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## **CSI Looking to Straighten out Parking Loop**

## A study is underway that might just help our traffic woes

Students complain loudly about the traffic and parking problems that plague CSI and the faculty and administration express their sympathy.

So what else is new?

Here's what: At a Student Leader conference held in IP 116 on September 18th, President Springer announced that a study of the loop road, traffic flow and parking problems was in the works.

"We know that parking is horrible here," said Springer. "Traffic is a problem and has been a problem since we moved to this campus."

According to Springer, 400 more paved parking spaces on campus would cost more than \$1 million. Carol Brower (Director of Student Life), Vice-President Carol Jackson, and eight student leader were also present at the meeting.

"What about the possibility of paving the gravel parking lots?" asked Nafisa Ahmad. The President responded by delineating a number of problems with that idea, one being drainage.

One possibility on the table is moving the loop road. The loop road (behind the south campus buildings and gravel parking areas) would be straightened out north of the fountain (see map at right). Trees would be removed and planted in different parts of the campus for new parking spaces.

#### GREEN LIGHT ON VICTORY

On a related front, Springer reported that she has asked the City's Department of Transportation to increase the time allotted for left turns into campus. Springer said DOT would "look into it" with their own study.

"I<sup>°</sup> could save them a bunch of money," said Springer. "Just make [the light] longer."

"I admire their work ethic and their positive sprit and that's what keeps me going as an administrator."

Although there will be a search for the permanent position of Provost, Podell will be eligible to apply, and is seriously considering the option.

Addiction, under-age sex and regret are being sold for \$20 a pill. And we're buying.

The continued rise in popularity of clubbing and secret raves has made it apparent that the use of Ecstasy is alive and well.

Everyone knows someone who is selling it; "E" or "X." According to Jenn, 18, it is "the ultimate party drug."

One pill purchased inside a club can cost from 20 to 30 dollars, while pills bought outside can run 15 dollars a piece.

"Buying Ecstasy outside the club can be easier, and safer, but it's just more time consuming," says Angie, a 20 year-old student who frequents clubs. "If you know the right people inside, it's no problem." Just who are the right

people? For Angie, it is her friend Gina, whose way of purchasing the drug is very scientific.

"First she starts dancing," says Angie. "Then she'll make eye contact with a dealer and raise her fingers in the amount she needs."

Double-stacked is a single pill which contains 50% more potency than normal. It is the brand of choice for Angie and her friends.

"You take one hit of that and you are gone for hours!" says Carl, a selfproclaimed club kid. "You wouldn't believe some of the stuff that goes on when you're on E."

Typical nightclub scene: On the dance floor, people are moving to the music; on the floor sit a handful of people, staring at the lights in wonderment; and against the wall lean another group. The wall is where Angie and her friends have matriculated.

"It makes you very touchyfeely," Angie says. "I was just sitting there one night and this chick comes over to me and starts rubbing my back. I didn't mind, though. Being touched feels so much better when you're flying off your head.

"You can do anything on X without worrying about any consequences," she continued. " That's the best part." "We just want to have fun," says

ress at a local diner and confesses that a large part of her weekly tips goes toward supporting her drug habit. "My mom found out once and grounded me," says Amber. "Now I just hide it better. What she doesn't know won't hurt her."

SOCIAL TURNS INTO EVERYDAY Krista is a 19 year-old high school dropout. She used to take Ecstasy socially at parties and clubs. But it seemed that there was a new party every night, and soon she was hooked.

"Sometimes I do it before work or even at work," she says. "Whenever I get the chance."

Krista used to be determined to join the Marines. Now she works in a diner. "I don't know what I want to do with my life, but for now I just want to have fun."

"I started smoking pot then tried acid and mushrooms," says Amber. "I did ecstasy for the first time at a club on thanksgiving Eve. I will try anything once."

The only thing some kids care about is getting high, but they have their reasons: "Just because I like to party on the weekends doesn't mean anything," says Angie. "I have a job, I go to school, and I have a good GPA. I think I deserve to have fun."

Perhaps Angle is right. Maybe kids deserve to party. But this isn't just partying. This is reckless abandon. Kids are going to clubs and taking a drug that alters their state of being and end up having sex with total strangers who also may happen to be hopped on on E. Until there is a strict crackdown on clubs and raves, the problem can only get worse. "It is so

easy to get Ecstasy in just about any club," says Gina. "It's just really accessible."

"I'm not afraid of cops and stuff," said Carl. "I haven't been to a place that's been raided yet, and I don't think it will happen. They just don't know where to look."

## X Marks the Spot

Type in "Ecstasy" on Yahoo, and this is what you get:

- Last year, Ecstasy use among teens jumped an additional 20%.
  Since 1999, teen Ecstasy use increased by 71%.
- More than 12% of teens report trying Ecstasy at least once in their lives
- ♦ From 1998 to 1999, deaths from ecstasy increased 400%.
- Emergency Room visits involving ecstasy grew nine-fold from 1996-1999 (319 to 2,850); most patients were under the age of twenty-five.
- Drinking too much water on ecstasy can be lethal. After people have taken ecstasy, their blood contains high concentrations of vasopressin. As levels of this hormone increase, the body retains more water, which dilutes the sodium and other salts in the blood. This can swell the brain causing damage to the brain and nerve tissue.
- Ecstasy is used by more American teenagers today than Cocaine.
- Ecstasy causes longlasting damage to brain areas that are critical for thought and memory.

## NYPIRG to Pataki: **Take Higher Education Off** State Chopping Block

New York State's budget deficit may be shifting the burden of education costs from State government to NY families.

Talk of a meeting between **Governor Pataki and State legislators** has compelled NYPIRG to write a letter that advocates taking cuts to higher education "off the table."

Between 1990 and 2000 the cost of higher education in New York has increased 97%. In 1995, tuition was raised \$750 and undergraduate enrollment dropped by 29,000.

NYPIRG's letter asserts that increased tuition will also mean cuts in financial aid programs. Such cuts will affect students who depend on the Tuition Assistance Program (TAP), ultimately jeopardizing their access to higher education


was straight from the book and didn't take advantage of his greatest skill, which is improvising in order to make







At the end of Raimondi's essay, the author issues a challenge for someone to take issue with his opinions: "If you don't like at I have to say. I would love prove me wrong."





Piebald We Are the Only Friends We Have



Among the unpredictable antics, quirky lyrics and windmill guitar strums, Piebald, from Andover, Mass., has been titillating crowds with their unique brand of emo pop punk. The band's recent release, "We Are the Only Friends We Have" is laced with catchy rifs, intense hooks and sing-along choruses. In the midst of all this work the band manages to have a good time, even going so far as to claim they have the best job ever.

'There's nowhere else I'd rather be, every single minute of every single day," said lead singer and guitarist **Travis Shettel.** 

Shettel's statement becomes apparent in their live performances. Their shows, filled with wacky anecdotes and unavoidable crowd participation, both amuse and entertain. Shettel, along with bassist Andrew **Bonner and guitarist Aaron Stuart** employ various rock and roll tactics such as the Townsend-esque windmill strums and synchronized heavy metal head bobbing; all employed with such perfect timing it seems choreographed.


