The works of the clubs have, therefore, benefited not only the members of the clubs, but have had a positive influence on all those who attend S.I.C.C.

There are also many cultural activities on campus, lending to both the enlightenment and entertainment of the student body. These include parties, charity balls, dramatic presentations, lectures and demonstrations. Scholarship funds are provided by various organizations, as well.








The paper has won both national and local awards and is a publication that S.I.C.C. will long be proud of.





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
INTRAMURAL SPORTS

We didn't even mind the possibility of falling through the basement floor!

But those days are gone. They were nostalgic and happy days, days when the complex which we call Staten Island Community College were so apple-pie-simple that we could almost wish we were back there. There was an air about the place that made us feel at home and forget about its crumbling antiquity.
