1. That classes at Richmond be suspended for the remainder of the semester.
2. That the college remain open to be used as a base for all future political activities.

RESULTS of CITY-WIDE STRIKE COORDINATING MEETING AT NYU

Tuesday night at 8:00 a meeting was held at the Loeb Student Center of NYU to discuss plans of action for the strike. Eighteen NYC area schools were represented and people were also there from the U. of Buffalo, Kent State, and Sarah Lawrence College. Twelve Richmond students attended. The Civil Service Workers Union had people there and said they were very sympathetic to the strike. They also stated that the majority of union members were willing to take part in the action.

Frank Freedman, of the Panther Defense Committee, was elected in New Haven to be one of the two NYC representatives. The following issues were discussed:

- 1) It was decided that all strikes rally around these three points:
 - a) Free all political prisoners - especially Bobby Seale.
 - b) Take U.S. out of South East Asia.
 - c) Stop "pro-war anti-life" government work at all universities.
- 2) Three major issues were decided on and voted upon:
 - a) A general New York City shutdown will be held Thursday, May 7th, blocking every form of access into NYC and the major arteries in the city (i.e., Queens Blvd., the Long Island Expressway.) Staten Islanders should concentrate on hampering the Ferry and Verrazano Bridge.
 - b) Similar to the 1967 "vietnam Summer," 1970 will be the "Panther Summer." All colleges are advised to formulate plans in order to reach people in their communities (by demonstrations, street theatre, or anything else possible to educate the community.)
 - c) The third proposal was unanimously defeated: To take political action by legal process!
- 3) NYU voted tonight to take over the Courant (the math institute) and hold the computer hostage for \$100,000 - the cost of bail for the Panthers.
- 4) The NYU Law School unanimously (except for two votes) decided to close down. All students will get a pass for the semester. Their efforts will be put toward getting the U.S. out of South East Asia. The entire Law School plans to stop business on Wall Street Wednesday, even if it means getting arrested.
- 5) All schools are urged not to shut down. They should form workshops to discuss plans for political action during the strike.
- 6) Another suggestion was to tie-up draft boards by any means possible.
- 7) A further suggestion was the "Groups of Ten Theory" which recommends that students set up committees to go out on the street and reach as many people as they can.
- 8) As for personal actions - students are asked not to buy ANYTHING (records, clothes, etc.) UNLESS ABSOLUTELY NECESSARY.
- 9) Brandeis University is the National Coordinating Center for the Strike and Loeb Student Center is the NYC Coordinating Center. For information, you can reach the Loeb Center at 598-3022, or 598-3032; WBAI-99.4 is a constant information center -tel. 826-0800

CUNY PRESIDENTS STATEMENT TO NIXON

TELEGRAM:

Mr. President;

18 college Presidents and the Chancellor of the City University of New York wish by this message to express their dismay at what can only appear to any concerned citizen as a major escalation of American involvement in South East Asia and to urge you to return to your repeated promises to seek a peaceful end to the fighting there. We wish to express our shock and sorrow at the useless and brutal slaughter at Kent University and to deplore the insensitive speeches of Vice-President Agnew. Whatever his intention may have been he has both complicated and inflamed the national student unrest. No nation can long endure the alienation of the best of its young people and the Vice-President seems determined "to sow the wind and let the whirlwind come." We who care for this republic as you do, urge with all the vigor at our command that the time for keeping this nation's promises to all its people has come.

Resolution:

WHEREAS, the Administrative Council recognizes that the American invasion of Cambodia and the resumption of the bombing of North Vietnam, and the senseless loss of human life at Kent State University have shocked and alarmed a major portion of the City University Faculty and Student Body,

and

WHEREAS, the Presidents and Chancellor have expressed their concern and dismay to President Nixon. Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Administrative Council support the request of the University Student Senate and University Faculty Senate that campus rallies and classroom discussions be held on May 7th and 8th, to signify the University community's solidarity in opposition to the American involvement in Cambodia and the insensitive disregard for human life evidenced by the incident at Kent State University on May 4th.

SCHUELER AVOIDING ISSUE

Pres. Schueler's assistant said that the President has no statement on the possibility of the strike lasting until the end of the semester, or the possibility of grading alternatives. He also said that the Pres. feels that the strike vote may not have been representative of the entire student body of the small attendance. 5/5/70

Results of Faculty Meeting

Wed., May 6th, at 4:30 p.m., an open meeting of the faculty was held. This meeting was called by petition of the faculty members. The ground rules of the meeting were set by the presiding officer: Dean Wasser (Dean of Faculty). In all there were 138 faculty members and representatives of the administration present. The actions that were decided upon by the faculty are in effect recommendations to the Board of Higher Education to make these proposals legal under City University. The general resolutions presented by some members of the faculty were as follows:

Dr. Rodriguez: That the faculty as a body endorse the student vote to suspend classes through the end of the semester. That the school remain open as a base for a political forum and that we make the national crisis the center of our concern. In essence, that Richmond College join in the national strike. Also that all faculty members make a commitment to respond to the needs of the students.

Prof. Lutzker: In the light of the grave events of the past few days, the killing of students at Kent State University, extension of the war into Cambodia, and the renewed bombing of North Vietnam, we are unable to continue business as usual at our college.

The shooting of young men and women on a campus in the United States has truly brought the war to our own territory. The unspeakable slaughter of the past five years has already poisoned every aspect of our nation's life. Along with the physical destruction of a small country, we have witnessed the alienation of practically an entire generation of young people. The nation is more deeply divided than at any time since the Civil War. Its President and Vice President speak to youthful dissenters in the language of insult. Congress has been shunted aside from its Constitutional role. Like the rest of us our elected representatives sit and listen to TV to find out what the President and the Pentagon have already decided. For educators to teach the traditional doctrine of separation of powers in the present context is nothing less than an act of hypocrisy.

We therefore join the academic community all over the country in halting our regular duties. By this act the nation's colleges declare their participation in this war is at an end. For the balance of the semester we will direct our energies to changing the course of destruction our nation seems bent upon.

Prof. Evans: That the days of discussion (between faculty and students) be extended through Tues., May 12th, so that the legitimate purpose of Richmond College be arrived at. Also that a steering committee shall be established. It will consist of four faculty members, chosen from each of the divisions, and four student members, chosen by the Student Council. Its responsibilities will include the following: planning of each day's events; responsibility for organizing and administering the ballot; handling all requests for space, use of college resources, etc; presenting a report to the college regarding future uses of what has been learned during this period of discussion.

A Representative from the Third World Students: P grades for all students, and that after this has been formally established, workshops be set up open to all.

Prof. Stearns: Grades be assigned on the basis of the student's work up to this point (e.g. P grade for P work, etc.)

Prof. Kramer: Every faculty member donate 1/2 of their May salaries to the McClain for Congress Fund.

Prof. Sider: The faculty members of Richmond and CUNY as a whole pressure the Administration to no longer withhold income tax from pay, since the tax is a political action. The symbolic issue of this action is important.

The following are the motions that were presented on the above resolutions:

Prof. Cooper: That the Rodriguez and Lutzker resolutions be merged and adopted.

Prof. Fedeshyn: that the Lutzker and Evans resolutions be merged and adopted.

The following are excerpts (as close as possible) from the discussions that centered around the above motions:

Prof. Ragir: In addition, our strike purposes include the elimination of political repressions and killings off-campus. Particularly the Panthers - Bobby Seale

Prof. Kramer: Some students want to continue their education, this strike will prevent it. To "respond to the needs of the students" is very nice but also vague. These other students should be heard.

Prof. Lutzker: Students and faculty can find ways to informally fulfill the content of courses. The main objective of our activities should be the national crisis.

Prof. Nachman: There should be indefinite suspension of classes - no coercive conduct of classes. We can find new ways in which to be educated.

Bill Pizzo: This proposed disruption of classes will not go unchallenged. If this is successful, legal action will be taken.

Prof. Quart: We have a moral obligation and a political obligation. Now is the time to make our choices.

Prof. (Joe) Schwartz: All of a sudden the students want to learn and are concerned about classes. This should be looked at very seriously.

Prof. Rodriguez: If we are truly dismayed and outraged then personal considerations are disregarded. Either our personal gains are considered first or our outrage is.

Mary Sponoca (Grad. Ed. Student): If you are committed and concerned - P's and I's should not even be considered. Consequences are never thought of.

A point was raised to "call the question" by Prof. Fischer (to vote on merging the Lutzker and Rodriguez proposals without further discussion). It was voted upon and in favor of yes. One faculty member requested a secret ballot in voting. According to parliamentary procedures, if a person requests a secret ballot he may vote so. It was decided that all would vote by secret ballot with the option of verbally relating his vote. All eligible faculty and students voted. The response to verbalizing votes went approximately as follows:

Abstentions: 1
Not Voting: 1
Yes: 64
No: 3
Secret Ballot: 44

The results of the official vote tallies were as follows:

Absent: 23
No: 33
Yes: 80
Not Voting: 2

The resolution to strike was carried by an 80 to 33 victory!

It is regrettable that the debates during the remainder of the meeting took precedence over the genuine purpose of the strike that had just been previously decided upon by an overwhelming majority. By deliberating so long over secondary issues, the fervor of our convictions as a group was greatly damaged. Let us hope that as a whole we can be reunited in the face of our common enemy - Oppression.

Special mention to Prof. Eis - he debated the issues out of his own convictions and then in the interest of the common good - openly voted yes!

RICHMOND STUDENT BUSTED FOR BLOCKING TRAFFIC

A large anti-war demonstration in the vicinity of Wall St. in Manhattan resulted in the arrest of a member of Richmond's Women's Liberation Front. Maureen J. Lannan was picked up by the police for obstructing the path of traffic in the intersection of Wall St. and Broadway.

The Noon Rally, in the heart of New York's financial district, was attended by large numbers of student and anti-war groups, including a contingent of Richmond students. At one point, a group of protestors began to sit-in the street. When the police arrived, all the demonstrators except Maureen were dispersed. She was physically removed to an empty public bus, which proceeded to take her to the First Precinct. She was then taken in a Police Van to the Court on Center Street, where she was placed in a cell with several prostitutes and was subjected to verbal abuse by her arresting officers.

She was charged with disorderly conduct and eventually pled guilty in order to be discharged promptly. She was fined ten dollars and released after two hours custody. She has been scheduled to appear in Court again at some future date.

AN UNPROVOKED ATTACK = BY ONE OF NEW YORK'S FINEST

An officer of the law with the shield number 18163 of the first precinct clubbed four or five of the demonstrators at the site of Maureen Lannan's arrest. This incident occurred several minutes after the arrest of Maureen.

A Richmond College Student Bob Cutter addressed 12205 Flatlands Ave., in Brooklyn, phone # NE 9-8629, witnessed together with two reporters from the Radio Station WNYU (Alan Paylesberge, Nancy Ettar) phone # 598-3038 or 3035 (office Number).

Bob while standing on the sidewalk at Wall Street one block down from the Stock Exchange, the same spot Maureen Lannan was arrested, witnessed the above officer's reaction to the crowds dismay of Maureen's arrest which was to use the instrument of his billy club when a girl called him a pig.

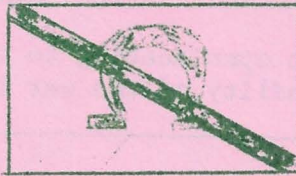

BHE UNDERMINES RC FACULTY RESOLUTION ON GRADES

READ THIS! IT CONCERNS YOUR GRADES!

To the Faculty and Staff of Richmond College:

The attached resolution was passed by the Board of Higher Education in a special meeting on Sunday, May 10, 1970 in the presence of all the Presidents of The City University of New York. I have been assured that the resolutions adopted by the Richmond College faculty on May 6th are authorized by this resolution, and the decisions voted by more than a two-thirds majority regarding grading practices for this semester are also approved with one significant exception: ". . . that no student may be granted a passing grade for a course unless in the judgment of the instructor he has met the standards of that course; . . ."

This latter action was prompted by discussions with the Commissioner of Education of New York State and members of the Board of Regents by Chancellor Bowker, the gist of which indicated that the accreditation of The City University of New York by the State would be jeopardized if such a restriction were not imposed.

Accordingly I ask that all members of faculty make themselves available this week to discuss grades with their students.

I should like as well to summarize what were my understandings of the interpretation of the May 6th resolution consented to by the meeting of May 7th.

1. Faculty members are obligated to make themselves available to students at least for the number of hours and the times previously listed on their programs.
2. Students will be free to make choices as to the kind of programs they wish to follow for the duration of the semester, even though such choice may include the conducting of regular classes.
3. Neither students nor faculty will be penalized if they opt for alternative educational experiences, except that faculty are bound by student preferences to make themselves available regardless of the choice, provided they are reasonable.

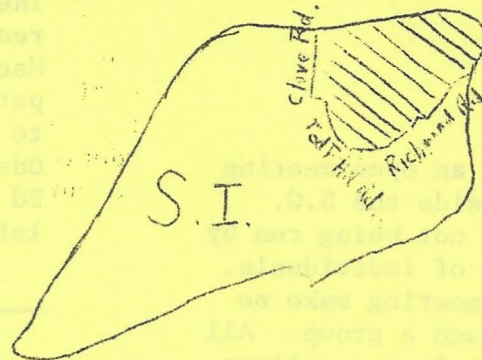

The Third World Coalition of Manhattan Community College is experiencing the usual Strike-Breaking tactics of the White Power Structure toward Third World People. May 1, the Coalition initiated strike action against the college in support of the city-wide demands of the city-wide coalition assault on the proposed tuition increase and the proposed reduction of the SEEK program. The question of Open Admission was also included in the strike demands. In the wake of the popular reaction to the death of the Kent State Four, the coalition then included War and Racism in their demands. On Monday, May 13th, an injunction was issued to open the college "business as usual." Well, as you know the building is still here, so it was just a scare - especially for one girl who sat in an 8th floor classroom through the entire thing. Nobody told her to leave. Now, what does that say for police thoroughness? Well, life/strike goes on!

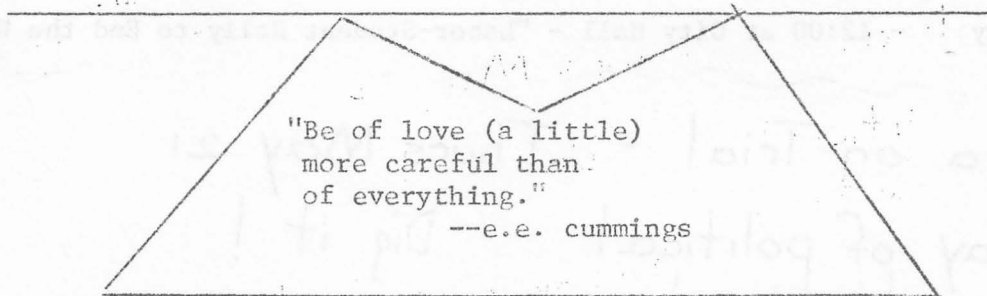
A TIME FOR UNITY

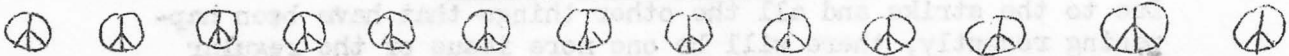

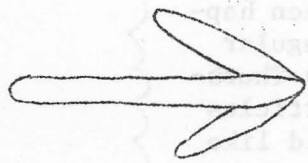

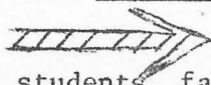
