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



Another CSI organization that was involved in this event was WSIA. WSIA had a table set up outside that gave away free items to any student that donated blood. The items, which included records ,stickers and posters, were donated by the music band 'Corrosion of Conformity.' HUNDREDS 'MAKE STRIDES' AGAINST BREAST CANCER


Over eight hundred people participated in the Walk-A-Thon to help fight against breast cancer Sunday, October 22nd. This five mile walk took place at Clove Lakes Park. The day started out with a two hour registration period starting at 9:00 a.m.

As people stood on line to register, they were given a chance to get information about breast cancer from various tables setup outside. Those organizations participating in the Making Strides Event were Doctor's Hospital, Bayley Seton Hospital, The American Cancer Society, and Regional Radiology. Each table was set up information regarding Mammograms, how to conduct self examinations, and other relevant Breast Cancer material. These tables also gave away a number of free items spanning from pens to free tee-sheets for all participants in the day's events. Angel Defeo from Regional Radiology commented, "It's important for woman to have breast exams." Kathy Quattrocchi, also from Regional Radiology said, "We are just happy that the sun is shining, just like the breast cancer survivors that are here today."

The walk began promptly at 11:00 a.m. In attendance from CSI was Professor Arlene Farren from the Nursing Department and Chairperson of the Nursing Department Professor Reese. Professor Farren said, "We are proud to be here representing the College of Staten Island and the Nursing Department." Professor Reese said, "There are some nursing students here taking part in the walk. The ones that could not make it made financial donations to this cause."

CSI's own Sigma Delta Tau also participated in this event. Member of Sigma Delta Tau, Summer Goldman came with her sister Terra Purtell and her mother Sharon Ryan-Coil who is a breast cancer survivor. The mother and daughter team practically

ran the five mile walk around Clove Lakes Park. Ms. Goldman's mother, Sharon Ryan spoke to reporters after the walk was completed. "I am a third generation breast cancer survivor. I did this walk for my two daughters and for all of the thousands of othe woman out there who are suffering from breast cansaid Ms. Rvan. Another member of Sigma Delta Tau who participated in the day's events was Danielle Barone . "I par-



ticipated today because it is a good cause. I am a woman and I had some family members that had breast cancer,"commented Ms. Barrone.

Drama Club Fears Future

The Drama Club, in association with One Man Productions, is putting on a production of *One Flew Over The Cuckoo's Nest*. The play, directed by Christopher E. Gonzales, will be performed at the Williamson Theater on November 20th and 22nd at 8 p.m., and on the 23rd at 3 p.m. and 8 p.m.

The Drama Club teaches students through hands-on experience, with everything overseen by a professional.

With the help of other students, the club's members have struggled to continue their work in theatrical production. One Man Production is the product of their hard work. It was formed out of the Drama Club and has been able to withstand the difficulties created by the shortage of theatre faculty. The club's president, Christopher E. Gonzales, feels that the theatre is threatened by the possibility of not having enough money for next term's theatrical productions. "We would like more students to get involved with the Drama Club and the production," Gonzales said. "We want to encourage the academic environment of the theatre through hands-on experience."

He continued, "From the school administration, we would like acknowledgment and continued support for the organization that is striving to continue in terms of funds and facilities for our future productions. We are not going anywhere; we're here to stay whether our support is here or somewhere else."

New Theatre, New Production

A production of Arthur Miller's The *Crucible* will christen the College of Staten Island's new Laboratory Theatre. The new theatre is located in the Center for the Arts (Building 1-P), and the play will run from November 13th to the 16th. *The Banner* was able to speak with the Director, Dr. Robert Hulton-Baker, about the play.

Dr. Hulton-Baker is the Coordinator of the Program in Dramatic Arts. He has directed several premieres, Shakespeare's *Othello* and *Twelfth Night*, and Arthur Miller's *All My Sons*. "So this is a Miller festival for me," he said. Dr. Hulton-Baker is thrilled about working in the Laboratory Theatre, or what has been dubbed "the black box".

He explained the difference between a regular and a Laboratory Theatre. "A regular theatre has fixed seating, and raised stage enclosed with a proscenium arch." He added that since this is the inaugural production, "everything is new in the Theatre. The lights, sound, everything."

"It's a very exciting opportunity, not only because of the new technology, but also the Laboratory Theatre is a completely flexible space," he said. By flexible space, he means, "there are a number of arrangements in staging and seating." Dr. Hulton-Baker likes the theatre because it helps with the production's image of *The Crucible*.

The play is about how revenge can get out of hand. It takes place in Salem, Massachusetts during what is known as the "Witch Trials" in the Sevententh Century. Arthur Miller was using it as a metaphor for the McCarthy era, to show how people always believe the worst about others. The young girls of the town are led by one character, Abigail Williams, who has had an affair with a respected member of the town, Mr. Proctor. Together the young girls accuse all dreaded vagrants, and especially Mrs. Proctor, of being witches.

Dr. Hulton-Baker said the production doesn't want "to emphasize so much the political elements, as we are exploring patriarchy, exploitation, and the sexual repression aspects of the play." Where the audience is being seated is also something Dr. Hulton-Baker finds will enhance the play. "We've levitated the seats around the action to increase the focus and intensity, approximating *The Crucible* title of the play."

Dr. Hulton-Baker continued, "We have a cast of great range of experience and preparation for the roles. The age range alone is from eleven to seventy. It's wonderful to watch such a collection of people learn, teach, laugh, act, and work together. Opening night will be worth all the time they and myself put into this production."

CSI ENTERS THE WORLD OF USS

In early July, the Student Government at The College of Staten Island elected its delegates to The University Student Senate, better known as USS. With the delegates chosen, Mary Anne Christensen as the Day/Full Time delegate, and Rochelle Benguiat as the Evening/Part Time delegate, so began their journey into the larger world of USS.

The purpose of the organization is as stated in its constitutional preamble " ...to preserve the accessibility, affordability, and excellence of higher education within the City of New York, and to protect the rights of the student body and to inform when their rights are threatened, to further the cause of public higher education, and to promote general welfare of its student constituents and the

Each of the nineteen CUNY colleges elects delegates and alternates from their Student Governments, to represent and inform the students at their specific college. Some of these delegates and alternates then in turn hold positions in numerous committees. The controlling body for the USS is the Steering Committee, which is made up of nine elected delegates. The executive officer of the Steering Committee is the Chairperson, who is responsible for implementing polices and decisions of the USS. Furthermore, the Chairperson holds an important seat on the Board of Trustees, which is the controlling body for CUNY.

The hierarchy of the Committee then follows as such; the Vice-Chair for Legislative affairs, who is the principal spokesperson on legislative proceedings affecting CUNY, on City, State, and Federal levels. The Vice-Chair of Fiscal Affairs, who deals which all financial concerns facing USS. The rest of the positions are as follows: Vice-Chairs of Graduate Affairs, Senior College Affairs, Community College Affairs, Evening and Part-time Affairs, Disabled Student Affairs, and International Student Affairs. This committee is funded through 85 cents of students activity fee, and in turn represents the over 200,000 students CUNY wide.

Fearing that the College would be entangled in the vast problems of CUNY, that they fortunately did not face, traditionally CSI held only a small role in USS. Yet, with this year's new Student Government came it's commitment to become a more vocal advocate, and with the unity of its fellow CUNY students the voice of CSI students would only grow.

Through incredible work done by student advocate, Charlo Almeda, the USS was already aware of CSI's problems and of the vast work students were doing to solve them. So early on in the summer, various student leaders of CUNY visited the College to offer an open hand

William Negron, Chairperson of USS, and Steve Kleinberg, executive director of USS, toured the College in search of solutions to CSI's problems. Through countless meetings with Student Government President Joseph Canale, who became an alternate to USS, and C.S.I delegates Rochelle Benguiat and Mary Anne Christensen, the delegation established a strong bond with the USS.

The first meeting of the newly elected delegation from each of the CUNY colleges meet at the 1996 USS Student Leaders Conference in upstate New York. The three day conference held workshops on various issues such as returning student majorities to college association, CUNY child care, lobbying, and opportunities for women.

The Student Government Projects workshop, was given by Joseph Canale, in which he spoke about the various proposals that he had made to increase student involvement at CSI, and how these programs can be incorporated to other colleges.

The workshop received praise from all who attended, and placed CSI leaders in the spotlight. In between workshops, the CSI delegation meet with several other CUNY leaders in an exchange of ideas of possible solutions for problems at our campus and CUNY wide.

The nights were filled with meetings that lasted beyond dawn, with issues such as CUNY's SAFE Team, cut's to financial aid, guns on campus, and the retrench-

ment of programs. During one of these all night meetings, an organization calling themselves SNUSS(Students for a New University Student Senate), which was made up of various CUNY colleges, presented a list of CUNY's problems and their solutions.

Student leaders were asked to offer suggestions on their proposal, this in turn began an open dialog, which lasted long into the night.

The CSI delegation took part and added some important proposals which included creation of a Merchants Committee which would regulate corporations whom did business on CUNY campus, student majority of the College Association, and disability issues.

Throughout the time, CSI delegates were approached with various colleges offering there support to the College as well as the possibility of having them run for a position in the Steering Committee. In which, Joseph Canale was offered support by many Colleges to run for Chairperson of USS. Mary Anne Christensen was asked to run for Disable Student Affairs, but both turn down those positions stating that they were focusing on the problems at CSI.

The months following had the CSI delegation, traveling to numerous CUNY colleges, gaining information and making further connections with other student leaders. A number of trips were traveled to SNUSS meetings, were Joseph Canale took a lead role in many of the meetings. Issues of parking space, tickets on campus, and limited club space was brought up constantly by the CSI student leaders Rochelle Benguiat, and Mary Anne Christensen at the meetings at SNUSS.

It was further remarked by the members SNUSS how impressed they were with the CSI delegation and asked them to take part in their workings.

Meetings were held on Campus with William Negron, in which he hoped to help define CSI's future in USS and CUNY. This was done in hopes to cast a light upon the student's plight at CSI, to College Community and the Board of Trustees. While Joseph Canale spoke with the Board of Trustees Sub-Committees, and with the various vice-chancellors to gain a solution for CSI exten-

The first official meeting of the year for USS, was at Baruch College to nominate for positions on the Steering Committee. All races were contented, expect for the position of Vice-Chair of Disabled Students. In which Darryl Sally a student form the CUNY Law, held the only nomination after a strong presentation at the meeting.

The most highly contested race was that of Chairperson, the candidates were Mizonor Bizwas from City College, Maximo Javior from Baruch College, and Ifeachor Potts from Borough of Manhattan Community College. CSI Student Government President Joseph Canale was nominated for Vice-Chair of Legislative Affairs against Victor Charles of John Jay College .

The elections were held on Sunday, October 13, at LaGuardia Community College, where William Negron held Chair at his final meeting. After a continuation of the nomination speeches, the delegates voted on the various positions. The race for the Chair went up to the 3rd ballot, in which Ifeachor Potts won the election over Mizonor Bizwas, 18-15. In the race for Vice-Chair of Legislative Affairs, Joseph Canale won the election 23-9.

Additionally, Jose Peralta was elected for Vice-Chair of Fiscal Affairs, Tatek Swart was elected for Vice-Chair of Graduate Affairs, Benjamin Allen was elected for Vice-Chair of Senior College Affairs, German Flores was elected Vice-Chair for Community College Affairs, Belinda Crichlow was elected for Vice-Chair of Evening and Part-Time Affairs, Darryl Sally was elected for Vice-Chair of Disabled Students, and Anthony Andrews was elected for Vice-Chair of International Affairs.

Joseph Canale spoke on his feelings on how his position will affect CSI. "This position will give CSI a say in what happens CUNY wide. Additionally, this position will give us more bang for the buck, in terms of presence and effectiveness at CSI. This is a real opportunity for CSI, we have a chance to enact positive change that will benefit students here and CUNY wide."

These positions will take effect in November, at which time other sub-committee positions will be appointed. Unofficial meetings are continuing on throughout the month, and will continue to address CUNY's problems.

IN RELATED NEWS...

Joseph Canale recently resigned from the position of Publications Commissioner on Thursday, November 7th. A tearful Mr. Canale explained to Student Government that he was leaving Publications due to the amount of responsibilities that he is taking on in the United Student Senate [USS]. Along with his resignation, came the dissolving of the entire Publications Commission, which included Rochelle Benguit, Christopher Alvarez, and Charlo Almeda.

Mr. Canale further announced that he will remain as Acting Publications Commissioner until another person is voted in to fill the position. At the meeting, other members of Student Government also voiced their views on Canale, calling him a "dedicated servant" and wishing him well on all future endeavors. Canale has not left Student Government, however, only Publications; he will continue to serve the CSI students.

There will be a publications workshop on Thursday November 14 from 1:30 to 3:20pm in the Student Activities **Conference Room** 1C-203.

The theme of the workshop is staff recruitment, training and ethics.

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Follow Up To Near Student Arrest

In the last issue of The Banner, an article was



written about a student having an altercation with campus security. This reporter was able to speak with Martha Tejada, to get her side of the story.

First, she was never placed under arrest for reckless endangerment." Also, she was never "charged with an alleged attempted vehicular assault on Security Officer Demby." In an interview, Head of Security Gene

Martinez stated that Ms. Tejada "was not charged with any criminal charges, primarily because Officer Demby decided to have a disciplinary investigation instead." The college is investigating the case, but at this moment Ms. Tejada is not guilty of any crime.

It was stated in the previous article, the car belonged to Ms. Tejada, and was "parked in the loading dock of the Library." According to her, the car is owned by one of her friends, and it was not parked. It was idling because Ms. Tejada's friend went into the Library to make copies. Ms. Tejada was in the car waiting for her friend.

It was then stated a roadblock was put up by the exits, so the car wouldn't be allowed to leave. According to Ms. Tejada, she and her friend did not know this. They drove from the Library, to a gravel spot by Lot 4 because they had class. Security found the car and put a boot on it.

It was stated in the article, "At 9:40 pm, Tejada and an unidentified female approached the Gray Oldsmobile, but quickly turned to leave when the boot on the car was discovered." Ms. Tejada said they were going to the security office to find out why a boot was on the car. Security was staking out the car, therefore the two women did not see any in the parking lot area to ask.

In the next paragraph, Mr. Martinez is quoted saying, "This is a serious offense, when you pulled away, you almost struck the officer." Ms. Tejada does not recollect hearing that statement. Also, Ms. Tejada was not "escorted to her vehicle," and "then allowed to leave campus," as the previous article stated. Her boyfriend picked her up from the security office where she answering questions and he took her home. This was verified by Mr. Martinez.

The members of CSI's Fashion Club have decided to help themselves. Originally hindered by a lack of club activity funds and by restrictive budget rules, they decided to run a series of fundraisers to alleviate the pitiful situation they were in. Thanks to the fundraisers, the Fashion Club is now helping you too.

On October 30, the Fashion Club held its first fundraiser, offering students a wholesome meal for a fair price. There was a wide variety of food comparable to the selection one recieves at the school cafeteria. A typical meal of macaroni and cheese, baked chicken, rice, corn, and a drink cost \$3.50 at the fundraiser. Considering that the Fashion Club was unable to buy food wholesale like the school cafeteria, this is a reasonable price indeed.

The second fundraiser took place one week later on November 6. The club was offering a bagel and a cup of coffee for one dollar; the same meal costs\$1.61 at the school cafeteria.

The Fashion Club ran a fundraiser because of the amazing rules that the current student government has implemented. According to the *Rules And Regulations For Club Chartering At CSI*, clubs must abide by ridiculous rules for spending their money. For instance, a club may only spend fifty percent of its total budget on two mandatory "special events." At the moment, the Fashion Club's maximum budget is only \$700 dollars. On average, each semester's special event receives no more than \$175. In order to become chartered, a club must have at least fifteen members. This means that each student is worth less than twelve dollars a semester. (If more than fifteen people

show up to such an event, then the students are worth even less.) Any money spent on refreshments or promotional items that exceeds fifty percent of the budget will take away from the "special event" budget. "We want to do more than the budget will allow," said Fashion Club member Jessica Negri.

The Fashion Club refused to let cheap micromanagement stop them from going ahead with their plans. "Not only do we supply to students the goods and services at a lower cost, they also receive the benefit of increased activities on campus," said Fashion Club member Vincent Cobb. The club plans to promote cultural diversity through the medium of fashion.

The Fashion Club will be on display at CSI's Club Fair on November 14. The fair will take place during club hours inside the Campus Center Rotunda.

Book Stolen From Library

Clean Air/Water Bill Passes

Despite controversy surrounding the article, The Clean Air/Clean Water Proposal #1 was passed Tuesday, November 5th. The Clean Water / Clean Air Environmental Bond Act- meant to improve water and air quality- involves the selling of \$1.75 billion in state bonds. The money collected would be used to clean up many local environmental hazards and will finance the closing of Fresh Kills- the largest dump in New York, or anywhere else in the world.

An exit poll taken outside of P.S. 42, a polling cite in close proximity to the dump, revealed a yes to no ratio of nearly 5-1. The main reason given by these voters is the fact that the bill represents a noble cause.

One Staten Island resident said, "It's very important that this bill gets passed. We have to think about our children who will have to clean up this mess eventually. Health risks have gotten out of control, and something has to be done about it now." This was an opinion also shared by NYPIRG [The New York Public Interest Resource Group] at CSI. NYPIRG handed out flyers which addressed voters to "vote yes" for the proposal.

"If we don't clean up pollution

now, our health will remain threatened, businesses may not move into industrial centers, and the price of cleanup will increase," claimed the flyer that NYPIRG gave out. An approxiamte \$75 million from the funding is alledgedly earmarked toward the closing of the Fresh Kills Landfill. Although approval was given to close the dump, no one has suggested a way to fund the close until now. "We have the bill, now we need the funding!" said NYPIRG volunteers at the polls.

Despite the nobility of the cause, it was a close vote. 2,084,658 voted yes, and 1,637,272 voted no according to a New York Times survey. As far as localization, most of upstate New York rejected the proposal. The bond was passed due to the overwhelming majority of favorable votes in the city. Still, others voted no because many people were suspicious of how the money would be handled and most feel this problem simply cannot be resolved.

While exiting P.S. 42, one Staten Island resident said, "We're screwed either way. Even if this bill is passed, I don't believe funding will be applied to the right areas. The money will get reverted elsewhere." For better or for worse, the bond act passed in New York.





Why the '86 Mets would beat the '96 Yankees

Why Graig Nettles Should Be in the Hall of Fame

(Sidenote from Editor- For years to come, Yankees fans will remember this World Series. Some may single out David Cone's heroic Game Three performance as the turning point. The last time the Yankees won a World Series was 1978, and it was Graig Nettles' heroics in Game Three that seemed to turn that Series around. However, a look at the Hall of Fame shows an absence of Nettles. When fans talk about the best third baseman ever, Brooks Robinson of the Baltimore Orioles is usually the logical choice. Here, Thomas M. Foley talks about how Nettles should be in the Hall of Fame compared to Robinson's stats.)

The following quotes are from David Falkner's book, "Nine Sides of the Diamond." Page 130: "Graig Nettles, at 44, was the oldest man ever to play Third Base in the majors. He took a record book full of achievements with him into retirement (second in Games Played, Assists, Total Chances & D.P's) - Rubenstein to Brook Robinson's Horowitz - but he also had the great fortune to play more post season games at third than anyone, including one game (#3 of the 1978 World Series) that brought his skills to the attention of everyone. Remember?"

On page 132, manager Tommy LaSorda shared his memories of Graig's golden glove-work in Game Three of the 1978 World Series. "Nettles single-handedly beat us (the L.A. Dodgers) and did it in such a way that he revived their (the New York Yankees) whole ball club. It's hard to describe unless you were actually there, but I've never seen anything like it. Nettles *single-handedly* turned the series around; he was the reason the Yankees won it.

Nettles hit more home runs than any other third baseman in the American League and finished his career with 390 homers. Despite having almost 1700 more atbats than Nettles, Robinson ended up with just 268 homers. Nettles led the American League with 32 home runs in 1976 and hit 37 home runs in 1977 (just two behind A.L. leader Jim Rice's 39). As a matter of fact, the only A.L. player to hit more homers in the 1970s was Hall of Famer Reggie Jackson.

Similarly, Nettles never really got the recognition he deserved as a fielder. Despite the fact that Nettles set two *all-time* Major League single-season fielding records in 1971 (412 assists and 54 Double Plays) and had a higher fielding average (.973) than Brooks Robinson (.968), Robinson still got the Gold Glove award. Although Nettles certainly earned and deserved the Gold Glove more than Robinson, Nettles' superb '71 season was overlooked. As statistician Bill James has said, starting in 1970, Nettles deserved the Gold Glove every year, but he didn't get his first Gold Glove until 1977. Had Nettles started getting Gold Gloves when he deserved them, he would've ended up with nine, only one behind Brooks, who would have had just 10.

Nettles was basically a .250 hitter, but Brooks' lifetime average is only in the mid .260's. In addition, Nettles had much higher slugging (.421 to .401) and on-base (.332 to .325) averages than Mr. Robinson. Brooks certainly earned, and deserves, his place in the Hall of Fame; however, Nettles should be there with him. There is already a display in the Hall of Fame featuring Graig Nettles' glove, honoring one of Graig's greatest achievements; he established a new World Series fielding record for taking the most chances without committing a single error in the 1978 World Series. So, it's only natural that Nettles should be inducted now.

WANTED: Some New NFL Coaches
