Turn On, Log In, Chill Out

September may have had a puzzled gaze upon first seeing the message that they had to "log-in" in order to use the campus' computer facilities. However, having to log-in is not a large change in policy but just a new procedure says Michael Kress, the

Assistant Vice-President for Technology Systems at the College. The new automated procedure is more effective and less staff intensive than the previous method of swiping your valid student ID and then being assigned a computer by the lab technician, Kress explained. There some instances in the past of students not wanting to

hand over their ID and a few heated arguments between staff and students over the process. Now even students who have left their ID at home can have access to a computer on campus.

Each campus within the university has to choose how to best implement the policy, according to Kress. Hunter and Kingsborough are also adopting this model in some of their computer labs. It promotes student use of the labs. According to Kress, computer resources utilization on campus is at almost 99% (a number important to ensure more computer resources for the school in the future). It also cuts down on non-authorized use of student resources. There have been

instances in the past

"We have chosen not to censor. It is a significant choice, we don't block sites based on content because we are dedicated to academic freedom," Kress added. In no way does signing into the campus network allow the school to search content being looked at by students and faculty. "There is no big brother complex at work," he said.

Privacy is a key feature in the new

the net and check their e-mail. The first two computers are only the first step toward what will soon be an Internet Cafe area with in the campus center. There are three additional computers available for 1C,Vice-President Kress stated. "We are just waiting for the furniture. We will add more (computers) as student demand increases."


The Internet Cafe was envisioned by

Assistant Vice-President Michael Daniels of the Student Life department. Knowing the library was going "UN-PLUGGED" Daniels asked if the

same could be done at the campus center. The cafe computers are for online searches and checking mail only. There is a time limit due to to demand and there are no other applications on them for students to do intensive class work.

The "Un-plugged Library" which also started in September, allows a student to borrow one of ten new Internet Ready IBM "THINK PAD" Laptop computers from the circulation desk for a two-hour period, Monday through Friday until 2PM (last return at 4 pm.)

All students with a valid student ID are given a log-in username and password, which they should change immediately after signing in for the first time. Students in need of a code should go to 2A-306.

"CSI's computer resources are for students," Kress added. "Someone who just got off the Victory Boulevard bus should not be able to


walk into a lab. People who need access to computer resources as far as the educational objectives of the college are given log-in IDs the same as students."


Of course, much like using your home PC, you are legally accountable for what you do on the Internet. "The guideline you should follow is if you don't do it at home, don't do it here," says Kress.

procedure due to the fact that all computers on the log-in network feature "Go Back," a program that automatically resets the computer information to the settings it possessed before you logged in.

Being responsible members of the academic community does have its advantages. Log-in capability means that CSI can now join the growing number of colleges with wireless computing services, a list that includes such technological heavyweights as Stanford and MIT according to a November 2000 article in *Rolling Stone* magazine.

The college's new wireless services began last spring with the addition of two PCs to the campus center cafeteria in order for students to be able to surf



The Banner Not Exactly Hitting the Spot



Peace Conference Held on Island's South Shore

President and top aides

House to discuss

"The old Conference house you are asking about?" asked the man that lives across the street from it. "That old house just takes up a lot of space, and it belongs to the English. We should have burned it."

The New York City Department of Cultural Affairs and the office of Staten Island Borough President writes that the Conference House is the only surviving monument of the manner of life of our Americans 17th century.

Where the Fate of the U.S. Has Changed, written by C.J. Henderson, explains that some 330 years ago a powerful landowner, Christopher Billopp built a great stone house on the southern tip of Staten Island, on 932 acres of land. The property was given to him by the Governor.

A century later, Billopp's great grandson offered old Billopp house as the meeting place for a peace conference. Lord Howe suggested that this conference take place so the

American and British governments could discuss the American Revolution. The peace conference was held on September 11th, 1776.

Sara Beth Hobel author of the Guide of Historic Houses in New York City Parks, wrote that the Admiral Howe, England's representitive, met with the Continental Congress including members Benjamin Franklin, John Adams and Edward Rutledge. The Billopp house, or as it's known nowadays, the Conference House, became central as war advanced on Staten Island. "The Colonel set command here. Billopp's militia and British soldiers lived here. American soldiers attack the house repeatedly."

Henderson wrote that after the Americans won the war, Christopher Billopp was forced to give up his house and land. For the next 150 years the house passed from one owner to the next, all the while remaining obscure. One owner converted the residence to a inn. Others made structural alterations. At the present time, the house and its




furnishings are bold in appearence, and are of the colonial style.

The house itself is rectangluar. It boasts an impressive main hall, as well as an attic of immense dimension.

The masonary comes from local stock,

unusual small stones, mortar and seashells. The first floor is the parlor where Franklin and others met for the peace conference. The master bedroom and colonel's office are one flight up. The basement is furnished with a huge colonial kitchen with a fireplace. The basement also contains a dungeon that was used for imprisoning rebel soldiers. It is rumored that an escape tunnel was fashioned, leading from the basement to Raritan Bay.

Anyone riding a city bus or subway car in the last few years will no doubt have noticed ads from the City University of New York encouraging New Yorkers to hop aboard the CUNY Express. Anyone drawn in by this curious metaphor lining up against your train's ceilings will remember that the CUNY Express makes all stops on the path toward success. One of those stops is apparently the College of Staten Island.

You may have never met him but if you entered the college within the last two years, Emmanuel Esperance Jr., the Assistant Director of Recruitment and Admissions, may have helped you on your own path to academic success.

"We like to say that we are the gate keepers. We try to market the school, recruit students to apply to the college and hopefully enroll them," Esperance said. "We create college students at CSI. That's what we do."


Esperance, a 28 year-old Brooklyn native, graduated from Midwood High School then decided to "cross the street" to attend Brooklyn College. He had initially planned to transfer to SUNY Stonybrook after a year but wound up getting his Bachelor's degree and finding his true calling, a career in higher education.

After receiving his Masters degree from Baruch in 1999, Esperance came to CSI in April 2000 to oversee the admissions process for undergraduates. After some restructuring within the department, he now coordinates all aspects of graduate admissions and recruitment.

"When you're an undergrad, it's not just about the academics, it's about finding out who you are," said Esperance. "There has to be a balance between academics and what happens outside the classroom because that's what really matters on the undergraduate level. 



Public points fingers at what may have incited the WTC tragedy

ver since the horrific events of September 11th, most people would assume that the citizens of the United States would be unified in their conviction that it would be necessary to avenge these "acts of war."

However, this has not been the case. On Wednesday November 28th, the Third Rail and the S.I. Greens organized an assembly to address the World Trade Center tragedy and America's response. Eight panelists were each given fifteen minutes to express their reactions to the terrorist attacks and the retaliations that have taken place in Afghanistan.

there are no other alternatives but to engage in war, and that the principle of proportionality have been considered. One must conduct one's own war and take responsibility for this war. According to Burkum, "We are not currently involved in a war."

Other panelists disagreed with this statement, particularly Marty Goodman, a transit worker and member

Israelis any support as they continue their fight with Palestine.

The dissatisfaction with American foreign policy was a recurrent issue throughout the meeting. Professor Harry Cason, who specializes in Political Science at CSI, talked about a small group of people he believes runs this country. They are called the "me" group and have no collective national

America became involved in war against people who would not bow down to their policies. They also agreed that the innocent lives lost at the World Trade Center were sacrificed on the altar of corporate America and United States citizens have been draped in a new American flag—the dollar bill.

A more patriotic perspective came from two other panelists.

"There is no justification for terrorism," said Professor George Sterns. He admitted that his percention of society.

admitted that his perception of society prior to the attacks had moved away from moral ethics and drifted towards shallowness and egocentricity. However, Sterns feels the "beauty of shallowness and democracy allows us to come together." The effect of this calamity has helped strengthen the nation and as a result, form communities, thus drifting away from a "me" standpoint.

Michael Christiano, a professor at Wagner College approved of Sterns' ideas, saying, "The United States past sins do not justify these crimes."

The audience was given a chance to react to the panelist's' opinions. Some left-of-center reactions came from a

The first speaker, Keith Burkum, a philosophy professor at CSI, opened the meeting by elaborating on the meaning of a "just war." He outlined different criteria that ancient philosophers developed in explaining how a war might be considered righteous and appropriate. Focusing mainly on the ideas of St. Augustine and Thomas Aquinas, Burkum's agenda stated that a just war exists when war is initiated by legitimate authorities, there is a just cause, there is a need for correct intention,

of the New York City Laborers Against The War. He argued that it is time to look past the tragedy and look for solutions without bloodshed. Goodman believes that "we should not punish a country because of the actions of a few" and views this war as one that is not in the interest of the working people, but for those with a corporate agenda. He also strongly denounced United States foreign policy, particularly our policies regarding Israel, claiming that the United States should not offer the

interest. He believes that the "me" group consists of the upper class and they are responsible for the establishment of the United Nations, who do not appeal to a majority of working class, but a majority of affluent busi-

Two other speakers, Dave Edwards a free-lance reporter and Brenda Stokely a social worker, agreed with Cason's theory of U.S. foreign policy. All three rehashed previous incidents in United States history in which an imperialist more middle-aged group who tended to agree with most of the panelists in their disapproval of foreign policy and the influence and corruption of big businesses. Younger college student's' responses were more loyal and some said they would continue to "wrap themselves in the flag of patriotism."

Regardless of who or what people may blame for the carnage of September 11th, all who participated in this discussion held common ground in their condemnation of this unfathomable ordeal.
