellence and service.

One of this year's undergraduate award recipients was Jennifer Villaran, a CSI sophomore who was recognized for her academic excellence as well as her efforts in giving back to the community. Ms. Villaran has tutored middle school and high school students at the Hope Gardens Community Center and has helped raise money for the Kuleba Exchange for the college education of students in Rwanda who have survived

genocide.

In accepting the Lifetime Achievement Award in Education, President Morales thanked the NYLPRW, its President Edith Padilla, and the Board of Directors for the tremendous work they do in helping Puerto Rican women pursue higher education and transforming their lives in the process. With hopes for "CSI to develop a full Arabic language program," one student is already considering future options and wants to "learn Arabic to study in Dubai and possibly teach there for a few years."

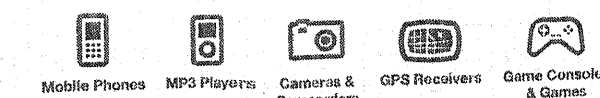
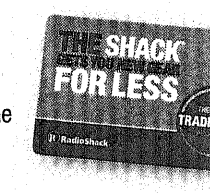
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A Fresh Look at Scholarships

If you think your grades aren't good enough to qualify for a scholarship, think again, says Sussie Gyamfi, BMCC's scholarship coordinator.

"Students often labor under the misconception that there's no point even applying for a scholarship if their GPA isn't at least 3.0," she says. "While grades are important, scholarships are often based on a range of factors, such as financial need, campus activities, special talents and skills, and community involvement. Grades may be only part of the picture, and well-rounded students sometimes have an advantage over those with higher GPAs."

A wealth of possibilities

In addition to scholarships offered by the BMCC Foundation, financial aid is available from many outside organizations and even, in many cases, from the employers of students' parents. BMCC Foundation scholarships for full-time students require a 3.0 GPA and provide \$2,800 a year; scholarships for part-time students require a 3.3 GPA and pay \$1,440 a year. But criteria for scholarships available from other sources vary widely and may or may not include GPA thresholds.

"It doesn't matter whether you're a full- or part-time student, a U.S. citizen or undocumented," says Gyamfi. "Don't take yourself out of the running because you've simply decided you don't have a chance." The mission of the scholarship office, she adds, "is to ensure that every eligible BMCC student seeks out and applies for a scholarship."

When it comes to researching scholarships, starting early is critical. "Completing the application can take time, and there are deadlines for filing," Gyamfi says. "Don't wait till the last minute to pull

your paperwork together, get your recommendation letters and write your essay. Also, be aware that if you apply and are selected this semester and you're awarded a scholarship, it won't be till next semester—or possibly next year—that you'll receive money."

First things first

As a first step, she encourages incoming freshmen to visit the scholarship office as soon as possible—"ideally on their first day of classes"—and schedule an appointment to see her. "I can provide you with a list of useful web sites and walk you through the search process," she says. Starting early and enlisting Gyamfi's guidance "will definitely increase your chances," she adds. "We can brainstorm about the types of scholarship you might be eligible for and the best ways to apply for them." She also encourages students to set aside time at least once a week to search online and be aware of application deadlines.

Students are sometimes overwhelmed by the prospect of having to write an essay and wind up not applying. "That's a mistake," says Gyamfi. "In most cases, all that's required is a brief statement articulating your goals and dreams and the qualities that you feel set you apart." In any event, she maintains a list of faculty members who are willing to edit application essays. "But, again, get to them early, so you know they'll be available," she advises.

While the competition for scholarships can be intense, Gyamfi says, "There are ways to improve your chances. The important thing is to start early, think ahead and talk to me. I'm here to help."

Fed Report Finds Signs That Growth Is Slowing

The United States economy showed "widespread signs" of slowing, the Federal Reserve said on Wednesday, though modest growth continued from mid-July through the end of August.

The latest regional survey by the 12 district Federal banks, known as the beige book, described an economy in which many sectors, from consumer spending to manufacturing, continued to expand. But there were also "widespread signs of a deceleration," the report said.

In at least five of the 12 Fed districts — New York, Philadelphia, Atlanta, Chicago and Richmond, Va. — conditions were "mixed" or had slowed, the report said.

"It suggests we are not going into a double dip, but it just suggests we are slowing," John Canally, an economist for LPL Financial, said of the report. "It tells me the Fed is on hold for a very long time. There is no indication here that they are worried about wages or prices getting out of control."

The publication, which is based on information supplied by business con-

tacts in the different regions, confirms the thrust of much of the economic data in the last month that has shown a sluggish pace to the recovery. Gross domestic product has been revised downward to 1.6 percent from 2.4 percent for the second quarter and the housing market has slumped.

In its report, the Fed said the economy had continued to pick up, but that growth had been uneven and in some regions, had started to slow.

"I think there has been a change in perception that the economy has turned the corner and put aside a lot of these fears of a double-dip recession," said Michael Dueker, head economist for North America at Russell Investments.

"People might be dismayed at the slow rate of recovery of the economy, but at the same time people are starting to realize the economy has turned the corner," he said.

Brian Bethune, IHS Global Insight's chief United States financial economist, said the "frank description" by the Fed of widespread deceleration "suggests a great deal of concern about the direction of the economy."

Federal Reserve officials signaled in August that their confidence in the recov-

ery had dimmed, and took measures to keep interest rates low and encourage growth. With short-term interest rates already close to zero, Fed officials announced plans to use the proceeds from the central bank's huge mortgage bond portfolio to buy long-term government debt.

Ben S. Bernanke, the chairman of the Federal Reserve, said in Jackson Hole, Wyo., last month that the central bank was determined to prevent the economy from slipping into a cycle of falling wages and prices, and that he expected modest growth in the second half of the year to expand in 2011.

The survey touched on many of the topics that have concerned the markets since the start of the recession, like the effect of household debt and the housing market on the economy.

The Federal Open Market Committee, which sets monetary policy, is to meet on Sept. 21.

The survey found that consumer spending, which is crucial because it dominates the overall economy and because of its implications for the job market, appeared to increase even though there was an emphasis on essential and lower-priced goods with limited spending on big-ticket items.

Generally, most districts reported that retail sales picked up, though not in Atlanta, New York and Dallas, where they either slowed or declined.

A separate report from the Fed showed that consumer borrowing fell in July as the use of credit cards continued to shrink. Borrowing declined at an annual rate of

\$3.6 billion in July, the 17th drop over the last year and a half. The fall compared with a \$1 billion decline in June.

According to the beige book, manufacturing expanded in most districts. A rise in manufacturing has been a bright spot in the recovery because it is considered a portent of possible hiring.

The survey noted modest improvements in credit quality, according to reports from financial institutions, and found that loan demand was lower or generally stable.

Upward price pressures remained limited for most categories of goods and services, although they were higher for such commodities as grains, according to the Dallas and San Francisco districts, and industrial materials, the survey said.

Several districts, including Atlanta, Chicago, San Francisco and Kansas City, Mo., reported that businesses absorbed higher costs to avoid passing them on to consumers.

Wage pressures were also limited. The survey said that over all, the pressures remained modest, with most of the districts that commented on wages reporting that there was little or no upward pressures or increases.

But there were exceptions. Dallas, for example, said that wage pressures were nonexistent, except for airline and temporary workers. Wage pressures inched up in Boston, Chicago and Kansas City as employers dealt with a mismatch in skills between the available positions and the applicants.

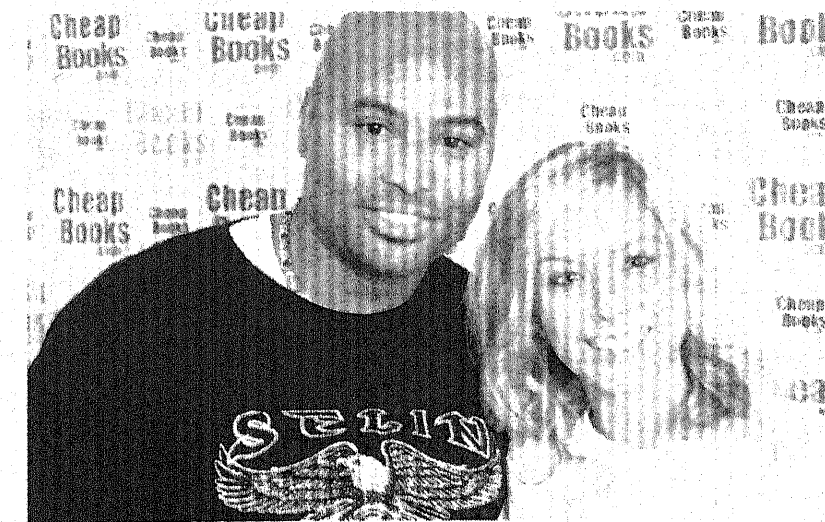

book buyback companies. Pricing was researched using the CheapBooks.com price comparison service, restricted to the US region.

For the week of March 1st, 2010, if a student were to rent all 142 books for 1

semester, the student would have spent \$3,681.11. If the student were to purchase the books new, and return them with an online buyback, the cost would be as low as \$2,558.08 and as high as \$2,794.06. Used books would cost the

student as low as \$1,846.19 and as high as \$2,002.82. With an optimal purchasing plan, including purchases of used textbooks with an online buyback, students would save approximately 50% buying books and selling them back, as opposed to the higher cost of renting books.

"We provide students with the tools to make an informed decision", said David Tiberio, Chief Executive Officer of CheapBooks.

CheapBooks, the international leader in textbook price comparison services, provides students with an easy way to compare prices for used books, new books, rental books, ebooks, and textbook buybacks. The defending World Series Champion, the New York Yankees, seem to be a lock to make the playoffs this year, leading American League East.
