Slow Down.....

Some say that the American car is one of the country's most beloved possessions. It is synchronous with images of freedom, independence and mobility. In some ways, it's a lot like college. But when the college and cars mix, some people at CSI want you to watch how much freedom and independence you use. The Director of Public Safety is enforcing a speed limit of 25 mph and is using new radar guns to get the job done.

The Department of Public Safety purchased one Speed Monitor II to

make sure that CSI students are stricly following the speed limit. "The Speed Monitor is a new piece of equipment that we received. We are always looking for ways to have people obey the speed limit on campus," Gene Martinez, the Director of Public Safety explained. "We purchased the equipment a few months ago and my officers were trying it out. And as soon as the parking situation settled down at the beginning of the semester I had my officers set up the radar detection on campus and set up warnings." Starting October 14th, Public Safety will be issuing summonses to people on campus who are speeding.

Speeding has always been a problem on campus. There was an accident three years ago on May 31, 1994. Two people, a brother and a sister, were driving on the campus loop and got into an accident with a van. The brother and the sister were killed. It was an important incident that affected Public Safety, and the department doesn't want something like that to happen again. On campus, there have also been other accidents that didn't involve fatalities, but they could have been avoided if the drivers obeyed the speed limit. "We have a very good roadway," continued Mr. Martinez, "and I want people to watch their speed at all times. One of my biggest concerns is traffic safety." In addition to the purchase of the radar gun, Public Safety is think of taking other precautions to curb the speed limit on campus. Road altering devices such as speed bumps and road striations are being considered. These devices would physically force people to slow down.


The Speed Monitor II is also one piece of hi-tech equipment. It is

described as a portable speed display with self-contained, one-direction radar sensor. It has an approach only sensor which makes sure that there will be no false speed due to opposite direction traffic, a radar range of 600, feet and a narrow radar beam width which gives precise selection of traffic lanes. The device is manufactured by MPH Industries. Costing \$2500 or more, it is one expensive piece of equipment. One thing concerns me. Can you avoid the radar gun somehow?

There is some strict enforcement that will be administer if anyone is found speeding on campus. All tickets have

to be paid by the due date, either in person at the Office of Parking Services or by mail. Tickets range from \$15 to \$40, and there is a risk that your car can be "booted" off campus. An appeal can be brought forth if one find a discrepancy with the violation. Appeals must be made in writing, on a special form available from the Office of Parking Services.

At first the speed limit was 15 mph, but that was deemed inappropriate. CSI students were given a little edge for traveling around campus. So eat, drink and be merry. Just don't drive over 25.

NYPIRG Holds General Interest Meeting

The Staten Island chapter of the New York Public Interest Research Group (NYPIRG) held its 20th General Interest Meeting at the Green Dolphin Lounge on Thursday, September 25th during club hours. Over 90 students attended the event being informed of NYPIRG's various projects for the fall semester. Some projects include Homeless Empowerment, Voter Registration, and the Small Claims Court Action Center.

CSI NYPIRG is one of the 19 college campus chapters throughout New York State. NYPIRG is known as the largest consumer, environmental, and government reform organization. It boasts in playing an integral role in pushing numerous pieces of reform in public interest legislation. One example was the passing of an environmental law requiring the Fresh Kills Landfill, the world's largest garbage dump, by December 31, 2001.

There were several speakers during the event. These speakers were Joann Raiola, Ingrid MomPoint, Tara Khan, John Ohlson, and Olusoji Oluwole, the NYPIRG State Board Representative of CSI. William Wharton, President of Student Government, gave an introductory speech and Chris Meyer, the NYPIRG Executive Director, was the keynote speaker.


When interviewing Chris Meyer about the purpose of the event, he commented, "The purpose of my speech is to inspire each individual to take a little bit of time from their busy schedule to volunteer with NYPIRG this semester." He further commented, "There is a lot of great projects [environmental, consumer, public health, voter registration] that will be benificial to the community. In addition, it is good for students of learning important skills [of organizing] adding to their resume."

Also interviewed was one of the new project coordinators of the Staten Island chapter, Greg Mihailovich. He discussed the purpose of the General Interest Meeting, "The main reason for this event was recruitment. This event is mainly a publicity event. A lot of people does not know about NYPIRG. CSI NYPIRG has been here for twenty years and [when presenting about NYPIRG] I receive numerous replies, such as 'Are you new here on this campus?' " He furthered continued, "NYPIRG just wants to get people aware of what we do to get them involved."

An incumbent for approximately three years, Olusoji Oluwole, CSI NYPIRG's state board representative felt very pleased with the outcome of the event. Rep. Oluwole remarked, "I was surprised by the huge turnout knowing that it was a short time of putting [the event] together. I hope that with the success of the G.I.M. (General Interest Meeting), more people will be involved in projects such as internships or voter registration."

The audience looked very inquisitive and curious as they listened to the speakers. The reaction of the crowd was positive. Certain students commented that the event was very interesting and that they would like to know more about NYPIRG. After the event, numerous students signed up to be involved in specific projects.

Chris Meyer summed up the essence of this event, "Unless students get involved, our democracy is at peril, with the manifestation of the campaign finance scandals that are engulfing in Washington. Students have been leaders in expanding democracy and we will start here in CSI."

SI's President Dr. Marlene Springer gave her annual convocation last week. The President's address, a mix of accomplishments, concerns, plans, and humor was given in the Williamson Theater and was attended by approximately 250 faculty, students, and staff. The purpose of the event was to welcome the college community back and discuss the results of the previous year's initiatives and upcoming endeavors. The overall tenor of the speech was

generally uplifting. The speech had a "harvest theme" in which the President described the

past year as "productive". She stated, "it was productive especially in terms CSI standards because we have been consistently functioning with a diminishing number faculty and staff for a long time. And we've been asked to do more with less for so long that it is difficult to define either term but things are looking better our requests for more have begun to happen."

The President went on to take a look back at some achievements from last year and cited the

hiring of 26 new faculty positions, the faculty and staff publishing 15 new books and 2 dozen articles, as well as the faculty and staff receiving almost 6 million in grants. She also went on to talk about the completion and adoption of the CSI Multi-Year plan which will chart the direction of the College in the future. The President discussed the changes the Multi-Year plan will bring and stated, "we owe our students and ourselves no less than a continued commitment to improvement and quality."

The President identified the issue of technology as a major concern. Her comments focused on the need for the college to embrace the technology revolution. In addressing the college's state of affairs with technology, the President appointed a CSI Task Force to do an institutional technology plan to go along with the Multi-Year plan. Also within the technology discussion the President brought up the implementation of the SIMS (Student Information Management System). SIMS, which is a support system that will ultimately facilitate everything that is done for students, will be operational in February.

It will deal with everything from advisement, registration, financial aid, billing, collection, to graduation. The President stated that with the introduction of SIMS, "in the long run we will streamline many of our own services." A direct benefit for students though, will be that the college's telephone registration system will then be brought on-line, and will be operational in Fall of 1998. The President said, "we are far ahead of everyone within CUNY in terms of technology and that we have been generous in sharing our expertise." Another concern the President raised was the Library. She alluded to the fact that things at the Library would have to change. Dr. Springer stated, "that times are not a changin they've already changed." She agreed the Library was inadequate, but the college has to agree where it is inadequate and a decision would have to made as to what the Library should be. The President called for a new mission for the Library with eclectic needs in mind, and sought wide participation from the college in developing this.

The President strongly commented

about the fate of students at the college and their education. She focused on the importance of public perception relating to students when stating, "what people think of a CSI degree will be the label that employers, their neighbors, their children, and their families place on it." The President further commented, "I want that label to be a good one and I can talk about standards and goals until I'm

blue and maroon in the face but I need help." The President called for constructive suggestions on how to make it better and stated she would try and use those suggestions. Going into more depth about the well-being of students, the President touched on the vast difficulties that plague us.

Among the difficulties mentioned were the juggling of classes, work, high tuition, high stress, Workfare, and Welfare reform. The President stated, "the Marchi/ Ramirez bill sponsored by John Marchi, after we went and asked him to do this has made it possible for Welfare recipients to do their Workfare on campus." The President also explained that although students pay for their college, 1/3 is paid for by those who will never set foot on a college campus. She stated, "students must know that they are a privileged elite group-less than 1% of the world's population and probably less now has the privilege of any extended education."

The President announced that the administration is doing its best to help. Dr. Springer explained the library hours have been extended, and that prior loss of services are gradually being recouped. Additionally, the President is bringing back a limited number classes on Sunday in order to help students that need courses on weekends. She was happy to point out that new parking spaces have been added, and that she is looking to pave some of the gravel lots. She wants to increase the campus lighting by adding more lights and added that she has made a capitol request for this. Dr. Springer is also trying to get the computer labs open longer.

The President pointed out that remediation is a continuing concern, as well as, access in the face of all the attacks on CUNY. The President stated, " that 46% of our students in remedial classes are under 20 years old." Thus, pointing out that this a problem CSI has inherited from the secondary schools. The President took this in stride when she said, "this is a challenge to us". The President cited grade inflation as another problem in some areas and "that some faculty are going to have to make more accurate assessments of their student's accomplishments." The President's focus on standards continued on the scores of Teacher Education exams, and she made a call to do better. The President reflected on the adjunct faculty rate and stated, "full time faculty has to be a priority." Additionally, the President stated that the administration is continuing to work on this.

The President closed her address with a story from a book called "The Heart Around Us" by David White. The moral of which was "we all come to bridges in our

lives when it seems too scary, or too troublesome, or too unknown to cross and than you realize that it can be done and you just do it." The President said, "right now I think we sometimes feel like we're swaying in the wind and the outside pressures of the last three years have certainly buffeted CSI, but as colleagues and as an institution we will share hope with each other and we will continue to cross that bridge and build new ones....we'll just do it."

The President's address ended with sustained applause and a harvest reception. A student that was present for the address, Mina Imtanos commented, "I think the President's speech was great it spoke about helping students and their environment." Dr. Sandi Cooper, a professor of History at CSI and Chair of the Faculty Senate/CUNY Trustee stated, "I think the address was right on target, it was upbeat, humorous, targeted, and well structured. We should be proud that we have one of CUNY's best."


takes all the existing events on Staten Island and markets it under the umbrella of the 'I Love NY' Fall Festival." Sponsors for

Much revenue should come about from the program. Gina Gutman, Director of Tourism at the Staten Island Tourism Council, which has been asked to Co-Chair the Festival, stated, "The elimination of the ferry fare comes at an ideal time. One could see the best Staten Island has too offer- from jazz to Italian history to historic tours." She adds that the response has been positive and that the Staten Island Tourism Council has needed to call on interpreters for the international

response that it was getting.


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In 1995, Queens hosted the festival and there was a 50% increase in attendance in their local events. Staten Island should expect the same increase for the 1997 Fall Festival.



McCourt is Amusing

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Perhaps a distinctive Irish-American culture is a thing of the past, but what a past it is. Best selling author of Angela's Ashes, Frank McCourt, has assembled a new tour de force of songs and stories about "The Irish...And How They Got That Way," directed by Charlotte Moore, now appearing at the Irish Repertory Theatre in Manhattan.

I may be the only one who has not read Angela's Ashes, but when I do, if the book fails to equal the quality of "The Irish...And How They Got That Way," I will recommend to Mr. McCourt that he consider Charlotte Moore as a ghostwriter for the next edition of his memoirs because "The Irish..." is an enthralling play.

The meat of the play lies in the history of the Irish folk, their joyful art and their political tribulations. For this play Moore is doing another excellent directing job. From choreography to costume design the presentation is precise. And despite the sorrowful side of Irish history, the play is done with a pleasant flair.

Ciaran O'Reilly sets the tone of the play immediately in Act I when he says, "We are the music makers; The dreamers of dreams." Imagination and fancy have traditionally been the Irish persons ways of entertaining themselves and also relieving the hardships of life. As the Earl of Beaconsfield, Benjamin Disraeli, so eloquently stated in 1868, "These (Irish) are discontented because they are not amused." When Ireland produces such literary greats as Thomas Moore, Sean O'Casey, G.B. Shaw, Brendan Behan, Samuell Beckett, Bono, it is not a bad bet to say the Irish like to be amused. But more seriously, perhaps one of the reasons why the Irish were not so "amused" in the 19th century was because the English State regularly forced the exportation of Irish grain and beef; that must have been especially painful to take in the midst of the 1840's decade-long-bad potato crop. One quarter of the Irish population emigrated to other countries or died during that time. The play combines history and personal emotion, so that we do not lose sight of actual human feelings. Anger and longing are potently expressed in the song "Fields of Athenry" performed by Marian Tomas Griffin. The song is about loving a man who has been unjustly put into an English jail.

These sentiments are what fuel Irish politics to this day; the song makes the political personal.

Between 1840 and 1860 1.7 million Irish emigrated from Ireland

to the United States leaving behind English law and the heavy weight of the past. They hoped the United States would be a sanctuary, and it was. Of course, the new Irish-Americans were abused, best expressed in the song "No Irish Need Apply," but there was also escape from wrenching poverty, more opportunity than existed in Ireland, and there was political successes as well. Ciaran O'Reilly, the Irish Rep's co-founder along with Charlotte Moore, and part of the six-person ensemble, tells a strong tale about being a politician at Tammany Hall. O'Reilly's character explains that when a public official helps to provide housing and clothes for his constituents, it is not called philanthropy - it is called politics. Then narrative cynically moves to explain the finer points of illegal and legal graft — to Tammany Hall politicians there was a difference. Charming in its boldness, riveting because of its apparent timelessness, the skit shows that holding political office can be both beneficial and corrupting. Just as some powerless Irish were discriminated against, the same way other groups throughout history have been, quite harshly, other powerful Irish took too much from the political system. It is a clear example that life is a struggle between the powerful and the powerless; demeaning characterizations according to merit and intelligence are some tools that the powerful use to justify the exploitation of the powerless (see the despicable attacks some of the powerful have recently made on CUNY; or the gross stereotyping of people on Welfare). McCourt's picks of such songs as the "Irish Washer Woman" and "Erie Canal," shows his artistic allegiance to the working class point of view.

Some may be turned off to the tales of hardship, for we can sometimes start forgetting the beauty of life. But this is where the play comes through powerfully. Showing the force and potential of life, the beautiful music, the sharply enunciated poetic dialogue, and the costumes combines for a mesmerizing experience.

Terry Donnelly, clothed in a handsome burgundy suede dress, is a model actress; her stage presence alternates between passionate sensitivity and frolicking humor, examples of both are when she longingly sings "Galway Bay" and tells the jocular tale of "Finnegan's Wake."

One of the fine points of the production is the velvet-heart tones of Ciaran Sheehan. "I'll Take You Home Again, Kathleen," which deals with the inheritance of culture, and "Skibereen" are two songs that are both touching and endearing.

Marian Tomas Griffin, who wears a gorgeous blue-emerald satin dress, and plays a great Irish tin flute, is especially fanciful, especially when she sings. What makes her even more

Wellness Column: Helping A Friend Who Drinks

There's no question that most people who use alcohol don't develop alcoholism. Still most people who become alcoholic never thought it would happen to them and from its earliest stages, alcoholism employs a complex system of rationalization and denial which keeps an alcoholic and his friends and family from effectively dealing with the disease. Would you know if alcoholism was effecting someone close to you?

Generally, alcoholism is a pattern of drinking that causes trouble in the drinker's personal, work, or family life. But experts also know that alcoholism is an illness. It has early warning signs and symptoms, any one of which can signal that a friend may be developing a problem. These include:

- Σ Using alcohol to deal with problems or to cope with difficult situations.
- Σ Drinking more often, consuming larger amounts, or both.
- Σ Hiding the amount of alcohol consumed, drinking alone or with strangers.
- E Gulping drinks or switching to more "potent" drinks to get the effect quickly.
- Σ Getting annoyed when others comment about how much he or she drinks.
- Being uncomfortable when alcohol is not available.
- Thinking its cool or sophisticated to "hold their liquor" or to drink their friends "under the table".
- Σ Feelings of guilt about drinking.

In addition, other signs that may signal a developing or existing alcohol problem include:

- Drinking more than planned. "Loss of control" or planning to have only one or two drinks and ending up intoxicated is a sure sign of trouble.
- Becoming a different person when drinking. A quiet person who becomes argumentative or an emotional person who becomes weepy or sad when drinking.
- Blackouts. Loss of memory for a period of time when drinking. Also known as alcoholic amnesia.
- Frequent intoxication . Although you can have an alcohol problem without ever getting "falling down drunk", frequent intoxication does make it more likely that problems will result from drinking.

 Drinking to feel normal. There is cause for concern when alcohol is used to become associated with the need to feel normal. Using alcohol to regulate highs and lows from other drugs also means trouble.

It makes no difference how long someone has been drinking, what alcoholic

beverage is used, or whether that person drinks every day. If you see these signs in

someone you care about, it's time to take a look at what drinking alcohol is doing to

their life, and yours. You don't need to be able to know how to diagnose alcoholism


The **Toronto Maple Leafs** will finish sixth place with Tie Domi, who has been a very physical presence for the Leafs. Many young players will be

The **Edmonton Oilers** have not made the playoffs for four straight years and fans are getting impatient. Curtis Joseph had 32 of the teams 36




victories last year. Doug Weight has led the Oilers in scoring for four consecutive years and paced the team with 82 points last year. The team will finish second place this year.

I see the main sticking point being the status of the American league's designated hitter and the national league's insistence on playing the game with nine players, having the pitcher hit.


