






## Retrenchment Committee Defend Their Preliminary Recommendations

Emotions were expressed at the possible loss of the Physical Education Department and two of the two-year programs within the Engineering Department as well as forced retirements for tenured faculty and the elimination of nearly fifteen staff and administration members. The plan also calls for the elimination of Sunday courses.

Students, faculty, and staff met at a "town meeting" Thursday, May 11th in the Atrium of building 1A. The Retrenchment Committee was present to justify the decisions made in the recommendations for next year's budget. As President Marlene Springer explained, "We are working in a situation where we do not know the bottom line (with the budget) but we have a very real awareness that the bottom line is not going to be something we will enjoy."

President Springer mapped out the route taken by the committee to estimate an approximate \$8 million cut in programs, departments, and administration, explaining that the budget passed by the state would leave CSI with a deficit between \$3 million and \$15 million. "We targeted a midpoint within the spectrum of the best case scenario, which would be a \$3 million cut, and the worst case scenario which would be a possible \$15 million cut to the budget. I asked the committee to aim as middle of the road as possible simply because we have until May 26th to make our intentions known to those people who would be going into early retirement. It seems to me inhumane and unfair to not have at least a realistic situation for these people to make these very painful and lifetime decisions."

Springer continued, "I want to stress, and this is very important, that this is a preliminary draft. We are working with our best foot forward... the plan at this point is general. Once the details are worked out, I will recirculate the plan. We will not have any more open hearings. I've got between May 11th and May 26th to come up with a plan that has to be forwarded to the Chancellor."

Members of the endangered departments were quick to respond to the preliminary recommendations, refusing to accept them. Accusations were made by Professor Lloyd Temes of the Engineering Department towards Springer as well. Mr. Temes said, "Dr. Springer, I accuse you of having an agenda for the removal of the two-year programs. In an interview with the Staten Island Advance (November 1994) you stated to the reporter that 'There is no room for two-year programs at CSI.' I wrote you a letter about this.... It seems odd that when an opportunity arises to cut such programs, you take it."

Mr. Temes proceeded to threaten Springer, stating, "We (the Engineering Tech Department) have gotten a lawyer and we plan in the extreme to instate a vote of no confidence in you if these recommendations are followed." Throughout the accusations and threats, Springer remained quiet.

Evin Pickman, Chairperson of the Phys Ed Department, spoke passionately for his department, stating, "I'm the chairperson of the Physical Education Department, the only other department and program that the committee has recommended to be abolished. We need to maintain the one credit/one course Phys Ed requirement at this college that meets the needs of every single student at this college for the least amount of money than any other program at this college." Angry with the recommendations, Mr. Pickman commented, " I am concerned about the requirement, a requirement that was changed after seven years .... It is important to teach every student how to take care of their physical fitness and health .... I would like to ask someone on the committee to what extent did the committee discuss the Phys Ed requirement in light of recommending the abolishment of the department that it is in."

With an estimated \$2.1 million invested in the campus gym grounds, the Intramural Department (funded through the Student Activity Fee) is expected to make use of the facilities despite the loss of the Physical Education Department.

A member of the sub committee commented to Pickman about the Phys Ed department removal, stating, "The members of the sub committee agree with you, but we did call for the immediate elimination of Phys Ed activity courses, which are no longer required of anyone." He continued, "We estimated that the need for the faculty was greatly reduced and we could not justify the existence of a separate health department. We therefore called for the elimination of the Phys Ed Department."

Angry with the decisions made, activist John Paul Patafio said, "I'm not going to pay \$500 dollars more tuition for less. Do I have a big S on my forehead for sucker?" He and **continued on page 4** 

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**RACIAL TENSIONS STIR DURING GREEK DAY FESTIVAL**

A simple water gun fight in the Campus Center during the Greek Day Festival on May 4 turned racial when students were stopped by security officers and told to put their guns away. "Basically, I don't know why they told us to stop, I guess they thought we were causing trouble they probably assumed someone was going to get hurt," commented student Dred. He continued, "But if

they're going to tell us, they got to tell everybody cause everybody had water guns today, not just us. They just messing with us cause we're black."

He and several friends were playing with their water guns in the campus center when they were stopped by Sergeant Landstrom and six other security officers. Student Thomas Tham commented, "I think it's a racial thing cause; I see everyone holding their water guns and as soon

as they see a black person with a water gun, they bring all their guards here and try to keep them He continued, "Even though under control." they're not running around in here spraying their water guns, they're doing it outside, why do they gotta call extra security to come and try to take the water guns away?"

Racial tensions stirred as students were told to put their guns away. Things remained calm until approximately 2:30 pm when Sergeant Landstrom returned to petition them to "keep the pistols away" because "I have 20 minutes left before my shift is over." Angry that they were sin-

gled out, they argued back asking the reason for his return when Landstrom commented, "Well the budget cuts are coming soon anyway."

Racial allegations flared as security officers tried to calm down the angered students. "What in the fuck was he talking about when he said 'The budget cuts are coming anyway'? What that mean? You trying to say we outta here anyway?" questioned one angry student. Another student, Chassidy, remarked, "What was he talking

about, that all of us are on financial aid? So what, his kids will be on financial aid when they try to come to this school. He's crazy." Chassidy flared, "Security spoke to us already, it was already settled, we put the water guns away, so why did he have to come back over here to us and say that about budget cuts coming anyway? It's not about water guns is it."

Another student involved claimed, "He said 'I gotta leave in twenty minutes so don't do nothing' and I asked 'how are

you going to assume that we're going to do something' and he said 'I'm not assuming,' then he says about the budget cuts." The student who wished to remain anonymous continued, "There was this white kid with this big water pistol, same thing we had and he didn't say nothing to him." The students vented their anger asking why they where singled out from the white students. Dred commented, "What's fair for one is fair for all, basically that's how we feel, and they've been messing with us on numerous occasions today so fuck them." Campus director Mike Daniels and security personnel were unavailable for comment.

# CULTS ON CAMPUS?

### CHURCH CLUBS ACCUSED AS A FRONT FOR CULT RECRUITING

**Recent allegations have** been made targeting Christian clubs on campus, naming the groups to be central recruiting stations for cult involvement. "Their only goal in life is to convert others into the belief and these groups on campus... it's actually a front to bring in people," claimed activist Tom Reily. Accusations were made that the groups demand a percentage of a person's wages, designate seasoned members as 'disciplers' to watch over and guide new recruits, and persecute those who dare to challenge their ideas. Among the groups trageted are the International Church of Christ, the Active Christians Taking a Stand (ACTS) and the Collegic Association for **Research of Principles (C.A.R.P.).** 

"A cult by definition," explained activist against cults John Bethell, "is a totalist religious group which dominates members' attention and rigidly prescribes their conduct in most of their daily activity." He continued, "These groups are customarily associated with a charismatic leader, tends to have a pre-occupation with the attainment of money and frequently use deceptive techniques to recruit and convert new members." Mr. Bethell commented, "They'll tell you 'come along to a dinner' or 'come to a bible study, we are just going to learn about God,' but what you do is when you go to that meeting you get roped in and they start controlling more and more of what you do.'

"When I joined ACTS," said ex-ACTS member Kevin Popovits, "I was told that what I believed was wrong according to the bible. They told me that they were the one and only true church and that if you didn't go to their church you wouldn't be going to heaven."

He continued to explain that members within the group were required to give ten percent of their private income to the group, stating, "They mark down how much money you had given in," Everybody's marked down, your name and how much you had given. No one knows where this money goes... they give out financial statements but I really feel that's all a bunch of B.S."

Accused of cultish behavior, ACTS President Don Jason Cordero was unavailable to respond and reporters were unable to find the group in their club room during club hours. Attempting to leave the group, Mr. Popovits alleges he was abused by the members, stating, "When I was ready to leave, I was put down by elders of the church." He continued, "They claimed I couldn't deal with the sins in my life. I was yelled at that I couldn't deal with the persecution of the church... I couldn't stand to their truth and that I would fall away from God."

Aside from the required monetary donations, members are forced to my life was going. They were telling me who not to date. They didn't like the idea that I was going to college to be a social worker, they thought I should get ready, settle down and start a women's ministry cause that's what I'm 'supposed to do' they decided for me."

C.A.R.P. is also accused of following the same patterns, hiding the

limit their association to their 'brothers and sisters' and not 'mix yokes' with those who are 'unsaved' in order to ensure their salvation. Mr. Reily, former member of ACTS, commented, "There was a friend of mine who wouldn't join the group and they suggested that it was not the best thing for me to be friends with this person...it was bad for my salvation."

Aside from controlling members within the group, the organization allegedly has a 'sin list.' "You have to confess all of your sins and they write everything down. If you do something wrong they go down the list and they let the elders know but they won't tell you that the elders know, so when you go to the elder, they will claim some revelation from God that you have sinned," explained Bethell.


Another ex-ACTS member Michelle Alpert claims that when a member strays from the teachings, they are publicly put through 'breaking' sessions where the stronger members emotionally attack them and threaten them with eternal damnation. "When you don't take their advice and when you don't do certain things, you are interrogated mentally. They are not known to use physical violence but they will tear you apart mentally," said Popovits. One member was stood up during a bible talk and was ridiculed until she burst into tears for disagreeing with some of the teachings.

Under the intense peer pressure, Ms. Alpert also sustained such suffering. "At the church one day there was me and a couple of women and I ended up in tears. I was actually driving home when I stopped my car at a green light and broke into tears. That's how upset I was because I didn't want to take their 'advice'." She continued, "They were telling me who I was going to have in my life, and where fact that the club is highly involved with the teachings of Sun Myung Moon and, according to Reily, "CARP is otherwise known as the moonies." When he tried to run for Student Government, SG Senator Natasha Genduso commented on the President of CARP Ralph Oppenheimer stating, "I asked him who was the head of his organization and he hesitated and I didn't know he was part of the 'moonie' organization. He concealed it very very well. I asked him several times when I noticed he was concealing it. He never made it known at the college."

President of CARP, Mr. Oppenheimer, stated, "Calling someone 'moonie' is like calling a black person 'Nigger' or a Jewish person a 'kike.' There is a lot of religious bigotry. If you talk to a church person and tell them 'what about allegations made that you are a holy roller' it's wrong and it's discriminatory."

He continued, "The accusations made are just people's opinions. There are no facts behind them, they are just stereotypes and I want to hold them accountable because I have seen too much religious persecution. I hold nothing back. In my organization, we are currently looking at the teachings of Rev. Sun Myung Moon as a basis for promoting peace."



78 cents of every dollar raised in the Walk America



# **FEVER CURE FOUND BY PRE-MED CLUB PRESIDENT?**

### The George.L.Perry Theory on the Mechanism of **Fever Production**

"Thermogenesis is under the direct control of the Central Nervous System (C.N.S.)." (1). Since fever is a type of thermogenesis it follows that fever is under C.N.S. control, specifically the anterior hypothalamic preoptic area (AHPOA) and the hypothalamic paraventricular nucleus (PVN). The process is controlled through various feedback systems. Ultimately, this control is at the molecular level and biochemically based.

### **Physiological Response:**

A cascade reaction can be observed to illustrate the body's mechanism to produce a fever. A fever is a systemic response to an invading microorganism culminating in a temporary raising of body temperature. The mechanism to produce this systemic response begins when white blood cells sense an invading microorganism and produce pyrogenic cytokines (a.k.a pyrogens) such as interleukin IL-l Beta or IL-6. (2). These pyrogens then travel to the brain where they attach to pyrogenic receivers in the AHPOA and trigger the AHPOA to signal the PVN to raise body temperature. The post pituitary then increases ADH production, the anterior pituitary increases TRH and TSH production, the Thyroid gland increases T3, T4, and cAMP production, and production the finally of "Deoxydihydrousferricase" (DOBHF) (3) by rough endoplasmic reticulum. The net effect is an increased amount of water intake through thirst stimulation, increased water retention, an ATP deficit, and an accumulation of cAMP.

### **Biochemical basis:**

What I propose is happening at the molecular level is as follows: An iron atom is added to a section or sections of native proteins containing the amino acids Met or Cys. These amino acids are unique in that they contain a sulfur atom. The iron atom attaches to the section of the protein near the sulfur atom. Two water molecules are also attached to the iron atom as it attaches to the protein. This is performed by DOBHF. The net product at this step has been the attachment of a complex containing two water molecules and an iron atom attaching itself to an amino acid containing sulfur on a protein.

What I believe we will observe at this step is that the tertiary structure of native proteins containing sulfur is strengthened through existing disulfide bridges and the addition of the iron-water complex. This is done so native proteins will not be denatured as body temperature is raised. The entire protein structure also now has increased hydrophobic properties. This is done to increase the survival of native proteins. Finally, we will observe the production of heat. I suggest that this is an exothermic reaction with a  $\Delta$  H value of approximately -160 kJ/mol caused by sigma bond formation. (4). See accompanying diagram.



ADH levels decrease as excess water molecules are utilized into my molecular model. This will also make it more difficult for the invading microorganism to get inside cells.


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### Summation:

The summation of this process is an increase in thirst, a decrease in iron ion concentration in the body and simultaneous decrease in ADH levels as the thirst response is fulfilled after all necessary water molecules have been added to my proposed molecular model, increase in body temperature, change in membrane potential, an increase in AMP and cAMP production as the body expends ATP's to produce all hormones and the enzyme DOBHF, inhibition of hormones and DOBHF, death of invading microorganisms, dissolving of proposed molecular model as entropy prevails, excretion of microorganisms with the assistance of excess water present, and return of body to homeostasis.

If this theory is correct it would seem that both fever production and microorganism procreation could be controlled simultaneously by simply varying iron ion concentration in the body. By decreasing iron ion concentration we decrease both the body's mechanism to produce fever as well as a necessary component for microorganism procreation. (This is my thesis).

As iron chelates are already produced by the pharmaceutical industry, the availability of a device to serve this purpose exists. A study on the side effects of iron chelates with and without the presence of fever would be necessary at this time. I do suggest that the body's mechanism should not be interfered with or overridden unless body temperatures approach fatal or near fatal levels.





Jaguar offers 64-BIT technology today, but for some reason it is just not selling as well as it should. This leaves everyone asking, "why?"

Now that Nintendo has got cold feet, one might be tired of waiting for the next level of 995 video games. The Jaguar system, as of today is, one of the most advanced systems in the 18, market. For only \$149 it would seem that the Jaguar would be Thursday, MAY a steal. Yet for some reason, it is just not moving.

This is not surprising. Two years ago, Atari has the most advanced portable system out. The 16-BIT Lynx sold for only \$20 more than

Nintendo's Game Boy, yet the Black & White system was supreme.


did not see the need for a good pack-in game or third party companies. This is what doomed the Lynx. Has Atari learned from their mistakes?

# lt's Personal

Hello, I am a student at the college who wishes to address all who will listen. I have a story to tell, so here goes ...

At five years of age, I was a rape victim. At six and seven, I was raped and molested repeatedly by a church official, a janitor at my school, a stranger at my school, a fifth grader, and others I can't remember. Because I was young, and because I didn't understand, I began to blame myself. I never told my parents because I felt that I deserved the treatment. My self-esteem became non-existent, and I became highly suicidal. At thirteen, I made my first suicide attempt. While I was in high school, I went through therapy, but when I was attacked again, I completely froze and had to go through more intense therapy to pull me out of my shell.

Recently, during the Easter vacation, my parents left a male friend of the family in the house with me. "Bill" had been a good friend for nearly five years and we thought nothing of leaving him

in the house alone with me. My parents left us to "watch the house." I automatically went to the kitchen to wash the dishes as Bill followed to keep me company. Bill watched me as I rattled on about my job and my day. Suddenly he asked me to go into the living room because he wanted to talk. As I reached for the light switch, he grabbed me around the waist and pulled me down backwards onto the couch. At first I thought he was playing and I tried to pull away telling him to "knock it off." The tighter I pulled, the tighter he held me. I began to struggle harder but Bill is considerably stronger than me, and my attempts were futile. I was thrown on the floor, Bill on top of me, when suddenly, I remembered therapy. Knowing I couldn't fight him, I stayed calm and began talking to him. Desperate but firm, I told him, "We're like family, I'm like your sister, I'm your baby sister. Don't hurt me, don't hurt your sister, this is incest! You're raping your sister!" He had just begun to tug at my pants when he stopped. I kept talking, "You don't want to hurt me

do you?" Bill pulled completely away and began to cry, telling me how sorry he was. After about five minutes, he left. As I locked the door behind him, I realized I had actually talked my way out of being raped. What was best of all was that I didn't hate myself and blame myself as I had done in the past. Therapy had helped me to overcome that horrible feeling of worthlessness and I was feeling good about myself.

Not every situation is the same, and I know it is tragic when something happens to a person that is so violent, but I also know there is a light at the end of the tunnel. You must remember that talking about it with counselors and people you trust helps you to deal with it. One thing I was able to realize (through the help of friends) was that it was NOT my fault.

I must say that I don't hate Bill but I do pity him. I thank you for your attention and I guess my writing about my situation can be considered the final step to my long healing process. - Kay

## Correct Urinating Procedures For Males at C.S.I.

It has come to my attention that some male students at C.S.I. are unclear on the steps necessary to successfully begin and complete the urination process. I shall not focus on the physiological aspects of osmotic pressure and homeostasis. Instead, I will explain the procedure from a logistical point of view with consideration to the ergonomical implications of different types of attire.

Step 1: Take whatever steps are necessary to avoid contact between urine and clothing. It is suggested that you either utilize the zipper mechanism in the front of your pants (if so equipped), or

partially pull down your outer and (if so attired) undergarment(s). This is done to decrease the possibility of public embarrassment or permanent garment staining.

Step 2: Initiate urinating maintaining maximum concentration on the aim of the urine stream. IDEALLY, WE WANT ALL OF THE URINE TO BE DELIVERED TO THE URINAL OR TOILET AND NONE TO THE TOILET SEAT, THE FLOOR, THE STALL, OR THE WALL. It is recommended that the toilet seat be raised to minimize the failure rate of this step. This component of the process is vital for several reasons including, but not limited to the following:

a) respect for your fellow students, who for various biological or sanitary reasons, may not have the time to spend cleaning the toilet seat.

b) respect for maintenance personnel. Although they are paid to maintain the facilities within certain parameters, a little effort can help them satisfy several aspects of their job description.

c) respect for the environment. Urine is both biodegradable and recyclable.

Step 3: Complete the process, maintaining the focus of steps 1 and 2, and proceed in an opposite direction as was described and appropriate to your particular circumstance in step 1.

Note: It is suggested that you wash your hands for sanitary reasons upon completion of steps 1, 2, and 3. If you are not sure as to the correct procedure to wash your hand(s), contact your local O.S.H.A. office and A.N.S.I. representative for current procedures.

Caution: It is not recommended that you urinate on the toilet paper roll itself. Nor is it recommended that you throw a roll, or rolls of toilet paper into a sink, urinal, or toilet.

For a more detailed description of the above procedure contact your local health care representative.

If you are caught urinating in a manner deemed inappropriate you may be subject to criminal prosecution, civil liabili-

ty, and academic sanctions for violating sections of the Penal Law, Environmental Code, Public Health Law, Administrative Code, and Campus Behavior Code. This has been a public service announce-

ment on behalf of those members of the C.S.I. community who are continuously outraged at the lack of maturity, respect, and discipline some of our fellow students have for one another. If this article has offended you in any way, it was not the intent of the author to do so, nor attempt to do so.

## "I'm not counting on leaving": An informal interview with Professor Stanley Zimmerman.

Professor Stanley Zimmerman teaches engineering technology at the College of Staten Island. He's been teaching at C.S.I. since 1956. He's been here before it was called the College of Staten Island, when it was Staten Island Community College. He has a B.A. in sociology, a M.A. in adult education, an M.M.E. in engineering, and is a licensed P.E. (Professional Engineer). The Ad-Hoc Committee of the college has proposed that the Mechanical Engineering Technology and Industrial Engineering Technology programs be eliminated. Under this proposal, Professor Zimmerman's position would be eliminated. Unless he is "adopted" by another department, he would be forced to retire. I first heard and saw him at the May 11th retrenchment hearings.

He got up in front of the committee last Thursday around (two o'clock that day) and lodged his complaint. He felt that two year degrees were being denigrated. He said that many students that received two year degrees from C.S.I have gotten "wonderful jobs" and have gone further in their education. He was angered at the attitude of the school and the fact they feel his department should be cut. He impressed me as a man on a mission based on absolute sincerity and dedication. After he finished speaking, I was compelled to interview him to hear more about the issues from his point of view. We agreed to an interview at 5:15 that day.

I got to his office at the correct time and he was there advising a student. Another student was waiting to speak with him. He asked me if I would wait while helped that young man. This showed me he was more concerned with students than with his own predicament. About twenty minutes later we started the interview.

He told me some of his life at SICC and CSI. He and another Faculty member helped start a bas-

ketball team during the first year of Staten Island Community College (1956). He also started the first musical group on campus, and played violin in performance of Baroque music. He had a opportunity to do a concert series with a professional planist, but was unable to do so because it would have taken time away from his teaching. Today he is probably the only professor in the country teaching a course in "Technology and Society", who has degrees in both areas.

We discussed the retrenchment plan's recommendation to eliminate the two engineering technology curricula. He said, "The whole business is bad news. I think the Ad-Hoc Committee did not have an accurate perception of the true numbers, and who is teaching what in the department."

Also he believes that the Ad Hoc Committee made a mistake when they recommended his retirement. "I'm not only teaching students in these curricula [that are being cut]." he said. He teaches classes that deal with computing, architecture, and civil technology which aren't proposed to be cut. If the school lost him, then they would be losing a professor that can teach more than his specific curriculum.

When I asked about the students, all he could say was, "According to Professor Levine, contingencies are going to be made." Professor Zimmerman knows the students are going suffer and he's trying to help them so these cuts wouldn't hurt them. You get the feeling he is more concerned about them than himself.

Professor Zimmerman has applied for retirement because he believes that it would help his department's chance for survival, in that would be one less person on the payroll. Nevertheless, he hopes that he will be able to continue to teach a few courses on an adjunct basis. This hope is based on certain conditions to be determined by the Administration. He has also been informed that he will retain the use of his office and the college computer facilities, based on other conditions.

What does the future hold for Professor Stanley Zimmerman? Teaching wise, no one knows. He's been approached by a publisher to print some of his poems. He recites his poems at poetry readings and in the classroom. When I was interviewing him, he recited one of his poems, called "Graffiti". It was a beautiful poem, and there was one line that stuck in my mind. "I'm here. I want to be counted." One can only wonder for how long.

Dear Editor:

I read with some interest your musings on three sculptures sited at various locations on campus. Without rehearsing the history of the Friedland bronze BIG STRIDE, a gift by the artist to the college, I would point out that Ms. Friedland has a long history of involvement in the women's movement including a charter membership in NOW. The vocabulary of forms is drawn from classical art, as you doubtless recognized since you've taken so many art classes, hence the impression

that this is a figure worn and affected by time: a figure, nonetheless, with considerable energy. We may not like or share the artist's associations or intentions, but the point is the piece can be read in this way. The other piece illustrated in a rather inadequate photograph is SHOOLILLO, a concrete piece by Miriam Bloom, a Staten Island sculptor who has exhibited widely and is known for whimsical images. Its placement in front of the future Day Care Center was calculated to appeal to the children who will be using that building. Indeed, the intention was to engage them with the piece — even to the point to touching or climbing on it.

The "THING ON THE GREAT LAWN" is ARK (as in Noah's), red chestnut and Hudson River granite, by Daniel Wurtzel. an artist admired for his handling of natural materials. Wurtzel was attempting to evoke a primordial structure, something monumental and powerful, capable of surviving time and natural assaults. Apart from artistic intentions, recognized or not by CSI viewers like yourself, the sculpture echoes those natural elements most characteristic of the site, namely trees and boulders such as those nearby. In my opinion, and it is shared by others, it is a compelling work, particularly effective in the winter when it interacts with the snow. A number of pieces are appearing - in the plaza in front of the Library, on the lawn to the left of the rear entrance to the Center for the Arts, on an island in the loop road, and in the edges of the Wooded Park. Two large sculptures will be installed in the Center for the Arts and the Gymnasium in the coming months. The latter piece, MARATHON by Red Grooms is a work that should find broad appeal since it is a very accessible and zany image. No possibility for phallic fantasies here, but as you wrote the point of school and of art is "to make us think" and to solicit reaction.

I would first like to say thank you in participating in the Banner's lazy journalism, but unfortunately you were the only one to speak positively about CSI's works of art.

After every issue is out, I will get responses from the CSI family (students, faculty, etc.). With the exception of your letter, everyone agreed with the article. I mean it...everyone. I would hear, "Yeah Mike what is the deal with those things." The descriptions of the sculptures in "Mysteries of CSI"

was an echo of what I was hearing, not so much what I was thinking. In fact some of the article was toned down. My goal was not to poke fun, but to generate a defense for these creations. It is truly sad to see you are the only one.

I know at least someone else besides Professor Kelder looks at these objects as art other than landfill bate. So I ask again, "does anyone think highly of these sculptures? Does anyone want to remove them? Does anyone care?"

The decision of TAB is comprised of two students, one mem-ber of teaching facult, one member non teaching staff and one member of professional staff and one member of professional staff appointed by the President of Auxiliary Services.

Parking is not bermin ted in locations not explicitly iden freed for this purpose, such as road-parking lot asiles, walkzougs and grass areas. A certain number of spots have been addee as approved for parking where gravel has been spread. Other than the gravel los parking is permitted only within spaces marked for parking by para (lines (white or blue) on pavement. nlle 2. Permitted hours.

a. On days that classes are not in ses-sion lots are open to all motor vehi-cles. Faculty/Staff lots are restricted on all working days.

b. Parking in faculty/staff lots is restricted to holders of faculty/staff permits from 7:30AM - 6:00PM Monday through 9 raday. After 6:00PM any registered vehicle may be parked in these /ots. Designated reserved spaces are restricted at all times; i.e. disabled parking spaces, loading zones and spaces designated as reserved for specific staff or departments.

3. Improper parking.

a. The assignment of a parking per-mit does not quarpite a space. The ariver is responsible for finding an approved spot for the venicle. Tarking closest to one is building can-not be quaranteed. However, for everyone is convenience there are shut-tle bisses operating on a frequent schedule.

b. All drivers are cautioned that the college, having marked approved space, does not mark all treas where parking is prohibited. An y area not so designated is not considered a legitimate parking area. An approved space is designated by parallel times panited on the pavement.

NOTE: Certain unimproved lots are not lined out for parking purposes so that the definition of approved spaces does not apply.

 RESPONSIBILITY

The owner and/or operator of a pri-vate vehicle for use on campus is responsible for its operation and for any fines or charges incurred. By reg-istering a vehicle for campus prio-leges, the registrant and or otware agree to abile by all - traffic and parking regulations. The assignee of college owned vehicle is responsible for its operation and any fines incurred during the period of assign-ment.

B. TEMPORARY INSTRUC-TION

C. REGISTRATION

Occasionally, special short term con-ditions arise that may require sus-pending a portion of these regula-tions, or may require additional, tem-porary regulations and/or instruc-tion, The Director of Security is authorized to take such actions as circumstances require.

Students, faculty, staff and affili-ated campus employees (i.e. CST Association, Auxiliary Services etc.) may register a vehicle for campus use in accordnet with the procedures outlined below, and upon payment of an appropriate registration fee. 2. An order/operator may register no more than one vehicle for on-campus use.

II. ELIGIBILITY - An owner/oper ator with an unpaid fine will not be permitted to register a motor vehicle for on-campus parking until the indebtedness i.e. satisfied.

A Response to Stupidity

### First get your facts straight then write, or at least your brain in place. By Sarah Husain

This is a response to an article written by Chris Zeyer, "Stupidity of a Protester II: The Town Meeting" in the Banner Issue XIV (May 4th).

Chris Zeyer has written two pieces about the budget cuts fight back, both of the pieces are outrageous and makes a student wonder if he is for or against the cuts. When discussing the cuts, readers would appreciate that a college student write something factual and readable. Making comments like:

> I couldn't stand watching students parading around practicing acts of futility. I figured it was youth and ignorance spewing their opinion. I found out a few weeks ago that age and arrogance can be just as foolish.

Mr. Zever obviously does not understand, I guess because as he says he "has no life" that the proposed budget cuts to CUNY is no joke.

These cuts that threaten to shut thousands of students out of an education, are the highest cuts in the history of CUNY. The cuts propose to increase tuition by a d \$1000 (the result of a \$148 million cut in state funding), a 10% cut in Financial Aid, the elimination of SEEK, elimination of thousands of classes and laying off of 100's of faculty and staff.

On March 23 when 20,000 students came out to protest the cuts, they weren't there "practicing acts of futility", or coming out to protest for their education because they had nothing better to do or don't have "no life." March 23 was a historical day, that protest was one of the largest since the Vietnam protests in NYC. It was a mass militant action that was organized independently by students, not by some so-called "student leaders" (SG) or NYPIRG or Administration. As a result it forced the politicians to announce that there will be reduction in the proposed cuts.

One lesson to be learned from the 23, that the "violence" that broke out was initiated by the NYPD, the hired thugs of the State and City politicians. Obviously those 20,000 or more High School and CUNY students were a threat to the present economic situation of the City. Since the Republicans

and the Democrats are proposing to cut all sectors of the social services that working people rely upon, the 23 the march down to Wall street would've been a catalyst for other sectors such as labor to launch a fight back against the cuts. The demand of those students to march to Wall street was directed towards the Rich who control the City. Surely this symbolic act was carried out with help of workers on April 4 and it raised the consciousness of the Working Class of this City, State and Country.

The violent response of the State illustrates the class conflict that are rising between the ruling rich and the working class. The uneven distribution of wealth under capitalist system, is becoming evident more and more due to the cuts that the two leading parties keep throwing on the backs of the working class. The only way to control the situation, the politicians unleash their hired thugs, the cops, by macing, clubbing and arresting students.

### The "picnic"? I Think Not!

He goes on to call the town hall meeting on April 13th a " protesting prostitution" and a "picnic." Transit getting cut is no "picnic", this City not only relies on public transportation, but the proposed cuts will fire 100's of workers. The cuts to Health Care and Hospitals threaten to eliminate 30,000 home-care workers, who are women, black and Latinos. Medicaid alone is being slated of 1.3 billion dollars, which is the State's single biggest employer.

On April 13, when Pataki came to Staten Island, his first visit since the budget cuts were proposed, he believed that he would not get a negative reception to his budget proposal. Well, he got a surprise. More then 500 Transit workers from Amalgamated Transit Union and School bus drivers were out in force. The whole auditorium was full, not just the "upper back bleachers", Mr. Zeyer. This action was not "cute" or "protesting prostitution" it was a threat to politicians as well as their Multi-millionaire bosses. The Transit workers have the power to shut the city down, if they go on a strike this city can not move. An example is the Philadelphia Transit workers Strike. The workers there went on a strike for 12 days and won all of their demands. If Mr. Zeyer calls a workers protest a "picnic", he surely does not understand the social power of the workers.

The strike in Philadelphia was not heard of in the corporate media and this obviously negates Mr. Zeyer's comment that "each group" at the April 13th protest was "trying to entice a media person with sayings like 'Come here, I got something you can print, or showing off their big, bright signs for a camera." Any fool, unfortunately not Zeyer, who looks closely at the News knows how racist and bias it is. The only thing that it is successful in doing is brain washing people, and Mr. Zeyer is definitely one of them.

### **Democracy for whom?**

The workers as well as CUNY students were not "just wasting time for questioning with all the hooting and hollering." Pataki was only their for his own benefits. He wanted to support for and defend his budget proposal. Nobody "wasted time for questioning" because the protesters weren't there to negotiate, they were plainly there to convey the message in force against the budget cuts. Pataki spoke of so-called 'democracy." For whom? Well the workers there exposed it by their chants and jeers that the proposed budget cuts didn't come out of a democratic procedure. plainly these budget cuts only benefit a the few rich and hurt the majority who are the working people.

The question posed to Pataki about taxing wall street, evidently Mr. Zever doesn't understand. That question was not only for Pataki but to expose the Republican and the Democratic parties politics as well as who they represent. Both parties in this country are of the ruling class. Recently Clinton gave \$50 billion to Wall Street to bail them out of Mexico and Giuliani gave a \$50 million tax break to 1st Boston Bank, one of the richest bank in the world. Surely, these two decisions that both the Republican and the Democratic parties made weren't in any benefit of the working class. The only thing that both parties offer is to eliminate Welfare, education and health care to built prisons and further poverty for the masses.

Pataki's answer to that question, that if he taxed the rich he would be "taxing them right into New Jersey" is a foot in his own mouth. His answer only exposes the fact that workers are held hostage by the corporations. His logic only crystallizes the fact that ruling class dictates the lives of the majority of the people in this country and world wide. If corporations get taxed then they will move to another place to find cheap labor and exploit workers their. Why is it such a big problem for corporations to switch places? The so-called "sheer stupidity" that you, Mr. Zeyer, call the questions of the protesters on April 13th, only shows your own "sheer stupidity." The lack of content in your superficial criticisms is revealed in your paternal suggestions to the "misguided protesters". You suggest that protesters should remain orderly (as if there can be order when people's lives are in danger due to the cuts) and ask the magical questions that will catch "THE MAN" (Pataki) "off guard."

It is obvious that you pose formal recommendations because you lack any substantial analysis of the politics, beneath the smiles of the politicians you don't at all pose an alternative of fighting the cuts. Your fascination with "image" replaces the political demands that must be put forward. This is not accidental on your part.

Unlike you, we have an alternative to the cuts (some of which you do not understand but yet have the arrogance to criticize) based upon the needs of working people. When we put forward the demand to tax the rich, a demand that received mass support from the crowd that day, it is with the understanding that we know that the politicians will avoid at all cost the implementation of such measures. When we demand that there should be no layoffs, no budget cuts it is not just some "wanna-be 60's" who want to scream in front of the cameras but is based upon the needs of students and workers.

In the end the fundamental problem is one of ownership of the means of production, that is the private ownership of the industries and banks that produce all the wealth in society. We want to place the future of society into the hands of those that produce it - the workers, not the fat administrators or capitalist. The way in which this will be accomplished is through the ranting and raving that you, with foolish pride, denounce so arrogantly.

Sarah Husian, in my opinion, is one of the finest writers against the cuts. She has stated intelligent points about the budget cuts and has accurate facts and figures to back herself up. This response proves that she knows what she is talking about. She does have one problem.
