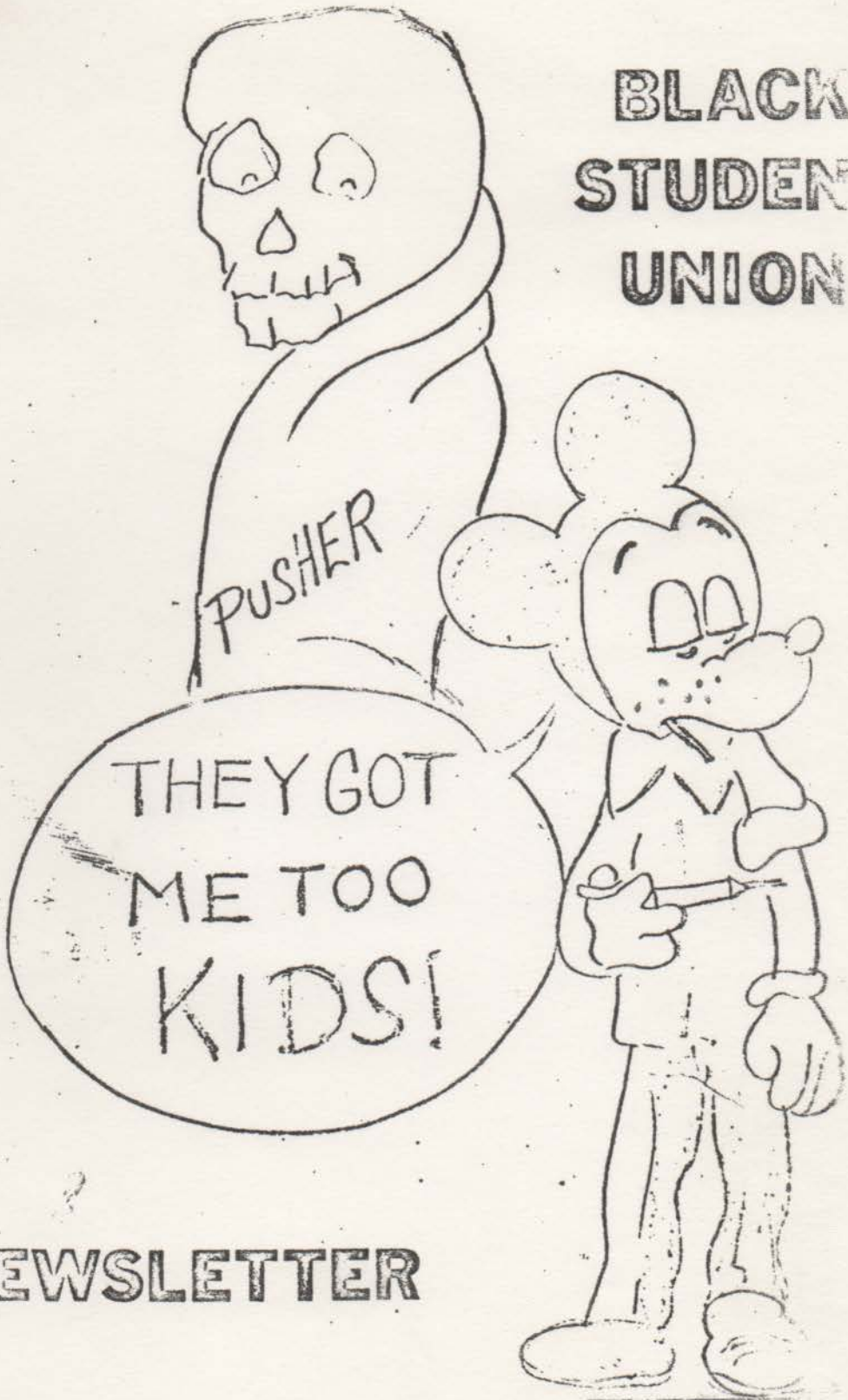

WE ARE AN AFRICAN PEOPLE

For many years I have believed there was just reason for Black Americans not recognizing Africans and other Black foreigners as Brothers and Sisters. Africans and West Indian thought themselves better than Blacks in this country, I was told. Blacks here felt no real need to be friendly with foreign peoples. We felt we (Black Americans) were being denied our culture by these foreign asimilationists. After all, only hand-picked Africans were allowed to come to this country. The government invited these people, and we readily assumed a mistrust for foreigners, knowing what the government thought about Black people in general. Black people in America were being told Africans don't like you, Africans don't wear afros and Africans have their own country and Black Americans don't. These falsities and the inward attitude of many Africans I met helped to cultivate my rejection of the foreign student. They were not my Brothers or Sisters, they seemed to enjoy the company of whites as opposed to Blacks.

The foreign student problem was forced to the deep recesses of my mind. I made excuses for not attempting to organize foreign students in our Black collective. Though I tried to forget I never truly gave up on the idea of "INTERNATIONAL NATIONALISM" and hope to see this manifested in the present BLACK STUDENT UNION. This is the

primary purpose of the newly formed "INTERNATIONAL COMMITTEE" of the BLACK STUDENT UNION. This committee was set up because many blacks students feel a need for total BLACK unity. Many of us have witnessed functional unity between Africans and Black Americans. At Lincoln University (Penn.) I saw foreign students with political sophistication and unity as their goal. I met foreign students who wanted to set the record straight in terms of reality, that being both foreign and american students were misinformed. Separation was only a means of preventing functional unity. The BLACK STUDENT UNION has therefore developed the International Committee in an effort to bring about Black unity. We are attempting to unite the different fractions of the Black community first, hoping this will supply the much needed knowledge to unite the entire college community at SICC.

The INTERNATIONAL COMMITTEE of the BLACK STUDENT UNION has been established with Oti Dabor, as its first chairman. The chairman of this committee will also serve on the Central Committee. This brother is an African and has expressed the need for all Black students to unite. This committee will succeed and it marks the BLACK STUDENT UNION'S first move toward Black unity and Black Power at Staten Island Community College.

Pest Control: One Year Later

The Pest Control program was started by a group of students at S.I.C.C. who wanted to force the college to relate to the community in which it was located. These Brothers opened an office in the community and financed it with personal funds and a grant of \$5,000 from the S.I. Corp. The college had cleared its conscience and the Pest Control was on its way, no one really knew where. After one year of operations the Pest Control Program is in need of more funds in an effort to expand its services. The expansion ideas come from communication with more than 1,500 families in the Staten Island area, serviced by the Pest Control Corp.

The Pest Control is asking donations from all interested parties, students, teachers, administrators, BSU, SGA, PRO, CCC and anyone wanting to help. Donations may be sent directly to - Staten Island Community Pest Control Corp. 997 Castleton Ave., Staten Island, NY. The Program needs your help to continue. This is the best program students have ever developed.

The Pest Control Program is trying to set up extermination groups in other communities. We are presently working with N.Y.C. Comm. College and Fordham Univ. We must grow in order to be relevant. We can only grow if people care. Support Pest Control...we support the community.

Brothers and Sisters Fight Sickle Cell

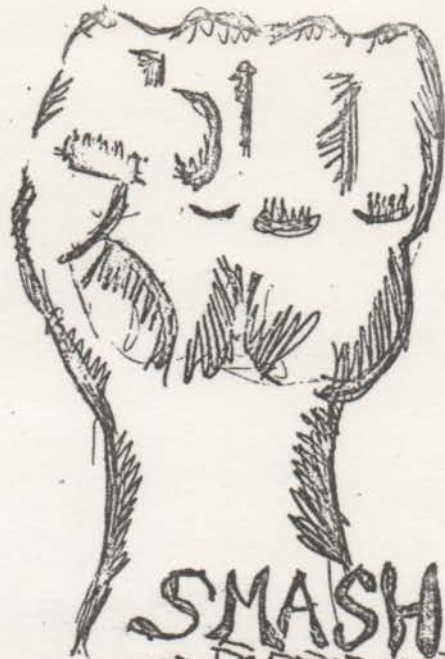
Sickle Cell Anemia is the result of the physical deformity of red cells following altered aggregation of hemoglobin molecules within the cell. The tiny blood vessels called capillaries in the human body serves as a metabolizing cell. Sickle Cell Anemia causes a reduction in oxygen and the production of acids such as carbons and lactic acids. The cell becomes shaped due to the aggregate of the hemoglobin resulting in Sickle Cell Anemia Disease. Though not life threatening sickle cell ~~does~~ not restrict the freedom of its victim to participate in a wide range of life activities. It is relevant among people of the black race and those whites who originate from the mediterranean countries of Europe. The following is an outline of the program of the committee: (1) Headed by the Biology Dept. Head of S.I.C.C.. (2) Plan to test students for Sickle Cell Anemia on request. (3) Blood typing (4) There will be a Sickle Cell Anemia day on Dec. 7th.
