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

The Williamson Theater filled with smoke when a backdrop caught fire Wednesday 13th at 10:15 PM. It is still a mystery as to how this hap-

EMT instructor Willie Wright alerted security of the fire. He stated, "I smelled the fire." His class was in the building at the time of the fire.

Security quickly arrived on the

scene and put out the fire. The backdrop, which was the source of the
smoke, was lowered and quickly extinguished. Every level one security guard
on the campus was

at the scene.

"It's a good thing these backdrops are fireproof or it would have been much worse," stated Sergeant Pete Licata.

Licata added, "Looks like one of the lights started the fire."

Theater worker Ken Bach stated, "[The lights] were absolutly off."

Facility Manager Felicia Ruff replied, "We don't know how it happened."

The most disturbing fact is

that the smoke alarm did not go off.

Raymond Pavia stated, "The construction people are still working in there." Pavia continued, "I am grateful

Pavia also does not know how the fire started. He stated, "I didn't get a clear answer."


Pavia, however, had this to say: "Everybody did what they were supposed to do and they did it in a timely fashion."

The confusion could be attributed to the fact that the Performing and Creative Arts Center just opened completely this semester.

Ruff stated, "We only started occupying the building since July."

The PCA building has a \$39.7 million price tag attached to it, and it is the most expensive building at the college.

While the investigation as to the cause of the fire continues, classes are expected to continue as usual in the building.


Loop bus driver "Mike" claims that he is not responsible for the accident. "She shot out, she hit

College Recognizes the Disabled

The College of Staten Island will be recognizing Disability Awareness Day for the first time on the Willowbrook

On September 27, participants and observers will meet at 10 AM at the atrium of building 1A. Margaret Venditti from the Office of Disability Services would like to "increase sensitivity and awareness" of students and especially faculty towards the needs of the handicapped.

Faculty and Administration have been asked to participate in simulation experiments. Invitees will experience what it is like to maneuver on campus in a wheel chair, with a cane, on crutches or with a walker. Some will be asked to find their way on the grounds with glasses which will obstruct their vision. Dr. Jed Luchow will also be holding a workshop in the same vein for the learning disabled.

The college had participated in Disability Awareness Day previously at the Sunnyside Campus. The Banner feels that the faculty will find these experiments a little more difficult this year as they trudge along on the cracked pavement and sloped paths. In an interview with Ms. Venditti she stated, "The College has always been cooperative in following the codes of

-the Rehabilitation Act - Section 504, which stresses equal access." Still, she wants it to be noted that some of the ramps are difficult for students to handle alone. Also, faculty who require visually impaired students to take open book tests are actually testing the knowledge of assistants. It is unrealistic to expect a student who has studied with an audio tape to take an open book test.

It has occurred to The Banner that some students have difficulty relating to disabled people. Although the events are intended to sensitize faculty, we would like to encourage all students to meet at 10 AM Wednesday, September 27 to receive assignments.

The Sports Recreation Area has been under construction for over a year now and there is still no answer concerning the date of its completion. The Banner was given a tour of the new building and

some insight into its future. Asst. Athletic Director Terry Small informs us that CSI's Sports Recreation Area is the best Division III building around. He also tells us that this new campus wonder will be open to all stu-

First, let's get more information about what to expect from the Sports Recreation Area. Students will be admitted for free every day, including Saturdays and Sundays. There is a 25 meter pool, with 2 meter diving boards and enough seating for 150 spectators. The four paddle ball courts will require appointments and they too have enough

seats to fit close to 100 spectators. A fitness center occupies 2000 square feet where you can find any kind of fitness machines ranging from rowing machines to stairmasters. An issue room is being built so that those students without the proper equipment can rent that equipment for a small fee.

No permanent lockers are to be given out, however, so any patron must use that space given for only for the duration which they are there.

Most of the facility is either complete or in the final stages of construction.

Warning to all those who read this article: This subject matter is very interesting and addictive. You will love it whether or not you're a computer buff. With this out of the way, let me tell all the beginners out there about this wonderful place called "The Internet," or, more simply, the

For those who don't know what the Net is, here's a brief primer. It started 20 years ago when the U.S. Defense department tried to connect their computer network (the ARPAnet) to various radio and satellite networks. It was soon deemed unreliable because if one section went out the whole network went dead. So it was redesigned, and academic and research facilities were added to it. This was the predecessor of the current Net. As the Net's popularity grew, more and more people became addicted to it. Its growth was also fueled by the desktop computer explosion and an increase use of Local Areas Networks (LANs). So here we are with the Net we have now. This may seem like it happened overnight, but it really took between 10 to 15 years. One note I'd like to add: the Net has become so huge that even if one whole section were to go down, the Net would still function. This is because all the major sites are mirrored (copied) in dif-

ferent parts of the world. I will not get into how the Net works because that's a whole article in itself.

There are many different functions available to you once you are connected. Telenet, FTP, Email, Usenet, and the World Wide Web (WWW) are the main functions that I use, but there are many others to fit everyone's needs and interests. Allow me to explain the one's I know:

•Telnet: A text based system which lets you log into other computers on the Net. It's used to access lots of public services, including library card catalogs, public chat rooms, text based Net games, and other kinds of data bases.

•FTP: Also known as "File Transfer Protocol." This is a way to move files back and forth between systems. The programs that do this are primarily used to get information, programs, and shareware games from public sites that are scattered along the Net.

• Email: Electronic mail allows you to send messages anywhere. The beauty of this is that the recipient gets it almost instantaneously. You can also send attachments such as pictures, game programs, or whatever else you'd •Usenet: Also known as "Bulletin Boards" or "Public News Groups," where you can read and/or post responses on particular topics. Usenet is also the largest bulletin board ser-

• World Wide Web: Has become most popular and sought-after method of Net travel. It's full of graphics as well as text. With the creation of new processes the WWW is becoming more interactive.

The browser of choice for the WWW is Netscape, which is now implementing the newest methods as they come about.

Well, this ends the primer. Now it's time to get you to use the school network to get on line - and, yes, it's free.

The school network is really easy to use. First I will talk about using the I.B.M's, then I will turn to the Macintosh.

First go to any I.B.M. lab. At the startup, when it asks you to login, type "guest". (Without the quotes, of course.) Then hit the escape key (the one which says "esc") to exit the Novell Menu. At the prompt, type "win", and open the Internet group. Choose Netscape and there you are. If Netscape is not there, use File

Manager to open it from the Netscape directory. Netscape is fairly simple to use. (I'll explain in a future article.) Now on to the Macintosh.

The Macs are just as simple. Open the Apple menu items, click on the chooser, open up the Information Technologies and, when asked for your name, type "guest" with no password. Go to the Netscape and there you go.

Netscape, as I said, is fairly easy to use. It will most likely open to the Netscape home page, where you can get a lot of in formation because it is broken up into many sections. All you have to do is click on any words that are highlighted to follow that link to something more. You can spend hours looking around this way, or you can use the net search tools to look up key words to find what you are looking for. If you have a location address, then you can open the location from "open location" under the "file" menu on the tool bar.

As you can see - or soon will see - the "Net" is a fun and addictive place to be. Once you start finding your clique of interests, you will develop a huge "Hot List" of address and spend many an hour living in cyberspace. So, have fun and remember: "humans are roadkill on the information superhigh way." -unknown het

TLAs and Other Mysteries of the Net

Now that you are all ready to get on the Net, I figured that there are a couple of terms that you all should know so that there will be less confusion for all you beginners. This is the list that I have compiled. Enjoy.

ARPAnet (ARPA Computer Network)

Experimental network designed to see how well distributed, non-centralized networks work; the basis for the later evolution of the Internet.

•ATM (Asynchronous Transfer Mode)

A high-speed networking scheme and communication protocol designed with the transfer of multimedia data in mind. You can't get \$20 bills from here.

•Baud

Number of analog transitions per second: not to be confused with bps (although it often is). For example, 9,600 bps modems communicate at around 2,400 baud.

•BITNET

Network created by Ira Fuchs in 1981 to connect IBM computer centers around the world.

•bps (bits per second)

The amount of data that can be transmitted over a communications medium.

•BRB

Stands for "be right back."

•BTW

By the way.

•DPI (dots per inch)

A matrix used to measure print and screen resolution.

•Ethernet

A widespread networking scheme rated at 10 Mbps (megabits per second).

A piece of software that lets you find out more information about an Internet user, usually if that user is on a UNIX system.

•Flame

To send nasty or insulting messages, usually in response to someone's having broken the rules of neti-

•GIF (Graphic Interchange Format)

Yet another graphic file format. Most images that appear on the Web are in GIF format. It was developed by CompuServe using compression technology from Unisys.

•HTML (HyperText Markup Language) The coding method used to format

documents for the World Wide Web. •IETF (Internet Engineering Task

Force) An open community of networkers who manage and shape the Internet. World Wide Web browsers

Display text, graphics, and links on a Web page by translating the HTML tags inserted into a plain-text

•IRC (Internet Relay Chat)

he Internet's version of CB radio IRC lets you join a channel and converse with other folks on the same channel in real time. Most channels are focused on specific topics of discussion.

•ISDN (Integrated Services Digital Network) Digital telephony scheme that allows two simultaneous connections over the same wire; can include audio or data.

•ISP (Internet Service Provider)

A company that provides access to

the Internet.

•JPEG (Joint Photographic Experts Group) An algorithm for compressing still images. Motion-JPEG, a variation of JPEG, is used to compress moving images.

MorF (Male or Female)

When someone asks if you're male or female, you've been "MorFed!."

•MPEG (Motion Picture Experts

An algorithm for compressing audio and video; not to be confused with Motion-JPEG.

•Netiquette

Etiquette for the Internet.

•NNTP (Network News Transfer

A tool for transferring files through e-mail.

•PCMCIA (Personal Computer Memory Card International Association)

Notebook computers that have PCMCIA slots can use credit cardsized modems, sometimes referred to as PC Cards.

•PDA (Personal Digital Assistant)

An expensive, hand-held electronic device designed to replace a date/address book. Also, public display of affection, which is generally allowed in high school.

•PROLLY

Short for probably.

•RGB (Red, Green, Blue)

The three colors that create all other colors on a computer screen.

•SMTP (Simple Mail Transfer Protocol) The standard Internet protocol for transferring electronic mail messages.

•SorG (Straight or gay)

See "MorF." •spam

To send identical postings to many different, and often inappropriate, newsgroups (a naughty thing to do); also, a trademark of Hormel.

Control •TCP/IP (Transport Protocol/Internet Protocol)

The protocol suite that makes Telnet, FTP, e-mail, and other services possible among computers that don't belong to the same network. Throughput

This describes the maximum amount of data that could be trans-

mitted under ideal circumstances. •TIFF (Tag Image File Format) A standard file format used for

scanning, storing, and interchanging gray-scale graphic images.

•TLAs (Three-Letter Acronyms)

The mysterious terms used to refer things net-related. See http://info.rutgers.edu/Computing/N etwork/Internet/General/Net-FAQ/11.html for a longer list of TLAs.


An operating system invented in 1969 at AT&T Bell Laboratories that was made available to researchers and students in 1973. It was used to develop the Internet's communication software protocols.

•URL (Uniform Resource Locator)

Describes the location and access method of a resource on the Internet. All Web sites have URLs.

Usenet

A network for distributing news items; originally set up in 1979, with Duke University as the central hub. This makes up what we now refer to simply as newsgroups.



Web Pages & Browsers: A Closer look

As you can see, to the left of this is a "World Wide Web Page". The browser is not complicated, and a new user can learn the basics quickly. What you see here is a typical homepage with text to identify its purpose and where it comes from. There can also be comments from the creator and lots of other fun stuff. Most pages have links to other pages from the same person or to places where they have been and like. There are also graphical logos, icons and an Email link to the creator. These are all the items that make the Web interactive. The browser is what you use to view these pages, and Netscape 1.1 (the browser of

...the browser is not complicated, and a new user can learn the basics quickly

choice) gives you enhanced viewing capabilities, such as background colors.

You access a page through the HTTP address on its location line. The Banner's HTTP address is: http://www.csi.cuny.edu/unauthorized/the_banner/default.html. (The default will soon be changed to banner.html). This page has a long address, but that's normal. You'll encounter smaller ones, also, like http://yahoo.com (the Net's most popular search engine). The good thing is that you have a bookmark's title on the tool bar and you can save your links there (on a "Hot List"), so you don't have to keep typing them.

The browser also has instant jump buttons like "What's New?", "What's Cool", "Net Search" (here you can search for a topic by name), "Net Directory" (search for a topic by group), and "Newsgroups" (here you can go directly to Usenet or whatever you set it for).

If you change the default page from the Netscape homepage to your own, you can click on the Netscape symbol (upper right) to get back to the Netscape homepage (more on Netscape next issue.)

As you can see the browser is not complicated, and a new user can learn the basics quickly. Next issue: more on Netscape and the other browsers. Till next time, Surf's Up.

Now that Nintendo pushed back the Ultra 64, they need a hit game for the Christmas season. Enter Killer Instinct for the Super Nintendo. With the lies that Nintendo spewed about the Ultra 64 being available this year at an Ultra-low price, it was hard for me to accept the fact that this 16-Bit cartridge would have all of the thrills of the arcade smash.

I was surprised. Just about everything is there, and unlike most of the previous Nintendo games, this one has violence. All of the finishing moves are there. The ridiculous combo system is there. It should have been expected

since it is the largest Nintendo 16 Bit game at a whopping 32 Megs. What's missing? All of the Ultra-cool 64-Bit effects, full

motion video, 3D scaling and rotation, the 64-Bit color palette, and just about every other frame. To compensate for the lack of space and the inadequacies of the SNES, the graphics needs to be altered. This means that the characters movements are choppy at times, especially during fatalities. It's nothing dras-

tic when you compare KI to other SNES games like Mortal Kombat II and Street Fighter II. But if you think you're getting a carbon copy, forget it.

While the graphics are not up to par with the arcade, the music kicks. This is the first game on the SNES where the music is better than the graphics. If you don't think so, listen to the free CD that comes with the game and compare. (Better hurry - it's only available with the first 2 million copies.) I felt I got my money's worth when I heard "Killer Instinct" rip through my speakers.

As for play control, it's all there (once you get used to the control pad). The combo movements are all the same, except for the ultra-cheap 80 hit combos, which were taken out. (Too bad, I miss the scores of 1.2 million and up.) If you were

the Killer King at the arcades you should have no problem wiping the floor with the computer at home. Even though the difficulty is variable, it doesn't seem to be much harder at higher levels.

The endings, as you may have known, are not anything to speak of. Without the full motion video, how could it compare to the arcade? Even with

that in mind, the ending are still pretty lame. SFII Turbo is probably the only SNES fighting game with above average endings.

Basically, we have another fighting game. If you love the arcade game you won't be too disappointed with this version, unless an \$60-\$80 price tag scares you away.





Hello From Japan: Through My Eyes

I remember one clear morning last fall when I was walking to work. The air was crisp, the sky was blue, and the clouds a rich, puffy white. I closed my eyes and let my nose take in generous amount of air... and, for a moment, I was in Florence. I opened my eyes as quickly as I had closed them, and instantly realized my senses had deceived me. I was in Japan.



There was something familiar in the air that morning. It's amazing how a scent, no matter how insignificant it may be, can trigger a memory. What was it in the air that morning? Strangely enough, it was car exhaust fumes. Funny, isn't it? That common, everyday presence smelled jumes; my heart remembered *Fiats*.

It seems as though my heart will always belong to Italy. Some of my fondest memories are of that unforget-table semester in Florence. It's incredible to think that was over three years ago. And now, I keep those treasured memories close to my heart, and carry them wherever I go, and continue to explore the rest of this wonderfully crazy world.

At times I wonder where I'd be now if I had chosen different paths in my life (in all likelihood, I wouldn't be in Japan!). If I hadn't attended The College of Staten Island for four years, what would my life be like now? Not nearly as interesting. At the age of eighteen, I had no idea that an education in little ol' Staten Island would gift-wrap the world for me.

Whether or not I was always aware of it, my education at The College of Staten Island has shaped my life since that first long, tiresome wait on the registration line at the Sunnyside campus. Back in my freshman year, I was sitting in class when I was told about the opportunity to study overseas. Who knew that such a dream was actually possible to fulfill? Well, it was mine for the taking... and after a brief hesitation, I took it, and happily lost my heart to the sweet country of Italy.

And now, I'm here, twentythree years old and in the middle of rice fields.

> Why? Well, why not? How?

Admittedly, there have been times when I'm confused, myself, as to how I got here. I registered at The

College of Staten Island. I studied in Italy. I worked at the Center for International Service. I graduated from The College of Staten Island. I continued working for the Center...and then, in November of 1994, this thing called the Japan Exchange and Teaching Program (more commonly known as JET) was introduced to me. I would be employed to teach English to Japanese students in junior and senior high schools. The ironic thing

was that I had no prior teaching experience, and didn't need any in order to be accepted into the program.

At first, I doubted it was really something for me. But somehow – I can't remember how it happened – I began to seriously think about doing this strange thing: to live and work in Japan for a year.

If I hadn't been working at the Center for International Service, I don't think I ever would have considered the JET program for a minute. Japan! What an extremely foreign country it seemed to be!

But I did it. I hopped on a plane, waved good-bye to all that was familiar to me, and headed for the Land of the Rising Sun, to discover the other side of the world and meet new and intriguing people. . . while being paid a very handsome salary. Not a bad deal!

At times it wasn't so simple.

assumed I'd be in the classroom with students during most of my day. The truth is that the actual teaching time was minimal, and there were days on end when I'd sit at my desk at the board of education, an ornament to the office.

Frustration managed to set in quite often. My days in the office were mundane and unproductive. Soon I was faced with the reality that I wasn't hired by the Japanese government to only teach English. Underneath it all, it's so much more than that. It wants me, a young person from the West, to come to Japan, fall in love with it, then return home and spread the good word of how wonderful Japan is. It wants me to be an ambassador for my home country, and bring Western thoughts and ideas to Japan at the community level. Then, maybe, if the situation calls for it, I might be in the classroom once in a while. All of this done in the name of internationalization. It can all be a bit overwhelming at times, and difficult to understand. And it was at times like these when I truly comprehended how people from different cultures can have such different ideas about how one thing should be.

So, as I said, Japan challenged me and my way of thinking. It won; but I won too. Japan taught me invaluable lessons; things that can't be learned second-hand. By living here as a foreigner, I've learned tolerance from those times when the "Japanese

old woman on the street. Suddenly, everything would seem fine again; the sky was blue, and the mountains were a vibrant green. Japan was a friendly place.

Over the course of the year here I've noticed that Japan is a land of contradiction in the eyes of a westerner... its people can be immensely kind or downright rude, they'll want to hold on to traditional ways but borrow as much western culture as possible at the same time. But aren't we all like



that, to some extent?

So, do I regret spending my twenty-third year in the land of sushi and slippers? Not at all. The Asian world has become real to me. Before this venture, Japan was a completely different country in my eyes. It was the big bad wolf who was supposedly ruthlessly buying out my country. I was conscious of countries like Korea, Thailand, or Indonesia only when I'd look at the bottom of a camera or calculator, and where the names were preceded by those familiar words "Made In..." That's all changed now.

An extra, unexpected reward of my year in Japan was that I not only learned about Asian culture, but I also learned heaps about other western cultures. I've befriended other ALTs from New Zealand, England, Ireland and Wales. And it's always wonderful to discover how different and how similar we all are.

What does all this mean? I'm not entirely sure. Take it for what it's worth. One thing I am sure of is that the world is a pretty interesting place.. Every day, I'm reminded that education doesn't ever stop unless we allow it to. It continues in every minute of every day. To live is to learn, and as long as I'm living, I intend to keep learning.

Yvonne Thurman returned home from Japan in the end of July. She still keeps her ties with the Center for International Service. I spoke with her about my interest in studying in Italy (see last issue) but was concerned because I do not speak Italian. She said, "Once you are immersed into the culture, you'd be surprised how quickly you can catch on." She also said that studying abroad is an experience of a lifetime. . . something that everyone should experience.







Students Brace Themselves For Rising College Costs

(CPS) Ana Henderson, a Dartmouth College senior, was recently accepted into Harvard Law School but doesn't know if she'll be able to attend.

"I just don't see how I can afford it," says Henderson, who has already taken out \$23,000 in loans to finance her undergraduate education. "I'd have to borrow so much more money and put myself in debt for the rest of my

As Congress continues to debate cuts to the education budget, many of today's college students are finding themselves in situations similar to Henderson's, searching for options and answers as their educational dollars continue to shrink.

In order to achieve their goal of cutting \$10 billion from the Federal Family Education Loan Program, Republican lawmakers have proposed:

- · Eliminating the in-school interest exemption, which is paid to banks for accrued loan interest while students are in school, for graduate and professional students, saving \$3.1 billion over seven years.
- Cutting out the six-month grace period after graduation for all borrowers (\$4.1 billion).
- Eliminating the loan interest rate cut scheduled to take place July 1998 (\$1.5 billion).
- · Increasing the loan origination fee for students (\$1 billion).
- Reducing funding for the Pell Grant program to \$5.6 billion (\$600 million).
- · Eliminating funding for Perkins Loans Capital Contributions (\$1.1 bil-
- · Cutting out the State Student Incentive Grant program (SSIG), which provides matching funds for statebased financial aid (\$441 million, but the total loss to student aid could rise to \$882 million if states decline to offer funds).
- · Killing numerous scholarships and fellowships, including Early Intervention, National Science and Douglas Teacher scholarships; Harris, Javits and Faculty Development fellowships and various other smaller, specialized programs.
- Eliminating the \$10-per-loan payment to each school for processing of direct student loans (\$960 million).

Although President Clinton has vowed to veto measures that would hurt education, many students aren't encouraged by the action they see on Capitol

"Any cuts to federal financial aid is a cut to the future of the American economy," says Jeannette Galanis, president of the United States Student

Association. "You can't expect to improve the living situations for U.S. citizens in the long run when you cut higher education. It doesn't make any

Galanis says that if the Republican plan passes, the 6.7 million students who receive educational loans--nearly half of all current undergraduate and graduate students--will wind up paying thousands of dollars more for their education.

Already, students are feeling the pinch as federal and state grant dollars have failed to keep pace with the rising cost of tuition--which has risen 48 percent in the last five years, according to the American Council on Education (ACE).

As a result, students are juggling classes and work, taking out more loans, and putting off graduate school in order to pay the bills.

A recent report by ACE reveals that 41 percent of students at community colleges are studying part-time, as are 10 percent of the students at four-year public schools and 9 percent of those at private schools. Those numbers are up from 1991, when 19 percent of community college students took classes part-time, compared with 5 percent at both public and private four-year schools.

To cope with rising educational costs, the majority of students are turning to loans as the primary source for

their educational funding.

And although the student loan interest subsidy has been spared for current undergraduates, approximately 1.8 million graduate students will find themselves paying more for their education if the subsidy is scrapped.

"The financial impact of any cuts to the interest exemption could be disastrous for graduate students," says Kevin Boyer, director of the National Association of Graduate Professional Students. "If funding for higher education continues to decrease, graduate schools will end up with only the students who have the most money."

The impacts already are obvious. Fewer seniors are opting for graduate school immediately after graduation, opting for work instead, according to the ACE report. The study states that 84 percent of all grad students are 25 years old or more. In addition, 65 percent attend school on a part-time

Despite criticism by some who claim the student loan interest exemption gives students an unfair advantage over regular borrowers, Boyer says the original intent of the legislation is to provide student aid.

"The interest exemption is a lot like a grant," he says. "It's the way the government has chosen to support graduate education because the country stands to benefit from the graduates.'

And while the impact of the six-month grace period from loan repayment after graduation may seem minimal, a hia-

> "It wouldn't have been a disaster but if I had to start repaying my loan right away, it definitely would have meant that I wouldn't have been able to concentrate on finding the career I went to school for," says Robert Snarski, who graduated from the University of Illinois with over \$10,000 in outstanding loans in 1991. "I would have had to worry about taking that first source of income so I could pay my bills."

If loan subsidies and the grace period are phased out, the Department of **Education** estimates that students entering college in the fall of 1996 with plans to earn a bachelor's degree would face a sharp increase in

their educational debt. Students borrowing the maximum of \$23,000 will pay roughly 23 percent more than today's students, or \$339 a month for 10 years, compared with the current monthly payment of \$275.

Those continuing on to earn a master's degree will be hit even harder. According to the proposal, those who borrow the \$88,000 maximum while in school will owe \$167,723 upon graduation, based on a standard 10-year repayment plan of \$1,452 per month. In comparison, that same \$88,000 debt currently adds up to \$128,400, or \$1,070 per month.

Only a completed dissertation stands between Anthony Rosati and a Ph.D. in chemistry. But once the Georgetown University student completes his coursework, he faces a colossal debt of \$86,000. And while the Philadelphia native had always planned to teach at a small liberal arts college after earn-

ing his degree, he realizes that he may never see that dream come to fruition.

"I have to reconsider everything because on a professor's salary, I'd be paying back my loans on my deathbed," Rosati says. "I will probably have to take a job that I really don't want that pays more money just to

Although most students borrow far less than Rosati during the course of their academic lives, his situation is hardly unique. Department of Education officials estimate that the amount loaned to students is skyrocketing. In fact, of the \$183 billion borrowed in the student loan program since its inception in 1966, more than 22 percent of that debt was borrowed in the last two years alone. -

While most student borrowers view their loans as an investment in the future, there is the possibility that a student's college career won't end with a degree, considering 42 percent of entering students never graduate. And while student loans can be difficult enough to pay back for graduates, those who leave school early face even tougher odds.

"Students who fail to graduate have a much more difficult time paying off their loans," says Jamie Merisotis, who headed a recent study on the role of universities in student loan repayment for the Institute for Higher Education. "Schools need to make a direct effort to offer students more options than just loans in terms of financial assistance."

The Next Step, the Institute's report, indicates a higher college drop-out rate for those students who receive the bulk of their aid in loans, as opposed to those who receive the majority of their financial assistance in grants. The report shows that a \$1,000 increase in financial aid in the form of grants to low-income students translates to a 14 percent decrease in dropout rates. Conversely, a \$1,000 increase in loan aid means a 3 percent increase in dropout rates.

Merisotis suggests increasing federal and state grants to lower-income and minority students who have shown a vested interest in education throughout their schooling.

"Children who begin pre-school in Head Start programs are typical of the type of student you want to look out for," says Merisotis. "They should be counseled and tutored along the way to make sure that they're getting the same opportunities as the other students.

And opportunities are what education is all about, says Dartmouth's Henderson.

"Being born into a family with money shouldn't mean you get a better chance at an education than everyone else," says Henderson. "If that becomes the case, I don't think this is the kind of country I want to live in."

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
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


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
