y daughter writes", said Fahamisha Brown's mother, after Langston Hughes recited his poetry and was speaking to the audience. "You do?" replied the poet. "I try", was what the painfully shy Fahamisha came back with. "She wrote her school play", her mama pressed on.

"Oh. You *are* a writer," declared Langston Hughes.

Being taken by her mother to poetry recitations made Professor Brown fall in love with poetry. This love is still breathing today. Growing up as part of the integration generation, living through the civil rights movement, traversing across Africa, and being the first in her family to go to college, Professor Brown has led a most interesting life.

Q. Where are you from?

A. Chicago.

• Where have you traveled to?

A. My ambition is to visit every African country. So far I'm about 1/5th of the way through. I've been to Senegal, Liberia, Ghana, The Ivory Coast, Nigeria, Kenya, Egypt, and Morocco. The experience there has always been positive for me. Americans really know very little about Africa. They mostly think that there's only poverty and the like. There is a different side that I was able

to see. I usually visit the University Campuses, where I have seen the academic side of Africa. I have noticed that black people, wherever they are, are culturally similar. They are similar in the music they listen to, their clothing styles, and their religion.

Africans also have a predetermined idea about Americans. When I was in Nigeria, I was led around by guides and at one point we stopped at a roadside market. The guides were quite surprised that I was willing to eat corn on the cob that was boiled right there. I have also noticed that Church going is quite similar in Africa and in America. The clothes are a big part. Everyone still dresses up in his or her Sunday Church clothes. I have also been to Puerto Rico, Martinique, Mexico, and Canada. I've also visited several states in the U.S.

Where have you lived?

A. I've lived in Chicago and in Boston. I like Chicago best , as it is my hometown. New York City comes in second place. Boston is funny because everything closes at 12:00 am.

Do you have a favorite book, poem, or play?

A. No favorites. Sometimes I'll go through phases where I'll read everything by a certain writer. My specialty is poetry. I do love Gwendolyn Brooks and Niyi Osundare. I love literature and the shelves in my office don't compare with my house.

Q. Your clothing style is beautiful, what is the story behind it?

A. My young adulthood was a period when cultural nationalism was in. That had an influence. However a bigger part would be that since I've traveled in Africa so much, I began to love the style.

A parking ticket triggered violence at 1C's loading dock Thursday, September 2nd, resulting in four injured peace officers, two non-students arrested and barred from the college, and another suspect still being sought by the NYPD.

"I'm here sixteen years and I've never seen this kind of violence directed toward the officers," said Gene Martinez, Director of Public Safety.

The incident was captured on one of the several video monitors mounted on buildings around campus. At approximately 3:45 pm, a traffic enforcer, Sgt. Donald Girard, issued a ticket to a car parked illegally in front of 1C's loading dock. The Sgt. Girard *Continued on page 3*

The search for a new general manager at WSIA may be coming to a close—or it may not. On Friday, September 10, one of the two finalists in the search took part in a phone interview; another came to CSI for an in-person interview, which included a closed door meeting with students who volunteer at WSIA. And on September 23rd, the final finalist had his final interview.

Despite such progress, there is no time frame for the search to wrap up, according to Carol Brower, CSI 's Director of Student Life. "I think it was a positive day in the search," she said on Monday, September 13th. "I'm not really sure what the final opinion is."

Although there are now 3 finalists currently under considerationwhich is down from 7- there is a chance that if none of the finalist is hired, there will have to be a whole new search. "We'll have to do a whole new search," said Brower. "Then it would be sometime in spring."

Brower emphasized that she does not want to put pressure on the staff members at WSIA to pick one of the 3 finalists, but at the same time warns them that doing so may delay the process. "I don't want to have students come back in 2 months and say we don't have a GM," said Brower, "but I don't want them picking someone they don't like."

Reporters from The Banner were not present at the September 10th meeting, at the request of Brower, who said she wanted to "protect the finalist's privacy." When asked why a representative from publications was not present at the meeting as required, Brower blamed the error on miscommunication and promised that someone would be present at the next interview. "Next time we'll do a better job getting the word out," she said.

Meanwhile, Dr. David Shear, who had been the Interim General Manager at WSIA since shortly after Greg Adamo resigned from the post in August 2002, and a community volunteer since 1993, told the Banner that the GM search didn't have to take this long.

"I went through the search committee like everyone else, to be fair," said Shear in a recent interview. "They liked all my answers in the phone interview and the in-person. It seemed like a done deal. Two weeks before my contract expired I was called to Jackson's office," Shear explained, referring to Carol Jackson, CSI's Vice President for



Bush Returns to Ground Zero for Political Gain

A lot of outrageous things have been said during the current election season, but few of these comments have been so absurd as what recently came out of the mouth of Dick Cheney. In a town hall style meeting early this month, Cheney hit a new low when he seemed to imply that a vote for John Kerry would be a vote for terrorism.

It's absolutely essential that eight weeks from today, on Nov. 2, we make the right choice, Cheney warned his audience, because if we make the wrong choice then the danger is that well get hit again.

This comment by Cheney was no accident. The Republicans have done their research. The pollsters and focus groups have submitted their results, and one thing is undeniably clear: Bush wins on terrorism. But, the President wouldn't actually try to capitalize on our fears, would he?

On a sunny day in late August, Dick Cheney arrived in New York City, where he was welcomed by delegates on Ellis Island. The speech was part of a photo opportunity to kick off the GOP convention, which would begin the next day.

As Cheney gave his speech, with the Manhattan skyline as a backdrop, 200,000 people marched up 8th Avenue past Madison Square Garden, to give the V.P. a different sort of welcome. (Editor's Note: See pages 6 and 7 for the Banner photo spread on the demonstrations.)

It's no secret that New York is a Democratic City. A poll taken a week before the convention showed that 80% of New Yorkers did not want the convention to come here. But they came. For the entire week, a fourblock radius around Madison Square Garden was cordoned to keep the delegates in a protective bubble.

This city has spent three years healing the emotional wounds that resulted from the worst terrorist attack on American soil and George W. Bush returns to Ground Zero and picks up some political points that he apparently left on top of the smoldering rubble.

The fact that Bush capitalizes off the September 11th constitutes one of the greatest political magic tricks in history. After all, Bush was in charge when those planes hit the towers. Former White House terrorism adviser Richard Clarke claims that he repeatedly tried to address the threat from Al Qaeda before 9/11.

He ignored terrorism for months, when maybe we could have done something to stop 9/11, Clarke told 60 minutes. "Maybe. We'll never know."

Then on August 6th 2001, one month before the attacks Bush received a presidential daily briefing entitled "Bin Laden Determined to Strike in US." The briefing mentioned that there were patterns of suspiclous activity in this country consistent with preparations for hijackings.

Nevertheless, the country is convinced that Bush will keep them safe and the GOP convention theme was "all terrorism all the time." Through a barrage of scare tactics and patriotism emerges the second Bush fallacy: the war in Iraq has made us safer. images of dead bodies on Aljazeera and the abuses at Abu Ghraib prison have done incalculable damage to our nation's image and have been an effective recruitment tool for al Qaeda.

Last April the State Department released an optimistic report on global terrorism for 2003. Deputy Secretary of State Richard Armitage held a press conference boasting that

If the President dropped the ball on 9/11, he dropped the kitchen sink on Iraq. A recent intelligence report offered a bleak outlook on the country including a possible outbreak of civil war. The insurgency has stepped up its attacks and they appear to be more organized. Entire cities are out of our control. We've lost more than 1,000 soldiers and about 10,000 Iraqi civilians have been killed.

Kofi Annan, the United Nations Secretary General, has referred to the Iraq war as "illegal," according to the UN charter. Republican Senator Chuck Hagel recently said, "We are not winning. Things are getting worse."

Instead of diminishing the threat of terrorism we have created a breeding ground for a whole new generation of suicide bombers. The the report was "clear evidence that we are prevailing in the fight" on terrorism. There was just one problem: the numbers were wrong. After some independent analysts looked at the report they concluded that terrorist incidents have not declined in 2003 but instead have been the highest in over 20 years. Colin Powell appeared on Meet the Press apologizing for the "big mistake" insisting that they had made an error and it was not a "political judgment."

In light of all this information we might want to look again at Mr. Cheney's comment. Maybe it is "absolutely essential" we make the right choice on Nov. 2. If Bush's first term is any indication of our future prospects of safety, I would have to say that four more years looks pretty grim.

Making Americans Safer? Some Thoughts on Homeland Security

Student Affairs.

Shear explained that he was informed he wouldn't be rehired at that meeting.

"My name was one of the three finalists, I was incumbent, and I was eligible," said Shear. "So there was no reason not to hire me. I was one of the three names!"

Shear went on to assert that CSI would rather have no GM than him for a GM, "someone who had been here for 10 years and had done a fine job."

However, Carol Brower disagreed. "David was one of many candidates for the position," Brower asserted. "Nobody was saying he did a bad job."

Indeed, Shear asserted that he had accomplished his goals for WSIA, which has made it more difficult for him to understand the administration's decision not to give him the full-time position. "There was nothing anybody could complain about," said Shear. "In my 2 years here we reduced the budget deficit 2 years in a row. We also increased our revenues."

Despite not being hired for the position, Shear has nothing against WSIA. "I still have a love for the station." Shear said, but is concerned that the administration wants his involvement with WSIA to come to a close. "When they heard I wanted to become a community volunteer, the administration said no.

"That's not the case," countered Carol Brower. "The administration does not want to bring on any changes to the station when there is no General Manager to make those decisions."

At a recent visit to WSIA, Shear noted "there was a history of a strained relationship between the station and the administration." Shear said, "My effort was to heat everything up."

Shear offered his advice to the man who will eventually become the permanent General Manager: "The biggest challenge would be to try sincerely to improve the station, despite the bureaucratic micromanagement and hidden agendas."

In an e-mail to The Banner, former general manager Greg Adamo gave his thoughts on finding a replacement. "My experience is that running a college radio station is a challenging position," he wrote. "I certainly know that I am not irreplaceable."

The Banner will continue to cover this story as it unfolds. Will there ever be a new General Manager for WSIA? Who will he-or she-be?

At this point, the only certainty is ... the search goes on.

was then confronted by seven individuals who asked about the ticket on the car. The individuals involved included two non-students and two current students. At that time the traffic enforcer called Public Safety for assistance.

"The peace officers asked the suspects to go in their cars and leave campus," said Director Martinez. "But instead of leaving, a verbal fight ensued."

According to the videotape, a scuffle broke out between the officers and the men, and led to two officers being knocked down, and one being kicked while on the ground.

Meanwhile, assisting Officer Gil Garcia was struck by a Mercedes Benz as it tried to flee the scene. He sustained injuries to his calf and knee and chipped a bone in his foot. The owner of the car was later identified as a former student of CSI.

"The owner of the car said he was not driving it that day. Someone else was driving it," Martinez said. "The detective on the case is currently trying to contact the alleged driver." This may take a long time, since only a first name was given.

Within 10 minutes of the scuffle, three police cars from the 122nd precinct arrived and placed one of the non-students under arrest for second-degree assault and criminal trespassing.

Director Martinez, Dean Michael Daniels, and Vice President Aponte arrived on the scene during this time.

"It should have ended there," said Angelo Aponte, CSI's Vice President of Finance and Administration. "But the other guys kept revving it back up."

Student Government members, Taiwo Olasupo and a friend helped reduce the level of confrontation by taking the two men left aside and cooling them down in the parking lot.

Another individual was arrested after he interfered with the first arrest, and then threatened Dean Daniels when Daniels asked him to calm down.

Another unidentified man remains wanted by police. According to the video footage, he is seen interfering with police business.

The District Attorney subpoenaed the videotape, which will be presented to a grand jury. The two men arrested were released on bail but may face jail time if found guilty.

As for the status of the two current students, one withdrew from the college the day after to avoid academic dismissal, while the other is still being sought by police.

"He will be brought with charges of violation of the Henderson Rules," Martinez said.

"The interesting thing is the

amount of restraint that the public safety officers used," said Aponte. "As we reviewed the tape, it's clear that they could've used more force than they did."

Aponte also wanted to make clear that the officers didn't use their batons at any time during the scuffle and are seen in the video constantly pointing for the accused assailants to leave, pushing and separating the men.

Officer Elsayed Khedr was on the Egyptian Olympic Karate team. When Martinez asked him why he didn't use his skills, he said, "I was afraid I might hurt someone."

"Officer Khedr's statement personified the actions of the Public Safety Officers," said Aponte. "They handled themselves very well."

According to Martinez, besides Lehman College there are no other public or private college that have armed officers. And while it is up to the President to arm officers, Martinez doesn't think it's necessary in New York City. "We have the biggest and best trained police department minutes away," he added.

An independent investigation, called for by President Springer, will be conducted by Professors Orlowsky and Garcia. Once completed, they will bring their findings to the President and take it from there.

"It's too soon to indicate, but no changes are contemplated as of now," stated Aponte.

"The students, faculty, and staff of the College must enjoy a safe environment in which to study, learn, teach, and work," President Springer wrote in a press release. "The College will take appropriate action against those who violate our Code of Conduct and the laws of the City and State of New York to ensure the safety of our campus."

Springer also wished the Public Safety Officers "a swift and complete recovery," and expressed her appreciation for "their prompt response and assistance in this matter."

Vice President Aponte gave the Banner access to the official report to **CSI's College Council, which stated** that on Tuesday, September 7th, "two former students involved in the incident distributed an inflammatory flier on campus alleging that the incident was racially motivated. For the record, of 36 Public Safety Officers, nineteen are persons of color: 9 are black, 2 are Asian, 7 are Hispanic, and 1 is Eavptian, 17 are white. Six of the officers are female. Of the four officers injured in the incident, two were Hispanic, one was Egyptian, and one was white."


Lazarus began acting when she was 12 years old ,and now she is 21 and her experience is increasing as the years and jobs pass.



From New York City . . . with love



Tithe: A Modern Faerie Tale; by Holly Black; 336 pages; Simon Pulse, April 2004

Faeries are supposed to be delicate, fragile, and full of benevolent magic, or so the stereotypes would have you believe. For those of us who like our fantasies dark and dangerous, Holly

Fierce Faeries: Welcome to Holly Black's Dangerous World

Black is definitely a must-read. *Tithe:* A Modern Faerie Tale is a novel that takes the conventions of what faeries have come to be in folklore and incorporates darker elements that Disney never dared to touch.

Tithe centers around 16-yearold Kaye Fierch, a teen travelling with her wannabe rock star mom Ellen, front woman of the band "Sweet Pussy."

When Ellen's rocker boyfriend Lloyd attacks her, Kaye and Ellen return to industrial New Jersey to live with Kaye's grandmother. There, Kaye hangs out with the flamboyant Janet, her trailer trash best buddy, and searches for the faeries that were once her childhood friends. Unwittingly, she stumbles into an ongoing war between two faerie courts, the Seelie and the Unseelie.

Tithe is more than a faerie tale. It is a novel that explores the themes of identity. There's Kaye, struggling to decide whether or not the nomad life is for her, along with discovering her own power as a woman. When realizing her power over one boy in particular. characters are well developed, and the evolving relationship between Kaye and Roiben, a sensual, dark fey knight, is filled with enough conflicting emotion and heat to keep it interesting. The imagery is succulent, such as a Queen's laugh "[rising] up out of her throat like crows going to wing."

Black delves into issues of pleasure and pain, using enchantment as a metaphor for vulnerability. The metaphors in this novel are subtle, clever, and effective. The central novel and a fast read that's a cure for Lord of the Rings overload. A new generation of faerie enthusiasts and literature buffs will appreciate the gothic tones of Black's haunting new world. Anyone who can turn the Jersey shore into a battleground for faeries and humanity has truly performed some magic of her own.

looking at certain things in the game's menu, such as how many hours you played the game, to big play accomplishments, like returning a punt or kick or completing a game without the other team scoring any points.



Poetry classes.

Q. Have you written anything yourself?

A. I wrote a book called Performing the Word– African American Poetry as a Vernacular Culture. It discusses the relationship between poetry written and folk practices and language use. I have written biographies of authors, and critical pieces. I am also put together an anthology of poems as a tribute to Gwendolyn Brooks. Right now I'm working on a study of Black Women Poets.

Q. What was life like during the civil rights movement?

A. I grew up in a predominantly black environment up until high school. I was one of twelve. Ever since then I've been a minority. I was part of the integration generation. The Archdiocese at the time was integrating schools. This all gave me a strange sense of the world. I learned that white people were diverse. Many of the kids I went to school with were children of immigrants and were bilingual.

When I became homeroom and freshman president, I had to learn to pronounce all the names. I was on the Catholic Interracial Council. There was an idea that the black people should open their doors to white people. My mother wouldn't allow that, but I went with my class to a man's house and he showed videos of his daughter's graduation. The camera astonishes everyone. Blacks and whites are really the same. I wasn't eager to participate in the demonstrations and whatnot. I did not want to be on the receiving end of the spitting and the rocks. However my friends were part of SNIC, and went on freedom rides. I was part of "The Town Criers." We were freedom singers and gave concerts to raise money. I was more of a witness to history than a participant. I met

Martin Luther King Junior, Malcolm X, and Nelson Mandela.

Q. You were coming up for tenure in Tennessee, why did you leave?

A. I left because I didn't want to live there anymore. I wanted a different life. I'm coming up for tenure at CSI, but now I think that I'm approaching the end of my working days. When I retire I'll probably read more, I will keep traveling, I'll write and maybe I'll teach occasionally. A perfect day for me would be not doing anything that I don't want to do.

Q. Have any of your ancestors been in slavery?

A. My family originated here because of slavery. My great grandmother was born into slavery. Her older siblings experienced more of it. She always heard stories from her mother. The parents of my father's parents were slaves.

Q. Is there something you regret doing in your life?
Is there something that you would have liked to do?
A. I don't look back. I can't regret because everything that has happened made me who I am, and I like who I am. I would have liked to learn and speak another language. I spoke Swahili for a time.
Q. Has there been anyone in your life that has influenced you?

A. All of the women in my family have influenced me. There was one woman I worked with that influenced me. She was the only Black woman with a college degree. We both liked clothes and she was my first adult friend. She was super confidant and was my role model.

Q . What are your thoughts about CSI?

A. I applied to work here because I like teaching urban students. I can relate to them. I'm sorry that most students don't take advantage of college life. They come for the wrong reasons. I look forward to interested students.

Q . Do you have any advice for living?

A. I'm a firm believer in the rule that says: what you put out, you get back.





For those who were wondering if


any of this year's CSI's home soccer games will be affected in any way, the answer to that question is not at all. The original field will continue to be used for this year's games.

The new field comes at an



"It's good to win," Borzymowski said, "but not like that." Saez was also ready to play. However she would have to wait for their next match. "I run a lot of miles to get ready," she said, "but I still need to practice."

CSI's tennis team has received a makeover, with only one player returning from last year, Richie May

Ynclino, who is the current number two seed.

"It feels good to be back," she said. Indeed, the coaching staff and the players are new members of the Dolphins. Bill Mueller was first hired as assistant coach.
