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Once again, clubs gathered together in a grand festival of fund raising and cultural celebration Wednesday, May 8th at 12:00 PM. Students enjoyed free food, games, and cultural dancing from noon until 6:00 PM.

One of the clubs which helped raise funds for charity was Sigma Omega Epsilon. Member of the club, Jennifer Kary said, "We are selling baked goods and sandwiches for the Rainbow Hope Foundation- it's a charity for kids with cancer."

While some clubs helped to contribute to society, others celebrated their cultural significance. Among the clubs to perform traditional dances was the Spanish Club. President of the club, Luis Cruzatte said, "We had a dance show from Columbia which was danced by Martha Tejada and Cristian Hernandez." He continued, "We gave out free food and we had a small display of flags. It was fun and exciting, but I wish that the same amount of people that came to see us dance also came to vote."

Another club which held a cultural dance was the Union of Arabic Students. Vice President Laith Khlil explained, "We hired our own belly dancer. Club member George Musa found her in a club and we hired her for \$150 dollars to do traditional dances." He continued, "This is the first time our club has participated in the club festival." The dancer, Bianca Gonzales said, "George (Musa) called me the night before and asked me to do this, so I came." Students crowded the Green Dolphin Lounge to sneak a peek at the remarkable dancer. The club also spent \$100 for food that students enjoyed free of charge.

While some clubs gave away free stuff, others sold different items in order to raise funds for their club. Vice President of the Social Work Club, Jennifer Dewaters said, "We are selling junk food to raise money so that next semester, the club can go to Washington D.C. to check out social work conventions."

The Physicians Assistant Club also made themselves known at the festival. Soda, cookies, and popcorn were sold to promote the club. Along with free pens, they also handed out flyers that explained the requirements to become a Physicians Assistant student. "We are the biggest club and the most organized club on campus with 170 members," said club member Jana Jankey.

Another club who worked towards fund raising was the Apolistic Christian Life Coalition. President Charlo Almeda explained, "We had a Gospel Fest where musicians played music in the Green Dolphin Lounge and we sold sandwiches from a 9 foot hero; 6ft- regular hero and 3ft. Vegetarian hero." The club also sold soda and had baked goods. Mr. Almeda commented, "The money is going to the club to offset an uncertain future by Student Government. If Student Government cuts more of the budget, at least we'll have some sort of buffer to alleviate the cuts."

The New York Public Interest Research Group (NYPIRG) also joined in the days events with their own table. NYPIRG hosted two activities at their tables. One game that was played was "Pin the Blame on Pataki," a spin off of "Pin the tail on the donkey." Contestants had to choose one: register to vote, vote in the Student Government Elections, or call representatives at an 800 number. The other game was the "CUNY drop," where students dropped pennies into a tank of water, trying to get the coins into a glass cup in the bottom center of the tank. Stuffed animals, blowpops, pins, and pens were handed out as prizes.

At the end of the day, the festival raised close to \$350 dollars. Student John Barry said, "This Club Festival is nice, but it would be better if all classes were canceled for today's events. I'm proud of my fellow students who organized this event." Another student, Dana Azenara said. "It's a way for everyone to be together as a group, and to mix all the cultures instead of everyone being in their little groups."

Student Government President and Club Commissioner Meri Kaufman commented, "The Club Festival was wonderful as usual. Clubs came together to show their pride and commitment to students and the college; and to raise money for charity." She ended, "Most important though, a lot of students had a good time."



updated to include available courses for the next semester. "The EUREKA system was designed to help students register for classes" said Registrar Personnel Elaine Bowden. She continued, "When students need to register, they usually go to the 'Registrar's Course Status Sheet' in the 2A building. Now, they can get this informa-

tion at the EUREKA! Kiosks."

> Students who also have personal computers with internet access can log on to the CSI home page (http://www.csi. cuny.edu/) and receive this information in their homes. Before it was released on the EUREKA!, students had to rely on the posted list outside of the Registrar's office to find out whether or not a class was open, closed, or canceled. Ms. Bowden also explained that the Kiosk will be updated at 2:00 PM and at 9:00 PM every day so that students will have the most current information at the touch of the screen.

In order to get the system to the campus, Vice President Carol Jackson wrote a lengthy proposal in which she expressed the need for such a system. "The decision to have this system brought on campus was reached even before we came to the new campus" said Bowden. She continued, "When Carol (Jackson) wrote to first get the EUREKA! grant three years ago, she explained that it was a system that she would like to see- something that students can easily get information about the college from."

When it was finally granted, the department set to work on putting together the information that would go into the system. "We began little by little... first we put the course catalog on it, then we continued to add information to it each day" said Bowden.

On Thursday, May 2nd, it was finally decided that the EUREKA! system would display the course status reports. Not only does the system provide course status information, but it also has on display the academic calendar, the registration schedule, the final exam schedule, meeting times, latest room assignments, and many other timely events and information. "We feel this will make the course information much more accessible to students," expressed Bowden.

Fire Alarms Ring Over Burnt Toast

Fire alarms went off in the Campus Center Thursday, May 9th at 1:30 PM when workers tried to toast a roll for a customer. "We don't like to refuse customers, but we can't toast the rolls because they burn easily," commented one of the female workers. It took approximately ten minutes for workers to reset the alarm. 
B&G Play Possum

After two weeks of deterioration, the dead possum on the side of the loop road at the entrance of the college was finally removed. The possum, a bit larger than the size of a full grown cat, was involved in a hit and run accident Friday night April 27th.

Upon seeing the twitching, half dead animal, security officers averted traffic until the animal died. Afterward, they moved the corpse to the side of the road to avoid further blood shed.

Several days later, despite garden work being done to the area, the possum was not removed. Buildings and Grounds workers mowed the lawn around the decomposing corpse on May 7th but ignored the maggot infested carcass. Three days later, when reporters tried to find out why the dead possum was left there, Buildings and Grounds office personnel explained that no official complaint was made regarding the cadaver. When asked why the workers who mowed around the body did not report it, secretary Annette said, "I don't know but we will look into it."

Campus Planning Director George Targownik expressed, "I don't know why they (B&G) ignored the possum, they're not suppose to do that. The possum should have been removed two weeks ago when the incident first happened." The possum was finally laid to rest Friday, May 10th.

Over twenty panels from the AIDS Quilt was brought to CSI for display in the Performing and Creative Arts Center Wednesday, May 8th at 2:30 PM. "We have been thinking about bringing the AIDS quilt to CSI for a while" said Vice President Carol Jackson.

The actual AIDS Quilt is located at Washington DC and hosts over 45,000 panels. Each panel consists of eight different quilts made for loved ones who have died of the AIDS Virus. Peer Education, Delta Sigma Tau, AIDS Task Force, and the Staten Island HIV Care Network worked in conjunction with the Wellness Program to bring over twenty panels to CSI.

Approximately 60 students and faculty gathered together to witness the Ceremonial opening of the quilt. Vice President Carol Jackson was the first to speak. She gave an emotional presentation about a friend that she lost to AIDS. "Michael Stolper, a dear friend of mine was among the first who died of this disease in 1982," said Ms. Jackson. She continued to explain how she and a group of friends worked on making a quilt for their deceased friend. "It was a way for us to share Michael's legacy and deal with his death," said Jackson.

President Springer addressed the audience with her own emotional testimony. "When I first saw this quilt down in Washington, I thought about how terrible and devastating this disease really is... It strikes the world," said President Springer. She continued, "The College of Staten Island is proud to house this quilt to give testimony to our undying goal towards finding a cure for AIDS."

Next to speak was NYC Commissioner of Finance/Consumer Affairs, Fred Cerullo. Mr. Cerullo came and spoke about his views on AIDS. "On Staten Island alone, we have about 10,000 people living with the HIV virus," said Mr. Cerullo. He continued, "We need to understand that this disease really knows no boundaries, and until we join together, we will not defeat this disease." Mr. Cerullo also spoke a bit about the history of the quilt and the significance it has in people's lives,

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Ginger Perez, maker of a quilt panel did a presentation with her mother titled, "If AIDS could talk, what would it say." Later, she explained that this was her way of giving a tangible face to the disease that kills so many people. "Isn't it ironic that today we are here talking about the AIDS quilt and my brother died of AIDS... Today would have been his 30th birthday," said Mrs. Perez.

Care Networker Wendy Hofner explained, "When we were bringing the quilt over, we realized that these were not just pieces of fabric but actual lives that were lost to AIDS and everyone that was working to unpack the quilt suddenly became very quiet."

Also at the event, Louisa Odones of the AIDS Task force said, "Just looking at the quilt is an overwhelming experience... each person in one way or another is affected by this deadly disease." Executive Director for Project Build, Robert Busan explained, "[The Quilt] is a way of bringing the AIDS community together in a powerful way." He continued, "This disease brings discrimination and isolation to the individual with the disease, and to the family... the quilt brings people together and helps them move forward from the sorrow that this disease brings."

In order for the quilt to be brought to the college, it cost \$2,000 dollars to ship it from Washington DC. Denise of the Care Network explained, "We worked with various groups to bring the quilt here [to CSI]. Two local banks contributed to the cost and the AIDS Service Organization also chipped in to bring the quilt to Staten Island." She added, "We are trying hard to bring people together on the AIDS Issue."

The AIDS quilt remained on display until Saturday, May 11th when it was gently packed to be shipped back to Washington. Vice President Carol Jackson said, "It truly honors the college to display such a remarkable quilt and hopefully bring awareness to the Staten Island community."

Wellness Festival

The Wellness Festival was held on May 9 from 12:00 to 6:00 in the Campus Center. It was sponsored by the Division of Student Affairs, Staten Island HIV Care Network, Program Development Committee, Health Service and the Wellness Program. The festival gave students information about health issues that may affect their lives.

There were over forty tables set up giving the students information about the March of Dimes, the AIDS Walk, the American Cancer Society, teen rape, pregnancy, AIDS, HIV, and the St. Vincent's Medical Center of Richmond. Amy Markovitz, from the St. Vincent's Medical Center table, commented that the "fair is to make students pay attention to their health care needs." Some of the workshops offered were about HIV, AIDS, Nutrition, and the last one of the day, "To be or not to be a Vegetarian," given by Professor Richard Schwartz. These were all Personal Growth Clues. There were also free condoms and pamphlets on every health issue. One student commented that the fair was "very interesting." There was also free breast and testicular exams, cholesterol, HIV and TB testing.

The 1996 Wellness Festival gave student a chance to learn about health issues that affect their lives. It also informed them of ways of dealing with health problems that may come up in a student's life. A comment was made by Rosemare Talorice from Health Services that "the students that attended this year seem to be more aware of these topic then the students from last year."

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ENTIRE CAMPUS UNDER FIRE ALARM VIOLATION

After three false alarms in one day, the entire CSI campus was cited by the Fire Department for failing to comply with the maintenance rules for alarm systems on Wednesday, May 1st. "Whether it's because they are oversensitive or not cleaned properly, the alarms are going off for no apparent reason," said Battalion Chief of the Fire Department Richard J. Powner.

Director of Campus planning, George Targownik explained, "TDX and the College are in the process of obtaining final approval for the alarm system." In order to receive final approval, security was instructed by the fire department not to respond to any more active alarms, but to contact the fire department as soon as an alarm is sounded. The memo, dated April 15th, states, "... The procedure being employed whereby upon notification of interior fire alarm or smoke detector activation, security personnel are sent to verify that an emergency condition exists... is not acceptable." The memo goes on to state that the entire college is in violation of Fire Code 17-01(b)(6)- use, maintenance, and operation of the Central Station Signaling Systems.

The first of the alarms leading up to the violation occurred in Building 3S at approximately 6:00 PM on May 1st. The building was evacuated and fire trucks responded to an active alarm which was found to be a false alarm. Approximately one hour later, 7:00 PM, the fire department responded to another false fire alarm in the library. At 8:30 PM, a third false alarm was sounded in the Performing and Creative Arts Building. One student at the scene, Tanya Lopez said, "It's inconvenient. These false alarms take time away from other things that I could be doing... especially since it's finals time. These false

alarms just add to the stress.

After receiving the notice of violation, there have been approximately twelve more false alarms. The most recent false alarm occurred at the Library on Monday, May 13th at 6:00 PM. During the false alarm, two male students were stuck in the elevator on the second floor. One of the students, Richard Arroyo said, "We heard the alarms and the security officer told us that there was nothing to worry about... I thought it was kind of cool though."

Fire Fighter Billy Burke said, "It might be a malfunction in the alarm system, they (The College) are having a lot of problems with it." Mr. Targownik explained, "We were cited because of an excess number of unwarranted false alarms." According to Fire Department regulation, any combination of three unwarranted or unnecessary alarms within a six month period will be deemed excessive and in violation. Targownik continued, "99.9% of the time, these alarms are false- mostly, it's something mechanically wrong... there is a possibility that the alarms are being set off by people smoking in the buildings but we have no evidence of this."

In order to resolve this infraction, the college has brought in G. S. Edwards, an outside organization who will deal with the maintenance of the alarms. "G.S. Edwards will be coming regularly to check on the system. They will improve maintenance and clean the alarms as required by the fire department so that they don't go off on false alarms" said Targownik.

Despite the violation, there is no danger of the system balking during a real emergency. Targownik said, "I think the alarms are very sensitive right now but if there is a real fire, the alarms will go off, and they will work. I don't think there will be a problem."

Hello From Ecuador

All My Sons: On Campus

Arthur Miller's *All My Sons* was performed in the Williamson Theater on April 18, 19 and 20. Directed by Robert Hulton Baker of the English department, all but one of the cast were CSI students. Professor Baker of the English department said, "It was the first contemporary drama (he directed at CSI) except one from the *theatre of the absurd*, and that was 4 or 5 years ago."

The stage was set at the Keller's home with a narrow house, picket fence and bodega. The supplies were donated by Farrell Lumber. *All My Sons* is a play about a man's greed. Joe Keller betrayes his family, friends, and ultimately many young men who lost their lives. A fallen tree represented the Keller's oldest son, and the breaking of the illusion that he might live. Mr. Baker said he was "attracted to the piece because it addresses many issues in the 90's, such as the indespensibility of individuals and corporate ethics - take overs, downsizing, and the dollar motive as the bottom line. Effects upon family individuals and society are overlooked in the pursuit of these other goals."

The cast rehearsed for 6 weeks according to Professor Baker. Although the first scene was a little slow, the play built to a brilliant tension by the end. Some of the players were more powerful than others, particularly Barbara Grigoli (Kate Keller), Ritty Mahoney (Chris Keller), Lori Seggio (Lydia Lubey) and also Jim Mc Vey (Dr. Jim Bayliss). Ritty Mahoney said afterwards, "I learned that this school has wonderful resources for comedy and drama both in equipment and human potential. I wish the students were given more support by the superstructure. I'd like to see more student productions in the theaters."

Next September Professor Robert Baker will be auditioning for another play. He did not give a tittle but mentioned the possibility of a "musical component."

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Using 1990's Technology to Emulate 1980's Games

Tired of the seemingly endless wave of mindless Doom clones? Did you just buy a \$2,000 dollar computer set-up and find yourself longing for your old Commodore 64 that's sitting in your closet? Well thanks to advances in modern programming techniques, and processor advances you can have that Commodore 64 in your computer again. Through the miracle of emulation you can have that Commodore and many other classic computer game systems right on your home computer.

There are many Internet Web sites that are dedicated to system emulation but the best site is Dave's Video Game Classics (http://www.csun.edu/~hbbuse08/classic.html) which has Links to all the emulators. Here you can get the Colecovison emulator. The emulator and over 100 games are available at this site. Finally, you can play Smurf Adventure again.

While you are at Dave's page you can download a copy of the "Virtual GameBoy" (VGB). The VGB is a GameBoy emulator! Since the GameBoy is still being sold and games are still being made it is extremely difficult to find games for it. You can try to FTP to 129.22.243.41 but as of this writing it appears to be down. Included with the emulator is instructions on how to build a machine to turn your carts into ROM images that you can use with the VGB.

At the bottom of Dave's page is a link to Dave's Commodore 64 page. The Commodore 64 is the most popular emulated system on the net. Many of the games that you remember are available from Archorn to Commando. At this page you can find many classic games and Commodore music files called SID. If you want to play the songs you must download SidPlay which is also available at Dave's page. You can also try Sushe's C64 Stuff

(http://www.uq.edu.au/~chjdendl/sush /c64.html). This is great site to download games from and find links to other C64 sites. If you are interested in finding emulators for the Spectrum and Amstrad (2 computers that we popular in Europe) click on the 'Back to Main Page' link at the bottom of Sushe's page.


Those of you who hated the Commodore 64 probably owned either an Apple II or an Atari 800. Well your in luck these systems are also emulated. A great

site for Apple II stuff is Digital Nostalgia (http://www.umich.edu/~webspin/gam es/emulators.html) Here you can get the emulator and lots of games. The Atari emulator can be found for the Macintosh at page Rainbow The Info (http://www.cityscape.co.uk/users/jx91 /rainbow.html) and for the IBM at Branch **On-Line** Always (http://www.halcyon.com/brasoft/index .html). Games for the Atari are hard to find and if you find any please come up to The Banner and tell me.

There are currently 3 commercially available emulators, the Atari 2600 Action pack from Activision (http://www.activision.com), the Commodore 64 Action pack also from Activison, and William's Arcade. There are 3 Atari 2600 packs out and is a decent way to get some cool old games. I personally am waiting for a real emulator to hit the net. The Commodore 64 pack is a waste of time in my opinion since you can get a real emulator and the same games for free from the net. William's Arcade is an emulator of many classic arcade games. William's Arcade contains Sinistar, Bubbles, Joust, Robotron, and Defender. This is diffidently worth a purchase since these are the actual games from the arcade sounds and all. For more info go to the GT Interactive web site (http://www.gtinteractive.com/).

There are also other systems that you can find on the net. There is the MSX emulator. (Side note, the MSX was an attempt in the early 80's for some big Japanese electronic companies to create a home computer standard.) If your interested you can get it from Dave's page. There are also Super Nintendo and Nintendo (8-bit) emulators. The Super Nintendo emulator requires a Pentium with 16 megs of RAM minimum and is not supposed to work that well anyway. The Nintendo (8-bit) emulator exists but I have yet to see one. There is a Vectrex emulator that is in Beta-stages and works but you also need a Pentium. There are also rumors of a Sega Genesis emulator but it's supposed to run crappy. Hopefully someday there will be an Intellivision and Sega Master System emulator soon.

Well I've given you the starting points now you can play all the old games that you grew up with. But, don't throw any of your old systems away just because you have them emulated.


I feel that this senseless acts of

CSI Holds Third Annual Women's Conference

On April 27 the CSI Alumni Association and the Women's Studies Program held the Third Annual Women's Conference, entitled "Difference: Does It Matter?" Professor Electa Arenal of Modern Languages explained that women "have always viewed each other through binoculars - separate and clear." She continued, "Now we need to use a kaleidoscope to see all the differences. Can we keep all our differences without killing each other?"

The gathering began at 9:00 am and ended at 5:00 PM. Approximately 75 people attended. The luncheon was \$10 for students and \$40 for Alumni. Those who wished, could attend the lectures and workshops for free. Participants chose one of six workshops in the morning.

English Professor, Nancy Bogen led the "Publishing Poetry and Short Stories in Little Magazines" workshop. According to Margarita Muinelo, a student, Ms. Bogen described how to write cover letters, and distributed a book "Directory of Literary Magazines". Ms. Muinelo said, "It was very generous of her to give a guide to small magazine publications, to all that attended."

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Professor Judith Stelboum, of the English department held the workshop on the "Significance of Lesbian Identity." A student, Linda Sharib said she was, "glad to see that the topic was even raised on campus because the student body tends to be somewhat homophobic. I think there needs to be more diversity and acceptance; And if you speak about these diversities, you need to speak more unilaterally in that no one gets to judge which diversities are acceptable."

Carol Pavin, a psychotherapist, led the discussion on Women and Codependency. Ms. Pavin explained that there are certain things women can do to prevent codependency, such as: writing out likes and dislikes each day, and paying attention to feelings. She said, "Women are conditioned to be the caretakers and therefore are blamed when things turn out badly. Forgetting one's self results in codependency. A relationship with one's self is most important." Carol Lombardo, a member of the Staten Island community said, "I learned that women who are caring and nurturing are not necessarily codependent. It's only codependency when it's carried to the extreme-" such as forgetting one's own needs.

Seven afternoon workshops were offered. Vita Paino, a student, described the portion on "Women with Disabilities", "Basically all the women talked about obstacles in society. They really were double minorities because they were disabled women." Ms. Paino was particularly concerned because many of the women had been discouraged against continuing education simply because of physical limitations.

The workshop on "Sexual Harassment: Where We're At, Where We're Going" was led by Professor Beatrice Kachuck, Women's Studies / Education, CUNY Graduate Center and Brooklyn College, and by Professor Lilia Melani, founder of the Women's Coalition and also of the English Department at Brooklyn College. Everyone received copies of the CUNY policy against sexual harassment and also the procedures for implementation of the policy. The hosts pointed out many holes within the documents because of unclear terms such as: <u>unreasonable</u> interference of an individuals work. Ms. Kachuch asked, "Who decides what is unreasonable; How much is unreasonable?"

The afternoon workshops concluded the days events. The need for the Women's Conference was summed up by Professor Electa Arenal of Modern Languages, "we (women) need to master the masters tools by either stealing them or making our own."

Students Turn To Job Hunting On The Internet

Leafing through classified ads. Trekking across campus to the career center to check the latest job listings. Mailing out stacks of resumes.

To Sara Sutton and Rachel Bell, it didn't make any sense that job hunting should be such a hassle. So, the two college students decided to do something about it.

Sutton, a junior at the University of California-Berkeley, and Bell, also a junior at Hobart & William Smith Colleges, took a year off from school to establish JobDirect, an Internet-based placement service that officially launched in mid-May.

"We were talking about this whole job process," said Sutton, of herself and Bell, a childhood friend. "We saw the stress of the job hunt."

With JobDirect, students can fill out an online resume form, listing information such as their major and activities. They also can check their area of interest, whether its business, law or sports. The information is stored in a database for companies to peruse, and can be updated by the student at any time. Also, the site's database sorts through job listings and places good matches in student's in-boxes, Sutton said.

To date, she and Bell have recruited 25-50 companies—larger ones like AT&T and Xerox, as well as small- to medium-sized businesses who plan to use JobDirect. Their site joins a variety of other career placement sites already on the Net.

Increasingly, students are turning to the Internet for their job search, as more and more companies are tuning into cyberspace to recruit employees, say college placement officers.

Jeannette Fromm, a graduate student in computer science at the University of Dayton, accepted a job offer as a programmer after only a twomonth job hunt, conducted entirely online.

"The previous times I had been looking for a job, I would have to go to the [UD] Placement Center during the hours they were open, make copies of job listings and take them home to work with," Fromm said.

But this time, by checking web sites created by variety of career placement services, she was able to switch on her computer and look for jobs at any time of the day—whether it was in the morning before classes or late at night.

Job searching on the Internet has been increasingly popular among students in the past six months, according to Sue Borgert, assistant director of job development in the UD Career Placement Center. More companies are posting job listings, more web sites are offering job searches, and more students are using the 'Net to post their resume and land a job, she said.

Chris Wiley, who works with UD alumni searching for career opportunities, said that when job listings first began to appear online, they were primarily for technical positions. "Now we're seeing more and more of any type of position," she said.

Students increasingly are

using the Internet because job listings are constantly updated and available 24 hours a day, Borgert added.

By using the Net, job hunters also demonstrate that they have skills in online research, a relatively new talent that many companies are seeking, she said.

A student can check out the variety of job placement services on the Net by clicking on a search engine such as Yahoo or Excite, then using a keyword search such as "jobs" or "careers"

For example, the site CareerPath was created by six major newspapers, including The New York Times and The Washington Post, and features more than 40,000 job listings.

NationJob's site features a little guy named P.J. (that's short for Personal Job)Scout, who will find job listings that match a user's credential and send them via e-mail.

Other sites, such as College Grad Job Hunter, which describes itself as "your link to life after college," give advise on resume writing.

Chris Wiley of the UD Placement Center cautions students to be careful about what information they post on the Internet, and suggests using only an e-mail address rather than a telephone number or home mailing address.

Also, the ease and convenience of using the Internet may be misleading, Wiley warns. The Internet services should supplement, rather than replace, conventional job-hunting techniques, such as networking and looking through classified ads, Wiley said.

"It's an added tool," she said. "Anything more you can do to have your resume exposed to more companies is going to be a plus."

How to Overcome Doubts about God

"And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose." (Romans 8:28) While we are going through college (as well as life) we might doubt God, especially during hard times. The above promise is in God's Word, the Bible, and God can't lie (Titus 1:2).



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Well folks, another semester is drawing to a close and soon many CSI student's attentions shall turn from school work to a more relaxing subject of study ... beer. It is a well known fact that as the temperature begins to soar people will invariably reach for an ice cold one to help them cool off. Try and avoid the temptation of grabbing a Bud or Coors, there are a lot tastier ways to cool off! For those in the know (and now you are one also), summertime is the time for refreshing wheat beers (or Weissbiers in German). Fortunately there are numerous examples to be found, many of which flow from taps here in Staten Island. If you are a true American patriot you can go for the wheat products made by American microbrewers like Sam Adams or Pete's. Pete's Summerbrew is a Wheat beer that has lemon flavor, perfect if you don't keep slices of lemon handy for your Weiss beer.

By far the greatest Wheat beers, both in number and quality, are products of Germany, with the vast majority coming from the Bavaria region. One of the most readily available Weiss beer is Franzikaner's Hefe-weiss. Franzikaner is available on tap in many bars on the Island, so you will not have problems finding some. Recently the Staten Island

Advance ran an article on Weiss beers, rating four wheat's (Pete's Wicked Honey Wheat, Franziskaner Club Weiss, Pschorr-Brau Dunkel Weisse and Paulaner Hefeweizen). All four are fine wheat beers, but surprisingly missing were two of the finest German wheat beers, Schneider-Weisse and Aventinus (Schneider's Dark weisse).

TomKo Rates the Beers:

Blue Moon Raspberry Cream Ale: This is a wonderful beer that has recently become available in NY. When you open a bottle you immediately become aware of the Raspberries. The beer has a nice flavor, (like drinking a raspberry soda) with a soft creamy finish. When they call it "Raspberry Cream Ale" they aren't kidding! This beer proves that more than just piss-water Coors Light comes from Colorado!

Dead Guy Ale: Rogue brewing has put out one of the most interesting bottles in Dead Guy. I'd buy this one just for the bottle! Oh, and the beer is very good!

Ayinger's Brau-weisse: This is a premium Weiss beer, smooth, refreshing, great with or without lemon. The flavor is sweet and fruity, perfect for a hot day in July.

Schneider-Weisse: One of the best wheat beers around! NEVER serve it with lemon, the flavor is too wonderful to mask. Jim Stavoch introduced me to this fantastic beer, and will always be thankful for that!

Killmeyer's Old **Bavarian** Inn

TomKo on Bars:

If you are a lover of good German beer, served in a beautifully restored Staten Island landmark, Killmeyer's is the place to go. Killmeyer's, located on the corner of Arthur Kill Road and Sharottis Lane, is the latest endeavor from the owners of Adobe Blues. This is a haven for those who love good German beer. If you never had a liter stein of Optimator (or any other excellent German beer) then you'd better head on over and down a few!


The Inn has what is probably the most beautiful bar on Staten Island (if not the entire city). The bar is made from hand carved mahogany that was dyed cherry. It was made in the Bowery in 1890 and assembled on site, with the final touches all added by Russian Jewish immigrants.

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
Much of the furnishings were purchased from a German restaurant that recently closed down in New Jersey (Jerseyis loss is our gain!). The moose head and boar's head help to add to the feeling your are drinking in a real Bavarian bar. The restoration of Killmeyer's is so complete and authentic that one immediately falls in love with the place.

One of the truly unique things about Killmeyer's is the 3 liter mini-keg. If you have never seen one (and unless you've either already visited Killmeyer's or traveled to Munich) it is truly a sight to see. You can get the kegs in any of the nonweisse beers, for a meager \$21. Tap beers run \$3.50 for 1/2 liter and \$7 for full liters. Weisse beers prices vary based on the brand on tap. There are only four taps at Killmeyer's, but they are all good ones. There is a large selection of German bottled beers and American Microbrews to choose from.

Currently only the bar is open. There will be a full menu German restaurant within the next month or so. This joint gets really packed now, and I fully suspect that Killmeyer's will draw even larger crowds once the kitchen is open. If I were you Iíd head over to Killmeyer's ASAP! Another way is by using the Real Audio player by itself and linking it to a station address you know, via the players Hot list or typing the address.

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There is not only Radio stations on the Net, some people also use Real Audio for general sound files. No more downloading big sound files, first listen and if you like what you hear, then you can go through the trouble of downloading.

Gif Animation: (http://member.aol.com/royalef/gifanim.htm)

This feature is supported by Netscape only, and is an easy way to make animated icons, logos, bars, words, or whatever you wish. These programs, which allow you to create these images, is easier to use then Macromedia's Director (and is about \$800+ cheaper). You can get a shareware version of these programs from the Address above. After setting them up, create the image you want to animate frame by frame. Then use the program to make them work the way you want it to. The program that I recommend is Gif Construction Set for Windows 3.x / 95 or Gif Builder for the Macintosh.

The images you create are client side, which means that images load like normal images then do their animation thing. The animated images cause Netscape to appear to be always loading, due to the images restarting from the original frame. This feature works with a 14.4 modem, since they are client side.

Iava: (http://www.sun.com/)

A language developed by Sun Microsystems, based on the C/C++ language. This is an Object Oriented language, which allows web pages to do many things. Java is only supported by Netscape 2.0 or by Sun's Hot Java browser (Not yet available for P.C. or Mac). Java works hand in hand with Html to create Web pages. Its Client side approach does not increase download time. Netscape compiles the Java and runs the program when the page is done loading.

Java has been used to create many interactive pages, examples are Calculators, GPA Calculators, scrolling text, animaetc... tion,

(http://www.gamelan.com/noframe/ Gamelan.html) I have seen sites where Java is used to make traveling the sight easier and telling you how long you have been at that site. With forms, Java has been used to auto update the sections that have identical inputs, etc. etc.

Java is one of the newest ideas to hit the Web, and has brought concerns. People fear that since it is a true programming language, a good programmer could write a program to crash systems, steal data or erase hard drives. The experts at Sun say, that Java posts as much a threat as downloading a game from a site does. They also say that Java is being designed to make the Web more interactive and is not designed to be a threat. There are many possibilities for the uses of Java and as it grows its true 53? capabilities will be known, because Java is not

being used to its true potential.

Since Java gets downloaded like text and Html, a 14.4 modem will be sufficient.

Internet Explorer: (http://www.msn.com)

This is the browser created by Microsoft and it has several features unto itself. These features are basic Html, which allow for a multimedia experience. IE allows background music to be played from the page adding to the theme. Inline images can now be replaced or complemented with inline movies. These inline movies can also be set to look like pictures, until a mouseover causing the movie to be started. A marquee (scrolling text) can be created easily, you don't have to write a special Java code or create an animated image.
