Students Bring Fight To Albany

Tuesday, March 11th –3,500 CUNY and SUNY students from across New York State rallied in Albany to protest the State's higher education budget proposed by Governor Pataki earlier this year. Pataki's budget inflates tuition at CUNY and SUNY while reducing dollars for financial aid, opportunity programs, CUNY and SUNY operating budgets, and campus childcare.

"Wiley E. Coyote made fewer mistakes while chasing the Road Runner than Governor Pataki made in this year's budget," said Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver. He asked engineering majors to explain to the Governor that "you can't build a house from the roof down." Education, Silver stressed, is the foundation of New York.

Governor Pàtaki's proposed tuition increase of \$1400 a year for SUNY and \$1200 a year for CUNY comes alongside a proposed 33% cut in TAP awards, and a 50% cut to SEEK (an opportunity program at CSI for academically and financially disadvantaged students). The totals: \$184 million slashed from the SUNY operating budget and \$82 million taken from the CUNY operating budget. The sad irony is that none of the revenue the State would obtain from these hikes and cuts would ever return to the CUNY or SUNY systems.

"Higher education was singled out


for the highest cuts" in Pataki's proposed budget, said Professional Staff Congress President Barbara Bowen.

A CUNY education "is well worth it, if the hikes don't go into effect," said CSI student Crystal Vale, who had to take a day off work to attend the rally. "Students will have to work a lot harder if this budget goes through."

In an additional protest of the proposed state budget, students had organized a "No Tuition Hike" starting in Buffalo and Stonybrook, Long Island. More than 100 students hiked, and Cail Casserly and Gerald McCall walked the whole way, for a combined total of 561 miles.

How You Can Fight the Cuts • Wednesday, March 26th: Students, faculty, and staff will have a rally and speak out at the fountain outside the Center for the Arts (Building 1P). The event will start at 2:30 pm and end at 4:00 pm. Students will receive CC clue credit for attending the event and writing a short letter to the Governor.

• Monday, March 31st: CUNY and SUNY students will return to Albany to lobby their representatives to vote against the proposed budget. CSI's Women's Colloquia series continued on March 13th with a panel discussion entitled, "Women Working: Professional Women in Non-Traditional Career Paths."

Each of the three panelists gave an inspiring lesson. Stacy Escovitz Rigler is about to be ordained a rabbi. She described people's reactions when she told them her plans and discussed some of the challenges of being a woman rabbi. "When people give me with a doubtful look, I feel I have to prove my confidence."

In 1985, Dr. Jane Ponterio founded her own OBGYN practice on Staten Island. It was the first allwoman practice on the Island. When she graduated from med school twenty years ago, only 11% of studying physicians were women. That percentage has since grown to 40%. "Find role models,"said Ponterio, "and emulate them."

Laurie LoPrimo is the Director of Operations for the New York City office of Housing and Preservation Development. "You find a level of resentment in a world of middle-aged men who believe women shouldn't be in the workplace," she said.

LoPrimo oversees a staff of 2,000 and is involved with every detail of the agency. And she makes it a priority to ensure there is equal opportunity for women and minorities. "It all comes around," said LoPrimo. "One day they might be working for you."

Prejudice and inequality still exist in the workplace. For every dollar earned by a man, a woman takes home .75¢.



Tech Fee Funds New Computer Lab

The Computer Science Department has opened a new computer lab in 1N-113. But unlike most computers scattered around campus, the computers in this lab support Windows, Linux, and Unix operating systems.

The Open Lab was the brainchild of Michael Ziselman, who originally envisioned a seminar class devoted to Unix. It evolved into its present student-friendly state thanks in part to CSI's Technology Fee, which made it possible to purchase high-quality workstations and software.

In order to use these new machines, students must open a special account. The username and password provided by the college to access all other campus computers will not apply here. Ziselman is the man to reach for these new accounts.

"It's not hard to set up an account," said Ziselman. "I ask for the last four digits of their social security number to make sure they're students here. Then they're free to use the lab."

If you're the type who abuses the power of the campus computers to surf the web and talk in chat rooms – you know who you are—then don't bother applying. The new computers are strictly for academic use.

"Those in the humanities probably wouldn't get a whole lot out of the lab," said Ziselman. "The software is more suited for people in biology, technology, chemistry, or math."

But don't let being a liberal arts major get you down. Setting up an account with the new lab is still a wise move, considering how crowded other computer labs have been getting lately.

I got to the pool at around 7:45pm for a Wednesday night practice. I moved the lanes and brought down the flags. Only eight kids have showed up to dive, but I don't mind when my practices are small. It gives me a chance to work with the kids on a one on one basis.


Joe came to practice that night. Joe is one of those kids that you know is special. I have been his coach since the first time he stepped onto a diving board when he was eight years old, and now he is eleven. He reminded me so much of myself when I was younger. But I am not going to lie, his talent, his grace, and his ambition are much greater then mine ever were. Joe can go off the board any way you ask him. Except for a front flip. He tried and tried, but he just couldn't get it.

Joe wanted to do a front flip more then anything. And for the last two years he suffered through countless smacks and welts in the process of learning.

I didn't think that tonight's practice was going to be any different. We started out with our usual workout, three front jumps; three back jumps and then begin your list.

As long as I have coached Joe, he has always said to me, "Kim, is it ok if I save my flips for the end of practice?" And I always responded, "Sure Joe, if that's what you feel more comfortable doing. As long as we try them." But tonight he didn't say that to me and just got on the board. I asked him, "What do you want to work on first, fronts or backs?" He said, "I think I want to do my flips first tonight." I agreed and said, "Lets do three front dives and go from there."

We had finished the front dives and he said he was ready to give it a shot. He stood on the board and tried to get focused. Other divers such as Anastasia, Kristen, and Anthony, gave him support. I remember Anastasia saying, "You got this Joe, this is easy for you." And Kristen clapped and said, "Don't think, just



go, come on, you got this, it's easy." Anthony clapped too and said, "Just don't let go Joe, just don't let go of your tuck." The words of his teammates gave him strength, which I could see by the way he straightened up and adjusted his feet.

He started his hurdle.

He went into the flip but bailed out and took a huge crash. He came out of

the water with tears in his eyes. But he wasn't crying. He was too mad at himself. I called him to the side of the pool and I said, "Joe, it's up to you. You are in control of your body, don't let your body control you. Now go do a front flip."

In all the years I have coached, I have never seen another kid walk up to a diving board with so much determination.

He started his hurdle. He jumped

high, threw hard and tucked tight. It was all over within 3 seconds. But in those three seconds, I couldn't have felt more proud, happy and excited all at the same time.

He did it, he did it well, and he did it again and again. I saw the pride and the sense of accomplishment in his eyes when he came out of the water.

When practice was over that night, Joe said to me, "Is it ok if I do my front flips first again tomorrow?" I said, "Sure Joe, what ever you feel comfortable doing, and hey, great job today, I am really proud of what you did tonight.

"Ya know Kim," he said, "the flip is a lot easier then it looks. See ya tomorrow."

On The Job At WSIA Rain Or Shine




Staten Island's **Underground Hip-Hop Talks**

"Where it All Began" is the second CD released by Balance, a relatively new CSI-based group trying to make it on the local hardcore rock scene.


What was that? A Woooo? Who says Woooo these days? I, personally, was dumbfounded.







"If it wasn't for days like that I might not have the love for the game I have today," CSI starting pitcher Nicole Fasano said. "I am very grateful."




Nicole has not wasted any of her talent. She continues to practice regularly in the off-season and with her pitching leading the way, the Dolphins are sure to have an excellent season.
